Korean Student Picks Ranger College For Future Studies

The world-wide fame of Ranger Junior College is verified by receipt of a letter from a high school boy in Korea, seeking admittance to the college, Dr. Price R. Ashton, president, said today. Bang Jong Hiup, who describes himself as a high school student presently attending a GI school of 2,500 in Seoul, Korea, explains that he is greatly interested in coming to America for study in college. He requested admittance to Ranger Junior College.

Dr. Ashton commented upon the sincerity of the Korean's letter, and added that encouragement would be given the boy to come to Ranger. All assistance which can be rendered by the college to help him enter will be extended. The letter, perfectly typed in English, was dated May 25 and sent air mail. The complete text of the boy's letter, in its original form follows:

"Allow me to introduce myself and my heartfelt request for a woman. I am a high school boy who lives in Seoul, Korea and now I think it is my great honor to correspond with your college in the United States of America. There are great many colleges from all over the world, but I like your college best. I have four sisters, two brothers and lovely parents. On Sunday, we go to Presbyterian church, which is called Chung Dong Church.

"I am studying second year grade of Kyung Gi Public High School that is best in Korea and attending about 2,500 students. I like best not only Science but English and Mathematics. But my country was destroyed by war that continued for three years.

"We long for study present time, but there are either materials for research and implements of experimentation nor building of school in our country.

"Our all famous professors are caught by communists, so many solitary students are only left. My heart almost burst with grief when I think actual circumstances of our country in these days so I hope to study with my heart's content in your country which has a passion for freedom, Peace and Justice.

"So I will esteem it a favor if you would send me an application for admission. If I study in your college, I shall be kind with all your students, study hard, a perfect your favor and your college's.

"Please, take my sincerest heart for your good health and happiness and for your students. Now I must close and I hope you will find something of interest in this letter.

"Well, I will pray to God to write me a letter and send me an application for admission of your college.

CHIEF OF POLICE POUNDS GIVES VACATION POINTERS TO DISCOURAGE BURGLARIES

The vacation season is rapidly coming into its own as people begin their vacation, or complete vacation plans. Ranger citizens are no different in this respect than are people in other places. Too often in the rush of planning the vacation and the eager anticipation of getting away from home a few days or weeks some important matters are overlooked before leaving.

The arrival of the vacation season has prompted Ranger Chief of Police W. G. Pounds today to suggest a few pointers for discouraging home burglaries when families are away.

He said this season of the year prompts thieves to begin working overtime. Records of the Federal Bureau of Investigation, Pounds said, show that during the months of July and August there are over 1,200 burglaries every 24 hours. He urges Ranger home owners to take these simple steps before leaving for vacations:

1. Cancel milk and newspaper deliveries until you return home.
2. Tell your postman about the temporary change in address. A collection of unopened mail bottles, a stuffed mail box, or a pile of newspapers on your front porch is an open invitation to burglars who constantly watch for such tell-tale signals. Professional burglars can drive into a town and quickly spot such evidence which clearly indicates no one is at home.
3. Notify your local police and tell them how long you will be away. The policemen will keep an eye open for any signs of strange activity at your home.
4. Inform a trustworthy neighbor of your vacation plans and give him your vacation address and phone number. Ask them to call the police if they note anything suspicious.
5. Don't leave any cash, gems, or valuables in the house unless protected in an approved, burglar-resistant, armored steel money safe, or place your valuables in a safe deposit box at your local bank.
6. Securely lock all windows and doors. Don't just slam the door. Lock it with a key so that the bolt provides added security.

Condemnation Hearing Decision Is Lacking

A three-man condemnation committee heard evidence Tuesday on the Eastland County Water Board's action to gain right of way for a pipe line and road to the new Leon River lake. The action is being taken against Mrs. Kenneth Jamison.

The three man committee, appointed by County Judge J. H. Hart, and agreed on by both sides, were in session almost all day Tuesday hearing both sides of the question.

The committee, composed of three Cisco men—M. E. Fry, James McCracken and Jessie Reynolds—had returned no official decision this morning. They have several days in which they can return their report to Judge Hart. After they file their report, both sides have 10 days to accept the terms or appeal the decision.

Although no official report has been filed, the Times learned through reliable sources today that the committee will probably recommend a cash settlement of approximately \$1000 and ask that the Water Board pay for the construction of a fence on each side of the road and pay the costs of several gates.

DISCARDED ICEBOXES REMAIN AS DEATH-TRAPS FOR SMALL CHILDREN, DOCKERY DECLARES

Despite national efforts to eliminate the hazard of death for small children as a result of discarded ice boxes and similar airtight compartments, frequent deaths continue to occur, Lee Dockery, Ranger manager of the Community Public Service Company declared today.

"It would be doubly tragic, should the death of a child in Ranger, result from carelessness or inattention of any individual or group of individuals, who failed to render a discarded icebox, refrigerator, or other such airtight cabinet harmless," he said.

In a period of six years, nationwide, 79 children have suffered tragic deaths by suffocation when they crawled into discarded boxes and closed the doors. In one case, five children died in a single abandoned refrigerator.

Furthermore, the potentiality for this type of tragedy is on the increase. There are more than 50 million iceboxes, refrigerators, freezers and other such airtight cabinets in use today. They are being discarded at the rate of two to three million a year. Once discarded, these airtight containers make inviting places for games by small children who have not been warned of the danger.

The above figures have been released by the National Safety Council in connection with the "Discarded Refrigerator and Freezer Safety Drive", which got underway this week.

Community action and city ordinance or state law are being used to combat this hazard in many places. Parents should cooperate by warning their children of the dangers. Owners of discarded airtight boxes should cooperate by destroying them or rendering them harmless.

Unfortunately, old refrigerator hazards are numerous. Persons who purchase new refrigerators today find that many dealers, even those who have given their "trade-in" value, have no use for their old boxes. It is costly for the owner to have his box carted away. Consequently, many old refrigerators may be found today in backyards, garages, dump yards and the like.

latch stop may be taken off. In cases where the old cabinet is being used for some sort of storage, holes should be drilled in the cabinet and the gasket removed. It is better, of course, to destroy the box altogether. Above all, parents are urged to warn their children of the hazards involved in playing around these death traps. It should not be hard

to persuade any parent to do this when he realizes the dreadful danger involved. Now is the "season" for abandoned refrigerator accidents. May through September have proved to be the critical months, when children are out of school and playing outdoors. 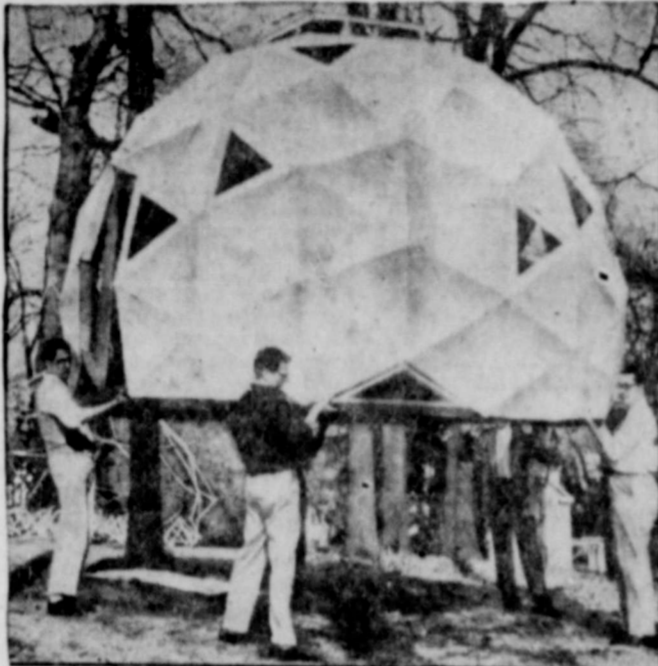

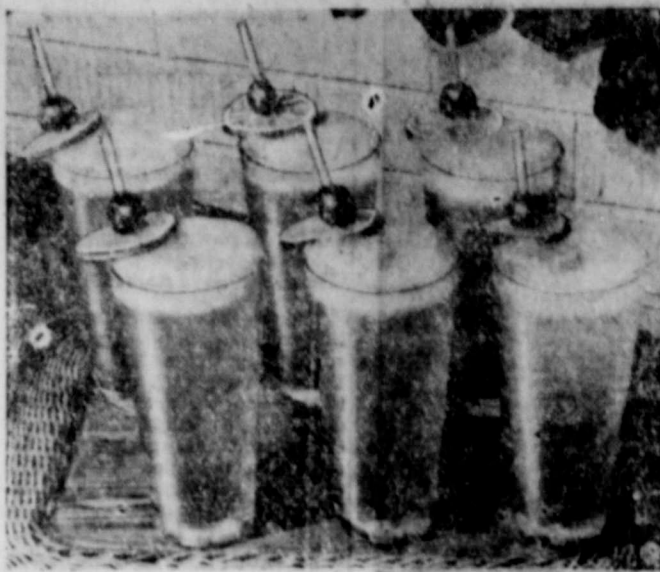

Dutch Poppy and Caraway Seeds Are Versatile Spices

Poppy seed and caraway seeds, those delicious, appetizing spices we get from the Netherlands, have a wide variety of uses in the kitchen.

Commercial bakers have made most of us very familiar with these seeds as toppings for bread and rolls. And, in case you hadn't thought about it, it's the fresh, tangy flavor of caraway that gives rye bread such a different taste.

But, if we stop with bread and rolls, we're missing some wonderful ideas for poppy and caraway seeds.

The nut-like flavor of poppy seeds, mixed with honey is the basis for many delectable pastry fillings. If you wish to try them ground, you might soak them for a few hours first. They'll swell up and are more easily mashed with a fork. Or, there are import specialty companies that offer the European-style poppy seed grinders. A ready-made poppy seed and honey mixture is also on the market.

Caraway's snappy flavor adds a refreshing note to apple pie. Buttered Noodles with poppy seeds is a delightful dish. Caraway should become a standard flavoring for gravy, eggs and cheese.

The Dutch have made an art out of growing and harvesting both poppy and caraway seeds. Their sandy soil and careful cultivation have made them the premium source of both seeds. While a few other countries produce poppy seeds, the Dutch have developed a beautiful blue seed which is considered the finest available, both for toppings and, because of its very high oil content, for flavoring.

Here are some tested caraway and poppy seed recipes guaranteed to make your "audience" sit up and take notice:

Poppy Seed Tea Bread
2 cups sifted all-purpose flour
3/4 teaspoon double-acting baking powder
1 teaspoon salt
1/3 cup poppy seeds
3/4 cup sugar
2 tablespoons shortening
2 eggs
1 teaspoon grated lemon rind
1 1/3 cups milk
Heat oven to 350 degrees F. (moderate). Sift the first 3 ingredients together and mix with poppy seeds. Beat sugar, shortening, and eggs together. Add grated lemon rind. Add flour mixture alternately with milk. Turn into a well-greased, lightly floured 9x5x3-

inch pan. Bake 60 minutes or until done. Yield: 1 loaf.

Use this delicious poppy seed filling in yeast or baking powder breads such as filled braids, pin-wheels, etc. It also makes a wonderful filling or center for cookies.

Poppy Seed Filling

1/3 cup seedless raisins
6 tablespoons chopped candied fruit (orange, lemon, pineapple, etc.)
6 seeded dates
2/3 cup milk
1 cup poppy seeds
1/3 cup sugar
1/4 cup honey
1 tablespoon margarine or butter

Put raisins, candied fruit and dates through meat grinder. Scald milk. Add poppy seeds and bring to boil. Reduce heat and cook gently 3 to 4 minutes, stirring constantly. Milk will be almost all absorbed. Add sugar, honey, fruit and margarine or butter. Bring to boil and cook gently 2 to 3 minutes—longer, stirring constantly. Cool before using. Makes about 2 cups filling. This filling may be stored in the refrigerator and used as needed.

Caraway Seed Biscuits
2 cups sifted all-purpose flour
3 teaspoons double-acting baking powder
1/2 teaspoon salt
1/4 cup shortening
2/3 cup grated sharp Cheddar cheese
1 tablespoon whole caraway seeds
2/3 to 3/4 cup milk
Heat oven to 450 degrees F. (very hot) Sift together the first 3 ingredients. Cut in shortening until the mixture resembles corn meal. Blend in cheese and caraway seeds. Gradually stir in milk, adding only enough to form a soft dough. Knead about 20 seconds on a lightly floured board. Roll dough to 1/8-inch thickness. Shape with a 2-inch biscuit cutter. Bake on ungreased baking sheets 12 to 15 minutes. Yield: 16 to 18 two-inch biscuits.

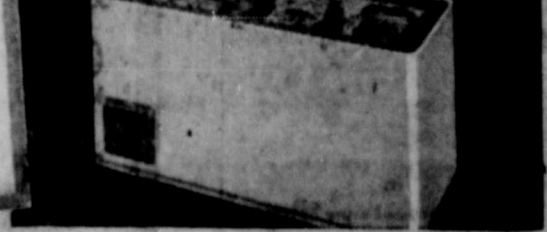

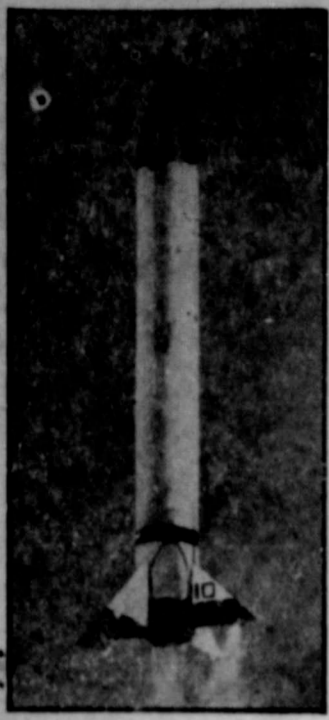
Story Buggy, But It's True

New Poison Is Giving Flies New Headache

COLLEGE STATION (Spl.) — Have you noticed how flies seem irresistibly drawn to a string hanging in a barn or other out-building?

Combining this tendency with a new kind of poison, Texas A&M College scientists are gaining excellent fly control — even over DDT-resistant strains.

The new poisons are organophosphorus compounds which kill a much the same manner as DDT, although they are completely different, chemically. They gave up to 92 percent control for as much as seven weeks in recent tests.

Malathion, L-1359, diazinon, 21/199—These are the new compounds. Some already have been approved for general use. Others are being tested.

Using malathion in amounts of five to 25 percent total weight in a dried whey and water solution, Assistant Professor Manning

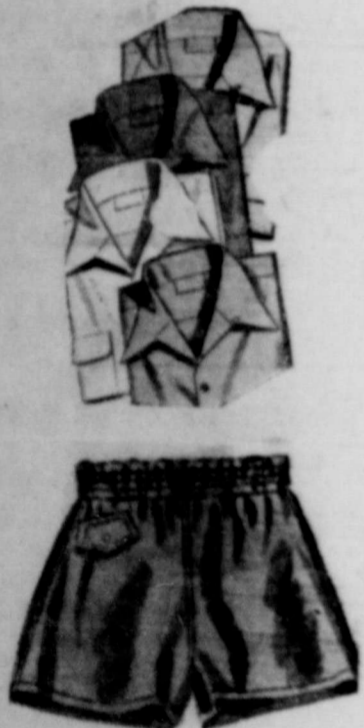

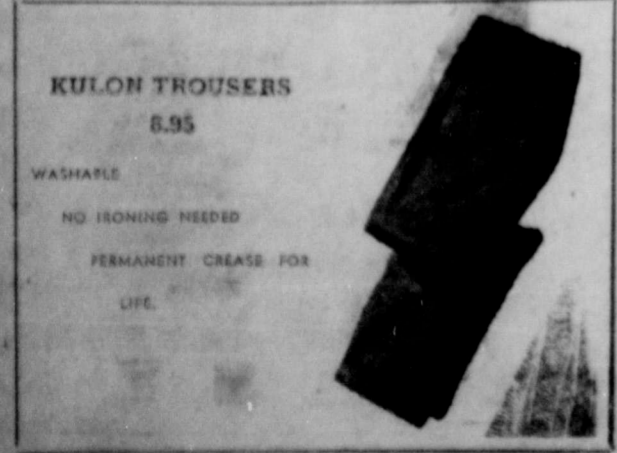
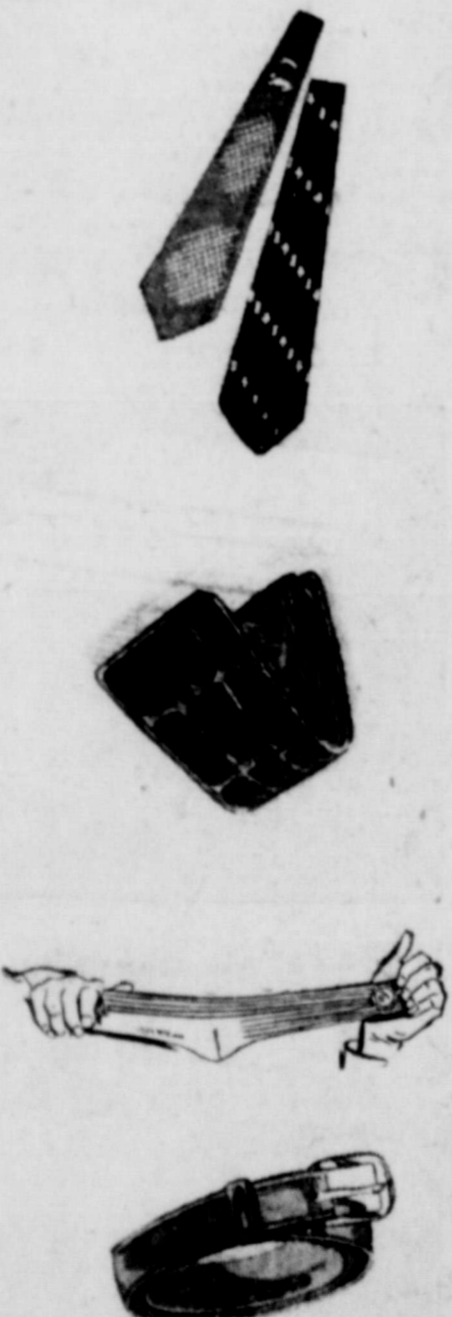
