Checking back on old issues of The Times, I noticed where George Kelly was editor of this paper at that time and a great admirer of Lindbergh. The Rising Star Chamber of Commerce served refreshments. Approximately 100,000 turkeys are now in this area, the growers were told.

### Wildcat Near Gorman Staked

Another wildcat has been staked for Eastland county. It is five miles northwest of Gorman.

It will be the Ernestine Callihan of Abilene No. 1 John W. Henderson, slated for 3,560 feet with rotary. Location is 1,320 feet from the north and 350 feet from the west lines of the southwest quarter of Section 10, Block 1, H&TC Survey.

Two miles northwest of Rising Star, J. W. Harding of Fort Worth No. 1 Robert H. Sone has been completed as a regular field producer. It is in Section 25, Block 2, ETRR Survey.

The well produced 39.5 barrels of 38 gravity oil, plus 50 per cent water, on pump from 48 perforations at 1,048-92 feet. Casing was set at 1,175 feet, total drilling depth. Plug was set at 1,135 feet.

A native of Mineral Wells, Dr. Ameen attended the University of Texas and Texas Tech and received his medical degree from Baylor.

## All Breeders Eligible For Beef Calf Show

There are more than 25 breeders of the Hereford and Angus breeds of beef cattle in Eastland County and they are all eligible to enter animals in the crop fed, registered beef calf show to be held in the show barn in Cisco, Friday, June 25, according to Howard Turner of that city, general show superintendent.

Turner said today that the County Agent's office in Eastland had a list of over 25 breeders in the county. Turner himself is a breeder of registered Herefords.

He said for the first calf show there will not be any sifting of animals. He also stated that it was not necessary to have an entry slip filled out prior to the show. The show is being sponsored by the Cisco Livestock Show Association.

Although animals to be entered for competition must have been dropped after Sept. 23 the breeders may show animals as individuals or of the opposite sex it was stated. The animals are to be shown in pens of three and for entering competition must be of the same sex.

It is a one day show. The animals are to be in their places by 9 a.m. and will be released by 3 p.m. Many of the calves will not be weaned. They will neither be halter broken or will they know how to lead. The exhibitor is expected to furnish his own eight-foot by ten-foot panels for the show. The panels are to be built of six inch rough boards and are to be four feet high.

Ed Huestis, Cisco, is grounds superintendent of the show.

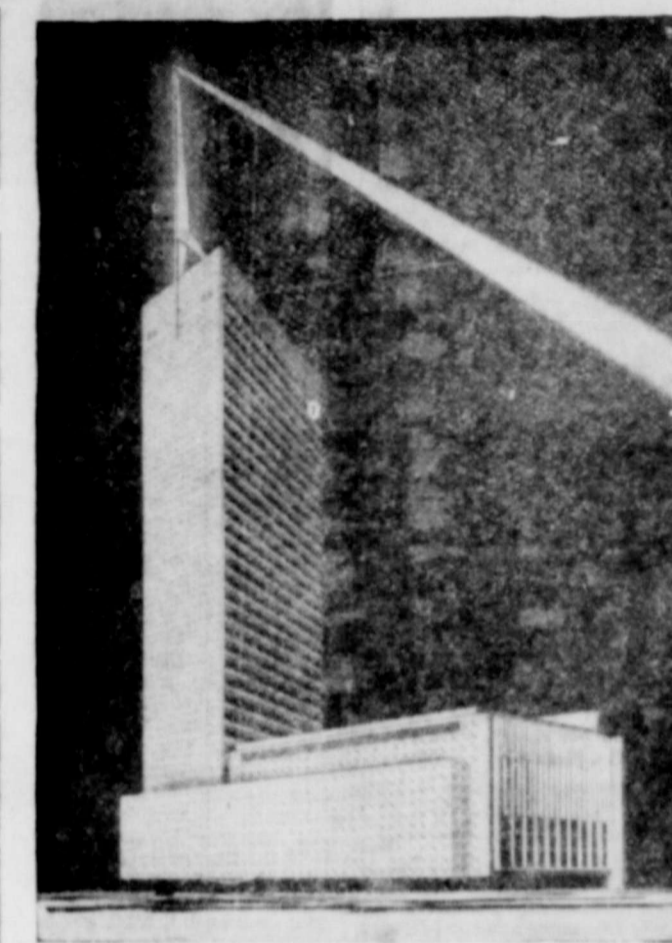

The beam will be visible 120 miles, and will rotate 12 times a minute. The beacon tower will give the building a total height of 598 feet. Basic lighting for the tower itself will be accomplished with more than two miles of red, white and blue "Lumenarc" tubing, a newly-developed, super-brilliant lighting tube.

Each Sunday during the summer months, a vacation spot will be featured to help you plan, and give you information that will be helpful in planning your summer trip.

Sightseeing Texans have "discovered" a spectacular scenic wonder within the state's own borders—Texas Longhorn Cavern, the third largest in the world.

A trickle of visitors to the giant cave became a flood last year, Manager H. H. (Hob) Galloway said, and a record number of vacationers, tourists and just folks driving by are expected this summer. Over a quarter of a million sightseers from all over the country already have explored the cave.

Longhorn Cavern State Park and the adjacent Inks State Park are particularly beautiful at this time of year, when the wild flowers are in bloom, Mr. Galloway pointed out. The road to the cavern from U. S. Highway 281 is six miles of pavement that winds and dips through rolling fields of colorful daisies, black-eyed Susans, Indian paintbrush, gaudiosa, purple sage, yucca and cacti of various types.

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Some of the rooms and passageways in the cavern are big enough to accommodate four-lane traffic. Every room is different—some with walls of crystallized calcite sparkling like diamond dust, others glowing red with the iron oxide embedded in them.

### 100,000 Bass In New Lake

The new Ranger-Eastland Lake is 100,000 bass fry strong today, following the dumping of that many Saturday morning by the State Fish Hatchery.

State Game Official Walton Baum, of the State Fish Hatchery at Cisco, officiated at the first fish were dumped in the new lake. He said he expected 90 per cent of the fish to survive.

Baum stated "Inasmuch as this is a new lake the fish should gain about five pounds a year."

The fish were placed in the lake 1/2 of a mile above the dam on the Frank Williamson Ranch.

The bass were from Pecos Kingdom State Hatchery.

### Caution Note Sounded On Summer Jobs

DALLAS (TNS)—Texas boys and girls who plan to enter the labor market by taking jobs after school closes this spring are advised to stop, look and listen before taking the plunge.

"It will be to your advantage to pause, to take stock of yourself and of the job situation around you," says Field Office Supervisor James L. Herriman of the U. S. Department of Labor's Wage-Hour Office here.

Such persons who are undecided about a vocational choice should get competent help on the matter, he declared. Vocational decisions must rest with the persons concerned; but they can make sounder decisions if they have competent help and a good understanding of the occupational fields open to them and suitable for them.

Both federal and state laws regulate the employment of young people, he said. Under the Federal Fair Labor Standards Act the minimum age is 16 for employment in factories and for most other interstate commerce work as well as for any type of work during school hours, including agriculture that is subject to the law.

"Under the federal law and many state laws, a minimum age of 18 is set for certain hazardous jobs," he said. "Among the jobs prohibited for minors under 18 by federal regulation and by some state laws are motor-vehicle driver and helper, the operation of power-driven wood-working machines, the operation of power-driven metal-forming, punching, and shearing machines, and the operation of bakery machines. Seven other types of work also require a minimum of 18 years under the federal law."

Also under regulation by the federal law are hours of work by minors, night work of boys and girls, as well as minimum wages and required overtime. Further information about such items is available from the local labor department office.

Employers who want to avoid unintentional violation of child labor laws should require youthful applicants to present age certificates before they go to work, he said. In Texas, such certificates of age are available as a public service from local offices of the Texas Employment Commission.

Fred D. Baumgardner, head of the Music Department of Ranger Junior College, was elected to executive board of the Texas Association of Music Schools at a recent annual convention held in San Antonio.

This meeting marked the fifteenth anniversary of the founding of the Texas Association of Music Schools, which has become an influential and greatly respected organization.

Membership in the association means that Ranger Junior College has been approved as having the highest standards and all its credits are transferable to any music school in Texas.

### Flour Salesman Completes Fifty Years of Selling With Big Record

May has been an outstanding month in the career of W. C. ("Pop") Schutts of Fort Worth. He has completed a full 50 years as a salesman of Light Crust Flour for Burrus Mills, Inc., and he has sold more than 500,000,000 pounds of his company's product.

Schutts and Mrs. Schutts, to whom he has been married for almost 48 years, went to New Orleans during the first week of May where they were honored by members of the Burrus staff during the Louisiana Wholesale Grocers Convention.

The next week Schutts was back in Fort Worth selling Light Crust Flour—on his way towards another fifty years of salesmanship. Schutts first joined the staff of Burrus Mills on May 4, 1904, and by the end of that year was handling sales of Light Crust Flour in the Fort Worth and West Texas territory. In 50 years, "Pop" Schutts has traveled more than two and one-half million miles over his territory in buggies, cinder covered trains, automobiles and Tinalys in airplanes.

During his first 30 years on the job, Mr. Schutts sold and shipped some 14,000,000 pounds of Light Crust Flour per year. However, in the past 20 years, he has averaged selling some 4,000,000 pounds annually to bring his total sales of Light Crust Flour to half a billion pounds.

Schutts figures, using Burrus Mills laboratory estimates of some 25 average biscuits to the pound of flour, that he has sold enough flour to supply West Texas with 25,000,300,000 (twenty-five billion) biscuits in his 50-year career.

One of the boys, Lewis Schutts of Dallas, is Sales Manager for Burrus Mills, Inc. The other Schutts children are: Bill Schutts of Amarillo; Bob Schutts of Fort Worth; Mrs. J. L. Crawford of Livingston; Jack Schutts

of Fort Worth; and Mrs. J. L. Rhotenberry of Midland. One daughter, Mrs. R. C. Binnion, Sweetwater, is deceased. All seven of the Schutts children attended college.

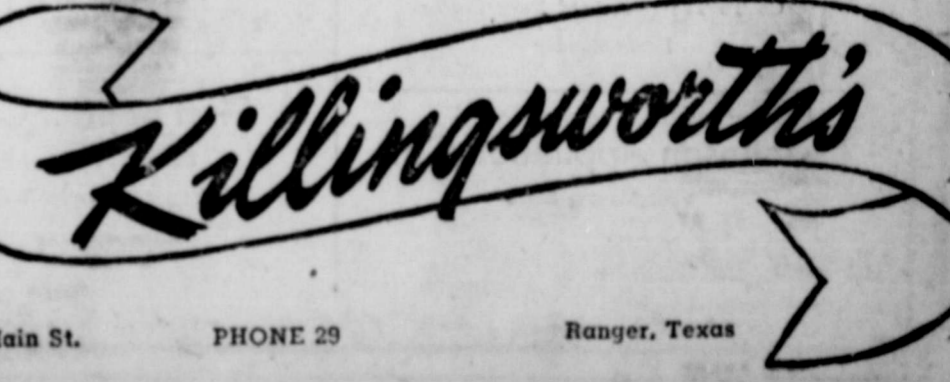

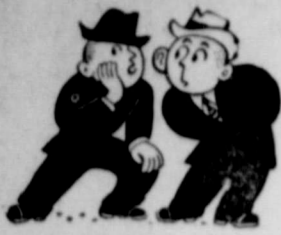
