One of the latest additions to the program is the announcement that one of the favorite clowns and wild bull wranglers of Ranger rodeo fans will again return to the Jaycee area for this year's show. He is "Alec" the colored clown who has appeared in the Ranger arena in three other rodeos.

The Jaycees expect to sign additional feature acts next week which will provide one of the fullest rodeo programs ever presented in Ranger. With its purse of \$2,900, plus entry fees, and its sanction by the Rodeo Cowboy Association, the Jaycee Rodeo will no doubt attract one of its largest lists of contestants. Campbell said early indications are that there will not be a lack of good performers, but on the other hand, perhaps the largest number of hands to ever participate in a Ranger arena will be awaiting their turn at the chutes when the show opens.

### Name the Lake Entries Begin Arriving Here

One day after the "Name the Lake Contest" of the Ranger and Eastland Chambers of Commerce had been announced in papers throughout the state, R. V. Galloy, Ranger manager, said his office had begun to receive entries.

The entries are coming from widely separated points in Texas, indicating, the manager said, a wide spread interest in the new lake for Eastland County. He was surprised at the early response.

Saturday morning Galloway said entries had been received from 14 Texas points. These included Ranger, Eastland, Plainview, Stephenville, Weatherford, Mineral Wells, Abilene, Baird, Hawley, Bonham, San Antonio, Poolville, Dublin and Fort Worth.

These are the contest entries which have been received at Ranger since. There were a number of entries from Ranger, and several entries each from some of the other cities. The entries will remain sealed until the judges of the contest open them to make the selection of a name for the lake.

It was learned Saturday that he and Mrs. Holliday, who has been at his bedside since his illness, planned to leave El Paso and drive to Menahsa where they would remain with relatives over the week end and then come to Ranger sometime next week. Until a few days ago, physicians indicated that his condition would not permit him to ride in an automobile and it had been planned to bring him back by pullman. However, latest reports indicated that his improved condition was such that physicians said he would be able to make the trip home in a car.

An employee of Ranger Transfer and Storage, Holliday suffered a heart attack while loading a van of household furniture in El Paso.

### \$2,000 Fire Destroys 65 Utility Poles

A grass fire developed into a \$2,000 blaze in Eastland Friday, destroying between 65 and 100 Texas Electric utility poles. The grass was being burned under supervision of Texas Electric workers, but it got out of hand and spread to the poles, which were stacked nearby.

Eastland paid and volunteer firemen rushed to the scene to fight the blaze.

FORT BLISS (Spl.)— Private Conrad D. Miller, husband of Mrs. Peggy D. Miller of Ranger, and son of Mrs. Cecil K. Miller, Route 2, of Eastland, was recently assigned to the Antiaircraft Artillery Replacement Training Center at Ft. Bliss, Texas, for his second eight-week cycle of basic training.

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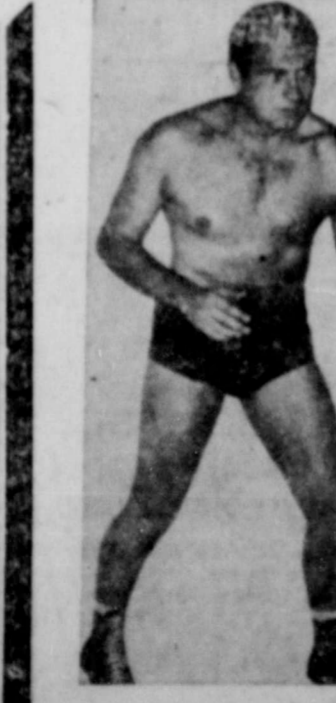

Advanced amateurs, hybridizers and scientific workers will revel in the chromosome counts given by Ann Wylie of the University of

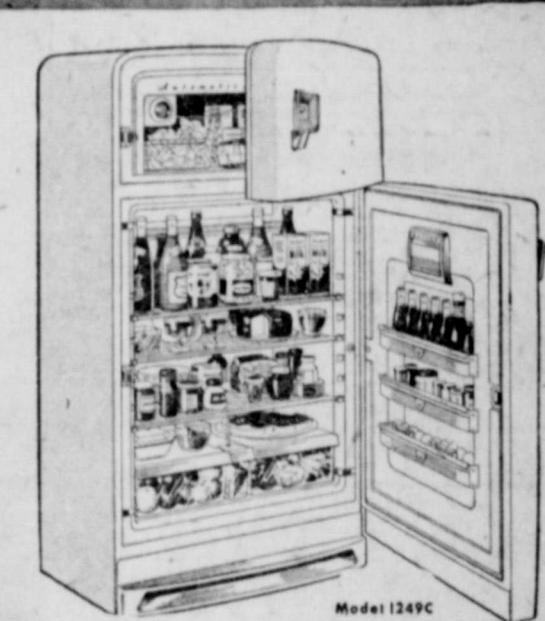

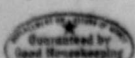

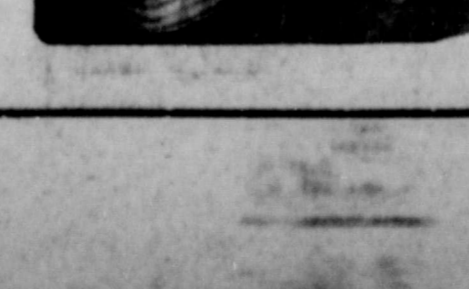
