Open house is scheduled Sunday from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. at the new W. D. McAlister ranch style 3-bedroom dwelling at the south edge of Ranger. It is located on Highway 80 west.

Furnishings for the open house are being provided by the Ranger Furniture Exchange.

McAlister, builder and owner, states this is the first in a series of buildings planned for the area to be known as the McAlister Addition to Ranger. Future plans include the construction of more dwellings, a tourist court, super service station and others, he said Saturday.

McAlister has, in recent years, developed two additions to Stephenville and one at Brady.

The new house is of mixed brick veneer and frame construction. It has a living room, dining room, kitchen, three bedrooms, two baths, hallway, den, and utility room. Also, it has a double car port facing the highway; a patio at the rear of the house, and a tile covered front porch.

There are two front entrance doors, one into the living room and one into the master bedroom. Outside doors at the rear of the house lead from both the utility room and the den onto the concrete patio.

McAlister points out that one of the house is the unusual amount of closet space, with each of the three bedrooms having walk-in closets.

The baths are elaborately tiled, and the fixtures and fittings are ultra-modern.

Capt. Massegee To Be Stationed At Fort Hood

Capt. Jasper C. Massegee, Army Chaplain, expects to be permanently stationed at Fort Hood. He will report there following the expiration of his present leave. He returned from service in Korea, arriving in Dallas last Sunday, Aug. 15, where he was met by Mrs. Massegee, returning home to Ranger that afternoon.

Capt. Massegee left the United States for Korea on March 4, 1953, and landed back in this country at Seattle on Aug. 14, flying from there to Dallas.

He states that following the expiration of this term of enlistment which expires in about another year, he is considering the extension of his service in the Army. He resigned as pastor of the Second Baptist Church in Ranger to enlist.

Tuesday he and Mrs. Massegee visits his parents and other relatives in Abilene. Wednesday night he went to Haskell, where he heard his son Charles preach in a Youth Revival at the Baptist Church here. This was the first time he had heard Charles preach, as he was licensed and ordained as a minister after Capt. Massegee went to Korea.

Ranger's Mayor, Dr. Calvin W. Harris, was the principal speaker before the Cisco Lions Club last Wednesday. His subject was "What's New in Internal Medicine."

Medicines are constantly being improved due to the competitive programs of private and public laboratories. Dr. Harris said. He brought to the meeting and showed Lions numerous new medicines just on the market.

He told about the new snake-bite medicines, which are working wonders in treating sufferers of malignant hypertension. He demonstrated new devices used by physicians and surgeons, including a cast cutter for removing old casts from broken limbs and a medicine for skin grafting.

"Doctors and pharmacists must remain alert constantly," he said, "to keep up with the advancements in the medical world." He told of a druggist who had been away from his store for a month's vacation and didn't know about some new pills a doctor had prescribed.

Eastland County residents Saturday were urged by Jess Cole, county chairman, to lend their assistance to the Emergency March of Dimes to fight polio. "Present prospects are that we will need all the emergency funds we can raise," he added.

Ranger To Observe Holiday Labor Day

Labor Day, September 6, is one of the regularly scheduled general holidays to be observed in Ranger. Mrs. Mae Belle Oyler, secretary-manager of the Retail Merchants Association, said today. Most business firms will be closed for the day, and the classes for the new school term will be suspended according to the calendar for the 1954-55 school year.

Legion Commander Cites Legal Change In November 11 Holiday

With the current session of Congress drawing to a close, one new law was enacted which created comparatively little comment at the time it was signed by the President, it was pointed out today, Saturday, by Don Butler, commander of the Carl Barnes Post 69 of the American Legion.

The law which Butler referred to was that of a change in the designation of November 11, as Armistice Day, which has been recognized as a legal holiday since the end of World War I. Hereafter, the date of November 11, is legally designated as "Veterans Day" and will honor military men of all wars in which the United States has been involved.

"Remaining a legal holiday," Butler said, "November 11th will hereafter be a solemn day set aside for the nation to pay homage to its veterans, living and dead, of all wars."

The bill was signed on June 1 by President Eisenhower. It was a measure backed in Congress by the American Legion and over other organizations of war veterans. The Legion in its national conventions in 1951 and 1952 had urged such a change. The bill was introduced in the House by Republican Representative Ed Rees of Kansas, on Feb. 8, 1954; passed by the House on March 15 and by the Senate on May 24.

Ranger Bulldogs Begin Football Workouts Mon.

1954 Bulldog Schedule—

FOOTBALL SEASON TO OPEN WITH COLORADO CITY GAME; CONFERENCE TILTS ARE LATE

Ranger's High School Bulldogs will open their 1954 gridiron season on Sept. 10, with a game away from home, playing Colorado City on its home ground. Also, they will close the away from home playing the final game at Weatherford, which will be a conference game.

The five conference games in Dist. 9, Class AA, will be the last five games of the season.

All games in 1954 are scheduled for night affairs. Coach Boone Yarbrough, said Saturday. Out of a schedule of 70 games this season only four will be played at home, and two of these will be conference games in Class AA.

The first home game will be with Brewer High (White Settlement) of Fort Worth on Sept. 17. There will be one open date, Oct. 15, allowing the Bulldogs a two week rest between the last non-conference and the first conference game.

CANDIDATES GO INTO FINAL WEEK OF RUN-OFF CAMPAIGN

Only six more days and the campaigning will be over until next election year.

With only a week remaining until the Democratic run-off primary election next Saturday, Aug. 28, candidates are becoming more intense in campaigning each day.

Despite the fact that there are only a few races in the runoff election to be determined, the intensity is not lessened.

Texas witnessed a bitter campaign in the governor's race during the first primary campaign, but it has become more vicious in the weeks since. Gov. Allen Shivers and Austin attorney, Ralph W. Yarbrough have this year perhaps set a record for producing the most intense and vicious campaign for the chief executive's position in Texas, that this state has ever seen.

Perhaps the campaign producing the least public interest is that for Place 1 on the Supreme Court of Texas. Few Brewster, incumbent is being opposed by Alfred M. Scott, unknown to the voters showed surprising strength in the first primary. Judge Brewster was widely known and had strong support from the majority of the members of the Texas Bar Association. Personal friends of Scott vouch for his honesty and integrity, declaring that he has qualifications for the office.

Contributions for the tags enable the DAV to maintain full-time national service officers in this state who without charge assist disabled veterans and their dependents in their compensation, hospitalization, employment and other disabled veterans problems.

The race for State Representative of the 76th District between Omar Purkett, incumbent and Paul Brashear, is becoming hotter each passing day. This is the race which aroused so much attention before the first primary when a suit was filed to keep the name of Charles H. Dawson off the ballot due to a technicality in reporting campaign expenses. Dawson was eliminated in the first primary.

For the office of Eastland County Sheriff, both candidates are waging an active run-off campaign. (Continued on Page Two)

Bulldog Coaches Reverse Positions For This Season

Beginning Monday, Coach Boone Yarbrough starts the task of putting together another football team for Ranger High School to replace the 1953 State Championship Class A team.

Facing the popular Ranger coach are two handicaps. First, The Bulldogs move into faster company, Class AA; and secondly, he must fill the seven vacancies left by that many graduates from last year's team.

Yarbrough said Saturday that he expects to see between 25 and 40 boys out for football practice sessions. He was anything but optimistic about this season's schedule, stating that the first team the Bulldogs will face, Colorado City, has its last year's team back for 1954, and Ranger barely got past them with its championship crew.

Of course, the coach said, none of the three all-state men of last year will be back, Eddy Justice, Chico Mendoza and Charles Masseur. John Rush, Scott Forney and Eddy Jones are the only ones from the list of eight who were named on the all-district team, who are returning.

From the squad of 28 men who received letters and reserve letters last year, expects to have at least 30 back from which he will build the foundation for the coming season.

One advantage for the Bulldogs is that the fact that all conference games in District 9AA will be played as the last five games of the season. This will give Yarbrough an opportunity to find his best combination before the pressure is on.

Those expected to return from last year's squad and their scholastic classification are:

Seniors: Scott Forney, back; John Rush, center; Eddie Joe Jones, tackle; Jimmy Littlefield, back; Jerry Bradford, coach.

Juniors: Johnny Swainey, back; Bennie Robinson, defensive back; Tommy Young, guard; Pete Jameson, tackle; Tommy Sutton, back; Archie Robinson, tackle and John Wylie, back.

Sophomores: Jerry Cantrell, end; Paul Hinds, back; John Hagan, center; Charles Bonney, guard; Eddy Jacoby, tackle; and Jerry Bradford, coach.

The Bulldog coach said there may be need for a large amount of reshuffling of playing positions from those of last year. He must develop material for end positions and fill a number of gaps in the line.

Kathryn Gibson Is Awarded MS Degree Friday

Mrs. Earle Kathryn Gibson, librarian of the Ranger Junior College, Friday received a Master's Degree in Library Science at the summer commencement of the Texas State College in Denton.

A total of 133 degrees were awarded. Mrs. Gibson was one of 49 to receive the master's degree. Bachelor's degrees were conferred on 82 students, and doctor of philosophy degrees on three.

College President John A. Guinn was the graduation speaker.

Mrs. Gibson resides with her mother, Mrs. E. K. Britton, 821 Spring Road in Ranger. She holds a BA degree from North Texas State College. She attended Ranger Junior College before going to North Texas State, and is a graduate of Ranger High School.

Absentee Voting Far Above That Of First Primary

Eastland County voters apparently will return to the polls in large numbers again next Saturday, that is if absentee voting is any indication. Saturday morning 125 persons had voted absentee.

County Clerk Johnson Smith's office had been kept busy by the near-record absentee voting. Only 136 votes were cast absentee during the first primary. Absentee voting ends Tuesday.

Sgt. Bob Butler To Go To Ft. Jackson

Sgt. Bob Butler, son of Mr. and Mrs. Don Butler, who returned recently after two and a half years service in Korea, expects to leave within a few days for Fort Jackson, S.C. He is to report there by Sept. 6, at which place he will receive his assignment to a permanent location in the United States. Prior to his service in Korea he had spent three years in Germany.

Rally Planned By Governor

Governor Allan Shivers will bring his campaign for re-election to Central Texas this week when he speaks at a gigantic political rally at Brownwood Tuesday night. The rally, one of the most important in the stormy run-off campaign, will be held on the courthouse lawn in Brownwood, Tuesday night at 7:30.

First Meeting Of Quarterbacks Set For Monday

The "kick-off" meeting Monday night for the Ranger Quarterback Club is set to coincide with the opening day of fall training for the Ranger Bulldogs, L. E. Wallace, club president said Saturday. Football training for last year's champions begins Monday and the Quarterback club will meet at 7:30 p.m. Monday, at the Chamber of Commerce office.

Wallace urged all members to be present for the first meeting of the year at which time club activities for the coming season will be outlined.

Birthstone For Month of August Is Sardonyx

The birthstone for August is either the peridot or the sardonyx... both symbolizing the hope and promise of married happiness. Entitled to wear the August birthstones as personal good luck tokens are actress Ethel Barrymore, dancer Gene Kelly, former president Herbert Hoover, novelist Edna Ferber and humorist Ogden Nash. Composer Claude Debussy was born in the month of August, as was Napoleon Bonaparte.

According to legend, as reported by the Jewelry Industry Council, the peridot was supposed to have come from the Serpent Isle in the Red Sea, guarded by zealous watchers whose duty it was to put to death any unauthorized persons who appeared. Not even those who had a right to seek the gem could find the peridot by daylight. It was not until nightfall that it was revealed by its radiance. The seekers then marked the spot and gathered the stones in daylight. Legend also relates that a peridot repels the terrors of the night and, when set in gold, exerts great power over evil spirits.

The peridot, which still comes chiefly from St. John's Island, makes a fine ring stone for men as well as women. The most preferred shade is a soft delicate green with pale yellow undertones.

The sardonyx, alternate birthstone for August, was reputed to give courage to orators and shy lovers. Scorpions cut from sardonyx have been found in Egyptian ruins, and history tells us that the ancient Romans were the first to choose it for August's birthstone. A stone which combines the beauty of opaque red and brown tones, the sardonyx is found mainly in Brazil and Uruguay today. For men it is popular in cameo and intaglios or when cut for crests or initials set in a ring.

Schlamb, extension poultry marketing specialists, have outlined and illustrated with pictures the standards of quality for individual dressed and ready to cook turkey carcasses.

They point out that the aim of all producers and processors should be to sell turkeys with maximum quality and with as few defects as possible. Consumer satisfaction is more likely when turkeys meet grade A quality requirements, they say.

The bulletin is now available, without cost, from the office of any local county Extension Service agent or by mail from the Agricultural Information Office, College Station, Texas.

BETTY'S BUDGET OF HELPFUL HINTS

A whole harvest of new skirt styles for Fall offer tempting novelties for the skirt collector. Real innovation is the Bermuda length skirt launched by Stanley Wyllins, leading sportswear designer. A single castor bean can cause death if eaten by a child, reports the September issue of Better Homes & Gardens magazine. Unfortunately, the strikingly mottled beans are attractive to youngsters. Equally dangerous is seed of the Angel's trumpet and other species of Daturs. Many other common

garden plants are poisonous, for instance, the bright berries of the garland flower, the seed of the yew and the foliage of larkspur.

Off the beaten track is this recipe for stuffed pork chops. Have your butcher cut a pocket on the one side of six double pork chops. Stuff with following mixture: 1/2 cup chopped celery, 2 tablespoons minced onion, 2 tablespoons chopped parsley, 1 cup fine bread crumbs, 1 teaspoon salt, 1 teaspoon melted butter and 1 cup whole cranberry sauce, broken up with a fork.

Brown stuffed chops first in hot fat in skillet over a medium flame. Transfer to shallow baking dish with scrapings of skillet. Add one cup of hot water and bake at 350 degrees until tender — about an hour. Bake 1 sweet potatoes, broccoli and green bean salad with French dressing go well with this pork dish. For dessert, apple pie, Brown Betty, scalloped apples or apple tapioca are all "naturals."

For best results from your home canning, use only standard size fruit jars that are made to withstand the heat used in processing. Old size "second hand" jars are usually lighter, and processing times recommended in recipes will not be correct. Also — never use chipped or cracked jars of any kind.

Want a quick main dish for supper? Brown some sausage in a skillet. Add 2 cups cooked white rice, 1 1/2 cups yellow whole kernel corn, drained, 1/2 cup chopped green pepper, salt and pepper and 2 1/2 cups tomato sauce. Simmer covered, over a low heat until most of the liquid is absorbed. Add liquid and continue cooking if the rest of the meal isn't quite ready. Or bake covered at 350 degrees F. for 30 minutes.

Ranger Baptists, along with Baptists from other cities in the Cisco Baptist Association, will attend an associational stewardship-evangelism conference at 7 p.m. Thursday, August 26, at the First Baptist Church in Cisco.

Dr. L. T. Daniel, Dallas, endowment secretary of the Baptist General Convention of Texas, will serve as team captain and be in charge of the conference. He will be introduced by Rev. Tom Small of Gorman, stewardship chairman for the association.

Rev. Levi Price, pastor of the First Baptist Church, Monahans, will be the evangelism speaker; and Dr. Richard Poss, pastor, First Baptist, Greenville, will discuss stewardship. H. P. Black, minister of music, Spring Branch Baptist Church, Houston, will be in charge of music.

The closing prayer will be given by Rev. J. J. Fowler of Moran, associational evangelism chairman. Rev. H. M. Ward will serve as host pastor.

The evangelism-stewardship conference is one of 122 scheduled during August and September for members of the 3,512 Baptist General Convention of Texas churches and is a part of the Southern Baptist Convention's fall program. This is the first year that evangelism and stewardship have been combined in an annual emphasis.

During the conferences, plans and materials for the churches' fall observance of "Harvest Week" will be held October 31-November 7, previous to the churches' adopting their annual

budgets for 1955. An evangelism-stewardship book, "These Go Together," will be taught, and evangelistic services will be held in the churches during the week of special emphasis.

Available for use of the churches through their district missionaries will be a color movie, "These Go Together," written and produced by the Convention's Public Relations Department and a color slide series, "Blocks for Building Better Budgets." The script for the slide series is narrated by Dr. L. B. Cobb of Dallas, stewardship promotion for Texas Baptists.

Last year Texas Baptists gave \$55,506,986 to their churches with more than \$7,000,000 being given to world missions. They baptized more than 60,000.

Family Size Farm Is Still Important

COLLEGE STATION (Spl.)—Is the family-size farm on its way out? Large scale farming which came in with mechanized production methods caused many people to give serious consideration to this question. But, says John McHane, extension economist, the 1950 Census figures show the family-size farm still very much in the picture after more than three decades of farm mechanization.

The 1950 Census divided the nation's 5.4 million farms into two groups, 3.7 million commercial and 1.7 million noncommercial. This last grouping consists mainly of part-time and residential units and they account for only 2.5 percent of the value of farm products sold in 1949.

Commercial farms were divided according to the amount of sales made, says the economist, and the classes were large, family and small-scale. Farms with sales of \$25,000 or more are large-scale; those with sales from \$1,200 to \$25,000 family-scale and the small scale were those reporting sales between \$250 and \$1,200 unless off-farm work or income was enough to class the operation as part-time farming.

Nearly 80 percent of all commercial farms fell into the family scale class, says McHane, and they account for about 70 percent of the value of total farm products sold. Mighty strong evidence, says the specialist, that family-size farms are still the backbone of America's great agricultural industry.

Commercial exhibits will be limited to a select group of manufacturers chosen on the basis of good taste, educational value and the beauty of their exhibits.

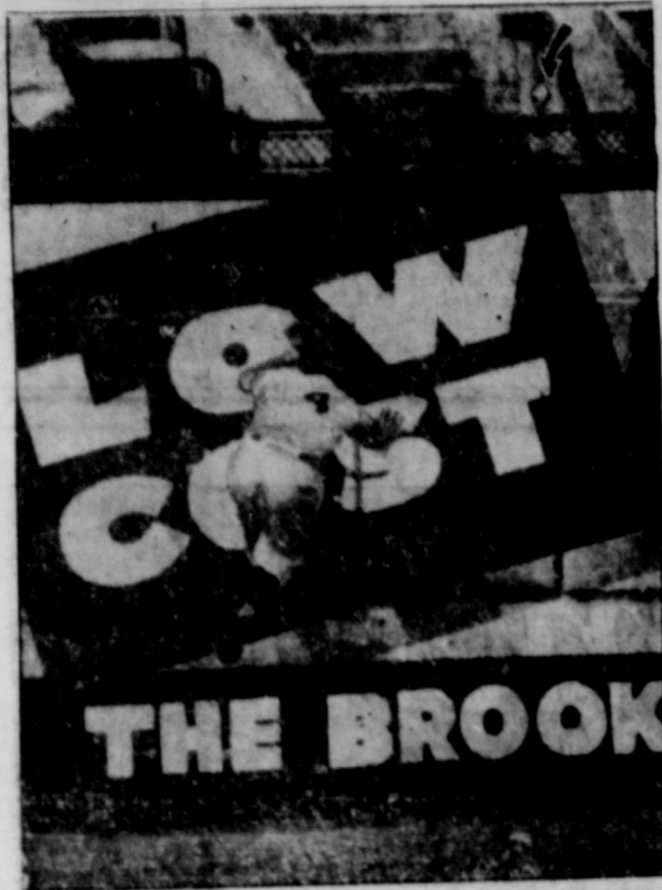

How To Teach Destructive Child To Respect Property of Others

Some children destroy property for the sake of destroying. They are the youngsters who, between the ages of 6 and 12, break windows, gouge furniture, mark up the walls and smash toys. You can prevent your child from becoming a destroyer, says child expert Irma Simonton Black in *Respectful Attitude*, by having a respectful attitude toward him and his property. Mrs. Black tells you how to teach him to care for his own and other people's things and how to show him the accepted ways of acquiring the possessions he wants.

"Throwing rocks through windows of vacant buildings, marking up cars, breaking branches of small trees and shrubbery — these are things that some children do between the ages of six and twelve. How can you prevent your child from becoming one of the destroyers?"

"First — respect his property. Don't throw around his Teddy bear because 'It's just a dirty old thing.' Set a good example. I was at a friend's house one day when her husband was scolding their child for leaving her skates out in

the rain. Ruthie countered, 'You left out the lawn mower you borrowed from Mr. Kay!'

"Show him that you expect him to be careful with family belongings. Explain that he mustn't grab things which don't belong to him, but allow him, in turn, to have a proprietary sense about his own things.

"If your child some day does take a toy which doesn't belong to him; be patient with him. He must return the toy himself, but you can help give him the courage and perhaps go with him. Then maybe you and he can plan how he can earn one himself by helping you around the house.

"It is not wrong to desire things we do not have. We all do. But some people earn them and others steal them. If you close the doors to many of your child's desires, he may come to believe he can only get what he wants by stealing. So show him the legitimate ways of obtaining things, and, of course, explain that they are better because they are carried out without hurting others as we would not want to be hurt ourselves.

"Most important of all — convince your child you are on his side. Sympathetic handling of his mistakes will show him you want to be fair — and that your concern springs from affection, not disapproval of him."

The basic colors of the wardrobe ensemble still play an important part but a secondary one to a woman's own basic coloring.

In addition to the great progress made in color and texture development, today's nylon is also the strongest thread ever used in women's hosiery. Only the actual pulling or breaking of a thread, will cause a run. The proof of nylon's strength is its military use in parachutes . . . threads that literally support a man's life. Also, nylon is not drastically weakened

Nylon dries very fast so don't over dry it near artificial heat. Perspiration is harmful and disintegrating to the dyes and finishes used in nylon hosiery so wash your nylons as often as possible. It's a good idea to wash them before their first wearing in mild soap and warm, not hot, water. A good system for washing nylons is to keep a covered jar handy. Throw hosiery into the jar with warm water and soft suds (never rub cake soap against your stockings.) Shake the jar with a circular washing machine motion and rinse the same way. Roll them full length in a turkish towel and hang to dry.

And, as a closing thought — treat your legs to the same beauty treatments you give your face.

Keep them immaculate and soft, firm and clear and your legs can be your "better half."
