

#### Clam Gets Some Scholarly Study

NEW BRUNSWICK, N. J. common clam is getting a lot of attention these days from world uthorities on the subject.

Six years ago, Rutgers University employed three top scientific minds to study the possibilities of establishing and operating a clam farm in southern New Jersey. The research team included Dr. Thurlow C. Nelson, professor of zoo-logy and world authority on shell-fish, and Drs. Melbourne R. arriker and Harold H. Haskin.

They managed to come up with lot of answers of some consequence to the economy of southern New Jersey, where clammers annually account for one-fifth of 6,000,000 Atlantic Coast busi-






