Well the way it looks from here a strong proposal is before the tax-writing committee of Congress to increase the personal exemption on income taxes from 600 to 700 dollars. If You Do Your Job Right You Can Put Club On The Town Map

So you're the publicity chairman. It is important to find out about the paper's deadlines, the kind of stories wanted, whether written copy or telephoned notes are preferred, and which reporter, if any, will be assigned to cover your club.

If the editor requests written releases, study the newspaper itself as a textbook on writing style. A news story, or even just a memo to the editor, would contain answers to the five question—what, when, where and how—in the first paragraph. The other paragraphs should add supporting details. Write tersely.

It's important to be absolutely sure that all facts, names and initials (never give just the last name of a person) titles and figures are correct. If you are correct you can expect the news story to be correct, but if you give halfway information, you can expect no better news story.

Type the stories, with double spacing, and put the club name and your name and telephone number at the top of the sheet. Start about a third of the way down on the first sheet and NEVER write a headline.

Indicate the release date on advance copy in the upper right hand corner, and deliver it at least a day ahead. Whenever possible aim your release for the days when the most space is available—Thursday as a rule (in the case of the Times). That doesn't hold true for reports of events that

Dairyman Says Trench Silo Saved Business

"I have 8 or 10 cows still milking that would have been dry several months ago if they had not been eating silage," said D. F. Williamson, Morton Valley dairyman recently when commenting on his trench silo.

"Like it?—Sure I like it. It is my first silo but my feed bill without it would have been at least \$125.00 per week whereas with the silage it only cost me about \$40 per week," he commented.

Out of the 85 head of cattle on the farm and eating silage only 14 are being milked at the present time, Williamson formerly retailed milk in Eastland. At the present time his milk goes to Abilene for processing and then is distributed at a number of West Texas points.

Feeding of the Hegari and cane silage was started on November 25. There was no trouble in getting the cows eating it. None have been bloated. Although some good quality Johnson Grass hay is fed to the animals daily, they usually root it off and go back to eating the silage if they can, said Williamson.

It only takes about an hour a day to back the trailer into the trench, load, haul and unload it. There is enough left in the trench to feed several months more even if no more was put in it, it was said.

Both the milk cows and the dry animals on the farm are in good condition say people who have seen them. The Hegari was cut with a lot of head on it.

"I would not today be in the dairy business if it had not been for my silo. I think that it will mean the difference of staying in and going out of the dairy business," Williamson said.

Horace Mann Father Of Public Schools

Every school child knows that the "father of our country" is George Washington. How many know who is the "father of the American public school?" Horace Mann, born to a poor farm family in Massachusetts in 1796, is truly one of America's unsung heroes. Here was a man who, by his own efforts, put education in America ahead of the rest of the world by many generations.

Horace Mann dedicated his life to the idea of free, universal education, working with the zeal of a missionary to establish a system of public education supported by the state. It was almost a religion with Horace Mann that every child, rich or poor alike, should have equal educational opportunities; that school buildings should be well built and well equipped; that teachers should be prepared to teach in their profession and should know how to control groups of children by methods other than that of brutal discipline.

When Mann gave up his law practice in 1817 to become the first Commissioner of the Massachusetts Board of Education — which he himself had created — there was little if any free public education. Children who went to charity cases. Education of children other than those from rich families was limited to the most rudimentary instruction in reading, writing, and "ciphering."

Mann wished to establish a system of public education so good that the wealthy families would prefer the public schools to private ones, and children from all classes would be educated together.

The dream alone was not enough. It took the genius of a great man to persuade the public to share the dream and support his plans. Representatives in the state legislature were not sure that the people who had elected them wanted their tax money to be spent on the establishment of a free school system. Mann worked tirelessly, traveling from one end of Massachusetts to the other, urging people to support the public schools and showing teachers how to improve their methods.

As a result of Mann's work Massachusetts had the best public school system in this country, and perhaps the best in the world, by 1850. Other states began to follow the lead of Massachusetts. Today, Horace Mann's dream is a reality. Free public education for all, rich and poor alike, is a fact long since taken for granted in the United States.

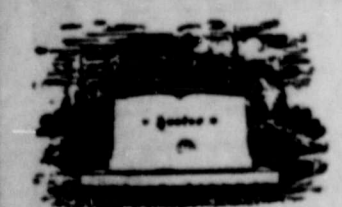

Harry C. Browne of Boston Will Speak at Christian Science Church

Christian Science

That we have Scriptural authority for beholding man as perfect here and now, as the image and likeness of God, is stressed in the Christian Science Lesson - Sermon entitled "Man" to be read this Sunday at the church service.

The Palmist expressed this thought, which will be read as the Golden Text (37:37): "Mark the perfect man, and behold the upright: for the end of that man is peace."

Isaiah indicated that this is possible through God's help when he wrote: "I have raised him up in righteousness, and I will direct all his ways" (45:19).

The following passages from "Science and Health with Key to the Scriptures" will also be read: "In Science man is the offspring of Spirit. The beautiful, good, and pure constitute his ancestry. His origin is not like that of mortals, is brute instinct, nor does he pass through material conditions prior to reaching intelligence. Spirit is his primitive and ultimate source of being. God is his Father, and Life is the law of his being" (p. 63).

No Log Jam Seen For Motorists

AUSTIN (Sp.)—If Texas motorists continue getting their autos inspected at the same rate that they are currently, there will be no chance of a "log jam" at the inspection stations prior to the April 15th deadline.

That was the opinion today of Homer Garrison Jr., director of the Texas Department of Public Safety, who complimented the 65 percent of Texas car owners who have already had their vehicles checked for mechanical defects. At the same time, he passed on a repeated word of warning to nearly a million other motorists who have neglected, thus far, to meet the requirements of the State's motor vehicle inspection law by reminding that approved stickers must be on cars after April 15th or the owners will face court action.

George W. Busby, Chief of the Safety Department's Motor Vehicle Inspection Division, announced that inspections are now being conducted at the rate of 150,000 weekly and that no stations are experiencing a capacity business.

"In the six weeks remaining the inspection deadline," Busby said "the licensed stations will be full-capable of taking care of every vehicle in the State remaining to be checked without undue waiting or inconvenience unless too many folks put off having their auto inspected until the last minute."
