PIONEER CONFERENCE TEAMS WIN SIX OUT OF SEVEN GAMES

Pioneer Conference teams, impressive in six victories out of seven games against non-conference opposition already this season will continue their schedules in four non-league contests this week.

Leading off Thursday night, the Tarleton State Plawboys, who unleashed a crushing offensive to defeat Cisco, 38-6, last Saturday will go to Paris for a setto with the Paris Junior College Dragons. The Paris team, which earlier this season extended the No. 1 rated Tyler JC Apaches of the Longhorn Conference before bowing 13-19, will be slight favorites on their home field.

One of the outstanding junior college games of the year is scheduled for Arlington Friday night when the ASC Rebels, 1953 conference champions and 19-7 victors over the Wharton JC Pioneers last week, tangle with the mighty Kilgore Rangers at Arlington. The Rangers, accompanied by the nationally famous co-ed Rangerettes, are expected to draw a capacity crowd to the ASC stadium. The Kilgore team boasts top-heavy victories over Navarro JC and Henderson County JC this season and handed the Rebs their only defeat in 1953.

On Saturday evening Coach John Hamburger's Schreiner

Mountaineers, 20-7 conquerors of Navarro last week, go to Victoria for a game with Victoria JC. The Victoria eleven is coached this year by H. N. "Rusty" Russell who tutored the Mountaineers last season. Another Saturday night contest matches the Ranger Junior College Rangers, rated as title contenders this season with the Cisco Junior College Wranglers at Ranger. Ranger has victories over Wharton and Allen Academy this year and shouldn't have too much trouble with Cisco which has been beaten by the Hardin-Simmons Frosh and Tarleton State.

The San Angelo Rams, who played the awesome Tyler Apaches to a standstill before bowing 7-13 last week, will be idle this weekend.

Versatile, Young Co-Ed Holds Many Home-Canning Awards



Everywhere, it seems, home canning enthusiasts are appearing in lower and lower age brackets. Young people, for instance, like Beatrice Luoma, the charming 20-year-old Finnish-American girl who, over the past nine years has won innumerable blue ribbons for her outstanding work in home canning.

"I've been home-canning as long as I can remember; canning everything I could lay my hands on," says this attractive young co-ed. As the eldest of nine children, living on a farm near Floodwood, Minnesota, Beatrice helped her mother with canning as a youngster; started winning home-canning prizes from her first days as a member of the 4-H when she was a mere 11 years old, and has continued rolling up a high score for her home canning ever since. In 1953, she demonstrated at the St. Louis County Fair (Minnesota), where she also won the championship for her canned vegetables; and that same year she took the blue ribbon at the Minnesota State Fair.

Last year, Beatrice put up over 100 quarts of pickles with the results again proving this young lady's remarkable ability for successful food preservation. Her sliced cucumber pickles, which she says are more tender when peeled, are made like this:

- 8 cups sliced cucumbers
- 1 green pepper
- 1 pound onions
- 3/4 cup salt
- Wash and peel cucumbers. Slice thin. Peel and slice onions. Seed and shred pepper. Mix vegetables, add salt, cover with lid and stand at least 3 hours.
- Place in a colander to drain excess liquid; and then rinse well by running cold water over the mixed vegetables. Add to hot syrup (given below) and heat slowly to just below boiling, stirring occasionally. Put in Ball Mason Jars; seal with Ball Dome Lids.
- Syrup: Mix ingredients, bring slowly to boiling point and boil five minutes.

- 2 cups brown sugar
- 1 tsp. mustard seed
- 3/4 tsp. turmeric
- 3/4 tsp. celery seed
- 3/4 tsp. ground clove
- 2 cups mild cider vinegar

In two years, when Beatrice Luoma graduates from the University of Minnesota, where she's now majoring in home economics, her experience and knowledge in the homemaking arts will become doubly useful. For she plans to combine a career in Extension work with marriage to a young geologist.

Today, the many hobbies of this popular young college girl include square dancing, water skiing, church work, writing for a school paper, and cheer leader. But of them all, home canning, she finds, is the most challenging and rewarding. And, it was due in large measure to her keen interest in, and aptitude for, home canning that this personable young woman eventually decided upon a career in the home economics field.

Mother Goose In Texas

Every time I come to town
Folks start kickin' my dog
around,
Makes no difference if he is a
hound,
They gotta stop kickin' my dog
around.
When Champ Clark, Missouri's
great senator, was candidate for
the presidential nomination, some
forty years ago, the "Houn' Dog
Song," which has an attractive
melody, was heard throughout the
land. Additional stanzas were ad-
ded and the song copyrighted as
"The Missouri State Song." The
rhyme quoted above, which served
as a refrain, did not originate in
Missouri, but is actually older
than Missouri's statehood, having
been brought there by the restless
pioneers from farther east. It
could well be that the followers of
Stephen F. Austin brought the
song to Texas. At any rate it is
one of the best known items of
American childlore, and is fully
in keeping with the Mother Goose
tradition.

The houn' dog has always been
regarded as willing and anxious
to please, but, except for his ability
to trail varmints, just a little
on the dumb side. One of the most
affectionately regarded of all do-
mestic animals, he was the sub-
ject of many rhymes by pioneer
kids, such as:

Someone stole our old houn'
dog,
I wish they'd bring him
back.
He run the big hogs over the
fence,
And the little 'uns through
the crack.

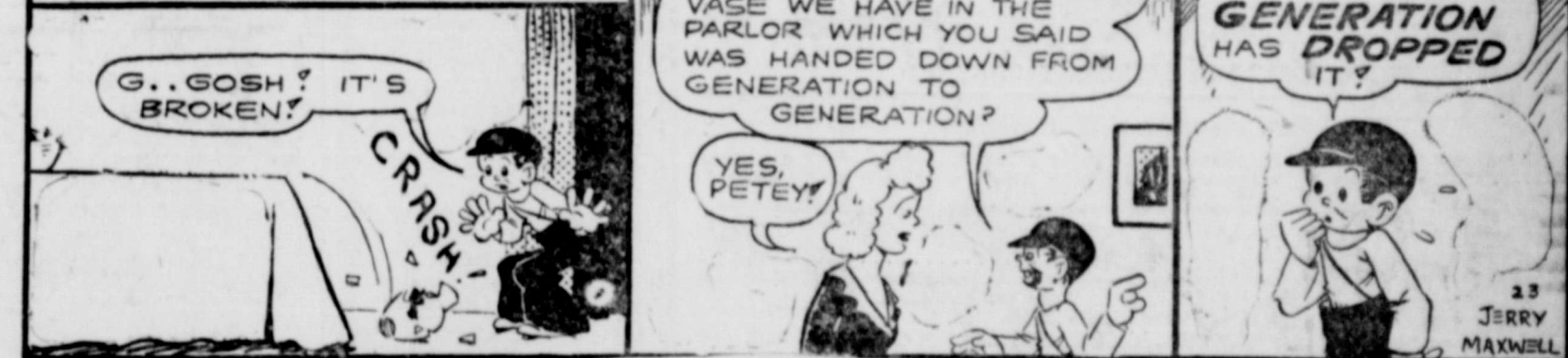

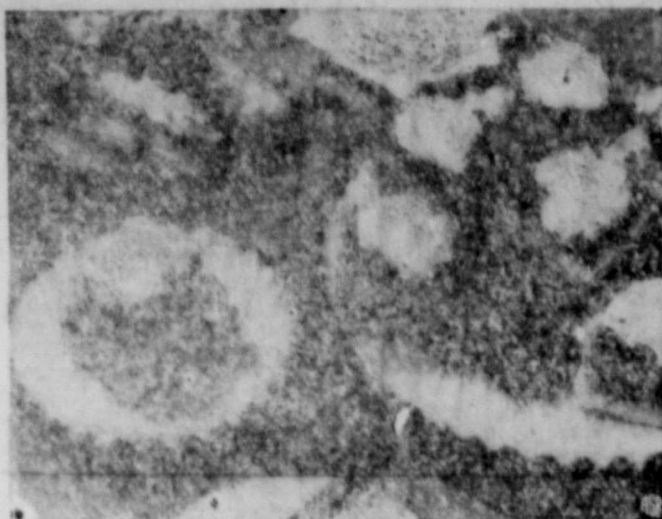

Make A Coconut Shortcake For Him!



Looking for something new for dessert? Add toasted coconut to a shortcake recipe. What a dicker way to give the man in your life a special treat! He will ask for seconds when you serve this short, short, shortcake with its crunchy coconut and its delicious blueberry sauce. A fluff of whipped cream adds to the eye appeal... and be sure to have a side dish of the coconut to pass—for second helpings.

Blueberry Coconut Shortcake

2 cups sifted flour
2 1/2 teaspoons double-acting baking powder
3 tablespoons sugar
1 teaspoon salt
2 1/2 cups raisins, sugared, add baking powder, sugar, salt and sift raisins. Cut in shortening until consistency of coarse corn meal. Add 3/4 cup of the coconut and mix well. Add milk all at once and stir until soft dough is formed.

Turn out on lightly floured board and knead 20 times. Divide dough in half and pat 1/2 inch thick in two greased 8-inch square layer pans. Bake in hot oven (450° F.) for 20 minutes, or until done.

Cut each cake in 9 or 12 squares and spread squares with softened butter. Put together as individual shortcakes, spreading blueberry topping between layers and over top. Garnish with whipped cream and remaining 3/4 cup of coconut. Makes 9 or 12 servings.

Blueberry Topping: Combine 1 1/2 quarts fresh blueberries, 3/4 cup sugar, 3 lemon slices, and 1/2 cup water in saucepan. Place over low heat and bring to a boil, stirring occasionally. Remove from heat. Cool, then remove lemon slices.

TERRACES ARE RECOMMENDED BY SOIL CONSERVATION MEN

(Editor's Note: This is the first of a series of reports of Soil Conservation work being done in Eastland County. The article was written for The Times by SC workers.)

E. B. Walker of Cisco recently completed a terrace system on his farm located one mile of Cisco. Walker has been a cooperator with the Tappan Leon Soil Conservation District since 1953. He feels that his new terraces combined with his cover crop program will do much to protect and improve his fields.

Mrs. Sam G. Hart and son, T. C. Hart, have finished construction of nearly three miles of terraces on their farm located 4 1/2 miles northeast of Cisco. They had three terraces built on the house field by the road. This field is rather steep and has washed some in spite of the limited rains of recent years. Soil Conservation technicians were able to good stable grass outlets to empty these terraces. The Harts have been District cooperators for several years. They believe the terraces will do much to conserve water from flash rains as well as handle excess water in case of heavy rains. Hart farms small grain and realizes the value of litter or organic matter to his soil.

Irven Phipper and C. V. Brown of the Dothan community are having terraces constructed on their farms at the present time. Phipper and Brown both are building about two miles each on their places. Soil Conservation Service men ran all of these terraces to empty onto pasture land which affords a good stable outlet. Many landowners in the District within Eastland County are building farm ponds for livestock water. The purpose of these ponds in addition to a source of water for livestock is to obtain proper distribution of livestock and encourage rotation or deferred grazing and better grass land management as

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
