Grownups Can Learn from School Garden Text Book

"Elementary Lessons in Gardening," by Paul R. Young, is a text book for school use in the primary grades; but many a parent would find it an excellent source of basic information, well organized and clearly expressed.

It would take a lot of reading in many books to acquire the understanding of how plants are grown, which this book in its 106 pages explains in easily understood words and graphic illustrations.

Mr. Young has been school garden supervisor of the Cleveland, O., schools since 1926. He is a graduate of the College of Agriculture, Cornell University, and has a master's degree from that university in Agricultural Education. Under his supervision the Cleveland schools have developed the largest school garden program in the country.

No other text book on gardening practice is comparable to this one in clarity and completeness. All fields of gardening are covered, seed growing, plant propagation, soil improvement, fertilization, and the practical care of gardens. Material is provided both for class room instruction, and practical outdoor gardening where the opportunity exists.

The text book is published by the National Garden Institute, a non-profit, non-partisan society interested in the promotion of gardening as a means of developing better health, morale, and a love of the land.
