## RANGER DEMOCRATIC RALLY FIRST BIG POLITICAL EVENT SINCE HOT '52 CAMPAIGN

William O. (Bill) Cooper, of Dallas, featured speaker at the nine-county Democratic rally in Ranger Friday at 7:30 p.m. is one of the state's outstanding Democrats, a dynamic political orator and an authority on world affairs.

The Friday night rally, staged under sponsorship of the Young Democratic Club of Eastland County, will be the first political explosion in this section of the state since the heated Eisenhower-Stevenson campaign back in the fall of 1952—18 months ago.

Friday night's Ranger rally will spark an area drive of loyalist Democrats who are forming battle lines to rigorously oppose Eisenhower Democrats and backers of Gov. Allan Shivers, Texas' chief executive, who switched to support Republican presidential candidate, Gen. Dwight D. Eisenhower, in 1952.

Ranger voters gave the Democratic candidate, Gov. Adlai Stevenson of Illinois, a substantial majority over President Eisenhower in the Presidential election in 1952.

Roy Tackett of Ranger, president of the Young Democratic Club of Eastland County, reported today that arrangements have been completed for Friday night's event and scores of visiting party leaders from Eastland, Palo Pinto, Stephens, Shackelford, Comanche, Erath, Brown, Callahan and Taylor counties are expected to be in attendance.

The rally will be held in the spacious CIO Oil Workers Hall, located in Ranger on U. S. Highway 80 East.

The visiting assemblage will be greeted by Dr. Price Ashton, major in the U. S. Marine Corps Reserve and president of Ranger Junior College, and other prominent Ranger citizens, and area Democratic leaders also will participate.

## Heavy Fines Paid, But ... GRAVEYARD GOES WANTING AS MOTORISTS HAVE SAFE MONTH

Eastland County motorists can put a red feather in their caps according to a report from The Department of Public Safety.

Eastland and Throckmorton Counties have had no fatal accidents so far this year the report showed. In other counties in this area Jones County led the way with the largest amount of highway deaths with a total of six so far this year followed by Stephens and Taylor with four each. Callahan and Mitchell had two each and Fisher, Haskell, Nolan, Scurry, Shackelford and Stoneval Counties have had one death.

Excessive speed and intoxicants were cited by Highway Patrol officers as causing a majority of the deaths. In the same vein 24 persons died in the quarter ending at midnight March 31 as compared to only seven highway fatalities in the same three month period last year. The sudden mania for motorcades has Captain G. L. Morahan and his patrolmen in the 13-county Abilene district ever searching for ways to cut down on the deaths.

**QUARTERLY HOUSEHOLD WORKERS TAX DEADLINE NEAR**

April 30th is the deadline on which social security payments for household workers for the first quarter of 1954 are due at the office of the Director of Internal Revenue in your district.

The federal law bringing household workers under the old-age and survivors insurance system went into effect January 1, 1951. However, lawyers say that many persons who employ help in their homes are still in the dark about requirements of the law.

Here are some provisions everyone should know. Household workers covered by the law include maids, laundresses, housekeepers, cooks, nursemaids, gardeners, handymen, valets, footmen, groomers, chauffeurs of privately owned cars, practical nurses, and others.

Whether or not a household worker is included in the law depends on how many days she works and how much money she is paid. If the person works 24 days and earns \$60 during any one of the three month periods into which the calendar year has been divided, a tax report must be filed and payment made.

Only cash wages are considered, which includes bus fare if paid in cash, but does not include bus tokens, clothing, room and board, or other non-cash items furnished by the employer. A domestic worker does not have to put in a full day to count on the 24 day rule—any portion of the day worked counts as a full day.

The rule is different for domestic workers on farms operated for profit. In such cases the domestic is considered a farm worker and is covered only if he or she meets the test for farm labor.

The tax in all amounts to 4 per cent of the cash wages paid. You, as an employer, must deduct 2 per cent from your household worker's cash wages if the person meets the 24 day, fifty dollar, test. You then include another 2 per cent which is the employer's contribution. After the close of each specified three-month period you should send the tax, with a report of the wages paid, to the Director

of Internal Revenue. These three-month periods, or quarters, end on March 31st, June 30th, September 30th and December 31st. Reports and payments are due by the last day of the month following the close of each quarter. During any quarterly period that a household worker does not work 24 days or earn \$50, the employer need not be concerned. You need not consider the work your employee performs for any other employer.

The Internal Revenue Service has a special household report form, printed on the back of a return envelope, which can be obtained from your director upon request. Just ask for Form 942.

**Contract Precautions Outlined**

Since contracts may be entered into quite informally, many people fall into serious difficulties by binding themselves to agreements which they do not fully understand. It is very easy for the unwise individual to obligate himself beyond his intent or ability to perform, and thereby invite litigation and a consequent judgment of forced performance or damages in favor of the other party to the contract.

Contracts are absolutely essential to the functioning of modern business. In order to plan for the future—to set up a business, insure a steady supply of necessary materials and goods, set a price and a delivery date, on what we have to sell, etc.—we must know that the courts will, if necessary, enforce the contracts we make with others.

Only a minute percentage of the millions of contracts annually made find their way to the courts. But by seeing that the exceptional case which reaches litigation is settled justly, the courts make it possible for the remaining multitude of transactions to be conducted with a minimum of friction.

How can we minimize the possibilities of litigation over our contracts? How can we protect ourselves in event we should later wind up in court? A clear understanding of all terms of every agreement entered into may prove the best answer. To both these questions, Justice demands that we be held to the letter of our lawful contracts, lest the other party be damaged by our failure. Knowing this, we should apply a few common sense rules in our dealings with others.

### State Rooms On Aircraft Now

The largest and most completely appointed state rooms in air service have been introduced on daily flights across the Atlantic by Pan American World Airways, it was announced today by Willis G. Lipscomb, vice president Traffic and Sales.

Styled by Henry Dreyfuss, the President State rooms take their name from the luxurious Presidential service operated between New York and Paris, Rome, London, Frankfurt and Beirut —

double-deck "Strato" Clippers. The President state rooms are offered in response to a demand for complete privacy by celebrities, businessmen who use travel time for conferences, families travelling with children and others. (Mr. Lipscomb said.)

On the forward bulkhead of the stateroom is an individual private washstand, the only one available on any airline. A mirror and special light with a completely stocked toilet article cabinet, a wash-basin with hot and cold water and a side stand with a bar combination and a bookshelf are also part of the equipment.

Features of the state rooms include fully reclining lounge chairs with the large footrests characteristic of Sleeperette accommodations, as well as a leather-covered divan, a private clothes closet, a large removable table and room for storage of overnight baggage.

Special insulation in the walls and floor-to-ceiling heavy drapery across the entrance to the room ensure quiet and privacy. At night the room provides a lower and upper berth.

During the day and evening, President stateroom passengers have special privileges. They have a choice of menus and may have their meals served at any time. New chinaware service is specially designed by Raymond Loewy. Special beverage service and additional snack service are also available. At departure and en route stops passengers may board the plane ahead of the other travelers, if they desire.

Surcharge for the stateroom is \$125. It will be available for single occupancy when two full first-class fares are paid.
