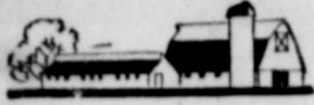

The Commercial State Bank of Ranger will be closed for business Monday, May 31, 1954, for Memorial Day.

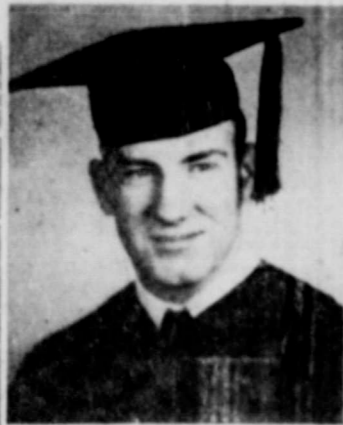
Bank officials ask that all business be conducted on Saturday, May 29.

More than 6,000 burglaries will take place over the Memorial Day week end in the United States unless proper precautions are taken by homeowners, apartment dwellers and storekeepers.
This is the estimate of W. H. Burhop, president of one of the nation's leading insurance companies.
The average burglary loss will be nearly \$200, he declared. This is a potential loss of \$1,200,000. He warned especially that rural burglaries were up about 15 per cent last year.
Records kept by Employers Mutuals of Wausau, Wis., show that burglaries increase considerably over three-day holiday periods. Professional and amateur thieves take advantage of carelessness on the part of householders and businessmen. Here are some rules to protect your home and store:

High School in 1923. I would have finished school sooner, but I was never able to enter school any year until after Christmas, until I reached the 9th grade. Our large family of ten boys and three girls made it necessary for us to pick cotton each fall until after Christmas, in order to have the bare necessities of life. Two different successive years I entered the 9th grade after Christmas, and the two different successive years I failed to be promoted because it is impossible to make the last half of the 9th grade without having had the first half as a foundation. The next year my father told me that if I would remain out of school completely for that year he would see that I did not have to be out any more until I finished high school. This I did, and when I re-entered the 9th grade, four years from the time I first entered it, I sat in the same seat, with classmates who had been four

grades behind me. With no more interruptions but with plenty of hard work as school janitor for three years, I graduated in 1923. My school-day sweetheart and I were married in the Fall of 1923. I studied for and took state examination for a teacher's certificate, passed, and began my first teaching in the 1923-1924 school term. From that beginning, by attending summerschool, extension courses at night, and correspondence work, I am now the holder of a Master of Arts degree, yet have not missed a year in teaching since my graduation from High School. (This is counting my work as County Superintendent, which is considered teaching) On July 27, 1947 I was unanimously appointed County School Superintendent of Eastland County schools and I would like to give you part of the order of the Court that made the appointment. It further being made known to the court that H. C. Elliott of Eastland, Eastland County, Texas, had filed with the Commissioners' Court his application to be appointed to fill the unexpired term of W. P. Jones, Supt. of Schools for Eastland County, and that he likewise has filed a letter bearing the signatures of all members of the County Board of Trustees, recommending that he, H. C. Elliott, be appointed to said position. And the court, after duly considering said application and after hearing Mr. Elliott personally, is of the opinion that he is a thoroughly qualified and suitable person to fill such position and that it would be for the best interest of the schools of Eastland County that he, H. C. Elliott, be appointed to fill the unexpired term of W. P. Jones, resigned, as County School Superintendent.

"This appointment was for one year five months and four days of an unexpired term of three years five months and four days. Since the Court can only appoint until general election, in July, 1948, I was a candidate for the remaining two years of this unexpired term. I had no opposition, so in July, 1950 I became a candidate for my first full-term as County Superintendent, subject to the action of the Democratic Party. I am at present serving my first full term of office as County Superintendent. If I should live until the expiration of this term on Dec. 31, 1954, I will have been your County Superintendent a total of seven years, five months and four days. So far as I am able to trace the records this is longer than any other County Superintendent has ever served Eastland County. This honor is doubly great when you consider that it has been bestowed upon me without opposition, without having to give out a

candidate card or having to ask anyone to vote for me. For this I am humbly grateful. I wish to give you a brief resume of the accomplishments and progress made in the Eastland County Schools during my service in this office. When I entered the office there were 37 school districts in Eastland County, 26 of which were inactive. I called a meeting of the County Board and asked the County Board to consolidate these districts long before the enactment of the Gilmer-Aiken bills. Many of these were consolidated prior to their enactment. We now have only 9 active School Districts. They are all first class affiliated schools. One other accomplishment that I would like to mention is the fact that I was instrumental in getting the Texas Education Agency to approve another teacher for the colored schools of Eastland County so they might be taught some high school work. Many other accomplishments in which I have had a part could be named, but space will not per-

mit. "I have done my best to make you a good County Superintendent. All decisions that I have made have been made in what I thought was the best interest of the school children of Eastland County. I made these decisions or rulings without fear or favor. No one can say I ever straddled the fence or that they ever had to ask me a second time how I stood on any question. This is not said boastfully.

"I have a written endorsement and recommendation signed by seven out of 9 superintendents of Eastland County Schools, and a statement of commendation for a job well done from the other two. I certainly want to express my sincere appreciation to the County School Board, Superintendents, teachers, and patrons for their splendid cooperation that you have given me in the past. It has been wonderful. No man could have had better help or cooperation. I shall ever be grateful to you for this. To all people of Eastland County let me say I shall always be indebted to you for permitting me to serve you seven years five months and four days as your County Superintendent — longer than any one, and this without opposition or having to campaign for it. This is the highest public educational office in the county. To have served you this long without opposition in the county in which I have lived all my life, is an honor anyone would be proud of. You people have been good time. You have honored me, helped me, been nice to me for which I thank you from the depth of my heart.

"The recent special session of the Legislature raised teacher's salaries \$402 per year. A teacher with a Masters Degree and 26

years experience can draw \$4,434 per year. Since I have more than these qualifications I can draw this amount for nine months teaching. I have been offered a teaching position which will pay me \$4,434 for nine months and an elementary principalship that will pay me \$4,860 for 9 months. I have also been offered an educational position in Eastland County that will pay me \$5,180 for 10 months employment. This term of office expires December 31, 1954. The following day, January 1, 1955 I can begin an educational position in Eastland County at a salary of \$5,180 for 10 months. "Using the words of Calvin Coolidge, 'I do not choose to run.' "Thank you."

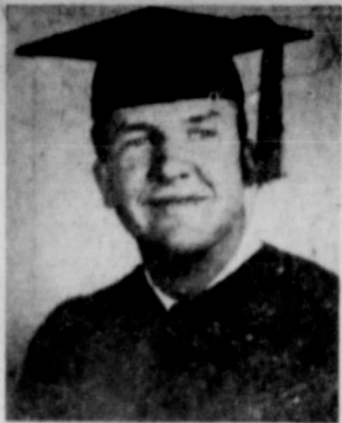

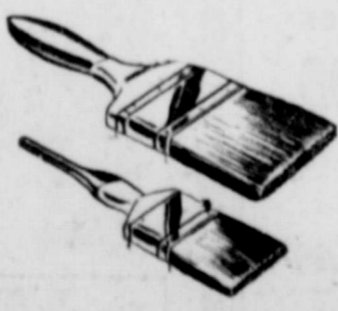

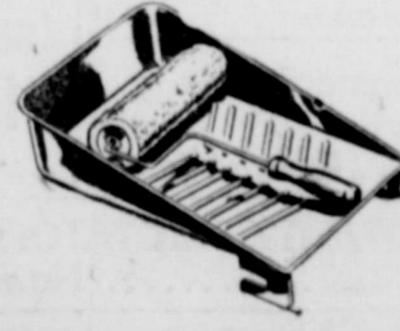
