Sheriff Tucker Finds Beer And Whiskey Hidden

Eastland County Sheriff Frank Tucker led a liquor raid in Ranger Monday night. Sheriff Tucker was assisted by officers of the Ranger Police Department and Eastland County Deputies.

On Marston Street in Ranger Sheriff Tucker found 106 one-half pints of whiskey, six pints of whiskey and 13 quarts of beer.

Possession charges have been filed in the Eastland County Court House against Lola Harris, colored Ranger woman, who makes her home at 309 North Marston.

Oil Activities

Five miles south of Eastland in the regular field, location was staked for Victor Cornelius, Eastland, No. 1 Mrs. L. E. Murrell.

Drill site is 150 feet from the south end of 990 feet from the west line of section 29, Block 2, H&TC Survey. Proposed depth is 1,990 feet with combination tools.

In Stephens county a 2,500 foot rotary project was spotted. Location is 3 1/2 miles southeast of Breckenridge for the Texas Company No. 72 A. J. W. Parks NCT-1.

Drill site is 660 feet from the north and 2,970 feet from the east line of section 3365, TEAL Survey.

In Palo Pinto County location for a wildcat was staked five miles west of Pickwick as T. G. Shaw, trustee, of Ft. Worth No. 2, The Allar Company. Having a proposed depth of 1,850 feet with cable tools, it spots 730 feet from the north and 1,090 feet from the east line of J. Poitevent Survey 3, A-1058.

At Strawn the Palo Pinto Oil and Gas Corporation staked two regular field projects eleven miles north of Strawn. Both are slated for 1,300 feet with cable tools.

The Company's Number 26 Wm. Sanders is located 710 feet from the south and 990 feet from the west line of Section 43, Block 2 T&P Survey.

Internal Revenue Having Difficult Time With Name

The tax collecting department of the Federal government has been having a difficult time in getting across the idea of using its new title, recent letters pointed out today. Since last July 1 the agency has been known as the Internal Revenue Service. It is no longer the Bureau of Internal Revenue.

The man to whom the taxpayer pays his taxes and to whom he makes out his check or money order is the district director of Internal Revenue and no longer the collector of Internal Revenue.

Under the reorganization effected last year and still in the process of polishing up, the country has been divided into nine regions and 64 districts. In Dallas the district office is located at 2101 Pacific Avenue, Dallas, Tex. and is one of six included in the Dallas region which embraces the states of Texas, Louisiana, Oklahoma, Arkansas, and New Mexico.

The district director is Ellis Campbell Jr. He is the man who collects your money which eventually finds its way into the national treasury and becomes a part of the national budget.

Area Officers Meet In Ranger

A meeting was held in Ranger Tuesday evening composed of officers from various police and judicial departments in this state on the juvenile problems of Texas.

At this meeting officers from Tarrant county expressed their desire to be glad to work with local officers and organizations in their juvenile work and to help if they are needed.

The meeting was held at the City Hall in Ranger and those present were Sgt. Counts, Fort Worth City Juvenile officer, Capt. Burns of the Fort Worth Police Department, Tarrant County Probation Officer McGee, Eastland County Sheriff Tucker, Deputy Sheriff Lee Horn, Eastland County Judge, Eastland County District Attorney, members of the Eastland Police Department and the Ranger Police Department under the direction of Chief Pounds.

The overall program will consist of three general sessions. The first will begin at 10 a.m. Friday with the invocation by Dr. Elmer D. Landreth of St. Paul's Methodist Church, Abilene. Music will be furnished by the Abilene High School Eagle band with Robert Fielder directing.

After a welcoming address by Supt. A. E. Wells of Abilene City Schools, Dr. William R. Ross, president of Colorado State College of Education, will speak on "My Defense of General Education."

Dr. Ross is sponsored jointly by the District 7 and the Hogg Foundation for Mental Hygiene of Texas University.

The second general session will begin at 7:30 Friday evening at the High School auditorium.

Following the invocation by Grace Morrow, high school senior, "A Song for Miss Sally" will be presented by the Abilene High School Glee Club.

Teachers Going To Abilene Meet

Abilene is dusting off the welcome mat to play host to an estimated 2,500 teachers who will converge on the city March 12 and 13. The event is the thirteenth annual District 7 Texas State Teachers Association meet.

Delegates will come from 22 counties comprising an area that runs east beyond Nocona, up Red River to Childress county, west beyond Snyder, south to Blackwell and east to Stephenville.

"We are expecting a minimum of 2,500 representatives," Dr. Charles Romine, principal of Abilene High School and president of District 7, said yesterday.

Planning around the theme, "A Century of Progress in Texas Education," local members have set up committees to discuss every phase of education through the secondary level and the rest—includes speakers of both local and national prominence.

Beginning at 8:30 a.m. Friday, delegates will register in the foyer of Abilene High School. A 7 a.m. breakfast served to the House of Delegates in the ballroom of the Windsor Hotel will start proceedings Saturday. Friday specials will consist of a Delta Kappa Gamma breakfast served by the Abilene Women's Club at 8:15 a.m. with Mrs. Edna Beck of Amon, presiding.

Friday special dinners will include a District Classroom Teachers' Dinner, South Junior High School cafeteria, Elementary School Principals and Supervisors' Dinner, Bonham School cafeteria, and a Secondary School Principals' Dinner at the High School cafeteria. All are at 6:30 p.m.

Luncheons include an Administrators, an Art Luncheon, Business Education Luncheon, Elementary Teachers Luncheon and an English Luncheon for Friday and a Special Education and Phi Delta Kappa Luncheon for Saturday.

Transportation to all luncheon sites will be furnished.

Ranger Firemen Always Ready In Case of Fire

During the first part of this year the Ranger Volunteer Fire Department under the direction of Chief Charles Isabell reported an estimate loss of \$3,700.

The Department received a total of sixteen alarms and in this group there were three dwelling house fires, ten grass fires, one chicken house fire, one automobile fire and one false alarm.

The Ranger Volunteer Fire Department is an organization that is proud of because only three members in the Fire Department are paid, the balance are volunteers donating their own time for training and putting out fires without very little consideration and thanks.

Mrs. Mae Belle Oyer would act as coordinator and her position would be to execute orders with coordination from the various groups and the control center.

Mrs. Oyer will maintain in her office a list of volunteer help and she will direct them to the activities that they can serve best.

The schools will be headed by Dr. Price Ashton and G. H. Rush. Their duties will be to direct the operations of removing school children before a disaster after a warning is issued or in case of a disaster to provide for the welfare of the school students.

Dr. W. P. Watkins will be in charge of emergency advance medicine and it will be his job to be at the rescue area to provide any immediate emergency attention that is needed and to send the injured to the first aid station or the hospital.

It will be the job of R. V. Galbreath to give out public information and to give press releases and notifications to next of kin and etc.

The hospitals will be able to take care of about thirty patients and it will be their duty to take care of the injured.

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RANGER MAKES WAY WITH PLAN IN CASE DISASTER HITS AREA

At a meeting at the City Hall Wednesday night of the Ranger Civil Defense Disaster Committee Master Sgt. Jess W. Cole explained to the group the need of disaster defense in Ranger.

"The need of an organized plan of what to do, how to do it, and who is to do it should be organized before the disaster and not after the disaster, with conditions that prevailed after the San Angelo and Waco disasters this last year. A plan should be organized now and when and if we ever have a disaster in Ranger we will know how to handle it," the Sergeant stressed.

A large chart was brought before the group and on this chart it showed the plan of organization. The head of the organization would consist of City Commissioners L. T. Rushing, A. G. Koenig, F. F. Penn and O. L. Cantrell along with Mayor Calvin W. Harris.

The heart of the disaster work in case Ranger would ever go into that status, would be at the city hall and called the control center composed of L. T. Rushing, H. E. Angus and Glynn Covington. The activity of this group would be to direct the complete operation and to put what group was needed where.

Lee Crossley would act as coordinator and his position would be to execute orders with coordination from the various groups and the control center.

Mrs. Mae Belle Oyer would act as volunteer enrollment officer and her duty would be to enroll all volunteer help and place them to the different activities that needed their work.

Mrs. Oyer will maintain in her office a list of volunteer help and she will direct them to the activities that they can serve best.

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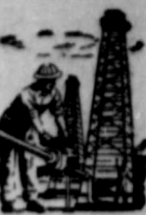

The job of supervisor of all nurses in the area goes to Mrs. R. J. Rhodes. It will be Mrs. Rhodes' job to keep a list of all available registered nurses in the area and notify them in case of a disaster and send them to the spot that they are needed.

In charge of emergency welfare Wilson Guest has a big job in his committee are Charles Milliken, who will take care of the food, Marjorie Maddocks housing and Bill McComas and Larry Purefoy clothing. It will be their job to procure any food and clothing that is needed for the disaster victims.

Calvin Lipkin has been named on this committee to include in the clothing group and it will be the job of the clothing group to make an estimate of the amount of clothing available in Ranger as per sizes and types.

Alvis Wood will be in charge of emergency transportation. Woods will have the responsibility of obtaining and dispersing means of transportation where and when needed.

Hugh and Jim Smith have a big responsibility as communication officers. It will be their job to set up communications where they are needed and to maintain contact with the outside world or from the disaster area to the control center.

Billy Bordeaux is in charge of demolition. It will be Bordeaux's job to remove obstacles that may hinder operations.

Floyd Killingsworth and Mrs. J. P. Morris are on the committee in the mortuary section.

Compulsory stations will be set up as follows: The first choice will be the First Methodist Church and if the case is whereby this building is destroyed, the second choice goes to the First Baptist church and the final choice is the Recreation building.

Rescue work goes to Arthur Deffenbach who will obtain heavy equipment if needed, and supervise all rescue activities in the section hit.

The Ranger Police Department composed of Chief W. G. Pounds, Edward Freeman, Joe Faircloth, Clifford Floyd and Auxiliary Bill Ewing, will maintain traffic control around the disaster area and be used as the central control station see fit.

The National Guard would maintain a guard around areas to maintain order, protect property and to keep curiosity seekers out of areas.

In the utilities section A. N. Larson will act as superintendent. Under him Larson will have J. D. Baker, who will be in charge of the water and sewer, Lee Dockery natural gas, and Larson will take the responsibility of the power and lights. This is an important part of the disaster program, because the rescue work will be hindered until gas and lights are turned off in the area damaged.

The group that will have the responsibility of putting out all fires will be the Ranger Volunteer Fire Department. The fire department will act on the alarm and this squad will be composed of Chief Charles Isabell, D. B. Shook, K. Robinson, V. F. Johnson, Jack Mace, D. A. Fawcett, Bill Ewing, H. A. Shockey, Max Ohr, Charles R. Doss, T. C. Weaver, George Beighley, Dr. M. E. Jolly, Elvis Freeman, W. Simpson, Warren Dooley, M. D. Sharp and Bill Myers.

The important part of the disaster plan for Ranger is that one hundred percent cooperation is needed from everyone in case we have a disaster in this area and this plan is put in operation. It was found in other areas conflicted by a disaster that traffic into the area by sightseers hindered operation and actually cost lives. The plan will work if everyone does the job that is assigned to him or her and the important part is to have a plan of this type before a disaster strikes, because at Waco no plan was made before the disaster and when it did strike it seemed that no one knew what to do.

Letter Received From The Bullocks

(EDITOR'S NOTE: We are printing, in part, a letter received from the Bill Bullocks, whom many of you remember so well.)

Four months have passed since our arriving at Klamath Falls. Every minute seems to have been filled with activity.

As you know, we left Ranger Wednesday morning, Oct. 14th, and arrived in Klamath Falls late in the evening of Oct. 22, four months ago today. We had many wonderful signs along the way but the Lord was surely with us. Except for a little trouble with the truck the second day we made it just fine.

We crossed the desert in the seat of the day. Johnny and Andy had very little trouble except for stirring restlessness.

We decided that since it was our vacation too, that we would go through the mountains in spite of the truck, so we came through boeinix and crossed the desert into Indio, Calif. At Blythe we had to uncover the load on the truck in order that it might be inspected. Sure wished for the fellows that helped me to get the tarp on at Ranger.

Up through California we came without incident. Saw lots of grapes and olives and vegetables being crated. When we got to Red Bluff, Calif., we began to climb gain for the last time. Soon Mt. Lassen with its snow capped top came into sight, the trees began to get taller, the weather cooler and we rejoiced that our trip was soon to end. Mt. Shasta made its appearance. (Though it is 70 miles from us we can see it good at a pet one block from our house.)

We saw many mountains that were covered with snow in the last hundred miles. All of the mountains that we can see are covered with snow. We have had now in K. Falls for two months now.

Our house is just a driveway from the church.

The people had fixed up our house while we were enroute here. Painted and cleaned and the welcome mat out. There is a large picture window in our living room that Andy has spent hours in looking for the boys and girls on the school yard across the street. Our room from is 8 feet above the side walk level, while our back door is on the ground. A six-foot retainer wall around the front makes a place for our yard.

The people here have been wonderful to us. They gave us a pounding and dinner the week we started to work full time. Lots of good home grown apples and potatoes.

Something we are having to get used to is that we are the oldest church in Klamath Falls. (70 years old in June) we are not the largest. Sunday School in the Northwest has been for children; last Sunday we had our largest Adult attendance since our coming, 54 of them. It is strange for us to see so many faiths in the city and most of them larger than we. I am encouraged. The people believe in and are anxious to put good methods to work. I know that there are 10,000 people in the city not now enrolled in Sunday School. We begin a regular visitation day next Thursday, Feb. 25, and we will then be a Standard Sunday School. We will get our share of those ten thousand.

Texas Baptists are being praised here. The loan fund that Texas made possible is doing wonders out here. This church has built an Educational Building because of the fund. The building far outclasses anything in the whole area and sets the pattern for growth.

We have not doubted from the beginning that God was leading in our coming here. Now that we are here we know afresh that God has led us to this place.

Letter Received From The Bullocks

County Agent Makes Report

By J. M. Cooper

"Hay is higher in price and not near so good for our milk cows as silage," says F. F. and Jim Sparks, Desdemona dairymen, who are milking 23 cows, largely Holsteins at the present time.

The father, F. F. Sparks and son Jim, partners, have been in the dairy business since January, 1951. Their milk goes into the Dallas and Ft. Worth Milkshed.

They put down their first trench silo in June last year when they bought some "burned out" corn crops from some of their neighbors, chopped it up and packed it down in a long trench. They later grew some Honey Drip cane and African millet. They started feeding it at once because of the need for roughage and the cows have never been off it they said. A total of 102 acres of the corn, Honey Drip cane and African Millet was put down. The corn and Honey Drip ran from 3 to 4 tons per acre while the Millet did not produce as much. The entire cost ran to about \$19.00 per ton.

At the present time the silage is being fed to 26 cows, ten heifers and ten goats. Around 1,000 lbs. of the material is fed per day.

County Agent Makes Report

By J. M. Cooper

"It has cut our roughage feed bill in half—every man who raises cattle should have one," said Jim. "If I cut off silage and feed only hay for a few days it dries up my milk production just like a well going dry," he continued.

The cows on the Sparks farm eat only 2 to 3 bales of dry peanut hay at night. That's all the entire herd will eat. They need some dry hay as a conditioner it was revealed.

We only wish that we had been making and feeding silage for many years, says the Sparks.

A bulletin on making and feeding silage is free and is available by calling or writing the County Agents office in Eastland.

There were more silos put down in Eastland County in 1953 than for many years.

IT'S THE LAW in Texas

Texas Full Tax Requirements Outlined

During the next few months, citizens all over the United States have been exhorted by printed, radio or movie advertisements to be sure to "Register" in order to be eligible to vote in the November 4 election. To many Texans these ads have been confusing, some of them wondering whether the new Election Code passed by the last session of the Legislature may have contained some requirement regarding registration.

This confusing situation has arisen because in a large number of states registration has replaced the poll tax. National get-out-the-vote campaigns were planned with requirements of the "registration states" in mind, and campaign advertisements circulated in "poll tax states" along with the others.

Registration is not required by the Texas Election Code. Unless you fall within specified statutory exceptions, you must still have a poll tax receipt in order to vote. In some but not all cases persons exempt from payment of the poll tax must obtain exemption certificates from their County Tax Collector.

Under Texas law a poll tax is not just a license to vote, even though it is a requirement of voting.

It is a tax which the statutes say shall be collected from every person between the ages of twenty one and sixty years, who resides in this State on the first day of January preceding the levy of the tax.

Indians are not taxed, nor persons insane, blind, deaf or dumb. Those who have lost a hand or foot, those permanently disabled, and all disabled veterans of foreign wars (where such disability is forty per cent or more) are exempt from payments of a poll tax.

Those who are exempt from the payment of a poll tax, and who reside in a city of ten thousand inhabitants or more, must secure a certificate from the Tax Collector of their County of residence before the first day of February of the year when such taxpayer

shall become entitled to said exemption. This exemption is good for one year. A new exemption must be secured for each year. Certificates of exemption are issued without cost to the person entitled to receive the same.

Those who reside in cities of less than ten thousand inhabitants are not required to secure this certificate of exemption before voting. These may make proof of their exemption at the time of voting to the presiding judge of the election where they are qualified by residence to vote.

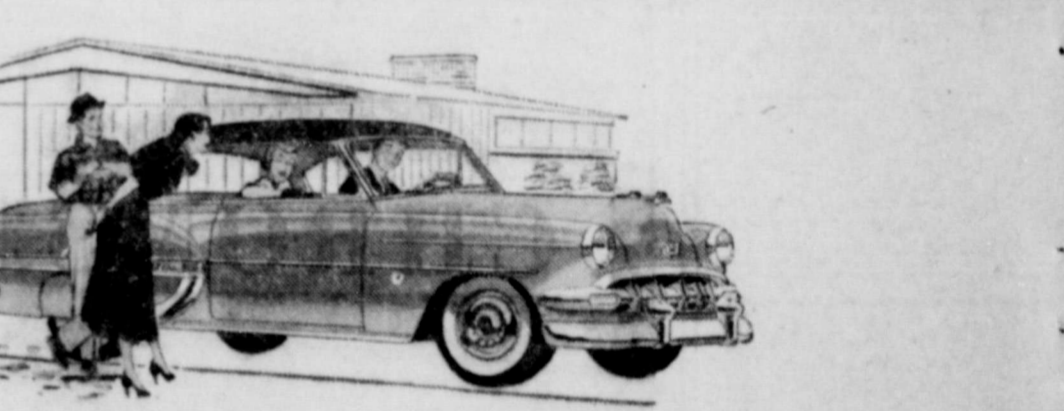

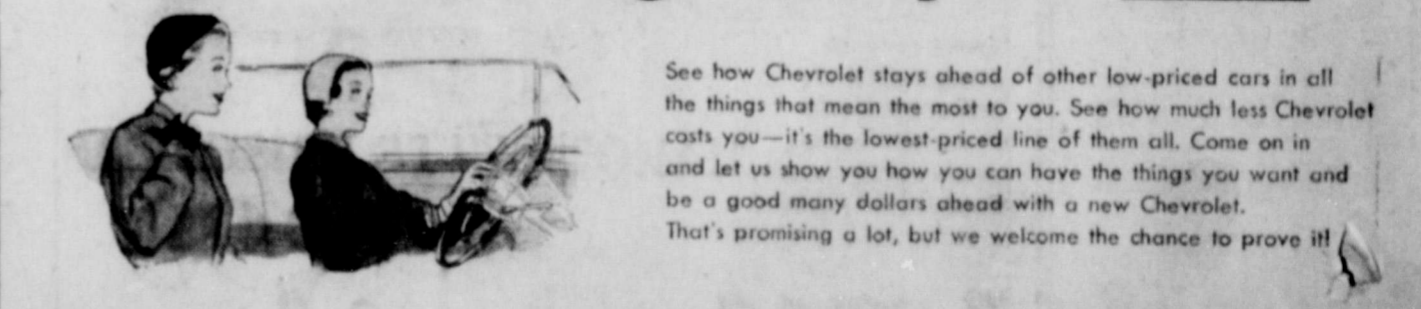
