Planning a vacation? Here is a list of the official opening and closing dates of the major national parks west of the Mississippi River.

With the national parks attracting more and more vacationists each year, Holiday Magazine has compiled a list of the official opening and closing dates of the major

parks. The first regional list, which follows, deals with the National Parks west of the Mississippi River.

**Big Bend National Park, Texas.** Accessible all year.

**Bryce Canyon National Park, Utah.** Accessible all year, except road beyond Inspiration Point, which is usually closed by snow

from November to April.

**Carlsbad Caverns National Park, New Mexico.** Accessible all year.

**Crater Lake National Park, Oregon.** Accessible all year.

**Glacier National Park, Montana.** May 1 to October 15.

**Grand Canyon National Park, Arizona.** South Rim accessible all year; North Rim, May 15 to Octo-

ber 15. (North Rim road closed by snow from November 1 to May 1.)

**Grand Teton National Park, Wyoming.** About mid-June to mid-September, depending on weather conditions.

**Hot Springs National Park, Arkansas.** Accessible all year.

**Kings Canyon National Park, California.** Accessible all year to

Grant Grove section; from late May to September in canyon section.

**Lassen Volcanic National Park, California.** About May 27 to Sept. 20. (Lassen Peak Highway open about June 20.)

**Mesa Verde National Park, Colorado.** May 15 to October 15, and when weather permits.

**Mount Rainier National Park, Washington.** May 1 to October 31.

**Olympic National Park, Washington.** Accessible all year, except areas restricted by snow.

**Flat National Park, Oklahoma.** Accessible all year.

**Rocky Mountain National Park, Colorado.** Accessible all year. (Trail Ridge Road closed by snow

from mid-October to June.)

**Sequoia National Park, California.** Accessible all year.

**Wind Cave National Park, South Dakota.** Accessible all year.

**Yellowstone National Park, Wyoming-Idaho-Montana.** About June 20 to September 10, depending on weather.

**Yosemite National Park, California.** Yosemite Valley, Wawona and Mariposa Grove accessible all year. Glacier Point and all sections north of Yosemite Valley open in summer only.

**Zion National Park, Utah.** Accessible all year.

## IMPROVEMENTS IN FARMERS HOME ADMINISTRATION MADE

Measures to speed up and further improve Farmers Home Administration services to farmers have recently been developed in Washington under the direction of Secretary Benson, T. T. Perkins, state director at Dallas, has informed George Lane, Eastland county supervisor.

Perkins had just returned from a meeting at Oklahoma City where the new steps to decentralize and streamline agency operations were explained by Washington officials, L. A. Machemehl, Jr., W. M. Burkes, and the state field representatives also attended the meeting.

In accordance with Secretary Benson's policy of placing more control of agricultural programs in local hands, many of the decisions formerly made in state offices will now be made in the counties. County supervisors, the employees who deal directly with the farmers, will have final approval on a larger number of loans and will have more authority in working with other creditors and in taking steps to help borrowers solve their financial and farming problems.

Greater use will be made of state and county committees. New state committees, to be appointed in the near future, will be called upon frequently to review agency operations and make sure they are efficiently serving local needs. County committees will be relied upon to an even greater extent than in the past to help adapt national policies of local needs.

Services of other public and private organizations will be used to the maximum extent possible. County home demonstration agents will help Farmers Home Administration borrowers with their

By the way, we were not the only ones that visited there. Mr. Duffer had a good business. Duffer was a clean cut man and most of us liked his product.

Now back to the lake and dam site on the Leon, which we are very proud of and it needs a name as Mr. Barber said. The Duffer name sounds pretty good, but to me it doesn't give honor to the

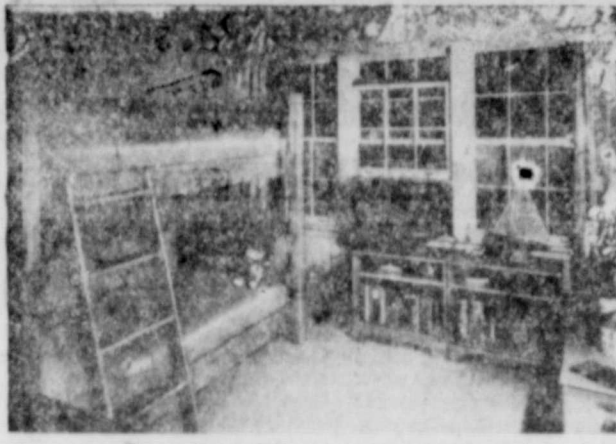

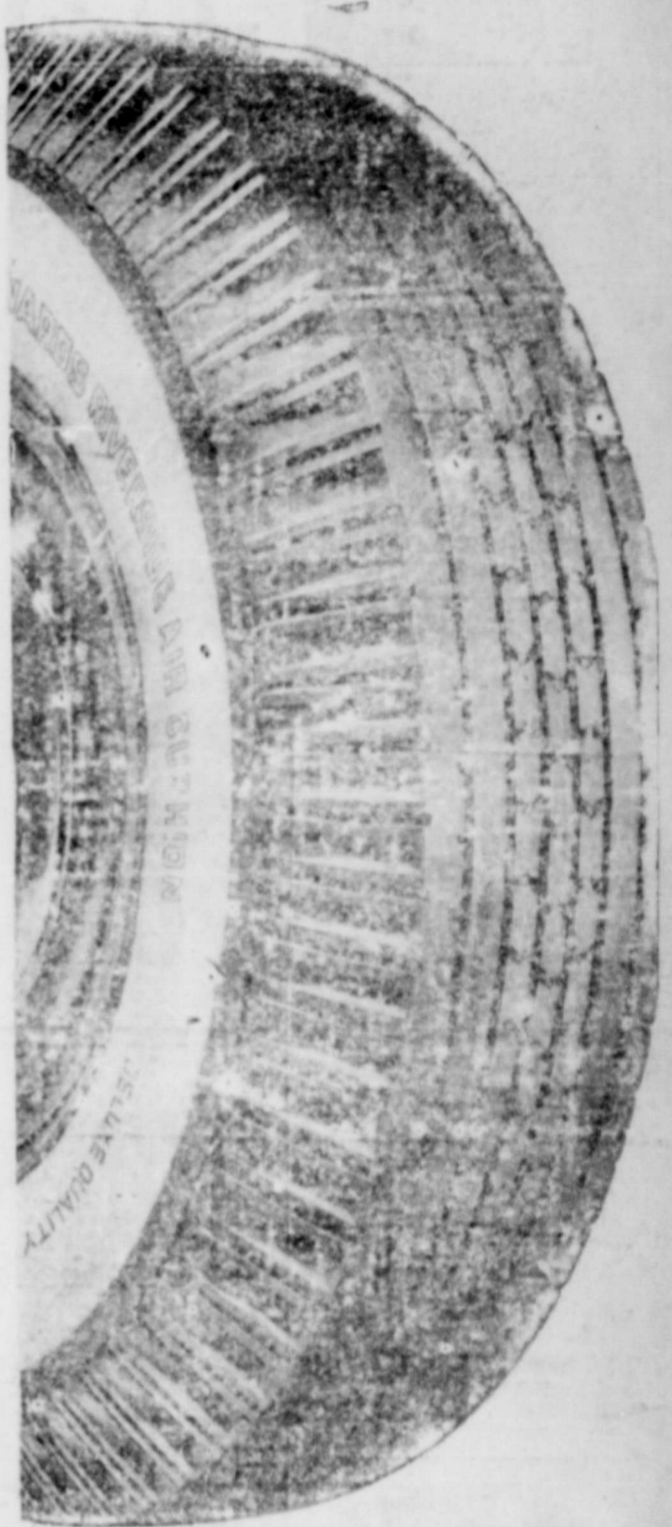

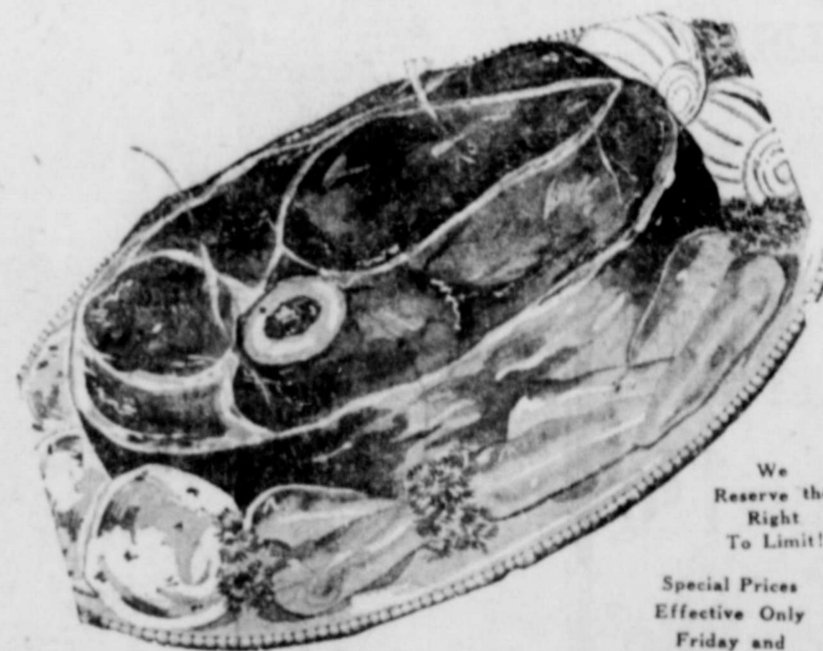
