A touchy subject, but— If you ask a blunt question you usually get a blunt answer. Asked in a nation-wide survey if they would just as soon vote a Catholic into the U. S. presidency as a man of their own religion, many U. S. Protestants and Jews said "no."

Fifty-one percent of the 71.1 million adult Protestants and 31 percent of the 3.5 million Jews gave this answer, the May Catholic Digest reports in an article on religion in American politics. Catholics, asked if they would vote willingly for a Protestant, were 92 percent agreed that they would as were 90 percent of the Jews. This is not, the article points out, proof of less bigotry among these groups. Other indications show that the strong Protestant position in this country is readily understood.

On a question of voting for a Jew for president, 57 percent of the Catholics reported that they would while only 31 percent of the Protestants shared their reaction. "All answers to this critical question seem to indicate that Catholics and Jews are less distrustful of each other than their Protestant neighbors are of them. However, Catholics and Jews must yet convince large numbers of their neighbors that, although they may be different, they are not necessarily less patriotic or less able than others."

This article on religion in American politics is part of a nationwide survey of U. S. belief and practices conducted by a commercial opinion research firm.

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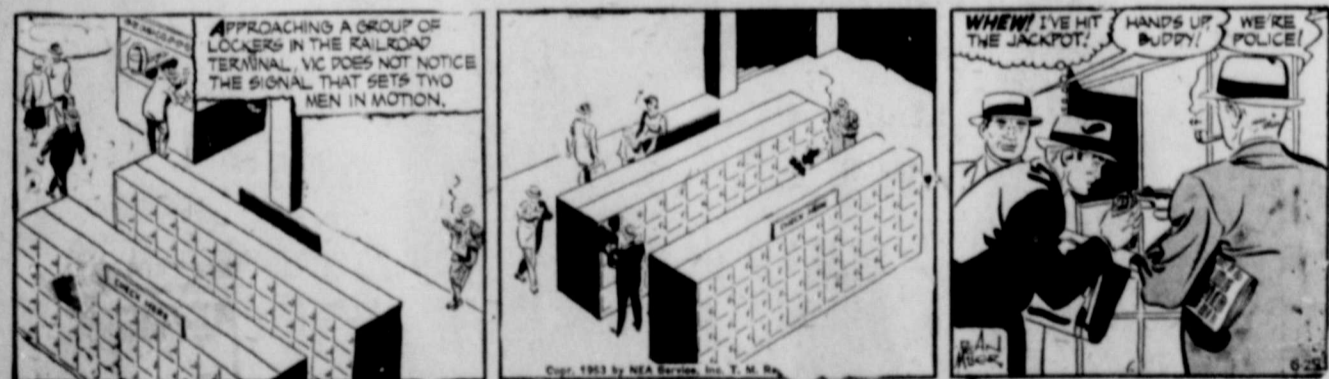
