## Boom Day Experience of Hardware Merchant

There has been numerous experiences and stories of the famous "boom" days of Ranger, but none have covered the life of the man who watched the town grow from a small country farming center of four or five hundred people to a 30,000 populated wild city, back to our Ranger of today.

Charley Bobo was born in Wise County, Texas November 30, 1883. He married Maude Madewell, March 7, 1909.

Charley's first business experiences were with the Bell Telephone Company at Spur and Stamford. He was manager of the Spur office for eight years and at the Stamford office one year. In the fall of 1917 Charley received a letter from his father asking him to return to Ranger to help him in his store in this city. Bobo owned and operated a farm implement company located where the Bagwell-Roberson Motor Co. used car

at the time and oil was the topic of the day. W. K. Gordon of Texas and Pacific M&M was having the McCleskey No. 1 drilled when the famous Ranger Sand was hit and the boom started.

About the time the Ranger boom well, McCleskey No. 1, came in, the opening stock of hardware reached Bobo and Bobo, now changed to a hardware company.

The boxes were opened and preparations were made to put the merchandise on the shelves, when the crowd rushed in and bought all of the opening stock out of the crates and Charley was without stock.

A new order was placed but a period of several weeks went by before a new stock arrived. The farm tools were non-sellable now that everyone was in the oil business, as farmers were making fortunes selling leases so the farm store stock was stored away.

Charley, being an inexperienced hardware buyer, and with no knowledge of the oil industry did not know what to order and in what amounts, so he ordered merchandise that would make a profit and by January 1, the store stock was now built up to \$50,000 and all paid for.

## Campaign Opens For Yarborough

Judge Ralph W. Yarborough officially opens his campaign for the Democratic nomination for governor with a statewide 15-minute radio talk at 9 p.m. Monday, June 7.

In his opening address, Judge Yarborough will discuss "Texas at the Crossroads." The speech will be carried over 31 stations, including the Texas State Network and the Texas Quality Network, together with additional stations not on the networks.

The need for integrity in state government and a sound program for the advancement of Texas will be discussed by Judge Yarborough in this first statewide program. The program will originate in Dallas.

Texas Quality Network: WFAA, Dallas; WBAP, Fort Worth; WOAI, San Antonio; KCBQ, Lubbock; KPRC, Houston; KGNC, Amarillo; KRIS, Corpus Christi; KRGV, Weslaco.

Additional stations not on networks: KRLD, Dallas; KFDN, Beaumont; KRQD, El Paso; KTBC, Austin.

One day a salesman called on Charley, selling dinner buckets. The buckets were called 40 horse power pails by the oil field workers.

The salesman was a good man and business was wonderful, so Charley placed an order for a car load of the buckets with the company.

When the buckets arrived they had to stack them all over the store. Bobo put a \$2 price on them and soon all were sold. When the last bucket was sold, Charley gave

a breath of relief. After all, a carload of dinner buckets is a lot of buckets.

Now that he was buying in quantities in midsummer Charley speculated that a cold winter was in store so he ordered a car of sheet iron wood stoves. The stoves arrived in the early part of the fall and were placed in the warehouse. After several hard looks at the big stack of stoves, Charley started wondering if he would sell that many heaters. One cold rainy day a gentleman walked into the store and asked Bobo if he had any wood heaters. The method of doing business in those days was different than today. You merely told the man yes or no and how many did he want. No sales talk was received by the prospective buyer. The gentleman wanted to see how many he had. This being a big joke as to the quantity of stoves Charley had bought, he marched the man to the warehouse and pointed to the enormous stack and stated to the man in a joking manner, "Do you think that this will be enough heaters for you?"

The man replied at once, "I believe so," and pulled out the money and bought all of them. It took a few minutes for Charley to regain his senses after this shock, but on questioning the gentleman, he found out that he had bought the heaters for a major oil company.

About this time there were thousands of people in Ranger and hardware salesmen called each day for orders. Hundreds of mules made up part of needed equipment by the oil contractors and some team contractors had as many as a hundred and fifty

### Farmers Offered Cotton Service

Cotton farmers can sign up now to get benefits of Smith-Duxey services.

This announcement was made today by Mr. Sam W. Martin, who is in charge of the Dallas Cotton Classing Office, U. S. Department of Agriculture's Agricultural Marketing Service, located at 1194 S. Ervay St., Dallas.

Application forms may be obtained from the county agent or local ginners. One application covers all farmers in the group.

Under the Smith-Duxey Act, farmers who organize into cotton improvement groups and file an application get their cotton classed by USDA without cost. Also, they receive a market price quotation sheet from USDA with which they can figure out what their cotton is worth locally according to its grade and staple.

Last year, 27,995 farmers in the Dallas Classing office territory took advantage of these services.

### Tuberculosis Headquarters In West Texas

Sweetwater has been chosen as headquarters for a survey of tuberculosis now under way throughout Texas.

The study, called "Searchlight on TB" was initiated by the Tuberculosis Association and is sponsored by 14 other agencies directly concerned with some phase of the disease which is labeled "Texas No. 1 health problem."

Mrs. Joella Terrill Butler of Wichita Falls, president of the state TB organization, has said that the study is designed to give the state its first clear picture of the disease and conditions which contribute to its incidence.

A schedule of information on patients and treatment facilities will be gathered from every county in the state, Mrs. Butler said. To facilitate this, Texas has been divided into 22 geographical areas. This county and adjacent ones fall in Area No. 7 with Sweetwater as the headquarters.

The reason for this change is to give the boys more time between games and to give Ranger a complete Monday night activity.

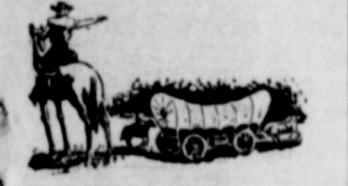
The next scheduled game is for Monday night June 7th. Game time will be at 6 for the first game and the second game will start at 7:45.

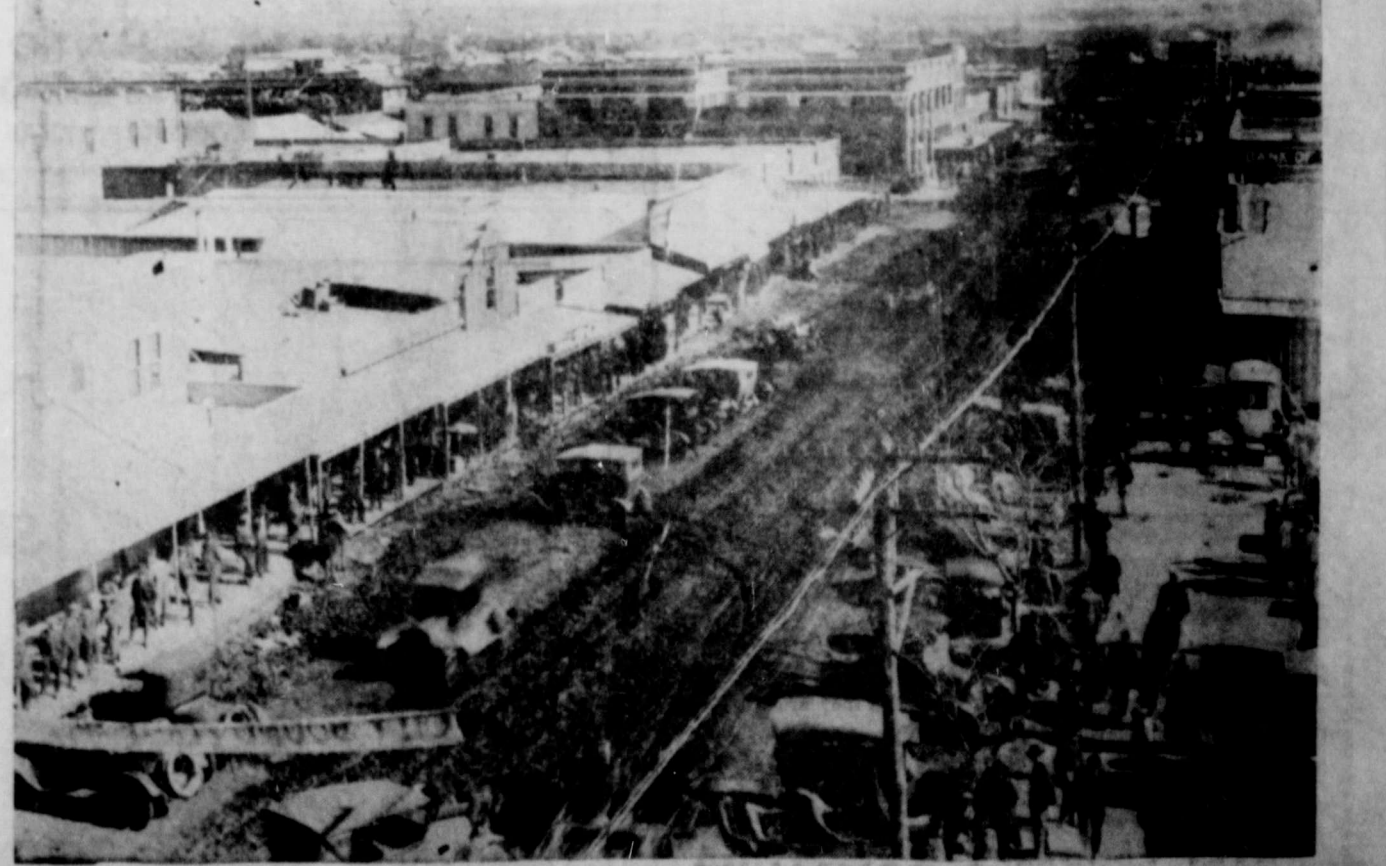

mules. A good mule then would bring several hundred dollars and each mule skinner would decorate his mule up with harness to try and make his team the best looking.

On each oil field wagon a boomer was used which was used to bind loads of pipe. Bobo & Bobo Hardware Co. usually sold a few boomers every day and re-ordered each day from salesmen always present. At that time there were three hardware stores in Ranger, Bobo & Bobo, Jones-Cox and Norvell White.

One day a salesman from Shapleigh Hardware Co. of St. Louis, walked in the door and Charley was growing tired of ordering boomers every day, so he told the salesman, "I am going to give you a good order today. Send me 1500 boomers so I won't have to re-order each day and have a supply at hand so that I will not run out."

The salesman left and went to Jones-Cox and told them about the big order placed by Bobo, so they in turn, ordered 2500 boomers. He left that company and walked over to Norvell White and explained to this company what the other two merchants did and so that they wouldn't look bad, they ordered 3000 boomers, a total amount of 7000 pairs of boomers.

The order went to St. Louis and this large hardware company never kept that amount of boomers on hand. Usually the stock was less than a hundred, so they wired the supplier, Stacy Poomer Co., at Tiff, Ohio, and asked that they fill the order.

One day a man walked into Bobo & Bobo Hardware Co. and in-

troduced himself as Stacy and explained that he owned the factory where the boomers were made. He said, "We can't make that many boomers in years, with our present factory, and I wanted to see who in the world would order all of those boomers."

The elder Iibo, being a horse-trader, owned the lots where part of Montgomery Ward & Co. and the Mission Garage are located today. He was approached on a proposition of selling the lease on the two lots for \$3000 and he at once grabbed the money. A well was drilled on the lot joining his property which proved to be a dry hole and his lots were never drilled on. He put the \$3000 in his pocket as a gain.

One day a northern promoter approached the Bobos on a proposition to build a building on the lots. They refused. He came back time and time again and finally, since he would not give up, they made his proposition. A 20-year lease on both lots for \$5000 a year, providing that he build a building at a cost of not less than \$40,000.

The gentleman paid the \$5000 and started the building with money from one of the five banks that failed after the boom and finished the building at the end of the boom with another \$5,000

rent money paid. There was no demand for the building then and he gave up. The bank took over the building and had the rent on the lots for another year at \$5,000, but finally turned the building back to Bobo after no chance was seen to re-gain their loss. This was a big gain for Bobo because the lots, when bought, were less than the amount he had received from the royalty, plus the \$40,000 build-and \$15,000 in rent money. The building is half of the Montgomery Ward Store today.

Now a successful real estate dealer, Bobo built a new building on main street and rented the bottom to F. E. Langston for a barber shop. Langston is still in the building and has stayed there 34 years. One of the oldest renters of Ranger, still in the same location.

The boom ended with men that came in on freight trains leaving on freight trains, having made and lost a fortune.

Bobo ended up with a fortune in hardware that was un-sellable in 1946. He had on hand at least 175 oil field wagons that cost \$150 to \$170 each. He disposed of this merchandise by traveling around the oil fields of the country and selling the wagons at \$75 each.

The complete stock was sold at a loss and new stock re-ordered to fill the demands of the farmers.

M. R. Bobo and the brother of Charles Bobo, had purchased his father's interest in the company and the two brothers ran the company until 1920 when Charles became the sole owner, buying the brother's share. In 1934 the pioneer of Ranger, S. W. Bobo, passed away.

Business was getting slower and the population decreasing so in 1946 Charles closed the doors of the Bobo & Bobo Hardware for the last time and sold the last of the stock to Crawley & Tibbels Hardware of Ranger.

Charles still maintains an office in Ranger as a tax accountant and justice of the peace of precinct 2. He won the justice job in 1943 from Bob Hansford and has

never had an opponent since. Charles remarked "Maybe no one wants this job," as he leaned back in the chair in his well maintained office in downtown Ranger today.

People like Charles Bobo who went through the boom, the early days before the boom, and the days after the boom, want no part of this type of life for Ranger. The Ranger of today with its beautiful homes and well-kept stores are better by far than the boom days when money, blood and oil ran together.

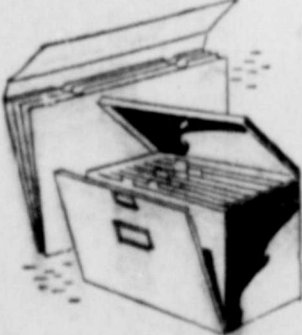
