ence. Ranger finished third that year and held victories over Turlington State, 7-6; Cisco Junior College, 34-6; and North Texas State B, 21-0.

Henderson rated Chick O'Neil and Bobby Williams as the top players that season.

That was in football. In basketball, the Rangers tied with Cisco for the conference crown. Cisco won the title in a play-off series, however. In track RJC won the state crown and in tennis took both the single and double first place trophies in the state meet.

It was the 1951-52 athletic season that Ranger joined the Pioneer conference. That year the Rangers placed fourth in football. Henderson remembers the RJC 20-7 victory over Schreiner as being the outstanding game of the year. And he chose Caddo Sanders and Tom Wilson as the outstanding players that year.

In basketball and tennis the Rangers placed second, and fourth in track.

Ranger tied Arlington State, the Pioneer grid champs, 13-13 in 1952-53. Henderson rates the 12-7 victory over San Angelo as the top game of the year, however. That was the year Ranger finished third in the conference football in 1952 and fourth in track. Bud Herrick was Henderson's player of the year that season.

All in all the last four years have been good years at RJC. The Rangers have won 24 games, lost 23 and tied three in the last four years in football.

And this season still offers bright hopes in other sports.

### Farm Bureau Has Record Membership

The Texas Farm Bureau ended its fiscal year Nov. 30 with the largest membership in its history—53,195 farm families. Several hundred memberships which came in after the deadline will be counted toward next year's quota.

The figure entitles Texas to send five voting delegates to the American Farm Bureau Federation national convention Dec. 14-17 in Chicago. Delegates this year are: President J. Walter Hammond of Tye, Vice-President C. H. DeVaney of Coahoma, and state directors, Edwin Sanderson of Paris, S. W. McClaren of Cameron and Howard Wright of Westaco. Hammond is also a member of the AFBF Resolutions Committee.

This year's membership record figure represents a gain of 4,545 members over last year when 48,650 members were enrolled at the end of the fiscal year. Ten years ago there were only 8,468 members in the organization. Membership fees doubled since then, but the organization has shown a steady increase in members and influence.

He will also be familiarized with the various electronic equipment used by the AAA-RTC.

### Don't Burn Up Your Tree This Christmas

The heat' on at Yuletide for many outdoor evergreens and shrubs.

Thousands of these Christmas favorites won't need fear freezing. Instead, their problem is to keep from being scorched.

Too many home owners give their home grounds evergreens a hot foot while stringing them with overly-powerful Christmas lights for a blinking, brilliant colorama.

To keep tree decorations from getting burned, H. E. Knox, field representative of the Davey Tree Expert Co. offers this advice:

Use only electrical fixtures that are made to be strung on outdoor trees. They are designed expressly for this purpose and will give best results without harming the trees.

Use bulbs no stronger than 15-watts. They are bright enough for a gay, colorful display yet do not generate enough heat to burn surrounding foliage, even on direct contact.

Larger bulbs should never be used because of their intense heat. Damage seldom is noticed by tree owners until the following Spring when memory of strings of Christmas lights has faded. Tree men are familiar with the tell-tale signs. They suggest that care with lights is better than avoidable tree injury.

Measuring Values is Good Business—

... The average American like you and me drifts along from day to day without giving much concern to the question of values. ## Eight Point Program Outlined For Farmers

Emmett E. Powell, county office manager of the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation office of the US Department of Agriculture, Thursday outlined the agriculture conservation program for Eastland county for 1954.

Powell divided the program into eight sections.

Strip cropping with Guar or Crocholaria, seeding rangeland, controlling oak, construction of earthen dams, establishing sod waterways, construction of standard terraces, construction of diversion terraces and cover crop of winter legumes were the eight practices outlined by Powell.

Powell said any producer who wishes may sign up for any of these practices to be carried out on his farm in 1954 by coming to the Production and Marketing Association office between Dec. 11 and Dec. 23.

He said funds not obligated during this period will be used for late requests during the year.

A county wide meeting of farmers was held today in the courthouse at Eastland. The 1954 program was discussed by the group.
