Ranger Bank Deposits Hit \$2,444,156.64

Bank deposits in Ranger were down slightly from 1952 at the end of the year, a statement issued by the Commercial State Bank in compliance with customary year-end call of the comptroller of the currency in Washington, D. C. revealed.

Deposits Dec. 31 totaled \$2,444,156.64. At this same time in 1952 deposits totaled \$2,671,716.

Deposits were still well above those in Dec. 1951 when they totaled just \$2,073,368.

The Dec. 31, 1953 report showed loans and discounts totaled \$514,812.24 and undivided profits \$99,555.55.

Ross Kemp Speaks At RJC Assembly Program Tuesday

"Careless Driving Leads to Murder" was the keynote of a speech given by Ross Kemp, of Abilene, divisional head of the State Department of Public Safety, in an assembly program at Ranger College Tuesday morning.

Mr. Kemp cited specific cases to show that a large percentage of traffic fatalities are a direct result of careless driving, often accompanied by drinking. In recent years many drivers who have been directly responsible through recklessness for accidents have been brought to court to answer a charge of murder.

According to Mr. Kemp, the most effective means of increasing safety on the highways is through the education of beginning drivers. Courteous driving is never careless driving.

Following Mr. Kemp's talk a film entitled "A Day in Court" was shown.

The program was arranged by the International Relations Club of the college, which is sponsored by Mr. R. L. Willis.

Arlington will be heavily favored to take the count of the Rebels, sporting a record of three wins and three losses against powerful opposition, the Rebels are again dubbed the number one team in the league.

Ranger, although getting only one win in four starts, has gained great experience while playing top-notch opponents and is being carefully watched by conference foes.

Ranger also has the scoring punch but Lee ASC, has found the going rough on defense. Leading scorer on the RJC team is Charles Ponzil with 77 points. He ranks sixth in the conference. Other offensive stalwarts are Ray Gilstrap and Fred Rowch.

Probable starters for Ranger are the three above mentioned players and John Wilson and Joe Nesbitt. In other conferences tilt this week Schreiner plays Odessa JC tonight at Odessa. Sam Angelo leads the McMurry B team at Abilene Friday; Schreiner plays Amarillo Friday; and Schreiner goes to Big Spring Saturday to play Howard County JC.

Joseph M. Weaver Rites To Be Held At 3 Friday

Funeral services for Joseph M. Weaver, 71, prominent Texas oil man who died at his home in Eastland Wednesday morning after a brief illness, have been tentatively scheduled for 3 p.m. Friday.

Services will be held at the Holy Trinity Episcopal Church and Rev. A. E. Hartwell will conduct the rite.

Mr. Weaver, founder of States Oil Corporation and past president of the West-Central Texas Oil and Gas Association and a director of Mid-Continent Oil and Gas Association, was born at Mountville, West Va., May 24, 1882. His early career was in the food and tobacco business.

Mr. Weaver first came to Eastland Feb. 24, 1917, to take the oil leases that founded States Oil Corporation. Shortly thereafter he was joined by Mrs. Weaver and

the three children, Virginia, Ruth and Louise, who came to make Eastland their home. Mr. Weaver was very active in the development of Eastland county oil, and through Weaver-Crim Corporation

and Duquesne Oil Corporation, his activities included oil discoveries in the East Texas and Coleman fields.

He was a Mason, a member of the Episcopal Church and a former mayor of Eastland. He was always constructively helpful in Eastland's civic and charitable projects. He disposed of States Oil Corporation in 1949, the year in which his first wife died, for more than three million dollars. Later he married Mrs. Margaret Powell Hertzog and they lived at Beall-Hurst Farm, Eastland, until his death occurred on Jan. 6, 1954.

Survivors are his wife, Mrs. Joseph M. Weaver, his three daughters, Mrs. Donald H. Russell of Dallas, Mrs. John Latrobe of Fort Lauderdale, Fla., and Mrs. David W. Owen of Wellburg, West Va., and five grandchildren.

Hanner Funeral Home is in charge of the service. The family has requested that no flowers be sent.

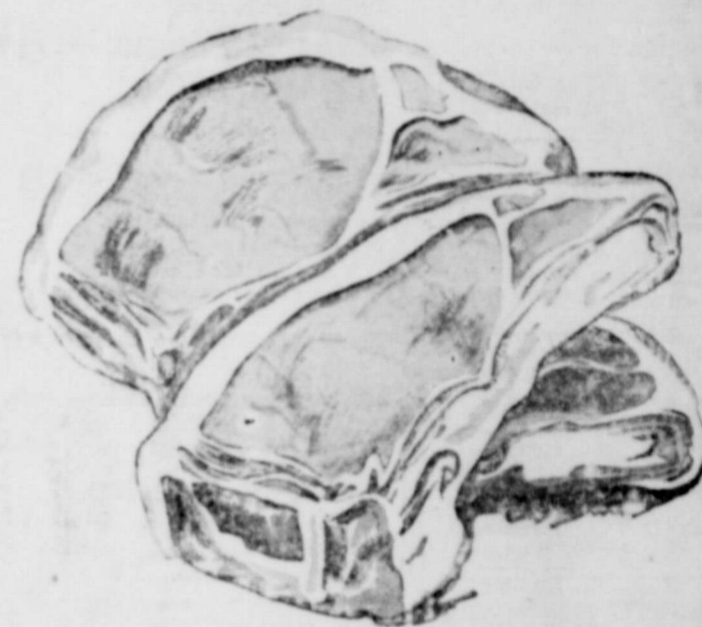

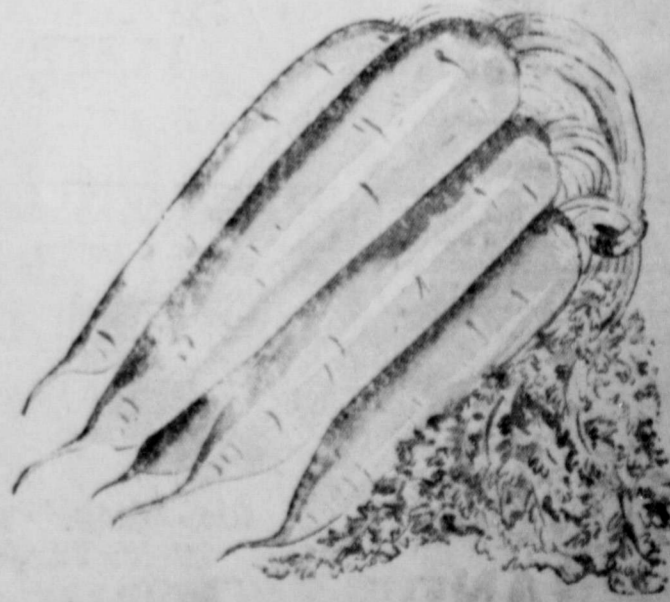

other day these new tax rates had us confused—now they have us just plain old lost. If you remember we mentioned that income taxes are due to be slightly decreased this month while social security rates are due to increase.

The article: "Joe Much has a wife and two children. He makes \$2,660 a year. He currently pays no income tax and will thus pay none in 1954 when the scheduled reductions go into effect. But at the same time, if the Social Security tax rate goes up to two per cent, Joe's tax on account of the raise, will go up by \$13.30 a year in 1954.

"Alice Ander, his neighbor, also married with two dependents, earns \$3,560 a year. By the operation of the income tax reduction law, Alice's income tax payments will go down in 1954 by \$17.69. But by the same token, if the Social Security tax rate goes up, he will be paying \$17.80 more in 1954 in Social Security taxes. Thus, net, he will be paying 11 cents more in taxes than he paid in 1953!

"On the other side of town lives Joe's cousin, Cal Carter (also married with two children). He makes \$3,670 a year. He'll pay \$17.80 less in income taxes in 1954 than he did in 1953 but, if the SS tax goes up, he'll be paying \$17.85 more for that, leaving Cal with a net gain of "take home" pay of four cents!"

And they say the tax load is being gradually lifted.

five counties 33 farmers responded to the call.

Thus, the Stephenville Production Credit Association was organized, and each man present bought one share of capital stock for \$5. The Production Credit Corporation of Houston bought \$40,000 worth of capital stock. The first step to be taken was to elect five men to serve on the board of directors until the first called meeting of future stockholders. Directors elected were C. C. Winters of Stephenville; G. M. Scott, Comanche; L. Bran, Hamilton; J. T. Dillard, Granbury; and L. C. Trimble, Glen Rose. The first meeting of the board was set for January 11, 1954, at the court house in Stephenville. C. C. Winters of Stephenville was elected to serve as the first president of production credit. Boase Reeder was then elected by the board as secretary-treasurer. Reeder now resides at 1511 W. Jones in Stephenville and is retired from active business.

Today the association is well capitalized. The member-stockholders now own better than \$328,000 in paid in capital and surplus. Since Jan. 2, 1951, loans exceeding 45 million dollars have been made. Loan losses have been small. To date the records indicate that less than \$25,000 has been lost. During the past four years the association has loaned an average of four and a half million dollars annually.

On July 27, 1934, the Fort Worth Production Credit office merged with Stephenville. The Fort Worth office was serving Tarrant, Wise, Parker and Johnson counties. In November 1934, Eastland county was added to the Stephenville territory and since that date there have been no changes in the 10 county area.
