Screwworms Found Outside Of Overwintering Area

Enough Texans are expected to make a three-hour session with the House Banks and Banking Committee, Tuesday, April 23, to discuss the proposed wheat referendum, which has now been set by the Secretary of Agriculture for May 21.

WOMEN'S RIGHT - Legislation to provide equal rights for women is in this status: Senate Joint Resolution No. 2, which is what the women want, has passed the House. It was heard by the House Committee on Education, Labor and Public Welfare and sent to a subcommittee.

PRUNE CHEESE CAKE



Here is a layered cheese cake frankly rich and sumptuous. Below, it's all waxy fruitiness set on a crunchy crust; above, velvety cheese creaminess with more of the crust as a top-off. The fruity part is prunes, tart-sweet and meaty, blended with sugar and graded lemon rind. The crunchy crust is toasted oat cereal, nut-like in taste. And the cheese layer has been frothed with eggs, cream, lemon rind and such.

Bottom Crust:
2 tablespoons butter or margarine 1 Pinch salt
8 marshmallows (2 ounces) 2 cups toasted oat cereal
Combine butter or margarine, marshmallows and salt. Stir over low heat until melted and smooth. Stir in cereal. Press mixture in even layer on bottom of greased 8-inch spring form pan.

Prune Layer:
2 cups pitted prunes, chopped 1/2 cup sugar
Combine ingredients and cook over low heat, stirring constantly, until thick. Cool, then smoothly spread over cereal layer.

2 envelopes unflavored gelatin 1/2 teaspoon grated lemon rind
1 cup sugar 2 cups creamy cottage cheese
1/4 teaspoon salt 1/2 cup milk

Fold in stiffly beaten egg whites and whipped cream. Pour cheese filling over prune layer. Continue topping layers: Prune, cottage cheese, Graham cracker with whole prunes. Chill about 3 hours or until firm enough to cut. Makes 8-10 servings.

Today, however, livestock producers are aware that good pasture is their cheapest source of good feed. Carpentier says good soil is the basis for good pastures and since there is only about 10 acres of land for every person in America, it is vital that it be used wisely and with care.

The most economical way to harvest pasture is by letting the animals graze it. Says Carpentier, adequate grazing should be provided throughout the year rather than starving the animals at one season and feeding them at another. However, it is difficult to maintain the correct amount of pasture for the satisfactory growth of animals the year-round.

It takes good planning and good weather to have grazing the entire year and usually temporary pastures will be needed to supplement the permanent crops, advises Carpentier. The two biggest enemies of permanent pasture are lack of moisture and weeds, he adds. Also, wise planning of grazing is essential.

As late as 1948 in the United States, Victoria blight, and oat disease, destroyed the best fields of the best varieties in the Midwest. But fortunately, say the pathologists, varieties not hurt by the disease were developed quickly to replace the damaged ones.

For more information on how to establish and maintain good pastures, see your local county agricultural agent. He has information that will help make your pasture a number one crop, concludes the specialist.

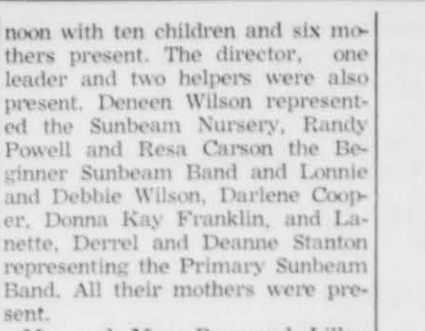

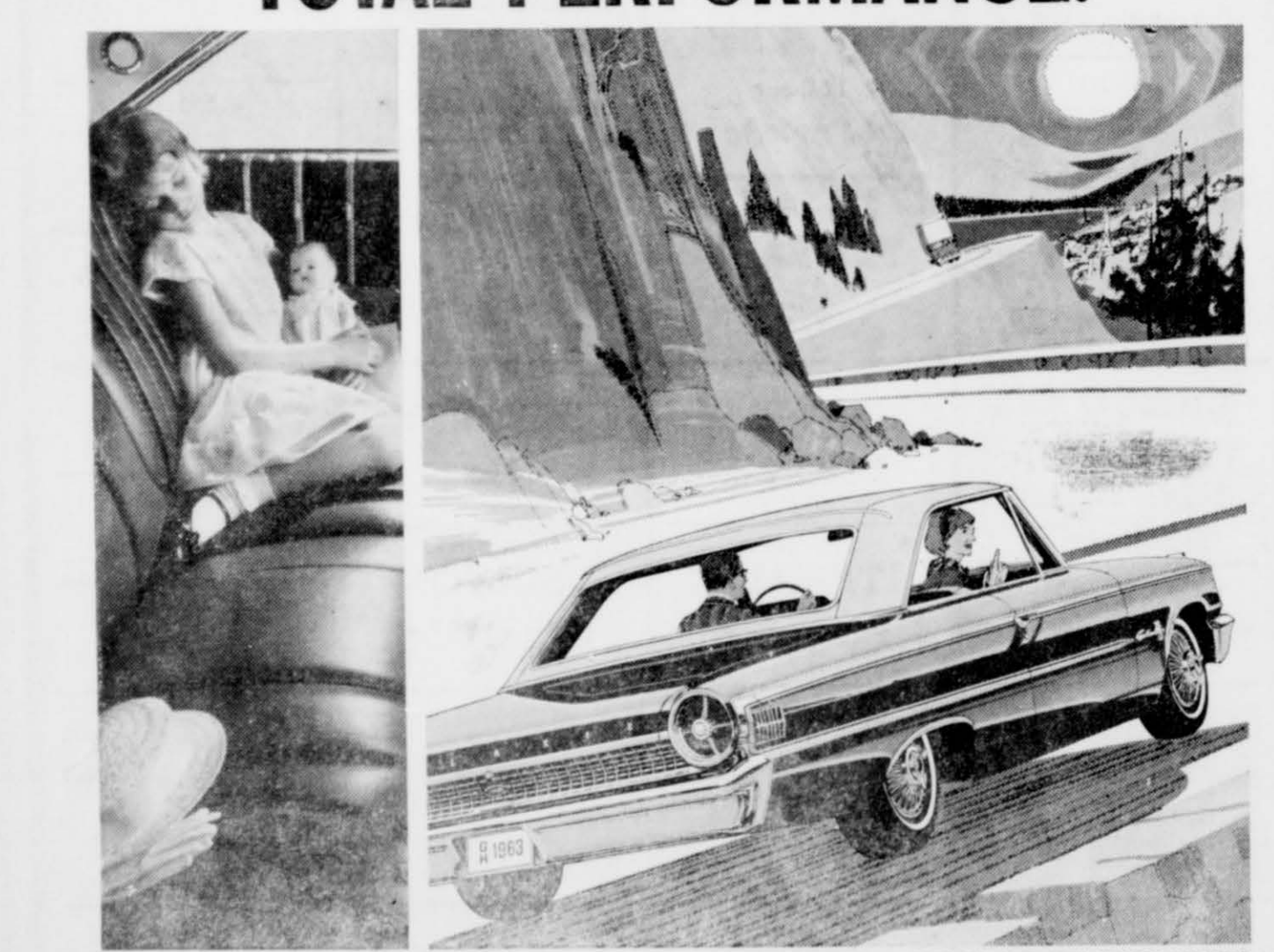

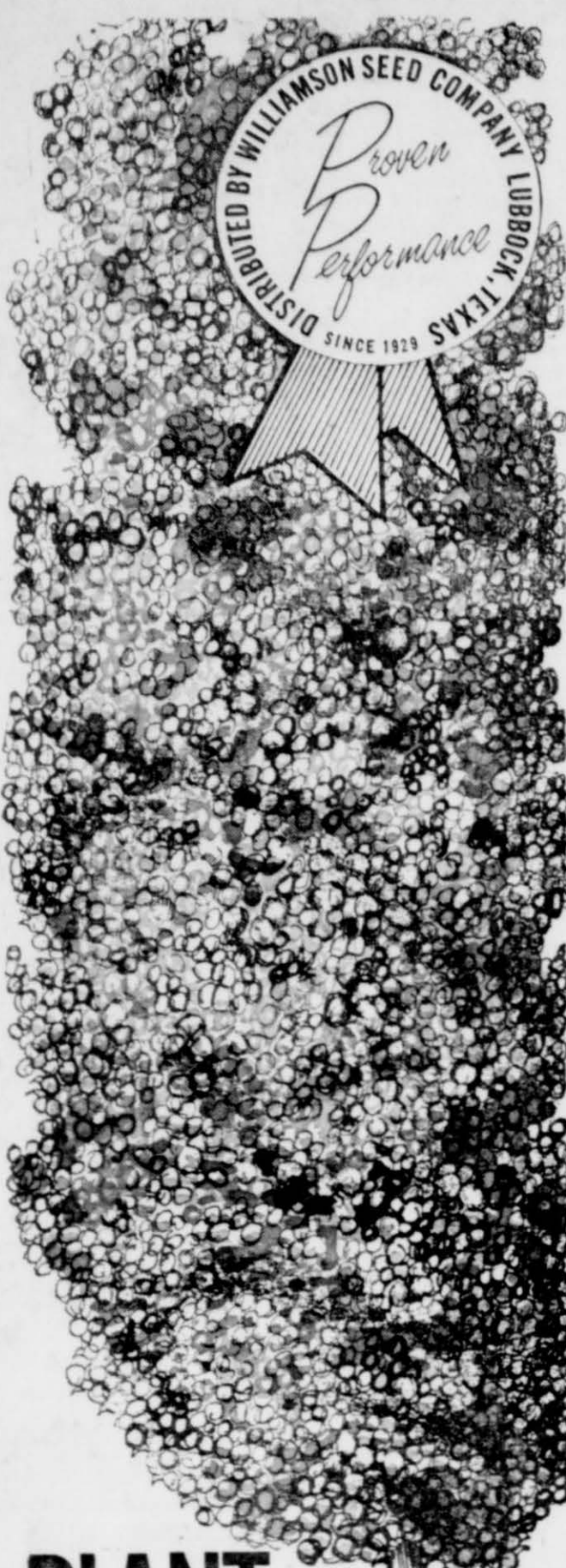

WHEAT PROGRAM FOR 1961
BACKGROUND
 About half the Nation's farmers produce wheat. Two-thirds of the wheat producers, about 1.2 million, have less than 10 percent of the allotted wheat acreage, planting less than 15 acres each.
 In most peacetime years during the last four decades, U. S. farmers have produced more wheat than could be used domestically or exported at prices satisfactory to growers. As U. S. population has increased, consumption of wheat per person has declined, leaving total consumption of wheat as food fairly stable. We eat about 500 million bushels of wheat a year; we have been producing a billion bushels or more. Carryover supplies to meet normal needs with an allowance for emergencies, probably should be around 600 million bushels; carryovers recently have been more than twice this amount. Reaching a peak of 1,400 million bushels in 1961.

More Cotton Research Needed

"Cutting Cotton production costs should be the goal of stepped up cotton research, says the USDA's Cotton Research and Marketing Advisory Committee.

At its annual meeting held recently, the committee proposed more study on breeding, weed and insect control, cultural practices and seedbed preparation, soil and water management, harvesting equipment, ginning and related processes, and storing cotton and seed cotton.

The unattractive appearance of the American cotton bale was criticized and the committee advised the use of new lightweight cotton bagging materials, standardization of the bale size and better methods of sampling the bales.

Research on improving the wash-and-wear properties of cotton were recommended. New developments with stretch cotton, flame resistant cotton, and cloth that resists rot, heat and weather promise to increase the use of cotton, the committee says.

The committee sees a need for more work on uses for cottonseed oil and a better cottonseed meal, with an accompanying improvement in the processing techniques of cottonseed.

The Cotton Research and Marketing Advisory Committee is made up of some of the nation's leaders in the industry and has two Texans among them. They are Otto Goedecke, president of Otto Goedecke Inc., Hallettsville, and Wilmer Smith, a Lynn county cotton grower.
