Probably no other problem is as of so much vital importance to Texas as our water supply—or the lack of one.

The Texas Water Resources Committee has just made a special report which they named "Plan for the Alleviation of the Water Shortage in Texas." Their report suggested that the state set up a series of dams on all our rivers to catch floodwater runoffs. We lose about 53,000,000 acre feet of water a year to the gulf.

This was the only thing they could have said. There is no other way for Texas to ease its water problem as a state—unless of course, we hire a band of Hopi Indians to stage rain dances periodically.

But their plan isn't going to help us out here on the High Plains—we don't have any rivers running up and it doesn't look like we have any floodwaters for long time to come.

Back in May, 1949, a Missourian engineer came up with a plan that was so large in scope that it staggered the imagination. It was a plan that would theoretically work but in this day and age would cost millions or billions of dollars. He estimated it would cost about the same amount in 1930 dollars, as the Tennessee Valley Authority.

Purpose of the project would be to irrigate with and to control the flood waters of the Mississippi. Both would be good reasons for serious consideration of the plan.

It consisted basically of a long canal, with eastward tributaries, running from the headwaters of the Missouri in Wyoming to the Nueces River in Southwest Texas and entering the Gulf of Mexico at Corpus Christi. It would have a three-fold purpose of flood control on the Mississippi, irrigation for the High Plains regions, and navigation.

Much publicity was given this idea at the time of its conception and the plan received a cold shoulder from the government and everyone else in a position to do anything about it. It has been our understanding that a similar plan has been kicking around in a congressional committee for several years but it has, and will continue, to lie dormant.

Naturally we are concerned with floodwater control, but the main project would be irrigation water—and it is highly unlikely at this time that the government will consent to even consider putting more land in cultivation. But with the water table in this area depleting as fast as it is, the time will come soon when everyone in this area will be searching for a way of keeping water available to our land.

According to the engineer, Charles E. Sexton, the system of canals would start in Wyoming at a point just west of the Black Hills, 5,200 feet above sea level and wind a main ditch down the east-southwest. Wherever the canal strikes a stream, it can be made behind a low dam.

This makes possible the control of volume of these streams, valuable for irrigation of their lower valley. Between rivers he would dig subsidiary canals, winding from the main canal along the crests of the watersheds a hundred or more miles eastward, providing water for those areas now drop. These canals would fill thousands of ponds or sinkholes, providing storage and also practically eliminating floods in the flat lands below.

The big canal would thus curve south, dropping only a few inches per mile, through Wyoming, Colorado, Oklahoma and West Texas to the Nueces river, 200 miles east of El Paso, swelling the Nueces all the way to Corpus Christi and the Gulf.

In addition to irrigating its millions of acres, spreading a blanket of vegetation that would halt erosion from the dust bowl area of the 30's to Montana and preventing floods, the contour canal would provide easy navigation from Corpus Christi to the Arkansas river and lock navigation from there all the way up to the Black Hills.

Later he proposes contour canal systems which would be laid down along other eastward slopes. Altogether they would be aimed at diverting four-fifths of the water from the Mississippi before it reaches the river.

Actually the Federal Power Commission engineers have approved the Sexton plan's basic recommendations—but that's as far as it has officially gone in eight years.

The main canal would run through Castro County and its waters could irrigate the entire Texas Panhandle.

A system of contour canals would be feeders to irrigation canals. The contour canals would follow the curve of the land letting nature do the work of moving the water and a rate of flow which would keep canal erosion to a minimum.

One Number System Sought For Highway

The dream of a transcontinental highway connecting Old Mexico and Canada came closer to realization last week as members of the International Parks Highway Association met in Odessa and

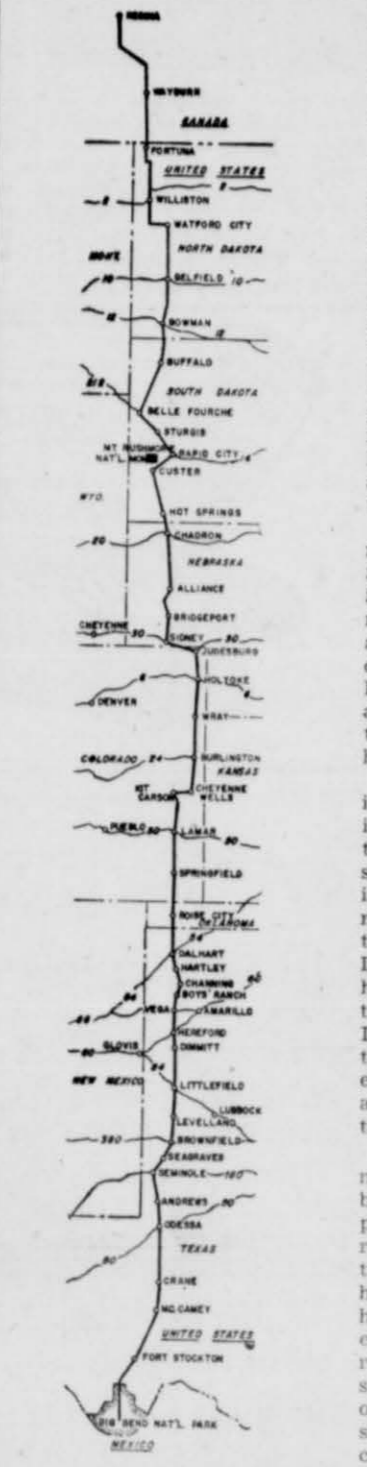
Lamar, Colorado. This highway passed through Dimmitt as State Highway 51 and runs north and south from the Big Bend National Park to Dalhart. After leaving the state, the same route receives other numerical designations as it goes through the Oklahoma Panhandle, Colorado, Nebraska, South Dakota North Dakota and finally to Regina, Canada.

The meetings in Odessa and Lamar set the wheels in motion to get all states along the route to agree on a single number for the highway. Tentatively chosen is the number 851, although it may be changed. All states along the route have agreed through their committee members to work on the redesignation of the route to a one-number road. Should this arrangement be made, the pressing necessity of obtaining a federal designation will be no longer felt, although there will be a continuing effort in this direction.

Attending the Association's meetings last week, were T. A. Singer and B. M. Nelson, Mr. Singer from Dimmitt is an original member of the organization and it was his report that indicated that the highway might at last become a one-number route and consequently receive more traffic than ever before in its history.

"This has been most encouraging," Mr. Singer said, "because it means we are now on our way to achieving our goals. There should be greatly increased tourist and other traffic so that Dimmitt may receive much additional trade due to the redesignation. Dimmitt businessmen contributed heavily to the new route when they joined the Association and I personally think it was one of the soundest investments they ever made. Of course it will be an additional service to the nation's tourists also."

The urgency in selecting a one-number designation is brought on by the Association's desire to have printed and to issue maps of the route. Association officials felt if the maps showed a one-numbered highway north and south it would have a greater impact on the traveling public and their choice of routes. No positive date has been set as a goal for the achievement of the Association's aims, but it should be in the near future, according to Mr. Singer.

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New Dimmitt Airfield Takes Shape As JayCees Secure Land, Materials

The Dimmitt Junior Chamber of Commerce this week made arrangements with Mr. Elmer Youts for the use of his property about one mile north of town for a municipal airport.

The move came after the JayCees had carefully considered the need for an airport and decided to carry the project out.

Located on Highway 51 the pastureland is ideally situated according to Jaycee officials and the terrain is well suited for an airport good enough to be listed on CAA air maps.

Four landing strips will criss-cross the area, making possible

takeoffs and landing for light aircraft from eight different directions.

Dimmitt has been without an airport for about five years since the lease held by the city was relinquished on property east of town.

Work will begin on the airfield almost immediately. Present plans call for the construction of three hangers, with more to be added as the need arises. All plans are presently subject to changes, however, since commitments on all construction materials have not been made.

JayCee members working on

the project have indicated that no definite plans are on the drawing board because the organization is starting from scratch and re-

northwest-southeast, and north-south may have to be made after work starts.

Refueling facilities will be available at the new airport. Runways will run east-west, north-south, east-southwest. Suitable markers will define the runways as soon as they are leveled and cleared of high spots.

There are presently three airplanes owned by Dimmitt residents and it is expected more will follow as soon as the facilities are provided.

Anyone contemplating the purchase of an aircraft is urged to contact H. B. Thomas at Thomas Jewelry, Dr. James E. Wohlgenuth, optometrist, or Bascom Nelson at the Castro County News, so additional hanger space can be provided.

Once the airfield is constructed it is expected it will be almost or completely self-supporting. Several reasons are given for building an airport here. Chief of these is to offer it as a service to the community. Another is the civic pride and prestige involved and that it may help to attract outside industry to Dimmitt since larger firms are turning more and more to light aircraft for transportation of their executive staffs.

Methodists Pay Off Construction Debt

Wednesday was a red-letter day for the First Methodist Church in Dimmitt because that day saw the final installment on the church building debt paid.

The last payment was for \$12,915 and it was made to the United Fidelity Insurance Company less than seven years after the \$146,000 building was completed.

A note burning ceremony will be held in the near future, the exact date to be announced later. According to church treasurer Steve Taylor, plans are being made for re-painting the sanctuary in preparation for the dedication ceremony.

One addition was made to the church. It was a \$26,000 education section added in 1955. It was paid for immediately and was not financed.

The Methodist Church was completed in September of 1949 by Killingsworth Construction Company. It seats 460 persons in the pews and thirty in the choir section. Rev. Horace Brooks was pastor at the time of construction.

Before moving into the new building on Southwest Third Street the Methodist Church congregation met in another building on Northwest Third that was

1957 License Plates Go On Sale Friday Morning At Sheriff's Office

Vehicle license plates for 1957 go on sale today (Thursday) all over the state. In preparation for the expected large demand, the Sheriff-Tax Assessor's office has on hand 2,700 passenger car plates, 2,125 truck plates and 300 for miscellaneous vehicles.

County Sheriff Jack Cartwright cautioned motorists against buying their license plates out of their home county. The law calls for a penalty of from \$1 to \$200 fine plus court costs and a full year's re-registration for offenders.

Purpose of the cautioning against out-of-county plate purchasing is that an estimated \$1,000 to \$2,000 is lost by Castro County each year as a result of this practice. Most of this out-of-county registration happens when cars or trucks are purchased from agencies in nearby cities. Instead of buying their plates in the same town in which the cars were purchased, the owners should use the dealer's tags as license plates to return to their home county. The dealer tag will be honored for several days, Sheriff Cartwright indicated.

The first \$50,000 collected as a result of license plate sales receipts stays in the county. After

that the county begins dividing it with the state until all goes to the state after \$175,000 is reached.

Receipts have climbed steadily during the past three years. The figures below indicate the amount retained of the total in the county and that sent to the state headquarters:

Persons wishing to purchase new license plates must present their last year's license receipt and vehicle title, according to the Sheriff's office. Deadline for purchasing new plates is April 1. Since the heaviest demand for the plates falls on the last day of business in March, Sheriff Cartwright urged all vehicle owners to buy their plates early and avoid the rush.

The plates this year are black numerals on a white background.

RAIN RAIN RAIN

General precipitation over Castro County since Saturday resulted in 2.3 of an inch of moisture according to identical readings on the rain gauges of Edwin (Goose) Ramey and Dewey Wright.

Saturday started the damp spell with light snow flurries which changed the color more than the moisture content of the soil. General drizzling rains Wednesday pushed the reading upward but so far January has not reached last month's total of .48 inches.

Hard freezes marked the early days of the week, but early Thursday morning water was running down the streets with no ice on the ground anywhere.

Wednesday's rain will give new hope for wheat and pasture lands although it will take more during the winter and spring months to come before good growths will be assured.

This rain came almost to the day a year after the

big snow of 1956 that left the county virtually immobile. An estimated 24 inches of snow fell last year at this time.

The 23 of an inch received this month is slightly below the .39 average over the past 26 years. More than one inch of moisture fell in 1921, 1939, and 1949 but none of these turned out to be particularly wet years since they were about average. 1923 started out with no rain at all in January and eventually wound up with a 38.58 total for the year. 1941 started out with .07 of an inch and finally wound up with 39.41.

City Mayor E. B. Wright Announces Decision Not to Seek Re-election

Mr. E. B. Wright, for the past five years mayor of Dimmitt, announced this week that he would not be a candidate for re-election. He was re-elected last year for a one-year term. At present there has been no one announced for the office, the election for which will be in April.

Mother's March Collects \$456 for Polio Campaign

The Mothers' March for Dimes Monday night brought \$456.32 into the polio fund coffers to lead in campaign activities. It was conducted by the Dimmitt JayCees-Ettes.

Following this in amount was \$341.15 brought in from the County's share of the KFDD-TV Telethon Saturday, January 19. School collections amounted to \$329.89 and a Flag Community donation amounted to \$13.95.

Total of the collections so far reached \$1,141.31 by Wednesday. Half of this amount, \$570.65 stays in Castro County and the other half goes to the national headquarters.

The gross receipts for the year were \$2,560 at the end of the campaign.

Several other sources of income are yet to be included. They are a Dance held Wednesday night at Nazareth, Hart School collections, coin collectors, and a benefit basketball game February 14 at Dimmitt High School between Dimmitt Lions Club and Junior Chamber of Commerce.

Temporary Drive Chairman Steve Taylor was optimistic in regards to this year's drive. It was off to a late start, but has proceeded as well or better than expected.

Last year five persons were aided by the county polio fund at a cost of about \$1,500. It is expected the local infant-paralysis treasury will contain about \$1,300 at the termination of the drive. The fund had reached a low of \$336.01 when the campaign began.

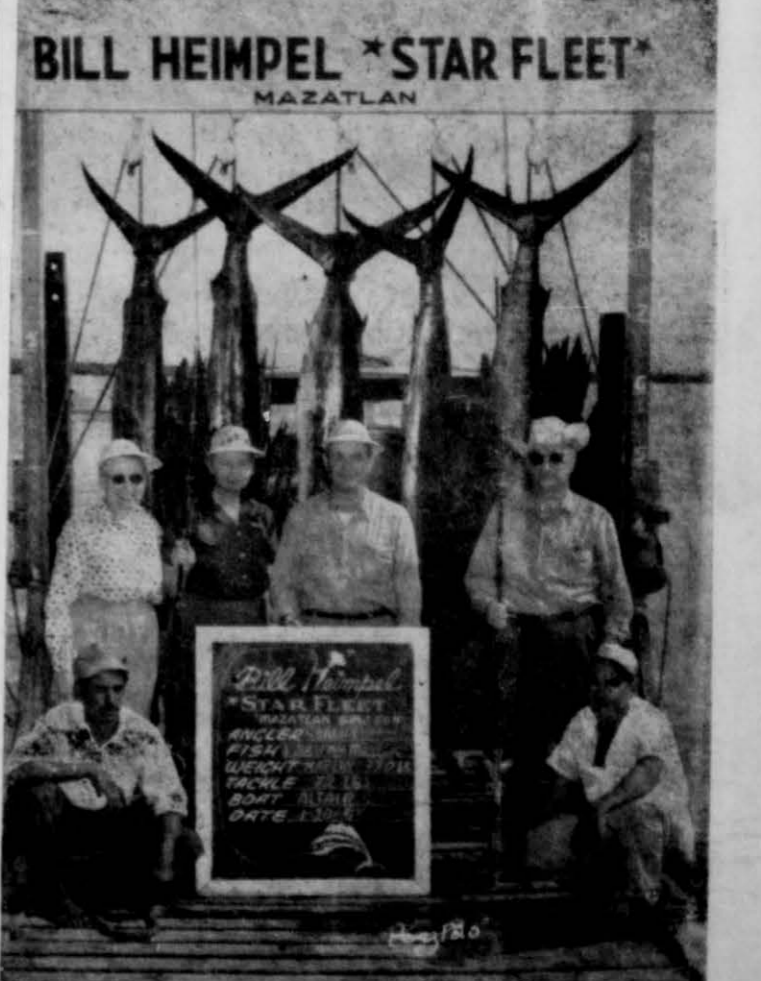
Funeral Services Held Here For Mr. B. T. Winkle

canal "needs only one levee, on the downhill side (east) from 10 to 14 feet effective height, mostly built by local men and machinery as off-season work. Slope of the land provides a western or uphill 12-foot levee would back water west for one-eighth of a mile as a shallow lagoon giving maximum escape and evaporation. Navigation channel is along levee, but re-ly, as mud-work in depressions; and levee widened downhill by pumping mud, furnishing all canal-side homes with deep moist soil for gardens.

The magnitude of this plan is awesome, even fantastic. It would probably cost us dearly—almost as much, perhaps, as the United States throws into foreign aid spending in a month. But the results could easily be just as awesome. Our purpose in presenting a brief sketch of this plan is to point out that depletion of our underground water doesn't have to write itself into agriculture on the High Plains. The devastating billions of gallons of water from melting snow on the Rockies that play ash have in flood-time along the Mississippi could well spill out the answer of their humanitarianism on the semi-arid and arid High Plains. 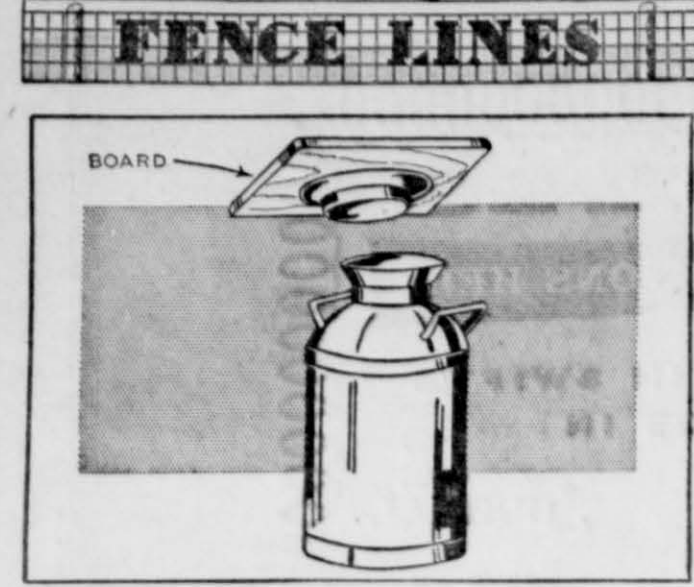

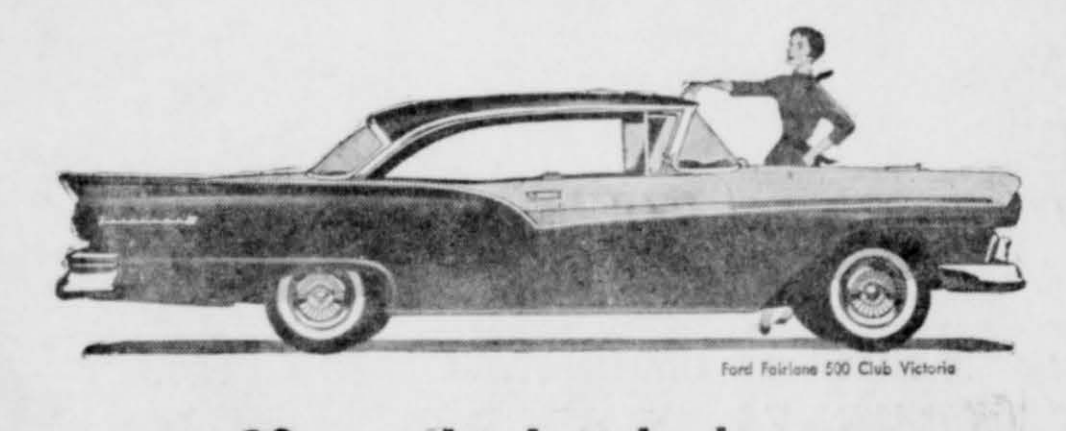

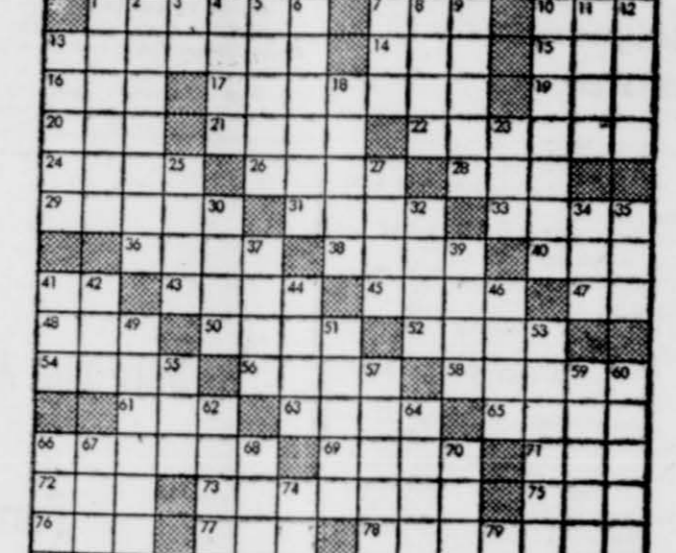
