We join one of our worthy contemporaries in the opinions which he expressed in his daily column in the Thursday edition of his Cisco Daily Press.

Editor J. W. (Jerry) Sittou writes—
IT AMAZES US how early the Communists of Red China can use the United States mails for the purpose of their propaganda machine. The mail brought us this week a magazine, 8 by 10 inches in size, entitled "United Nations P.O.W.'s in Korea. The first page inside records that the book was published "by Chinese People's Committee for World Peace, Peking, China, 1953."

The booklet, which contains 92 pages, came to us in the mail. It was mailed somewhere in England (the postmark can't be read) with an English stamp bearing the picture of that country's attractive queen. The address on the wrapper contained our name as editor of The Press, Cisco, Texas, U.S.A. The cover shows a healthy looking American young man, and they would have you believe that he is the typical P.O.W. The back cover is a four color river scene with the notation "The Yalu River, with Pyuktong P.O.W. camp in the background."

The book is kind of like the average U. S. magazine. It shows dozens of pictures of U. S. soldiers in the P.O.W. camps. They're always happy, smiling, well-fed fellows. The reading matter with the pictures is supposed to be interviews with the P.O.W.s to show how wonderful their life is as prisoners.

The magazine even has pictures made in the United States of the families of the men. And you're given the information that these families are happy in the knowledge that the P.O.W.s are so handsomely treated. Special articles deal with Christmas and holiday activities in the camps, of the food and clothing and the little "extras" given the men.

The magazine offers pictures of Reds being mistreated in the U. N. camps as evidence that this country isn't treating its prisoners as well.

We can't understand how any thoughtful American could fall for this kind of propaganda—especially after reading interviews coming back almost daily from the liberated prisoners in Korea. And we can't understand how the U. S. Post Office Department can justify the use of the mails to allow propaganda of this sort to be circulated in America.

We got quite a bang out of this Aug. 13 United Press dispatch detailing Tulsa, Okla. Plans of the city of Tulsa clashed with those of a farmer charged Thursday as he sued the city for allegedly discouraging his 47 mink from mating.

Mr. and Mrs. Everett Dillon urged the lack of mink township cost them \$6,886.38. They blamed the city for noisily building a sewer line through the mink farm and taking the mink's mind off their business.

Biologically, the Dillons figured it this way—they said their nine male and 38 female mink, if they had peace and quiet, would produce 228 babies. But what with all the blasting and other noise, the mink delivered only 25 youngsters.

The business session beginning at 10:00 a.m. will feature reports of officers and Manager and election of directors for the coming year.

The business session will be relieved by plenty of "top-notch" entertainment—cowboy music, amateur talent contest, trained animal acts, juggling, previews of progress—a wonders-of-science show, and the laughable antics of Bozo the clown.

He is Chairman of the National Waterfowl and a representative of the Central Flyway. Contributions to Caudle's Fund Wind Up \$467.04

Cash contributions to the fund for Morris Caudle, 63-year-old totally blind Ranger resident, totaled \$467.04 as the fund-raising drive drew to a close, it was announced by campaign leaders in Ranger early Saturday.

Among the final donations reported were \$1.00 from W. E. Downing of Staff and \$1.00 from "a friend."

Funds raised during the drive staged in Ranger and Eastland by the Ranger Times and Eastland Telegram, the Ranger and Eastland 100F lodges and the Lions and Rotary Clubs of both cities, will be used to finance Caudle's round-trip via American Airlines to Hollywood, Calif., where he will receive a "seeing eye" German Shepherd dog from the International Guiding Eye Foundation.

Caudle will remain in California for a period of four weeks during which time he and his new dog will be trained together prior to their return to Ranger.

Hot and Dry Weather Due For Thirty Days
It'll be hot and dry. Rain—practically nil. That's not only the weather outlook for the Eastland County vicinity over the weekend. But that's the outlook for the area for the next 30 days—from the present time through mid-September.

The current Saturday and Sunday forecast, the five-day prediction and the 30-day outlook all added up to the same sad story, according to the U. S. Weather Bureau.

For Saturday and Sunday, weather men forecast partly cloudy skies with scattered thundershowers possible during the afternoons of both days.

The maximum mercury readings for Saturday afternoon and Sunday afternoon—100 degrees or hotter.

The Saturday night low—around 75. For North Central and West Texas: Partly cloudy Saturday and Sunday with widely scattered thundershowers in the afternoon and evening. No important temperature changes.

\$2,000 Goal Is Near— Paving Fund Totals \$1709

Additional contributions to the Evergreen Cemetery road paving fund totaling \$375.50 were reported late Friday as the third week of the fund-raising drive came to a close.

The current donations swelled the campaign total to \$1,709.50—just \$300.50 from the goal of \$2,000.

Work on the paving project now is progressing rapidly, according to reports.

The road being topped links West Main Street with Evergreen Cemetery, final resting place of hundreds of Ranger residents. Due to the inability of the City of Ranger to finance the project, it was necessary that funds be raised through individual donations.

A special arrangement with the contractor constructing the new Ranger-to-Eastland four-lane highway makes it possible for the much-traveled road to the cemetery to be paved at a minimum of expense, sponsors said.

No further canvass will be carried on, according to L. N. Bryan and C. A. Dawson, who have been soliciting funds for the project over the city. However persons not contacted who'd like to make a donation are asked to call Mr. Bryan at 684-R or Mr. Dawson at 596-W at their earliest convenience.

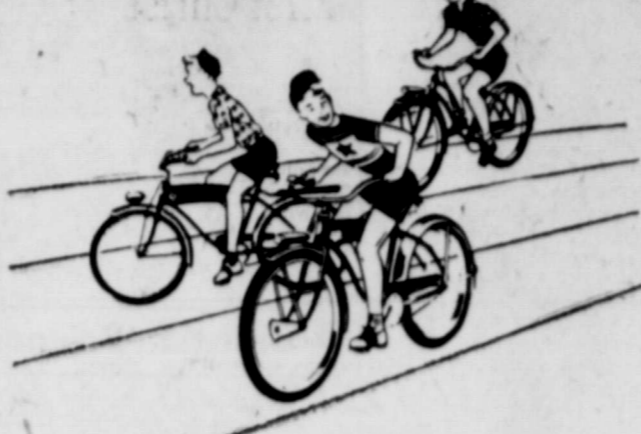

THE SLOW OR SNAIL RACE is one of the funniest races ever run with bicycles. Every type of bike can be used . . . and it is for boys or girls, tall or short, fat or slim.

The object of the race is to see which rider can travel slowest . . . and that's quite a feat on a bike. The last rider to cross the finish line is the winner, provided of course that the contestant has not violated any of the rules.

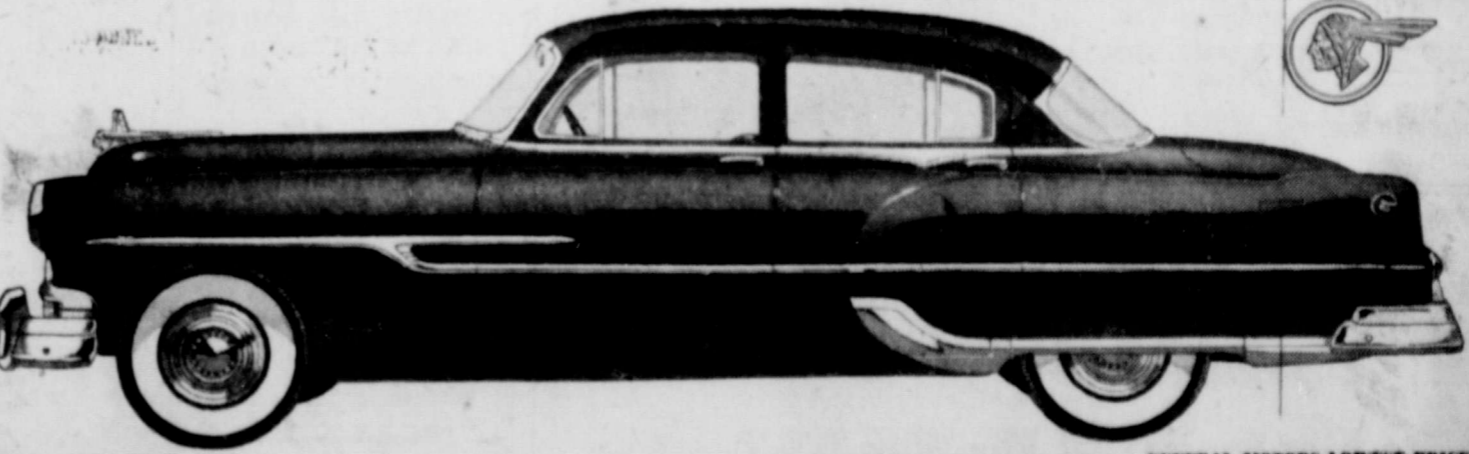

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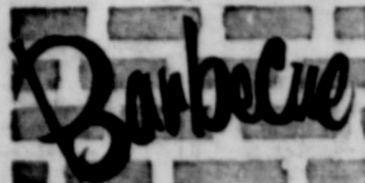

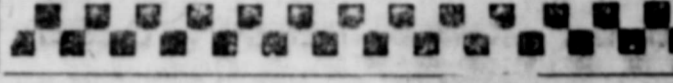
