

#### The Same Power **More Light From**

COLLEGE STATION - Thrifty minded families are finding that it's the "little things" around home that help trim the rough edges from their tightening bud-

With this in mind, Bernice Claytor, extension home management specialist, offers homemakers several tips on how to get more light from the same amount of electric power.
Mrs. Claytor points out that

colored electric light bulbs absorb up to one-third of the light they produce and should not be used, except for decorating purposes.

Replace dark or dingy lamp hades with white or some other light colored shade. Dark colors absorb light; light colors reflect. Use one high-wattage bulb, Mrs Claytor says, instead of several smaller ones. For example, she adds, a 100-watt bulb furnishes 50 percent more light than four 25-watt bulbs, yet uses the same



grown. This is to make sure that enough plants come up; if more grow than are wanted, the surplus ones are thinned out.

In sections of extremely heavy rainfall, or where land is poorly drained, hills may be elevated, so that the seeds are held above the average surface level, and drainage is thus improved. But in well drained gardens, it may be advisable to leave a slight de-
