The balance will be used for paying rent on the mother's room, until Saturday, and at that time she will seek employment in Cisco, where she attends Junior College. Groceries have been provided to last her until the date that she will go back to Cisco. The amount of money that is in twenty-two dollars and ninety-four cents. This will be used to pay for his robe and buy the necessities that he will need. Mrs. Rhodes, nurses supervisor of Ranger General Hospital, has agreed to take him to town and buy him a haircut out of her own pocket.

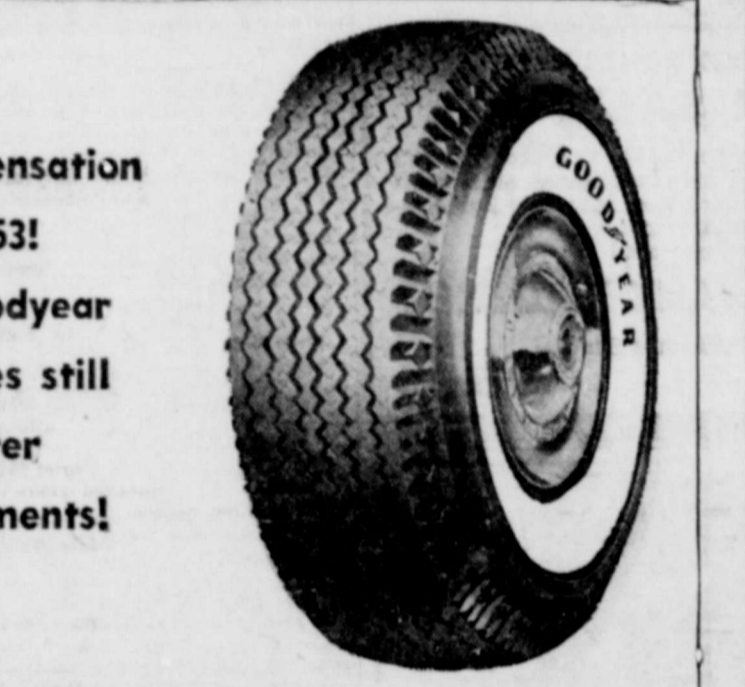
