Each student was given a Junior Fire Marshal's home report to take home and fill out. Each will inspect his or her own home to check on fire hazards.

New Wells Spotted In Eastland County

A new field venture, a new location in a regular field and the completion of a well highlight oil news in Eastland County.

W. H. Green of Abilene No. 3 V. M. Smith will be a new project in Eastland County's Bankline-Owen Field five miles east of Cisco.

Slotted for 4,000 feet with rotary, it spots 330 feet from the north and 1,320 feet from the east lines of Section 60, Block 4, H&TC Survey.

Completed as a regular field producer was Bruce L. Hoover of Ranger No. 1 C. C. Harris, three miles south of Eastland in Section 28, Block 2, H&TC Survey.

Daily potential was 30 barrels of 37 gravity oil, plus 29 percent water, through a 1/2-inch choke with 240 pounds on casing and 50 pounds on tubing. Production was from 20 perforations at 1,297-1,300 feet. Casing was set at 1,318 feet, total depth. Gas-oil ratio was 520-1.

Porter and Hasner, Olney, have spotted No. 2-A Guy Parker in the Eastland County regular field, six miles south of Eastland.

Having a proposed depth of 1,500 feet with rotary, it spots 1,552 feet from the north, and 1,277 feet from the west lines of the southwest quarter in section 30, block 2, H&TC Survey.

In other area oil news: Hancock - Strawn Field five miles southeast of Wayland, Stephens County, has gained a new oiler. It is J. E. Connally, et al, of Abilene No. 1-A E. A. Hancock, Section 7, Block B, T&NO Survey.

Daily potential was 24.71 barrels of 36.5 gravity oil, flowing through a 12-64-inch choke with packer set on casing and 250 pounds pressure. Production is (Continued on Page Five)

Verdict Still Lacking In Blackwell Death

Officers left Eastland this morning for Austin where they will take organs of Mrs. Ola Faye Blackwell to the Texas Department of Public Safety laboratory for analysis. The 49-year-old Staff woman died Thursday afternoon at her home two miles southeast of Staff.

Justice Jim Boggs of Eastland, said today that he did not expect any report from the DPS laboratory until Wednesday or Thursday. He said he would not return an autopsy verdict until he had that report.

District Attorney Joe Nussle termed the action of officers as a "routine investigation." Nussle, who has been assisting Boggs and Texas Ranger Jim Riddle, explained that anytime a person dies when no physician is at hand, or poison is involved or believed to be involved, or indications point to suicide, then an inquest must be held by law.

An autopsy was performed on the dead woman last week, and final analysis of the autopsy is the reason for the delayed inquest verdict, Boggs said.

Man Killed In Train Wreck May Be Rangerite

An Associated Press release from Amarillo this morning said that the 42-year-old man killed in a train crash near that city is a Ranger man.

The AP story identified the dead man as Joe Hopper. The story did not say how the identification was made. A check with the Ranger police department and the city's two funeral homes did not clear up the situation. No Joe Hopper is listed in the Ranger city directory.

Hopper was killed when 30 cars of a Fort Worth and Denver freight train plunged down an embankment near Amarillo Monday.

Another man, William Wilson, 41, of Pueblo, Colo., was reported injured with both arms and legs fractured. Wilson told officers he and the dead man boarded the freight Sunday night in Pueblo.

The wreck tore up around 300 feet of track on a high fill about 25 miles northwest of Amarillo. Traffic was rerouted on nearby Rock Island and Santa Fe tracks.

Traffic is due to be rolling again by this afternoon.

Resident Engineer G. L. Smith of the Texas Highway Department announced Tuesday that work on Farm-Market Road 570, six miles east of Eastland east to Farm-Market Road 571 near Cheaney, a distance of approximately 7.2 miles, would begin in the near future.

Smith said work on the projects will begin as soon as final planning is completed and right-of-way secured. Smith will be in charge of the work.

First of A Series

Pro and Con of Amendment Which Would Increase Welfare Aid Given

(Editor's Note: This is the first of a series of 11 articles pertaining to the Constitutional amendments voters of this area will vote on Nov. 2. The Times is indebted to the Texas League of Women Voters for the articles.)

Proposed amendment No. one local voters will have to vote yes or no on concerns a fund increase of State Welfare.

This amendment would authorize the legislature to increase the total amount to be spent for Old Age Assistance, Aid to the Blind and Aid to Dependent Children from \$35 million per year to \$42 million, and to enact laws to make lists of recipients of aid available for inspection.

The maximum amount that may be paid out of state funds to an individual classified as the "needy aged" is limited under the State Constitution to \$20 per month and they must be actual bona fide citizens of the State of Texas. These provisions would not be changed by this amendment. The State Department of Public Welfare sets the amounts which may be paid per individual under Aid to the Blind and Aid to Dependent Children.

Increased taxes to cover this raise is a burden which should not be placed on the taxpayers at this time.

Opening the list to inspection would tend to eliminate fraudulent claimants. In states where this method is used, truly needy recipients experience no embarrassment.

Needless persons entitled to public aid should not be embarrassed by disclosure of their names. Many needy persons would not apply for aid if the rolls were open to the public.

Many of the aged now receive state benefits own property. Any new amendments should require property-owning pensioners to give the State a lien in the amount of the benefits received.

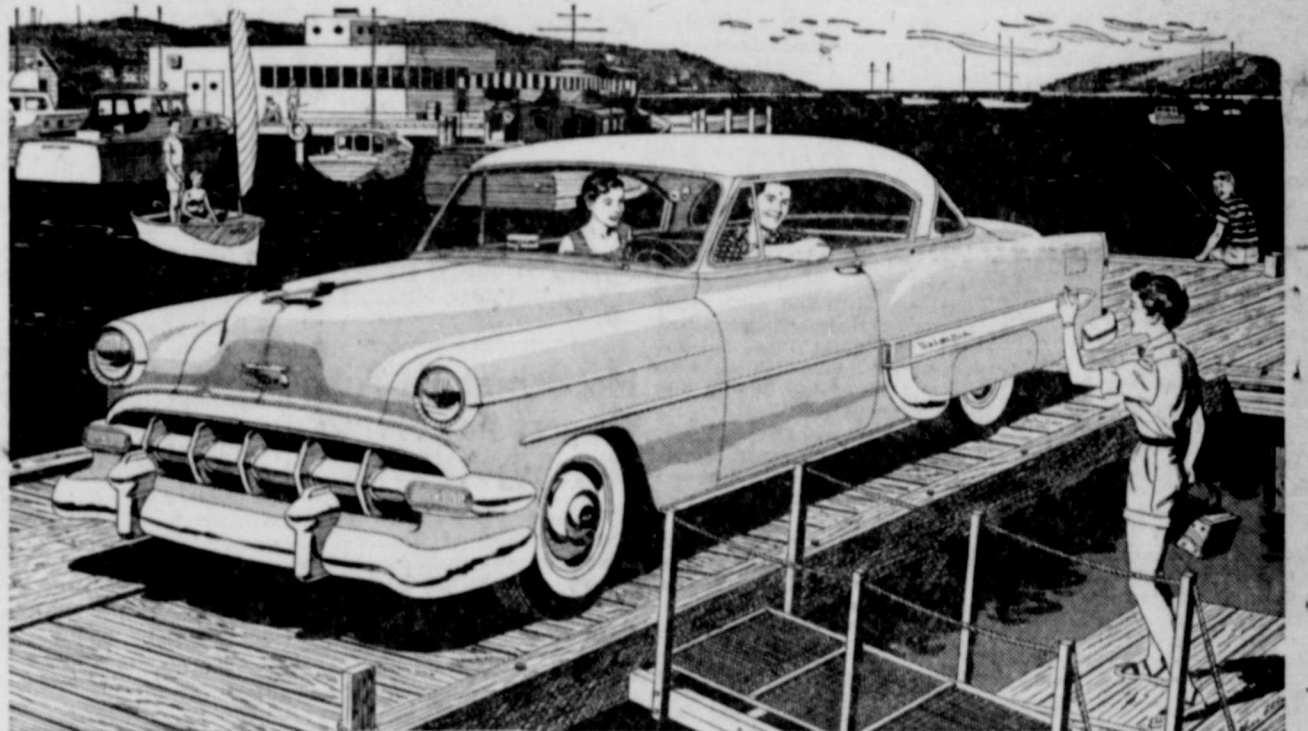

BETTI'S BUDGET of HELPFUL HINTS

It's smart planning to allow at least a month before a new permanent to get your hair in good condition. Start with a regular routine of really thorough shampoos. First, lather your hair at least twice and rinse it three times—use a little brush to scrub around your hairline where cosmetics tend to cake. And make it a habit to use your hair brush regularly every day or night for that 100 strokes. No permanent, no matter how costly or how expertly given, will look its best unless the hair itself is in prime condition.

There's an easy way to make draperies with box or French pleats. A new washable pleating tape, which can be sewn flat to any drapery fabric, is "slotted" at suitable intervals. The pleats are formed when special pins are inserted into the slots according to directions. A lock is then slipped into place over each pin to hold the pleats as firmly as though they were stitched. When it's time to launder the draperies, the pins can be unlocked and removed, and the pleats can be flattened for easy steaming and ironing.

If you have run out of ideas for the "after school cookie jar," try Snickerdoodles. The dough is made into balls and dipped in a sugar-cinnamon mixture before baking. While baking they first rise—then flatten out, giving a wrinkled appearance on top. Their crispness and sugary flavor make them a family favorite. Here's the recipe—Mix and sift two and three-fourths cups flour, one and one-half teaspoon baking powder and one-half teaspoon salt. Cream together very thoroughly one cup shortening and one and one-half cups sugar. Add two eggs—one at a time—beating well after each addition. Beat the mixture until light and fluffy. Stir in one teaspoon vanilla. Add the sifted dry ingredients to the creamed mixture and mix well. Chill the dough. Form into balls using one tablespoon dough for each. Roll balls in mixture of two tablespoons sugar and two teaspoons cinnamon. Place two inches apart on baking sheet. Bake in 375 degree F. oven eight to ten minutes.

Agricultural Census Begins This Month

COLLEGE STATION — When a stranger walks up to your farm this month, act kindly, sir, he may be a census taker.
 The Bureau of Census this month begins its 1954 Census of Agriculture and each Texas farmer will answer about 100 questions regarding their land, crops, live stock, farming methods, expenses, labor and equipment.
 Robert W. Burgess, bureau director, reports it will require 39,000 enumerators to check the more than 5,000,000 farms and ranches in the United States. And it will all be done during October and November.

After the enumeration is complete, the Bureau will total the figures and release them. It keeps individual farm's and farm's secrets by releasing only totals for a county or larger areas.
 The census taking commenced October 4 in the High Plains counties and in the citrus belt of extreme south Texas. Enumerators will begin asking questions on the Edwards Plateau October 18 and on the Rio Grande Plains October 25. The canvass of east, central and far west Texas farms will start November 3.

"The 1954 census will collect information from every farmer in the United States, make it available as totals to the public—and keep secrets of individual farms and farmers at the same time," Burgess says.
 Since 1920, an agricultural census has been taken every five years.

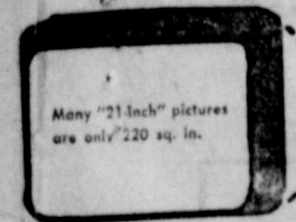

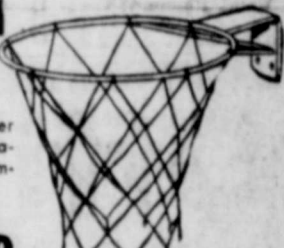

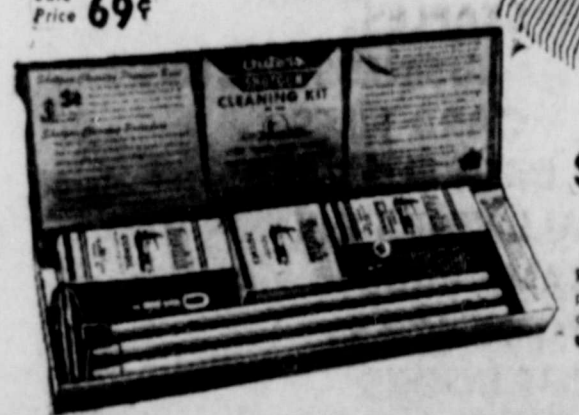
