An early morning headon automobile collision during a hard rainstorm about 10 miles west of Weatherford on US Highway 80 today claimed the lives of two Ranger men and injured a Weatherford man.

The dead are:

Thomas A. Cunningham, 62, a Ranger barber. John E. Hatton, 29. a farmer, residing four and a half miles north of Ranger on the Caddo Road. He lived with his parents, Mr. and Mrs. W. W. Hatton.

Injured: Nig Pearson, about 40, residing on a rural route out of Weatherford. He is in the Medical and Surgical Clinic at Weatherford. At noon today it was reported that he was not in a critical condition, although the extent of

The accident happened at about 5:45 a.m. today, but details as to the probable cause were not immediately known. It was stated that Cunningham and Hatton were enroute from Ranger to the Veteran's Hospital at Lisbon, near Dallas. Cunningham was going to the hospital for medical treatment. Hatton is reported to have been driving Cunningham's automobile.
