Cancer Crusade Gets Underway Throughout Area

American Cancer Society volunteers from the Rio Grande to the Red River began the 1954 Texas Cancer Crusade this week. Travis T. Wallace of Dallas, president of the Society's Texas Division, emphasized that the Crusade has two purposes. "It will give vital information about cancer to the public and will raise funds to advance the society's programs of research, education and service," he said. Official goal of the Texas Crusade is \$700,000. The national goal is \$25,000,000. Gov. Allan Shivers, opening the Crusade on a network broadcast earlier this week, pointed out that cancer is expected to kill more than 9,000 Texans this year. He urged everyone to support the Crusade and to learn as much as they can about cancer during April—designated by President Eisenhower and Gov. Shivers as Cancer Control Month. Wallace pointed out how the money contributed in Texas will be used in the cancer control program. "At least 25 per cent will go for advanced scientific research," he said, "and much of that will be used by Texas scientists and institutions. Sixty per cent will stay right here in Texas, to provide professional and public education, service to cancer patients and to maintain tumor clinics and information and service centers. Secretary Will Oppose Tax Cut

FORT WORTH (Sp.)—"The business recession" which gloom prophets have talked up can be measured in terms of reduced expenses resulting from peace in Korea. Sinclair Weeks, secretary of commerce, noted to a statewide radio audience over the Republican Party's weekly network program last night.

"War material costs have been cut, accounting partially for the 10 per cent dip in business under 1953, which was our biggest economic year in history. I feel confident that the American people would rather have a temporary drop in business than more death in Korea," Secretary Weeks emphasized.

"First quarter business in 1954," he further pointed out, "is better than it was in 1952, and we can expect improvements as the year progresses. Unless the professional pessimists, irresponsible union leaders, and socialist planners convince the public they cannot afford to buy, there is every reason to view the year with confidence."



EAST-WEST BALANCE OF POWER COMPARED—According to experts of the U. S. State Department, the leaders of the Kremlin and the Soviet satellites have stationed about 491 divisions of troops in Asia and Europe, which form a potential menace to the free world. As opposed to the Communists, the West can put 176 divisions in the field. Militarily this presents a dark picture, but the odds are made more nearly even by the productive genius of the Allied powers. 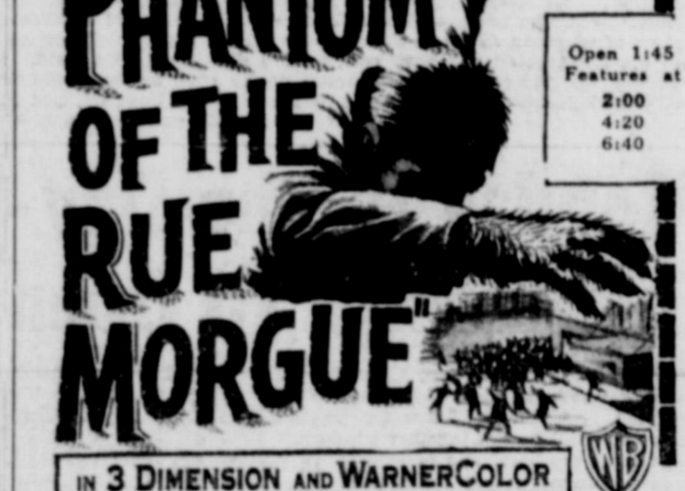

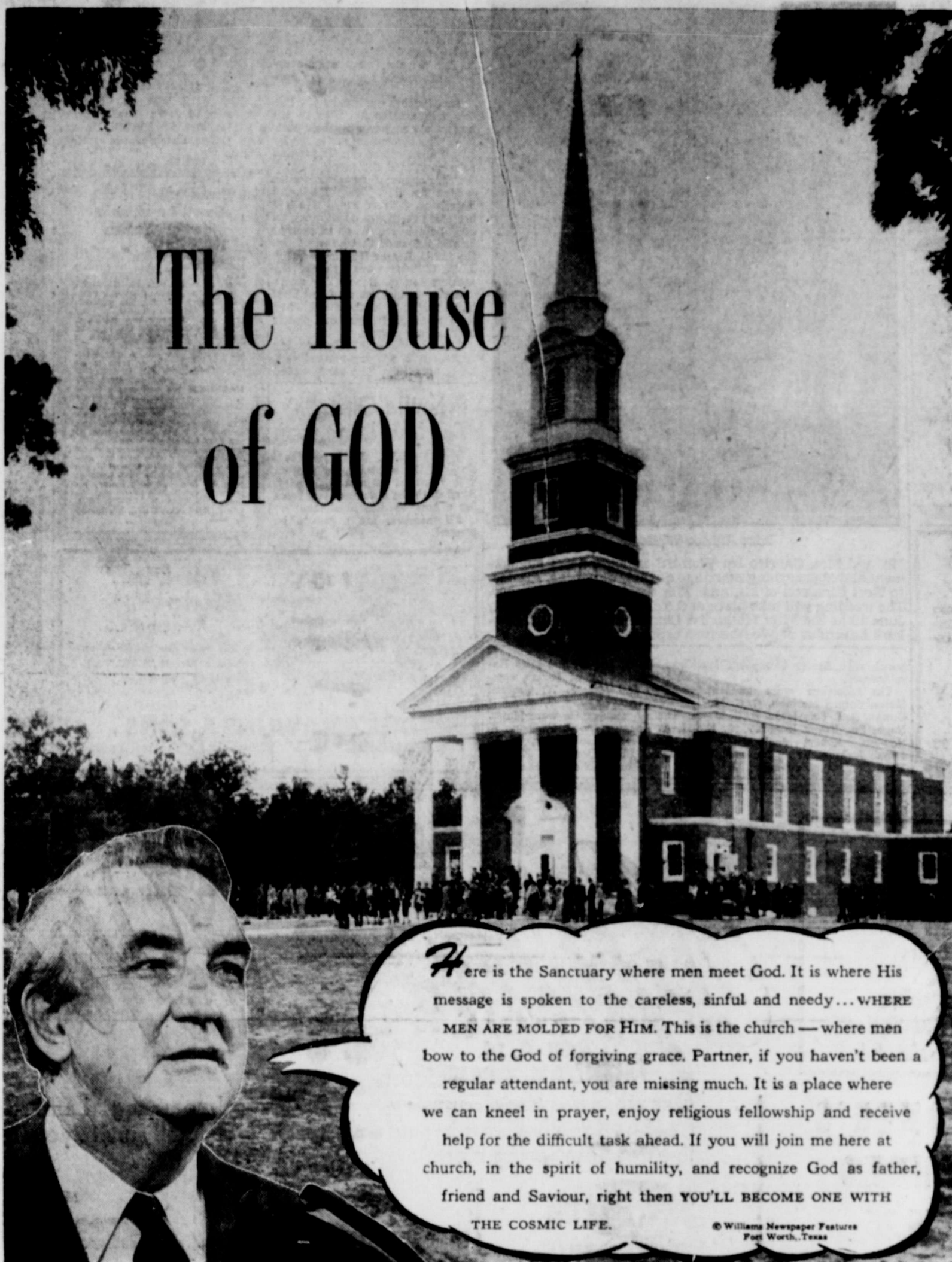

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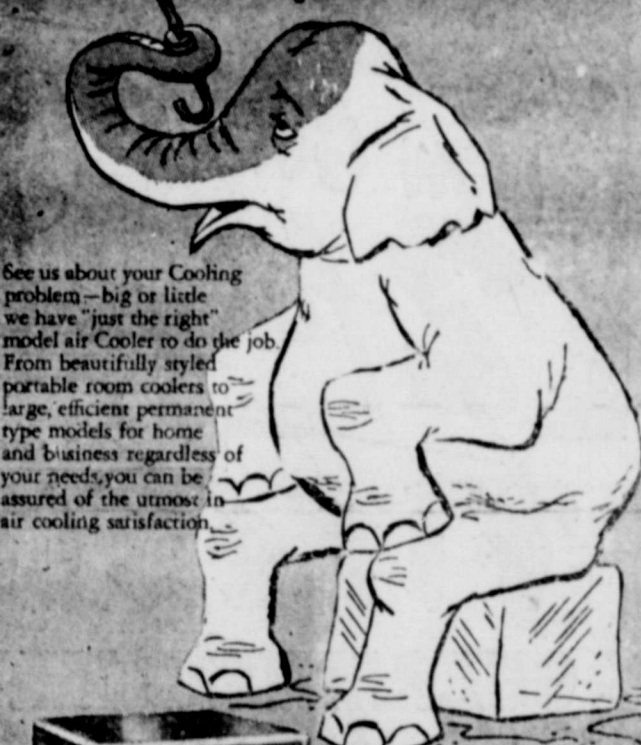
