Lake Michigan Has A Mystery For Radar

MILWAUKEE — Milwaukee air traffic controllers have a puzzle on their hands since installation of a new radar system.

A mystery target appears on the radar screen at a position about two miles out in Lake Michigan. The controllers say there is nothing but water at that point and that they should not get any indication there.

"It's hard to guess what it is," said David G. Buckman, Mitchell Field chief air traffic controller. "I just hope it goes away."

"It could be a seasonal phenomenon caused by some temperature conditions."

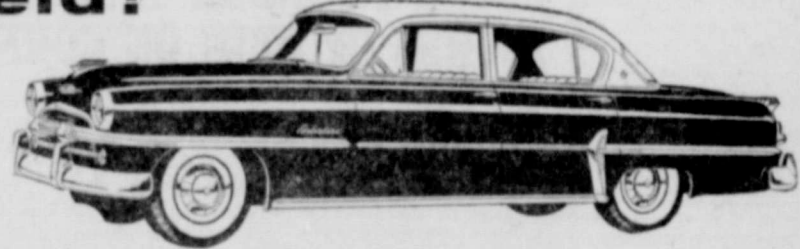

Combine Raisins And Bananas For New Flavor In Loaf Cake

Remember the Raisin Cupcakes of childhood? Remember the cooking the raisins before adding them to the cake, lest, like wrinkled meteors, they sink to the bottom of the cakes during baking? Raisins are a plentiful food for the month of May, recommended for our use by the U. S. Department of Agriculture, to make the most of the excellent supplies in the market. Raisin cakes are great favorites, so we shall have no problem in complying with the request to use them.

Banana Raisin Loaf Cake

- 1-4 cups sifted cake flour
1 cup sugar
2 teaspoons baking powder
1-4 teaspoon baking soda
3-4 teaspoon salt
1-2 cup shortening
2 eggs, unbeaten
1 cup mashed ripe bananas* (2 to 3 bananas)
2 tablespoons milk
1 teaspoon vanilla
1 cup chopped seedless raisins
*Use fully ripe bananas...

yellow peel flecked with brown. Sift together flour, sugar, baking powder, soda and salt into mixing bowl. Add shortening, eggs and 1-3 cup bananas. Beat 2 minutes at slow to medium speed with electric mixer or 2 minutes by hand. Scrape down bowl and beat or spoon frequently during mixing. Add remaining 2-3 cup bananas, milk and vanilla. Beat 1 minute longer. Fold in chopped seedless raisins. Turn into a well-greased square pan (8x8x2) and bake in a moderate oven (350 degrees F.) 55 minutes, or until cake is done. Makes 1 cake.

Letter From Olden
