This compares with an average expenditure of \$2.83 per day for each patient in mental hospitals. Mental hospitals accounted for 44 per cent of the nation's total of 1,580,564 hospital beds.

**Bible Comment-
Paul Forged
Spiritual Armor
For Christians**

FOR SEPT. 26TH

The Apostle Paul, who was a Christian in a Roman pagan world dominated by power and Roman conquering armies, did not hesitate to draw effective illustrations for Christian life and conduct from the details of happenings in that Roman world.

He compared the Christian life to a race, and he laid great stress upon running to win.

In imperial Rome, with its dominance of the world, he saw the material realization of a similar dream of imperialism, but his dream was of a spiritual imperialism of a world completely conquered by Christ and His gospel.

In that sense Paul was an imperialist, and the dream enshrined in the Lord's Prayer, "Thy Kingdom come; Thy will be done on earth as it is done in heaven" is still the dream and prayer of Christians, though it is still far from fulfillment.

That Roman world was one of action, war, and conquest; and in his spiritual world Paul saw the Christian life, and Christian duty, individual and collective, as a demanding action, war, and conquest. The Christian's warfare was against inward evils, temptations and weaknesses from which Paul, himself, was not immune.

But the foes of the Christian were not all inward. Against the forces of evil, within and without, Paul called for Christians, strong and well-prepared.

What the Christian world of today lacks is the Pauline sense of the Christian warfare. We tend to think of Christianity too exclusively in terms of personal character and conduct. What we need is aroused and awakened Christians, following a Son of God, Who goes forth to war, and fully equipped with all the available spiritual weapons for offense and defense.

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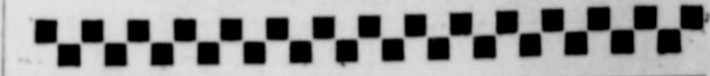


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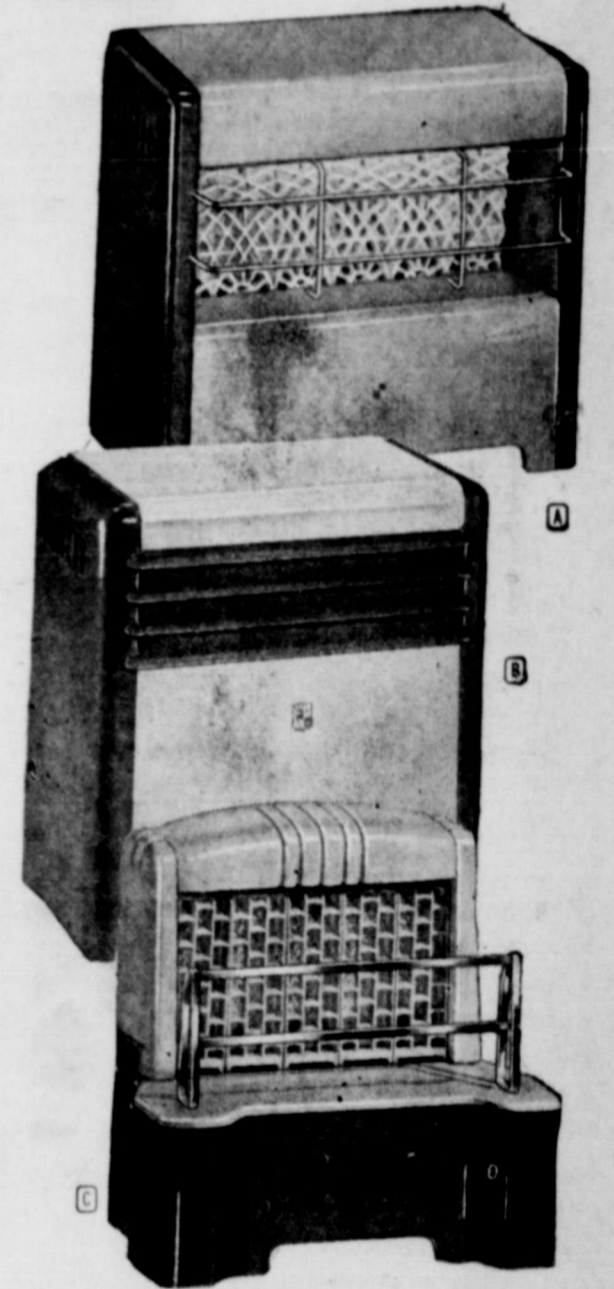

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BETTI'S BUDGET of HELPFUL HINTS

Modern mothers, who are just starting their families, certainly have the advantage over past generations. With no laundering problems to worry about, they can indulge themselves as much as they like in exquisite, dressy little clothes even for every day. Thanks to all the nylon and dacron fabrics available for children's clothes, little dresses look sweeter and fluffier and more feminine than ever. For the fluff and the ruffles and the lace and ribbons no longer mean difficult ironing. They usually mean no ironing at all—just the simplest sort of sudsing and maybe a bit of hand pressing.

Most of the utensils and tools needed to do home canning easily and economically are already in your kitchen. However, here are a few inexpensive and handy items you may not have, which would be most useful: jar lifter, funnel, ladle with lip, sieve or strainer, colander, food mill, food chopper,

large measuring cups, large trays and a wire basket.

Nearly everyone likes hamburger patties, but there are advantages, too, in serving "loose" hamburger. Scooped from a heated pan and spread on buns, it can be served quickly to many persons. Second helpings are ready immediately. Moreover, "loose" hamburger can be endowed with delectable flavors. Here's how it's made: 2 lbs. hamburger sprinkled lightly with monosodium glutamate, 8 slices, bacon cut into quarter-inch pieces, 1 medium onion (chopped fine), 1 small bunch celery (chopped), 2 cans tomato soup, 1 can water, 2 tablespoons chili powder, 1 tablespoon sugar, 1 1/2 teaspoon pepper. Fry bacon with onion in 10-inch skillet until onion is tender. Add hamburger and celery. When light brown, add the other ingredients and simmer 1 hour. For an extra flourish, slice buns and grill in 1 tablespoon garlic butter for five minutes in heated frying pan. Serve filled with loose hamburger. Suggested munchery: carrot curls sliced with a potato peeler, stuffed celery and tomato wedges.

If the bottom crust on your fruit pies turn out soggy, remember to keep a constant, even heat throughout the baking time. Pre-heat the oven to 400 degrees. Then place the pie on lowest rack. The exact baking time depends, of course, upon the kind of fruit you are using.

A box lunch is not complete without a simple dessert. Make a lunch box dessert that will also be suitable for dinner desserts. Cupcakes are a good example. Make them in small cups for the children's lunch boxes and cover with a pretty colored icing. You can use larger cups for family meals and make a special icing for dinner dessert.
