

SHRIMP are the No. 1 sea-food favorite in all parts of the country. They are available fresh in most cities and towns today. They come frozen, too, and canned.

Therefore, if you and your family enjoy them (they have high nutritional value), these recipes will be welcome at your table.

#### Shrimp Remoulade

Clean, cook and chill I pound fresh or frozen shrimp. Combine 2 tablespoons vinegar. 6 tablespoons olive oil (or half olive and half salad oil), 2 teaspoons paprika, %4 teaspoon salt, ¼4 teaspoon pepper. 11/2 teaspoons prepared mustard and 1 tablespoon grated

Add 2 tablespoons minced parsley, ½ cup minced celery and 1 tablespoon minced scallions or onion. Blend thoroughly. Chill. When ready to serve place the chilled shrimp on a bed of shredded lettuce (about half a small head) Pour the chilled sauce over

Chill. Arrange shrimp in tiny fish molds or in 8x8x2-inch pan. Before gelatin mixture begins to gel. pour mixture over shrimp. Serve with lemon wedges and mayon-
