We doubt if there is any area comparable anywhere to Castro County for per capita participation in farm youth organizations. This is a phenomena that has

conte about within the past ten years or so. 4-H hasn't always been the tremendous influence on farm' youth that it is today. While FFA chapters in the county once maintained most of the real farm youngsters work, the 4-H is now becoming even more important from a standpoint of active membership.

The strangest thing about 4-H is its success. While other youth organizations have come and gone and others enjoy only moderate continuing success the 4-H has grown tremendously.

To our knowledge this is the only youth organization ever to grow directly under the supervision of the U.S. government. The name which stands for head, heart, hands and health-first appeared as a project of the U.S. Department of Agriculture with state agricultural colleges in 1914. More than 2,000,000 strong, they are under the direction of county extension agents and voluntary

4-H does a lot for youngsters. It is a good program that teachers the importance of keeping records, of farming for conservation as well as yield, and for staying alert to opportunities. We doubt if there are many mature farmers, with years of experience who could best the more than two bales per acre production of 4-H'er Aaron Hutto either on single or multiple acre tracts.

Teaching youngsters how to get better production may seem pointless in the light of so-called overproduction on the American farm today. But any industry-farming or any other-must have goals or vocation loses much of its interest. There must be a continued emphasis on increased production, conservation and lowered costs.


