Thousands Watch Long Rodeo Parade

Described as the longest parade in the history of the Ranger Jaycee Rodeo, Wednesday afternoon marked the opening of the annual event as thousands lined the parade route, in downtown Ranger to see the paraders pass in review.

Two bands, the Ranger High School band and one from Stephenville, advertising its centennial program, furnished music. Hundreds of riders, including Ranger Jaycees and Sheriff's Posse from Parker, Palo Pinto and Callahan counties, provided the rodeo atmosphere. The parade was headed by official vehicles including trucks from the Ranger Fire Department.

National Guard units of Ranger, Cisco and Breckenridge added a military note. Ranger's Little League teams were in evidence, riding in vehicles of their sponsors.

Business firms represented included Killingsworth's, Mathena's Flower Shop, both with attractive floats; Robinson's Food Market; Wheat's Welding Shop; Ranger Well Service; Bagwell-Roberson Motors; D & D Sign Co.; Shelby Parnell Radio & TV service; Beck's Cafe; Paramount Hotel; Hatfield's Food Store and a number of other stores.

Two religious groups were represented. A car furnished by Mrs. Roscoe Hopper announced the Youth Activities week at the First Methodist Church and the Second Baptist Church had an entry.

A number of candidates for office took advantage of the parade to appeal to voters.

The parade was directed by Pat Moseley and James Ratliff.

The reviewing stand was in front of the Gholson Hotel, with Bud Townsend, rodeo announcer acknowledging various units as they passed in review. The Gulf Oil Corporation furnished the public address system.

Isabell Warns Of Fire Danger In Dry Grass

Fire alarms of a minor nature have averaged more than one a day within the past few days in Ranger. Two fires were on record for Saturday. At 8:10 p.m. a small fire on West Commerce near the rodeo grounds caught from a grass fire and did slight damage. At 11:35 p.m. smoke was discovered in Killingsworth's and found to be coming from an overheated refrigerator motor. Damage was slight.

At 12:20 p.m. Sunday the fire department received a call, but found that the only damage was an overheated pan of beans on a cook stove at 517 Mesquite. Monday's call was a grass fire at 424 South Oak, with no damage reported.

Fire Chief Chas. Isabell, who returned Friday night from attending the annual fireman's school at College Station, issued a warning today regarding the danger of grass fires. He said almost all grass areas within the city are potential hazards, and urged that every precaution be taken by property owners and residents to avoid a fire being started. He said the volunteer firemen are burning a number of dangerous areas, but it is impossible to get to all of them soon, and there is need for every attempt being made to prevent grass fires.

No damage was reported from a grass fire at noon Wednesday in the 600 block of West Main.

City Has Two New Employees

Mrs. Reba Rawls has been employed by the City of Ranger to work in the city, Les Crossley has announced. She will replace Miss Waidline Kribbs, who has resigned effective August 1.

Miss Yvonne Offield, a student of Ranger Junior College, is a new temporary employee of the city hall, and will assist with the preparation of the city tax rolls, Crossley said.

Miss Kribbs will remain on the job until the effective date of her resignation, at which time Mrs. Rawls will assume the duties which Miss Kribbs has handled for the past eight and a half years. Mrs. Rawls began working for the city on July 15.

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Auto Accident Injuries Fatal To Marvin Judy

Marvin Judy, 37, died late Wednesday afternoon from injuries received earlier in the day in an auto-accident near Damon, Texas, between Houston and Freeport. He was reared in Ranger and is the son of Mr. and Mrs. E. R. Judy, 601 Spring Road.

He had been living in Damon for several years and was employed in a chemical plant in that vicinity. Details of the accident had not been learned by relatives early today, and funeral arrangements had not been announced although it was stated that burial would be at Damon.

Both his parents and a sister, Mrs. E. P. Getts left Ranger early today enroute to Damon.

He is survived by his wife and three children; his parents; two sisters, Mrs. Getts of Ranger and Mrs. E. D. Langwell of Houston; four brothers, Noel of Ranger; Billy, with the Air Force in Alaska; Jack, with the Navy in Japan; and Wayne of Houston.

GAME AND FISH COMMISSION ADDS STOCK OF 36,000 CAT IN THE NEW LAKE WEDNESDAY

The prospects for good fishing in the future for the new lake of the Eastland County Water Supply District were greatly increased Wednesday when the Texas Game and Fish Commission released 36,000 fingerling Channel Cat in the lake.

Three commission trucks from the Possum Kingdom Lake hatchery brought the fish to the lake. They were placed in the waters under the direction of W. L. Baum, who is in charge of the Cisco Fish hatchery of the commission. With Baum were W. H. Henderson and L. W. Newman of the Possum Kingdom hatchery.

Several Ranger and Eastland men were on hand to see the fish released. These included, O. H. Dick, publisher of The Eastland Telegram, Joe Dennis, publisher of the Ranger Times, C. B. Pruet, president of the water district, and Dave Pickrell, secretary of the water district.

The commission recently released 200,000 black bass in the lake. Pruet and Pickrell pointed out that the lake is now legally closed to fishing and that anyone caught fishing there would be subject to severe penalties in violation of the game and fish laws of the state.

The Eastland County Water Supply District is cooperating with the Texas Game and Fish Commission in making the new lake a good place in the future. The lake will not be opened for fishing until such time as the commission gives its sanction.

Baum said Wednesday that it is possible for there to be a 95 per cent survival of the small fish used in stocking a new lake, and when they reach proper size the fishing should be good. There will possibly be other fish added later.

FORT BLISS, Tex. (Spl.)—Pvt. Lonnie L. Ainsworth, son of Mr. and Mrs. O. P. Ainsworth of Ranger recently began eight weeks of Army basic training in the Artillery Replacement Training Center at Ft. Bliss.

He will spend his first eight weeks of basic military training on fundamental subjects such as rifle, machine gun, and bazooka marksmanship, and familiarization with Army technical subjects. This first phase of training is climaxed with a one week maneuver in the field.

Ranger Firemen Escape Injury As Truck Skids Into Rock Wall

Two Ranger firemen, Donnie Shook and Alvis Weaver, escaped injury about 4 p.m. Tuesday when the fire truck, enroute in which they were riding skidded into a rock wall at the intersection of Highway 80 east and Blundell street. They were enroute to a fire reported to be at 708 Blundell.

Only the two men were with the truck, and Shook was driving the 1952 Chevrolet booster truck of the fire department. As he started to turn onto Blundell from Highway 80, the truck went into a skid striking the rock retaining wall of a ditch on Blundell. A ten-foot section of the wall was knocked down.

Recently Blundell street was resurfaced by the State Highway Department as this intersection is the beginning of Farm Road 571 extending to the south. During the past several weeks of hot weather the asphalt coating has "bled" through the gravel and caused the truck to skid.

No serious damage was reported from the fire which started with burning grass, and for a time threatened a dwelling and several small outbuildings.

The truck is being repaired at Anderson Chevrolet Company, where early estimates placed the damage at between \$300 and \$400.

Ranger Bank Will Close On Saturday For Election Day

The Commercial State Bank in Ranger will be closed Saturday, July 24, it was announced today by W. F. Creager, vice president, as a reminder for persons to transact all necessary banking business before closing time on Friday.

The closing of the bank on election day, the biennial Democratic Primary is required under state law. In addition to the closing of banks on election days, a number of other offices usually close, especially state offices.

Prices Steady On Good Cattle Run Here Mon.

Five hundred fifty-six head of livestock went through the auction ring Monday at the Ranger Livestock Commission Company. There were 450 head of cattle, 66 hogs and 40 goats.

Bidding was brisk, and a good number of buyers were at the weekly sale. Prices indicated that livestock sold in Ranger is bringing as much here as elsewhere and providing a convenient market for ranchers and farmers in this area.

Good heavy calves brought \$15 to \$20.50; bulls, \$8 to \$13.50; canner and cutter cows, \$5 to \$10; stocker yearlings, \$12 to \$17; light calves, \$12 to \$14; goats, \$3.25 to \$7.50 each. Top hog price was \$23.50.

Rotarian president D. Joseph presided, with Morris Campbell, a Lion and President of the Ranger Jaycees acting as program chairman.

Wilson Guest, told of the history of the annual rodeo from its beginning in 1946 and the early struggles up to the present time. Beverly Dudley, Jr., outlined reviewed the calf scramble feature of the rodeo which is promoted for the purpose of encouraging FFA and 4-H boys in the raising of dairy cattle.

Bob Estes of Baird, producer of the Jaycee Rodeo, and Bud Townsend of Nocona, rodeo announcer were introduced.

SIX IMPORTANT DISPUTED RACES FACE LOCAL VOTERS

Eastland County voters will join Texas throughout the state Saturday to go to the polls and vote in the Democratic State primary election.

One red hot state race, two important district races and two hotly disputed county races feature the Eastland County election. In Justice Precinct another warm race will give Eastland and other precinct voters another big decision to make.

The big state race features Gov. Allan Shivers and Ralph W. Yarborough in a struggle to see who will be the next governor of the state. Also in the race, but not given much chance of winning, are Cyclone Davis and J. J. Holmes. The governors race has featured charges and countercharges by both candidates. Shivers is seeking an unprecedented third term.

The race for State Representative from the 76th District is a three way battle between Rep. Omar Burkett, Paul Brashear and Charles H. Dawson. Burkett seeks re-election to the important post. Brashear and Burkett have been at odds during most of the pre-election speeches.

The two county races are featured by a three man struggle for the sheriff's post. Two men who have already held the job are in the race as well as a new man in the county politics. Sheriff J. Frank Tucker seeks re-election. He is opposed by J. B. Williams, who Tucker defeated four years ago to win the office and by E. L. "Jug" Dennis, formerly constable of the Gorman precinct.

The County Judge's race features two men who have been opponents of each other on numerous occasions. Judge John S. Hart seeks re-election and is opposed by Clabe S. Eldridge.

The District Clerk's race, puts Roy L. Lane, who seeks re-election, against John C. Nicholas.

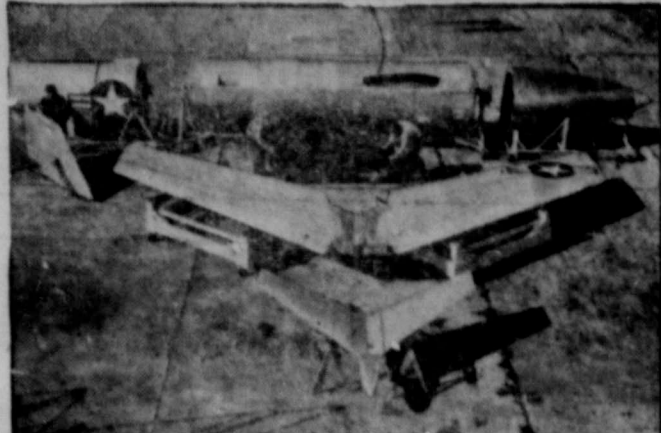

But it isn't. It's plain, common table salt that costs but a few cents a box.

Salt has worked its wonders for mankind for thousands of years. It continues to be one of the most useful and versatile products we have. Today its uses in the bathroom are chalking up beside its kitchen and other household uses. You start the day with vim and vigor if you add a brisk salt rub to your morning bath. Rub plain white salt over the entire body until the skin is pink and tingles. Your circulation steps up, your body is toned and you are ready to tackle the day's work. At the other end of the day, when you're tired and worn, your nerves frayed and you can't relax, add a couple of handfuls of salt to a warm bath. Lie there and soak until the tired, jumpy feeling gives way to an easy, relaxed calm.

Again you may have pounded the hot pavements or taken too many steps in keeping up with your daily chores. Your burning feet are popping out of your shoes. Try soaking them alternately in a strong, hot salt water bath and then in a cool bath until the burn and swelling are gone.

Rural Sections Show A Decline In Population

AUSTIN (Sp.)—Most of Texas' rural areas are losing population but rural life is improving, Assistant Professor Wilfrid C. Bailey of the University of Texas declares.

Latest U.S. census figures show only irrigation-farming sections of the Texas Panhandle and Lower Rio Grande Valley recorded rural population gains.

That means prosperity for all areas, Bailey says. Farming prospects in the Panhandle and Valley are improving. In either rural sections, farms have become larger and marginal lands have been turned into grazing pastures. Better roads and transportation have caused larger villages and towns to grow as shopping centers for the larger-farm owners, Bailey explains. Operators of small marginal farms, have found better-paying jobs in the shopping centers.

Only the smaller villages have suffered from the change, he says. With today's highways and motor vehicles, a purchaser who once had only time to drive 10 miles to a store now is willing to drive from 20 to 50 miles to shop.

New industries in smaller cities also are improving living conditions in many rural areas of waning farmers to work in factories also, Bailey pointed out. An anthropologist, Bailey has made many studies of changing social, economic and cultural conditions in rural areas.

Mangum WMU Has Meeting

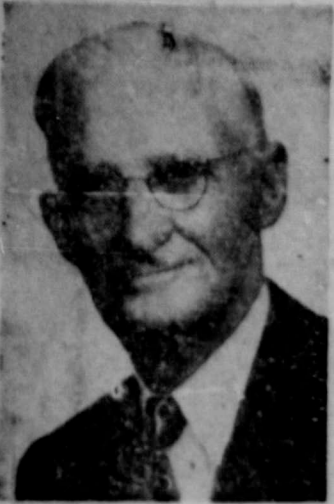

Pour into individual molds or custard cups. Chill until firm. Unmold on serving plates. Peel a banana and score with a fork. Cut in half lengthwise, then cut in 1-inch slices. Dip in lemon juice. Place a banana slice, round side up, on top of each gelatin "skirt." For dolls' head attach a cherry with a toothpick. Decorate skirts with whipped cream.

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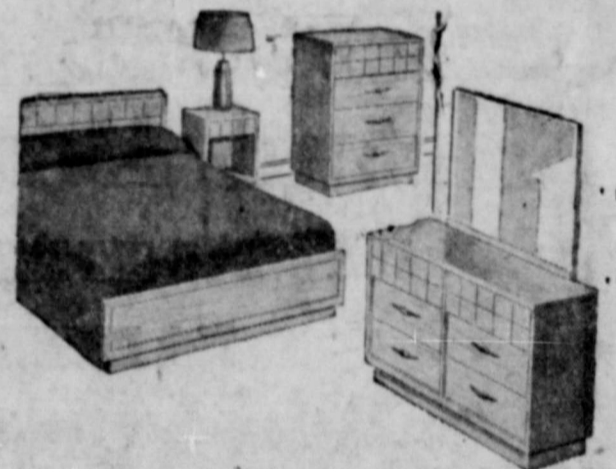

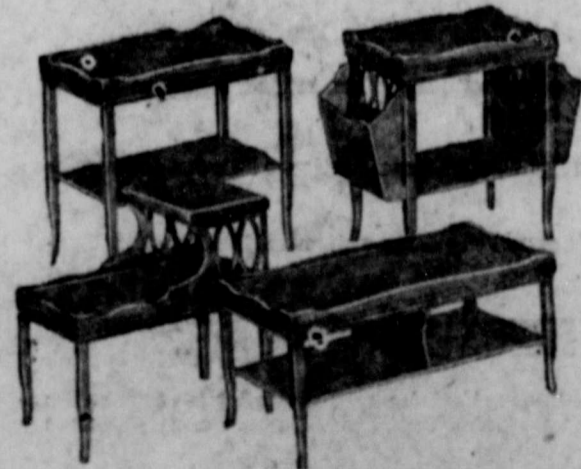

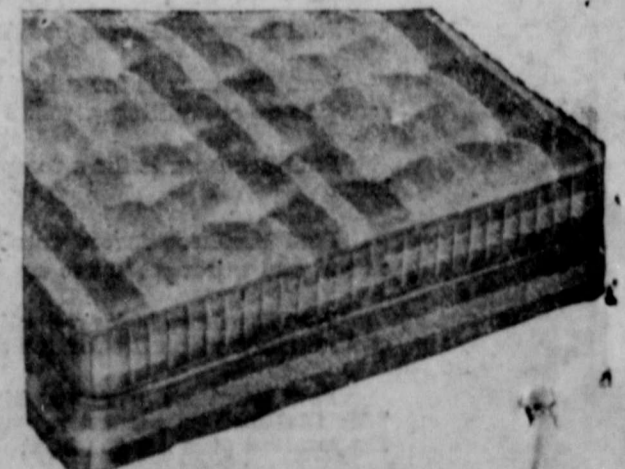
