# Put the "B" On

All Texas cattle that are tested for Bang's disease and found infected must be branded on the left jaw with the letter "B" and reported to othe Texas Livestock Sanitary Commission, to conform with House Bill 525, recently made law by the State Legislature.

Dr. E. A. Grist, veterinarian of the Texas A. and M. College Extension Service, explains that it is now the duty of the veterinarians who do Bang's testing to place the brand on cows that react postively to the disease. A penalty will be fixed upon any person who refuses to allow the branding, or who sells or disposes of cattle for milk puroses when he knows them to be infected.

The branding of Bangs-infected cows will enable better control of the disease, says Doctor Grist, since control measure must be planned on the basis of individual herd

In the fiscal year, September, 1944 to August, 1945, 133,891 head of cattle were tested for Bang's disease in Teras, with 9,435 showing up infected. Many of those reacting cattle probably found their way into other herds, says Doctor Grist. The requirements of the branding law will help hold down the spraed of the disease.

Castro County farmers interested in getting their cows tested are urged to contact the County Agents Office to make application for the government test or private test. Dr. L. O. Chedester, State Veterinarian, will be in the county in September and applications for testing should be made before then.

#### Corporations Charterd And **Business Failures**

June was the peak 1947 month in Texas as far as new business is oncerned, with 281 new domestic corporations receiving charters, ecording to The University of Texas Bureau of Business Research. In the same period Dun and Bradstreet reported only business failures in the State.

The new charters exceeded the 230 granted in May but business failures were also greater, as only 2 failures were reported in May. Capitalization on charters issued during June reached \$6.591,000, which was a sharp drop from the \$9,547,000 total marked up in May. This reduction means that the size of new business is maredly smaller.
