Lawyers Meet In Abilene

ABILENE, March 16 — (Spl.) — Experts in four fields of law will share their knowledge with lawyers in Abilene and its surrounding area March 20.

The occasion is a one-day legal institute that will convene Saturday morning at 9:30 in the West-end Hotel. Sponsors are the Abilene Bar Association and State Bar of Texas.

Lead-off speaker will be Lee Jones, Jr., San Antonio. His subject is "Problems Presented by the Joint Ownership of Oil, Gas and Other Minerals."

Civil Appeals Justice James R. Norvell, San Antonio, will follow with a discussion of "Special Issues."

One afternoon speaker will be Wilmer D. Masterson Jr., Southern Methodist University law professor. His topic is "Summary Judgment and Other Pre-Trial Practices."

Paul Strong, a Houston attorney will conclude the institute with a discussion of "The Appellant Brief and Application for Writ of Error."

Frank E. Smith, Abilene attorney, is in charge of arrangements. Esco A. Walter is president of the Abilene Bar.

FLORIDA PAROLE VIOLATOR ARRESTED BY RANGER POLICE

The Ranger Police Department received a call on a parked car located at Commerce and Elm Street Monday night, bearing Michigan license plates, and containing three men. The car was stopped at the intersection of Highway 89 and Hunt Street and the occupants removed to the Ranger City Jail on charges of suspicion.

After a check by the Ranger Police Department through the various State Police Departments, it was found that two of the occupants had records over this state and had been held for investigation in numerous cities. Their home address was listed as Fort Worth.

The driver of the automobile, age 52, admitted to the Ranger department that the automobile they were riding in was a rented car from Detroit, Mich. The car was rented for a period of one week, said the driver, and at the end of the week he paid for this period and re-rented it for a second week. On this week the driver drove the car on to Florida and various other states. The car was a 1954 model and brand new at the time it was rented.

On reaching Ranger Sunday the driver was without funds and he removed one tire with wheel from the spare tire rack in the rear of the vehicle and sold it to a Ranger filling station for three dollars and twenty-five cents. He then proceeded on to Abilene.

Leaving Abilene and heading back in the direction of Ranger he ran out of gas. The driver caught a ride with two men in an early model car and went to Fort Worth. On reaching Fort Worth, the trio left for West Texas to pick up the 1954 automobile. The 1954 automobile was picked up and the trio drove into Ranger.

The driver of the automobile admitted to local police officers that he was wanted in the state of Florida for parole violation and also in the state of Michigan for moving a rented car over state lines. He stated that he was sentenced to twenty three years in the State of Florida Penitentiary for armed robbery and served a period of ten years for that violation and was released on parole. He has not reported to his parole officer for a period of years thus he must go back to this institute for the remainder of his allotted sentence.

He will be turned over to officers of the Federal Bureau of Investigation today for handling.

Spurien said that he and other members of the board of the local district feel that they were very fortunate in securing the services of a speaker who is in such demand throughout the state.

Spurien said that he also wanted to secure the services of Armstrong as a speaker for the Eastland Lions and Rotary Clubs but was unable to do so because of previous commitments on the meeting dates of the clubs. In view of this Spurien made a special invitation to members of these clubs to attend one of the meetings.

Europeans Aren't Interested In U. S. A-Type Capitalism

WASHINGTON—(NEA)—The big problem of battling communism in Western Europe has been to convince the working people of those countries that American-style capitalism and the free enterprise system have more to offer them than communism or socialism.

Fair progress in this phase of the battle for men's minds has been reported from West Germany. The people there can see first-hand that communism offers the East Germans only a hollow shell.

In France and Italy, however, the fact that the free enterprise way of life offers a higher standard of living to the working people has not registered. Communism still seems to promise more to more people.

Beginning with the Marshall Plan, the United States has tried hard to sell this idea of greater profit sharing to the Europeans, and to the rest of the world for that matter. American business men have tried to sell it to European business men and American labor leaders have tried to sell it to European labor leaders. It has been known generally as the "productivity drive." But the idea has not caught on and has been slowed to a walk.

PRESIDENT EISENHOWER's report to Congress on the first six months of foreign aid operations in his administration bristles off this productivity drive with a scant five paragraphs.

As a matter of fact, all the initiative in the productivity drive has now been turned over to the Europeans. It has been practically abandoned as an American enterprise. The reason for this lies largely buried in a peculiar chain of circumstances.

The principle of the productivity drive as a program to help wean Europe away from communism was first written into the Mutual Security Act through an amendment introduced by former Senator Blair Moody (D-Mich.) in 1951.

The next year former Senator William Benton (D-Conn.) implemented this by another amendment. It provided that up to \$100 million in European counterpart funds could be allocated for promoting productivity drives in the Marshall Plan countries.

By dint of a year's hard work, a team of American experts under Everett Bellows got 11 European countries to agree to take \$95 million worth of this technical assistance. The sums were: France, \$30 million; Britain, Germany and Austria, \$10 million; Italy, \$22 million; Norway, \$4 million; Denmark and The Netherlands, \$3 million; Belgium, Turkey and Greece, \$1 million apiece. Productivity councils were set up in each country.

Early in 1953, Harold E. Stassen, the new foreign aid administrator, sent teams of U. S. businessmen abroad to survey all programs. Almost without exception, these teams came back and recommended that the Moody-Benton amendment productivity drive be dropped.

The reason given was in general that European businessmen didn't want American productivity methods introduced in their factories. They resented American interference. In response to these recommendations, expansion of the program stopped and staffs were cut.

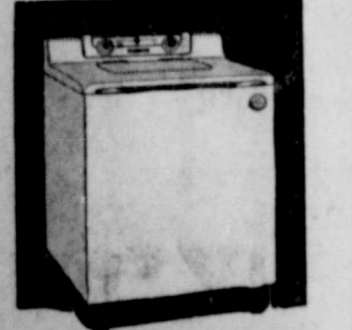

Pastor To Begin Sermon Series Wednesday At First Baptist

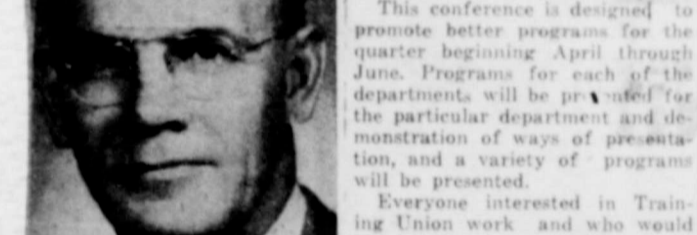

Oranges Give a Lift to Lenten Pancakes



Everybody's going in often for the good revered Lenten habit of pancakes. This special variation will delight everyone—combining as it does the sunshine and flavor of Florida oranges and creamy cottage cheese. Right now, the market stalls are filled with the big seedless Valencia oranges, easy to section, and full of juice to use in adding tangy goodness to many foods. Try this for a luncheon main dish or dinner dessert to intrigue your family and friends—the sauce is better than syrup, the sections of oranges good and plump, and there's plenty of nutrition in both the oranges and the cottage cheese. If you're in a hurry, use a packaged pancake mix and the sauce. Florida Pancake Stacks with Orange Sauce: 1 1/2 cups sifted all-purpose flour, 1 egg, slightly beaten, 2 1/2 teaspoons baking powder, 1/4 cup milk, 1/2 teaspoon salt, 3/4 cup Florida orange juice, 3 tablespoons sugar, 3 tablespoons melted butter or margarine, 1 to 2 cups cottage cheese. Sift together dry ingredients. Combine slightly beaten egg, milk, orange juice and butter. Stir into dry ingredients. To make 4 large pancakes, bake on hot griddle, one at a time, using 3/4 cup batter for each pancake. Stack pancakes, spreading 1/4 cup cottage cheese between each. To serve, cut into wedges; spoon "Sunshine Orange Sauce" over top. YIELD: 4 to 6 servings.

Sunshine Orange Sauce: 1 tablespoon cornstarch, 1 cup Florida orange juice, 1/2 cup sugar, 2 teaspoons grated Florida orange rind, 1/4 teaspoon salt, 1 Florida orange, sectioned. Mix together cornstarch, sugar and salt in a saucepan. Blend in orange juice gradually, add orange rind. Cook over medium heat until mixture comes to a boil, stirring constantly. Add Florida orange sections; heat. YIELD: About 1 1/2 cups. For main luncheon dish use 2 cups cottage cheese; as a dessert use 1 cup.

COWS GO TO THEIR FEED

Handling of hay is at a minimum when it can be stored, dried and self-fed on one level. In a project in loose housing of dairy cattle at Michigan State College, reports Capper's Farmer, hay is stored in a quonset-type building which is also used to house young cattle. Forage is dried through a ventilating tunnel in the hay by a 42-inch fan and 5-horsepower motor. Cattle eat at a manger at an open end of the building. A self-feeding fence is pushed back and animals eat their way into the structure.
