## Final Returns Show Eastland County For Brashear, Yarbrough

Complete, unofficial returns from all 25 precincts in Eastland County show Ralph Yarbrough leading Allan Shivers by 62 votes in the county.

The governor's race, which from all indications has been thrown into a run-off, set the pattern for several others in the county. Final counts show Paul Brashear leading Omar Burkett by 129 votes in the race for State Representative from the 76th District; J. B. Williams ahead of J. Frank Tucker by 440 votes in the race for Sheriff; and J. B. "Tip" Arthur leading Frank Castleberry by 162 votes in the Commissioner, Precinct 1, race. All three races will be thrown into run-offs.

In the governor's race, Yarbrough polled 3,002 votes to 2,940 votes recorded by Governor Shivers. J. J. Holmes had 131 votes and Cyclone Davis scored 85.

Ben Ramsey received 4,913 votes in his bid for reelection as Lieutenant Governor. George T. Hinson got 928 and C. T. Johnson recorded 878.

John Ben Sneppers had 4,913 votes to just 995 recorded by Doug Crouch.

Lyndon B. Johnson had 4,041 votes to Dudley Dougherty's 1,974 in the race for United States Senator.

Martin Dies had 6,051 votes in winning reelection as congressman at large; John C. White got 6,020 votes in his bid for another term as commissioner of agriculture; Bascom Giles recorded 6,032 for commissioner of land office; Jesse James had 6,051 in his bid for reelection as treasurer of the state; Ernest O. Thompson got 6,032 votes for railroad commissioner; Robert S. Calvert received 6,044 votes for railroad commissioner; and J. E. Hickman had 6,039 votes for chief justice of the Supreme Court of Texas.

Alfred M. Scott led Few Brewster 2,230 votes to 2,201 votes in the race for Supreme Court of Texas, place 1, and Robert Keenan, the third candidate, got 1,077.

Clyde E. Smith recorded 5,993 votes for Supreme Court of Texas, place 2.

In the race for court of Criminal Appeals, Lloyd W. Davidson led a field of four with 2,519 votes. His nearest rival was Alan Daley with 1,289 votes, while Sam Davis got 840 and W. C. Graves 488.

Omni Burleson, seeking reelection for U.S. Congress, received 5,999 votes. Cecil C. Collins was given 6,013 votes for associate justice, Court of Civil Appeals, 11th Judicial District.

Brashear led Burkett in the State Representative race 2,715 votes to 2,595 votes. Charles H. Dawson, the third candidate in the race, had 684 votes.

Roy L. Lane easily won reelection as district clerk, winding up with 4,193 votes to 1,871 votes recorded by John C. Njeholas.

County Judge John Hart beat Clabe S. Eldridge 3,523 votes to 2,560 and Johnson Smith got 6,938 votes for county clerk. J. M. Nusselle was reelected county attorney with 5,981 votes.

William had 2,719 votes to 2,279 votes for Tucker in the race for sheriff. E. L. "Jug" Dennis ran a fairly strong third, getting 1,140 votes.

Stanley Webb had 6,052 votes in seeking reelection as tax assessor and collector; Richard C. Cox received 5,979 votes for county treasurer; T. H. Landon 6,057 votes for county school superintendent; and F. C. Williamson Sr. had 6,018 votes for county chairman.

Arther led Castleberry 1,251 votes to 1,081 in the Precinct 1 Commissioners race. James R. Lanier had 375 votes.

Votes are due to be canvassed today.

Eastland County Commissioners met Monday morning but no business was on the agenda.

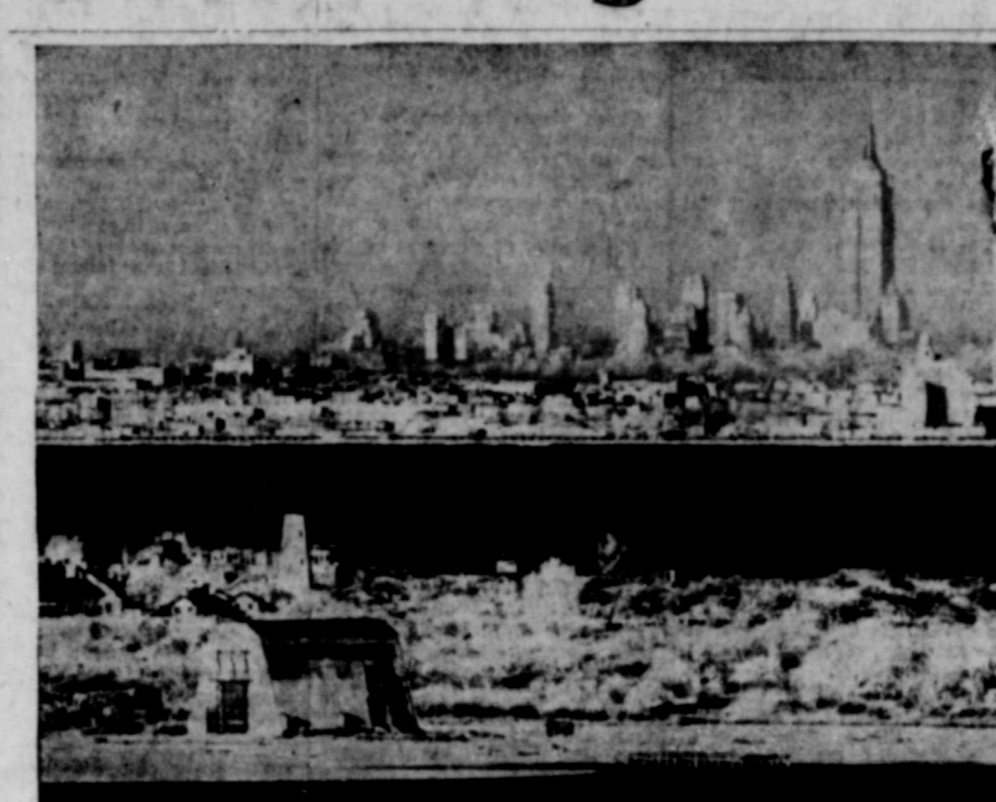
All of the latest additions are listed among the best sellers.

## Monday Night Games—YANKEES WIN OVER INDIANS TO REGAIN LEAGUE LEAD AS DODGERS HUMBLE THE GIANTS

The Killingsworth's Yankees in Ranger's Little League Monday night moved back into first place in league standings by a last-inning run to take a six to five decision over Art's Indians who had battled them on even terms in the first game of the double header. In the second game the Commercial State Bank Giants dropped a game to the Premier Dodgers by a score of 13 to seven.

The results of Monday night's games broke the two-way tie between the Killingsworth Yankees and the Commercial State Bank Giants, both of whom have been scrapping for first spot in the league all this month.

The Indians were in top form Monday night and gave the league leading Yankees a hard time, but pushing across three runs in the top of the fifth and another in the top of the sixth, forcing the Yankees to turn on the steam in their half of the sixth to push across the winning run.

Bobby Fron for the Indians pitched the six innings and picked up eight strike-outs while giving up only five hits. The Yankees had to be satisfied by scoring one run an inning except for the second when they got two scores across home plate.

The only extra base blow in the game was a triple in the fourth inning by Robert Ferguson of the Yankees.

In the second game, the Giants moved out in front, and at the end of their second inning were ahead by a four to one score, only to see this lead chipped away as the Dodgers gradually moved up to their fifth inning, when a rally sent seven men across the home base to take the lead and win the ball game.

The only extra base hit of the 11 accumulated by the Giants was a home run by Robert Powell in the third inning.

For the Dodgers, Ronnie Wynn picked up a double in the fourth inning and Tommy Camacho was credited with a triple in the fifth.

The Little League season will close Thursday night, with the Yankees and Giants playing in the first game to begin at 7 p. m.

## Livestock Prices Steady At Sales Arena In Ranger

The Monday run of cattle at the Ranger Livestock Commission Sales Company was off some, but the prices held steady, and were favorable in comparison with markets elsewhere.

Four hundred twenty-five head of livestock were sold under the hammer of the auctioneer Monday.

Heavy fat calves brought from \$17 to \$20.50; common calves, \$10 to \$16; fat cows, \$9 to \$11; canners and cutters, \$6.50 to \$8.50; bulls, \$12 to \$13.50; hogs, \$23; sows, \$15 to \$17.50 and goats, \$3 per head.

This was the latest move today by city officials in a desperate attempt to overcome a serious water storage problem.

Following an emergency conference early this morning, between Dr. Calvin Harris, Mayor, O. L. Cantrell, City Water Commissioner, and Les Crossley, City Manager, it was announced that a drastic move would have to be made to safeguard all of Ranger.

City officials expressed regret at having to adopt the strict rationing procedure, but explained that present conditions leave the city so badly exposed to several dangers, something must be done to recover and hold an adequate supply of water in the city storage tower.

## Two Year Old Youth Injured In Accident

A two year old Ranger boy, Randall Lloyd Young, son of Mr. and Mrs. Earl Lee Young, was slightly injured Saturday night when the 1941 Plymouth sedan driven by his father and a 1952 Buick coach driven by Royce Rockwood Brown of Fort Worth collided at the intersection of Highway 16 and Highway 80, 15 miles east of Ranger.

Highway Patrolman Ray Hatten, who investigated the accident, said Young was attempting to turn left on Highway 16 when the Buick smashed into the back of the Plymouth.

Randall was rushed to the Ranger General Hospital and treated for a slight head injury. He was released Saturday night.

## Precincts Name Delegates To County Meeting

A total of 45 delegates will represent the two voting precincts of Ranger at the county Democratic Convention at Eastland on Saturday, July 31. The convention will be held in the courthouse beginning at 2 p. m.

Precinct Three will be represented by 26 delegates, with Lee Dockery as chairman of the delegation. The delegates were named, and the chairman designated at the precinct convention held at 2 p. m. Saturday, July 24. The precinct meeting adopted a resolution pledging support to the Democratic nominees.

Precinct Four will have 19 delegates with the chairman being A. H. Powell. In naming its list of delegates at the meeting held last Saturday, this precinct is sending unopposed delegation to the county convention, but delegates are bound by precinct instructions to vote as a unit.

The basis used for determining the number of delegates from both Ranger precincts was the total vote for Governor under the Democratic column in the November 1952 general election.

## Doctors Are Warned Of Socialism Dangers In Public Health Measure

Dr. F. J. L. Blasingame of Wharton, president of the Texas Medical Association, Saturday afternoon warned of the dangers of socialism in the health insurance proposals pending before Congress, as he addressed an audience of approximately 150 medical doctors, their wives and visitors at a meeting at the Terrell Ranch, 12 miles, south of Ranger.

The ranch is owned by Dr. T. C. Terrell of Fort Worth, and doctors from a wide area of this section of the state attended as guests of the Fort Worth doctor. The president of the state association reviewed in detail the health insurance proposal pending in Congress, and pointed out the faults in the proposed system. He declared that local doctors must combat this part of a program of creeping socialism and it must be done by educating the public to the dangers involved.

Dr. P. M. Kuykendall of Ranger presided as chairman of the meeting which brought a large number of doctors from Fort Worth, the Five County Medical Society, and other medical groups throughout central west Texas.

A ranch-style barbecue dinner was served under the direction of John Thurman and a crew of assistants. Thurman is manager of the Terrell Ranch.

### Deep Watering of Plants Gets Best Results During Hot Weather

The roots of all plants — trees, flowers, shrubs and grasses — go where they get water.

That fact should be the basis for all watering during these days of high temperatures and shortages, according to Dr. Martine Emert, associate professor of geography at Texas Christian University, Fort Worth, and nationally known expert on conservation.

As much as 75 per cent of the water being used — and paid for — by some people is being entirely wasted these days, Dr. Emert believes.

"Since roots will seek water," she points out, "those plants and lawns that are sprinkled often and watered lightly turn back toward the surface. They can be scalded and killed by the hot sun and must be watered more frequently."

Those plants that receive deep watering sink their roots far into the soil where they are protected from the sun and heat. They require much less water to live, Dr. Emert said.

Frequently, 60 per cent of the water used is lost before it ever has a chance to help. Sprays and sprinklers that throw water into the hot air, especially in fine streams, result in a very high percentage of evaporation either before it hits the ground or as it lies there.

### Ernest Warner Now Stationed At Okinawa

**OKINAWA (Spl.)** — Army Pvt. Ernest H. Warner, son of Mr. and Mrs. Ernest R. Warner, Rt. 2, Eastland, recently joined the Ryukyus Command on Okinawa.

A strong U. S. outpost in the Far East, Okinawa is located off the coast of China between Formosa and the southern tip of Japan.

Private Warner, a 1949 graduate of Odessa High School, worked for the Gulf Oil Corporation before entering the Army last November. He completed basic training at Fort Bliss, and arrived on Okinawa last month.

### USAF To Drop Monthly Quota On Enlistment

Effective August 1, the US Air Force will remove the limit on the number of men to be accepted, it was announced today by S-Sgt. Grady D. Hoyle of the Air Force Recruiting office in Eastland.

Sgt. Hoyle is in Ranger each Wednesday from 9 a.m. until noon, and is officing at the Chamber of Commerce.

The new ruling he said will apply to aviation cadets as well as all airmen.

Until now the Air Force has operated on a quota basis each month. Under the new plan of the Defense Department, which authorizes 137 combat wings, the Air Force needs additional skilled men.

Most urgently needed at this time are aviation students. Minimum educational requirements for this class of enlistment is high school or above. However, Sgt. Hoyle added, men are being accepted for all other departments.

### Wheat Growers Favor Quotas

Eastland County wheat growers voted 28 to 3 over the week end in favor of wheat quotas, Emmett Powell, head of the Eastland P & MA office, said Tuesday.

Only 31 votes were cast in the election, 28 of them favored quotas. Seventy-three per cent of the nation's wheat growers voted yes at Friday's referendum.

### Only 3 Deathless Days On Highways Of Texas In 1953

There were only three deathless days during 1953. This information comes from the final tabulation of the 1953 traffic accident records of the Texas Department of Public Safety.

The department has issued a composite record of death and injury on Texas highways for last year, and figures indicate the heaviest single day's toll of lives was Dec. 24, 1953, when 24 persons died in 18 fatal accidents.

The deathless days were May 7, August 19 and November 5.

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**SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 11**  
 An act to amend the Constitution of the State of Texas creating the State Building Commission and determining the membership thereof, creating the Building Fund, providing for the transfer of the Confederate Pension Fund to the State Building Fund, providing for the expenditure of such fund under the direction of the Legislature, providing for the expenditure of a limited amount of the building fund for the erection of memorials under certain conditions and limitations, providing for an election thereon, the provisions of such election, and the form of the same.

**SECTION 1.** Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas shall be amended by adding thereto a new section to be known as Section 51-b and reading as follows:

**SECTION 51-b.** (a) The State Building Commission is hereby created. Its membership shall consist of the Governor, the Attorney General and the Chairman of the Board of Control. The Legislature may provide by law for some other State officials to be a member of this Commission in lieu of the Chairman of the Board of Control, and in the event said State official has not already been confirmed by the Senate, the Governor shall appoint him to be confirmed by the Senate. The State Building Commission shall have the same powers and duties as are conferred upon the State Building Commission in the same manner as other State officials are conferred.

(b) The State Building Fund is hereby created. On or before the first day of January following the adoption of this amendment, the amount of the Confederate Pension Fund to be transferred to the State Building Fund shall be ascertained by the Comptroller of Public Accounts and reported to the State Treasurer. The amount of money necessary to pay Confederate pensions for the ensuing calendar year as provided by law for some other State officials shall be paid by the State Treasurer out of the Confederate Pension Fund to the State Building Fund all money except that needed to pay the Confederate Pension Fund as certified by the Comptroller. This provision is self-executing. The State Building Fund shall be expended by the Commission upon appropriation by the Legislature for the purpose of erecting memorials to the Confederate States of America, and shall be expended for the purchase of land, the erection of buildings, the purchase of materials, and the payment of expenses necessary to carry out and effectuate the purpose herein mentioned.

(c) The first major structure erected from the State Building Fund shall be known and designated as a memorial to the Texans who served in the Armed Forces of the Confederate States of America, and shall be devoted to the use and occupancy of the Supreme Court and such other courts and State agencies as may be provided by law. The second major structure erected from the State Building Fund shall be a State office building and shall be used by whatever State agencies as may be provided by law.

(d) Under such terms and conditions as are hereinafter provided by law:

The State Building Commission may expend not exceeding five (5%) percent of the money available to it in any one year for the purpose of erecting memorials to the Confederate States of America. Said memorials may be upon battlefields or other suitable places within or without the boundaries of this State. The authorization for expenditures for memorials herein mentioned shall cease as of December 31, 1955.

Under such terms and conditions as are hereinafter provided by law, the State Building Commission may expend not exceeding thirty thousand (\$30,000) dollars in the aggregate for the purpose of erecting memorials to the Texans who served in the Armed Forces of the Republic in the Texas War for Independence. Said memorials may be erected upon battlefields, in cemeteries or other suitable places within or without the boundaries of this State. The authorization for expenditures for memorials herein mentioned shall cease as of December 31, 1955.

(d) The State ad valorem tax on property of Two (2) Cents on the One Hundred (\$100.00) Dollars valuation now levied under Section 51 of Article III of the Constitution as amended by Section II, Article VII (adopted in 1947) is hereby specifically levied for the purpose of continuing the payment of Confederate pensions as provided under Article III, Section 51, and for the establishment and continued maintenance of the State Building Fund hereby created.

(e) Should the State Legislature enact a law or laws in anticipation of the adoption of this amendment, such law shall be voided by reason of their anticipatory character.

(f) The foregoing amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of Texas at the general election to be held throughout the State on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1954, at which election those favoring such amendment shall have printed or written on their ballot the following:

FOR the amendment transferring that portion of the Confederate Pension Fund not needed for the payment of Confederate pensions to the State Building Fund to be used for State building purposes as may be provided by law, and also permitting not more than six (6%) percent of such fund to be used for memorials to the Texans who served in the Armed Forces of the Confederate States.

Those opposing such amendment shall have printed or written on their ballot the following:

AGAINST the amendment transferring that portion of the Confederate Pension Fund not needed for the payment of Confederate pensions to the State Building Fund to be used for State building purposes as may be provided by law, and also permitting not more than six (6%) percent of such fund to be used for memorials to the Texans who served in the Armed Forces of the Confederate States.

Sec. 2. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for such election, and shall have the amendment published as required by the Constitution and laws of the State of Texas.

### Rev. and Mrs. Henry Littleton To Return To Eastland To Live

Rev. Henry Littleton, who is retiring as district missionary of Baptist District 17, has spent 44 years in the ministry in one phase or another.

He helped organize District 17 in 1913 and has served as district missionary from 1939 until July 1 of this year. He was born in this district and all his church work has been in the district.

He and Mrs. Littleton will move to Eastland, the town where he was born. While he has retired as district missionary, he is staying on as business manager of Lueders Baptist Encampment, a project close to his heart.

Rev. Mr. Littleton is proud of the progress the district has made during the more than 14 years he

has served as missionary. Total gifts to missions by the churches of district 17 amounted to \$280,000 last year as compared to \$20,000 in 1939. Some 30-odd churches of the district were not giving to missions in 1939, Mr. Littleton said, but for the past two or three years every church has given to missions.

The district now has 154 churches, approximately 12 of which have been organized in towns during the past few years to meet the needs in populated sections that did not have a Baptist Church. Some grew from missions. During his service in this district, practically every church has either built a new building or made major improvement. During that time, too, the State Mission board has helped between 69 and 70 churches with buildings, an expenditure of state mission money of approximately \$35,000, Mr. Littleton said.

Subscriptions to the Baptist Standard, denominational publication, has grown from 1,500 to 11,000 in the district between 1939 and 1954, Rev. Mr. Littleton said.

While his work as district missionary has been full and satisfying, one of the greatest joys of service at Lueders Baptist Encampment has been in fellowship with fellow-Baptists of the district and "of the world," both Mr.

and Mrs. Littleton say.

"We have been in touch with leadership of Baptists of the world and have met them at Lueders Baptist Encampment," they said.

"I have driven more than 500,000 miles, have tried to go to every church when there was a call to try to help with every phase of the work," Mr. Littleton said.

"I have attended more than 1000 associational meetings, many district and state meetings."

Mr. and Mrs. Littleton were the first husband-and-wife team to graduate at the same time from Hardin-Simmons University. They finished in the same class in 1922.

"I'd hate to tell you all the ways we made money so we could go to school together," Mr. Littleton said. "There was nothing wrong with them, mind you, it was just hard work and lots of it. I'm not ashamed of it, but I'd just as soon forget it."

The Littletons were married September 4, 1912, in the home in which he grew up, six miles northeast of Eastland. Mrs. Littleton was Fannie Lee Lewellen of Waco. They saw each other only three times before they were married. That worked out all right for them, but they hesitate about offering it for advice. She came to visit her grandmother in January or February of 1912 and Mr. Littleton saw her at church. Most of their getting acquainted was by correspondence.

Rev. Mr. Littleton was 21 years old when he surrendered as a minister. His first church was at Jasper in Stephens county. He was pastor there at Snalium in Shackelford county when they married. They then moved to Crystal Falls, which was a half-time church, while he continued to preach once each month at Pioneer and Snalium.

Mr. Littleton went to Hamlin as pastor of the First Baptist Church in August, 1925, and continued there until 1929 when he became district missionary. During his pastorate there the church was built in 1928 and the pastor's home in 1929.

In the years before 1925 he was pastor at Crystal Falls for four years, associational missionary of Stephens county a year, pastor of the New Hope church in Stephens County and Seranton church in Callahan County, pastor at the New Hope Church in Cisco association and at Frankel in Stephens county. He went to Clyde in 1921. This half-time church went to full time in 1922. He continued there as pastor while he was attending Hardin-Simmons and left there in 1924. He built a church building the next year at Cross Plains.

Most of the time as district missionary, Mr. and Mrs. Littleton lived in Abilene, with the exception of two years at Anson and the past few years at the Lueders Encampment grounds. They had not really intended to move to the Encampment grounds. They just

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 3 proposing an amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas...  
SECTION 1. That Section 1 of Article 4 of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to hereafter read as follows:  
"Section 1. The Governor shall, at stated times, receive as compensation for his services an annual salary in an amount to be fixed by the Legislature, and shall have the use and occupation of the Governor's Mansion, fixtures and furniture."  
SECTION 2. That Section 22 of Article 4 of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to hereafter read as follows:  
"Section 22. The Attorney General shall hold office for two years and until his successor is duly qualified. He shall represent the State in all suits and plead in the Supreme Court of the State in which the State may be a party, and shall especially inquire into the charter rights of public utility corporations, and from time to time, in the name of the State, take such action in the courts as may be proper and necessary to prevent any private corporation from exercising any power or privilege of collecting any species of taxes, tolls, freight or wharfage not authorized by law. He shall, whenever sufficient cause exists, seek a judicial forfeiture of such charters, unless otherwise expressly directed by law, and give legal advice in writing to the Governor and other executive officers, when requested by them, and perform such other duties as may be required by law. He shall reside at the seat of government during his continuance in office. He shall receive for his services an annual salary in an amount to be fixed by the Legislature."  
SECTION 3. That Section 23 of Article 4 of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to hereafter read as follows:  
"Section 23. The Comptroller of Public Accounts, the Treasurer, and the Commissioner of the General Land Office shall hold office for the term of two years and until his successor is qualified; provided that the Comptroller, the Treasurer, and the Commissioner of the General Land Office, shall receive for their services an annual salary in an amount to be fixed by the Legislature, and shall have the use and occupation of the Comptroller's Office, the Treasurer's Office, and the Secretary of State's Office, and shall receive for their services an annual salary in an amount to be fixed by the Legislature, and shall have the use and occupation of the Comptroller's Office, the Treasurer's Office, and the Secretary of State's Office."  
SECTION 4. That Section 21 of Article 4 of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to hereafter read as follows:  
"Section 21. There shall be a Secretary of State, who shall be appointed by the Governor, by and with the advice and consent of the Senate, and who shall continue in office during the term of service of the Governor. He shall authenticate the publication of the laws, and keep a fair register of all official acts and proceedings of the Governor, and shall, when required, lay the same and all papers, messages, and vouchers relative thereto, before the Legislature, or either House thereof, and shall perform such other duties as may be required of him by law. He shall receive for his services an annual salary in an amount to be fixed by the Legislature."  
SECTION 5. That Article 3 of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to hereafter read as follows:  
"Section 5. The Legislature shall not fix the salary of the Governor, Attorney General, Comptroller of Public Accounts, the Treasurer, Commissioner of the General Land Office or Secretary of State at a sum less than that fixed for such officials in the Constitution on January 1, 1953."  
SECTION 6. That Section 24 of Article 3 of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to hereafter read as follows:  
"Section 24. Members of the Legislature shall receive from the public Treasury a sum of not exceeding Twenty-five (\$25.00) dollars per day for the first 120 days only of each session of the Legislature. In addition to the per diem the members of each House shall receive and returning from the seat of government, which mileage shall not exceed \$2.50 for every 25 miles, the distance to be computed by the nearest and most direct route of travel, from the seat of government to the place where they shall perform their duties, and shall receive for their services an annual salary in an amount to be fixed by the Legislature."  
SECTION 7. Said proposed Constitutional Amendments shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1954, at which election all voters favoring such proposed amendments shall write or have printed on their ballots the words:  
"FOR THE AMENDMENTS TO THE STATE CONSTITUTION PROVIDING THAT THE SALARIES OF THE GOVERNOR, THE ATTORNEY GENERAL, THE COMPTROLLER OF PUBLIC ACCOUNTS, THE TREASURER, THE COMMISSIONER OF THE GENERAL LAND OFFICE, AND THE SECRETARY OF STATE, BE FIXED BY THE LEGISLATURE, AND THAT THE PER DIEM OF THE MEMBERS OF THE LEGISLATURE BE FIXED AT TWENTY-FIVE (\$25.00) DOLLARS PER DAY FOR 120 DAYS ONLY."  
SECTION 8. The Governor of the State of Texas is hereby directed to issue the necessary Proclamation for said election and to have same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

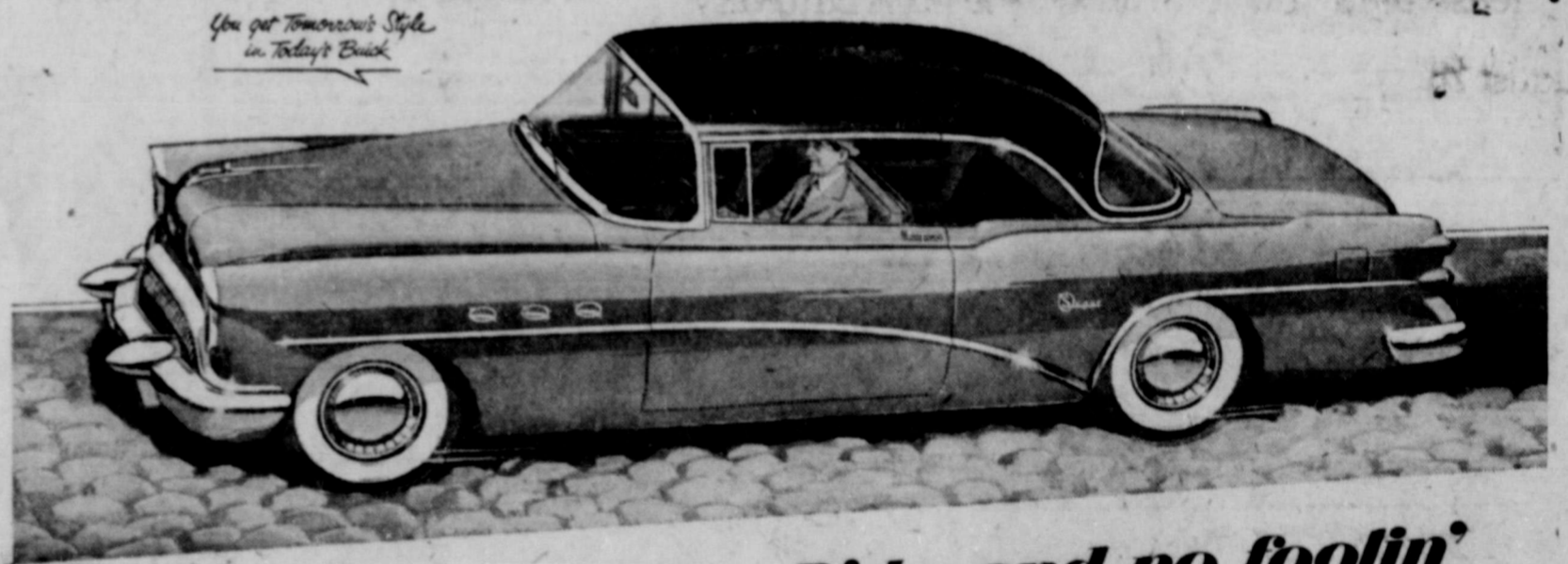

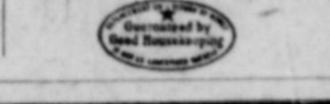

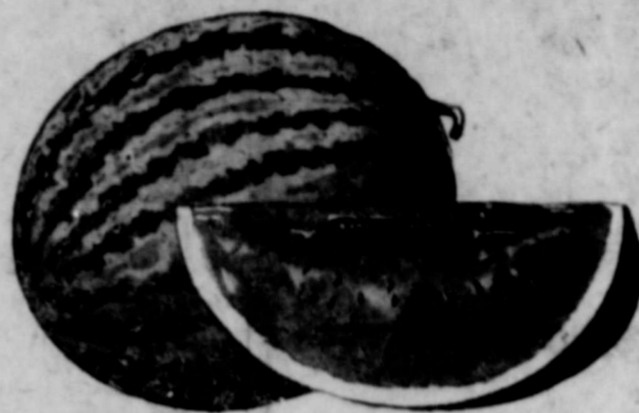
