COUNTY AGENTS REPORT SHOWS RESULTS OF WORK DURING PAST YEAR

A narrative report prepared by County Agent Raymond L. King for the Texas Extension Service gives a cross section of Agriculture and Stock farming in Castro county in 1946.

The report is quoted in part below:

4-H Club Work

Six 4-H Clubs located at Dimmitt, Nazareth, and Hart have been active. Clubs met each month including a recreational activity each month during the summer.

Two boys, Buddy Hill of Hart and Floyd Acker of Nazareth were State Contest winners and eleven county medals were won. Ten boys attended a district 4-H Club Camp at Lubbock. The camp consisted of Recreation and Educational activities.

Two boys attended a 4-H Club round-up at A. & M. College in August where some 1200 other boys and girls in the State attended.

Over 100 boys and girls and leaders attended a county-wide rally day at Dimmitt in August. A movie, swimming and picnic lunch were the feature attractions. Seventy 4-H Club boys attended a play day held in August. The day was spent in games and recreation and swimming.

Eighty 4-H Club boys and girls of Hart, their parents and guests attended the annual 4-H Club Mother-Daughter and Father-Son banquet in April. J. W. Potts, State 4-H Club Agent was principal speaker.

Two hundred and fifty 4-H Club boys, girls and parents attended a county-wide Christmas party.

Sixty-two head of Swine, 82 head of beef calves and 30 lambs were shown by 4-H Club boys at Amanillo, Fort Worth, Lubbock, Plainville and Dimmitt. The animals sold for \$29,907.13, this being \$12067.54 above top market price. The club boys won \$596.00 prize money.

175 boys were enrolled in club work and 165 completed demonstrations. Demonstrations carried and units involved were as follows: 3 boys with one acre garden, 19 with 522 acres crops, 23 with 1256 birds for poultry, 44 with 60 dairy animals, 51 with 90 head beef calves, 4 with lambs, 66 with 179 head swine, and 6 with 50 rabbits.

Wheat

Wheat is the county's most important crop. A Castro county Certified Seed Growers Association was organized for the purpose of improving wheat. Ten men were members last year and approximately 20 men have 3000 acres of wheat planted for irrigation this year.

All the wheat grown in the county last year for certification was graded No. 1. To further indicate the quality of wheat grown in Castro county a report sent out by the Tex-O-Kan flour mills showed Castro county to have 95% recommended varieties and only 5% not recommended. This was the highest percentage of any county in the panhandle.

Castro County Fair

Approximately 1500 people attended the Castro county Fair in October. Farm products, Livestock, Fancy works, canned goods and a flower show were the attractions. Flower show were the attractions.

Beef Cattle

Registered breeders in the county are striving to improve the beef cattle and 4-H Club boys are doing a good job of feeding 79 calves shown at Dimmitt averaged 1,093 pounds and brought club boys \$24,268.19.

Cattle were treated for lice and grubs by dusting and spraying with rotenone-sulphur. Approximately 25,000 head of cattle were grazed on wheat pasture.

Poultry

Poultry flocks were culled and treated for external and internal parasites. Over 1200 pounds of roosters were sold during a cull the roosters campaign.

Dairy Cattle

Dairymen of Deaf Smith, Hale, Lamb and Castro county organized the Plains Dairy Herd Improvement Association. A tester was employed and the purpose of organization is to improve the dairy industry by testing and applying better methods of dairying to each herd represented.

Approximately 50 dairy herds were tested for Bangs disease.

A total of 68 animals were entered in the 1st Castro county Dairy show held in May and 30 head of Jerseys and Milking Shorthorns were entered at the Plainview Dairy Show.

Harry Rothwell, local breeder, placed 1st with his 3 year old Milking Shorthorn and 3rd in the Production contest with his aged Milking Shorthorn cow.

Swine

Castro county Swine breeders have gained state-wide recognition for producing outstanding swine. Orders for pigs have been received from all over Texas as well as some other states. 4-H Club boys have shown the reserve animal at Amanillo and Grand Champion at both the Fort Worth and Lubbock show.

All of the six leading swine breeds can be found in the county. Twenty six 4-H Club boys are feeding 130 head of pigs for show in 1947.

Weed Eradication

Demonstrations were conducted with the use of chemicals in eradicating Johnson grass and bindweed. Favorable results were reported. 98 farmers attended a meeting on Johnson Grass eradication.

Grain Sorghums

With improved irrigation and combine type of grain sorghums a larger acreage was planted than before. Approximately 1000 acres were planted to Cody Kafir. Farmers realize the value of planting good seed.

Potatoes

Raising of potatoes as commercial crop is rapidly becoming more important to Castro county irrigation farmers. Some 4000 acres of potatoes were harvested last year with good yields.

Rodent Control

Approximately 400 pounds of poison grain for the control and eradication of prairie dogs was placed with Castro county farmers.

IRRIGATION

Irrigation is increasing with over a hundred wells being dug during the past year. Irrigation is looked on as an insurance proposition by many farmers that will enable them to plan a balanced livestock program.

World War Vets Must File Claims Before Feb. 10

Many survivors of World War II veterans will lose their rights to full retroactive payments as provided for in a recent amendment to the Social Security Act if claims are not filed before the 10th of next month.

J. R. Sanderson, Manager of the Amarillo Social Security Field Office, urges the survivors of deceased World War II veterans to contact his office immediately if they believe payments under the new legislation may be possible. This legislation provided that if a veteran died within 3 years of his discharge, his survivors would be entitled to Old-Age and Survivors Insurance payments if they were not receiving, or not entitled to receive, Veterans Administrative payments.

In cases where veterans died before the enactment of the new amendment, August 10, 1946, the measure provides for monthly benefits retroactive to the date of death if the survivors file their benefit claims before February 10, 1947. These payments cannot be retroactive for more than the usual 3 months if claims are filed after February 10.

Dr. Cox Urges Health Check-Up

Austin, Texas, Jan. 9.—Dr. Geo. W. Cox, State Health Officer, stated today that he believed it would be a worthwhile idea for every Texan to take a health inventory at the beginning of the New Year.

"At the beginning of a New Year, we should give some thought to the mistakes we have made during the past year, and a great deal of thought to planning some way of improving our health conditions during 1947," Dr. Cox said.

"The American people are very fortunate. We have scientific knowledge of communicable diseases; we have already made important conquests in the warfare against infectious diseases. We have material wealth to make knowledge work; we have capable leaders in the sciences of life processes who see great opportunities for public good in health measures that unite effectively the resources of medicine, education, finance, and government," Dr. Cox asserted.

Every Texan should make a New Year's resolution to practice better personal, home, and community sanitation, with a view to elevating the health level in every community, and in so doing create better health conditions throughout the State.

The State Health Department, according to Dr. Cox is confident that with national health being stressed as one of our nations most important problems, 1947 will see great strides made in the upbuilding of public health on a national scale.

Texas Teacher Problem Aired

(Article I.)

Since 1941, 40% of the teachers of Texas have resigned their jobs. In the United States, 350,000 teachers have done the same thing. The main reason is poor pay. Results: A grave educational problem and one out of six of our teachers sub-standard. During the school year 1945-46, 4,700 teachers in Texas drew less than \$1200 per year. Even though the withholding tax on this salary was very small—most all of these teachers are members of the Teacher Retirement System of Texas and contributed 5% of their salaries because of this membership. Hence, they had a take-home pay of less than what would be considered necessary to provide a bare subsistence.

Is this as it should be? Most everyone will tell you that it is not and that something must be done to remedy the situation.

A study of the Constitution of public schools in Texas will convince any citizen of the gravity of our educational problems. Such is the purpose of the series of articles to follow.

A study of the Constitution of Texas will show that it was the intention of the framers of our organic law that the state of Texas should provide for a system of public education in keeping with the needs of the citizenship. Article VII, Section 1 reads: "A general diffusion of knowledge being essential to the preservation of the liberties and rights of the people, it shall be the duty of the Legislature of the State to establish and make suitable provision for the support and maintenance of an efficient system of public free schools."

In order to lay the foundation for carrying out this section of the state constitution, there was created a Permanent Free School Fund by using the vast public domain of the state for this purpose. The Permanent Fund now aggregates more than \$100,000,000. The interest from the investment of this fund is allocated to the Available School Fund, and amounted to \$2,770,685.19 for the school year 1945-46.

The Constitution also provided for the creation of County Permanent School Funds by assigning to each county some 17,000 acres of land from the public domain. The principal of the 238 county Permanent Funds is approximately \$11,000,000 and provided an income of \$500,000 last year.

The Constitution also created the Available School Fund and provided that not less than "one-fourth of the revenue derived from state occupation taxes..." one dollar of the poll tax and an ad valorem tax not to exceed thirty-five cents on the \$100 of property valuation should be allocated to the Available Fund to be distributed annually for the support of the schools.

The available fund is distributed annually on a per capita basis to approximately 1,500,000 children between the ages of 6 and 18.

Significant is the fact that no express limitation is placed in the Constitution on the powers of the legislature to levy taxes or make additional appropriations for the support of the public schools or for the establishment and maintenance of institutions of higher learning.

Has the state of Texas and local school districts made suitable provision for the education of the 1,500,000 children of school age in Texas? This will be the subject of succeeding articles in this series.

Reports Bangs Testing

A report from Dr. Brown, veterinarian from Tullia, who tested 88 cows in the county last week showed 17% of those tested were affected by the disease.

This is a large percent according to D. L. King, county agent, and those who have not had their cows tested should do so. Dr. Brown will be in the county again Thursday, January 30 and anyone wishing cows tested should notify the county agent. This test or the government test is available through the county agent's office.

During the program of entertainment, a panel discussion on "Rural Life" was held. Those taking part in the discussion of this timely subject were Mr. Frank Anen, Mrs. Ed Brockman, Mr. Florence Albracht, Mrs. Joe Birkenfeld, and the County 4-H Agent, Mr. King. The main theme of this program was the importance of keeping the young people on the farms and the necessity and advantages of the ownership of the land of those dwelling upon it.

Another interesting part of the meeting was the display of the games and equipment recently purchased by the organization for the local schools. The fifth and sixth grades won the attendance prize. The gathering closed with the serving of cake and coffee in the school cafeteria to those present.

Dairy Check-Up Pointers Given

Here are five dairying check points for this month from D. L. King, County Agent.

Number one—take an inventory of your dairy business. List the things that cut down your profits last year, and make plans to correct as many of these things as possible.

Next—bear down on feeding roughage from now until grass comes on again. Feed all the hay and silage your cows will clean up.

Number three—keep ice out of the dairy cow's drinking water, so they'll drink all the water they need. The average cow needs about a hundred pounds of water a day. And good cows—high producers—need even more than that.

Fourth—cattle lice are due to start causing trouble soon. Don't let those lice cause losses in live weight and milk—you can control them by treating with a mixture of one pound of five percent rotenone and two pounds such as prophylite or sulphur. This mixture will knock out the grubs, too.

And here's something to watch or all through the year. Keep an eye out for pieces of baling wire, nails and other "hardware" in feed. These things cause the death of many dairy cows each year.

GUNS AT SCHOOL

EDITOR'S NOTE—The following statement was submitted to the News for publication to clarify erroneous reports being circulated concerning guns at school:

"Due to the fact that there has been some unfounded gossip concerning the carrying of guns to Dimmitt High School, the following report is in order:

There have been a sum total of five guns brought to the school premises, three of which were entirely incapable of being fired. One of these three guns was an 1890 Belgian 44 which perhaps had not been fired in the last thirty years. The other two were just as useless.

It is true that two guns which could be fired (when shells can be found) were brought to school and two shots were fired at a piece of tin on the prairie west of the High School Building. With the exception of this firing of two shots, the guns were dismantled at all times and were brought to school only one day. The boys who had the guns were talked to by the administration the day following the shooting of the shells, and so far as is known there have been no other carrying of guns to school before or since.

The administration and teachers of the school had no knowledge whatever about any guns being at school until the report came to the office about the shots being fired. This is regrettable by all, but more regrettable that the facts have been tampered with by unformed people until some have become somewhat alarmed.

Wheat Poison Research Program in Progress

Work is progressing rapidly in regard to the wheat poisoning research program reported Newton Harrell, Chairman of Claude, Texas in a letter to R. L. King, county agent this week.

The work is under direction of Dr. Harold Redmond and Mr. Harrell's letter is as follows:

"Dr. Redmond's research work includes analyzing the blood from several groups of cattle before they are put on wheat and every thirty days thereafter. He finds the blood becomes increasingly deficient in two things necessary for healthy cattle. Perhaps one of his outstanding findings up to this time resulted from confining rabbits on wheat pasture. The rabbits all died with all indications of "Wheat Poisoning." This interesting phase of the work holds much promise and merits immediate support.

RABBITS ARE CHEAPER THAN CATTLE. Dr. Redmond paid for the rabbits himself. If he had money for more rabbits and other incidental expenses he might make a lot of progress in the next few weeks.

New Dental Clinic Opened At Littlefield

Drs. Ira E. Woods and B. W. Armistead, Littlefield optometrists, will conduct the formal opening of their new two-story office building Saturday, Jan. 25.

Drs. Woods and Armistead have issued invitations to the general public throughout the plains area to inspect the establishment between the hours of 9 a. m. and 5 p. m.

The entire staff will be available to show visitors through the various offices and laboratories, explaining the functions of the different departments.

Drs. Woods and Armistead only recently moved into their modern building which houses their offices and laboratory in one of the most complete optometric establishments to be found in the entire Southwest. The building, one of the show-places of Littlefield, is located at 406 LFD Drive, one block east of the First National Bank.

Visitors attending the formal opening will be shown through the following departments: A semi-circular reception room, embodying a modern theme of simplicity and attractiveness of decorations and furnishings; individual offices for Drs. Woods and Armistead; two refracting rooms (examining rooms); secretary's and business offices; a laboratory occupying two rooms with an additional unit as a stock room; and the lounge.

Of particular interest to visitors inspecting the optometric establishment will be the modern laboratory where they see equipment to completely grind and carry prescriptions for glasses through the entire process.

For Drs. Woods and Armistead, who have an extensive practice throughout the plains area and eastern New Mexico, the new office building is a culmination of several years of planning, and a full year of actual construction.

Dr. Woods has been practicing optometry in Littlefield for the past 16 years. Dr. Armistead became associated with Dr. Woods in practice in 1940, re-joining the firm several months ago after an absence of almost four years, during which time he served in the armed forces.

Planning A New Home?

If you are ready to build a new home every precaution should be taken in the planning, selection of materials and workmanship.

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METHOD DEVISED FOR WORMING HOGS

A new method of worming hogs has been devised by the Bureau of Animal Industry according to R. L. King, county agent. This is what the hog raiser has been wanting. Every hog raiser knows that round worms are the worst handicap in the hog business. They not only cause the death of a lot of pigs, they cause a loss in the feed lot. Wormy pigs consume too much feed to make a pound of gain.

The new method of worming pigs is the use of sodium flouride. The following is listed by the county agent:

In using sodium flouride for worming pigs, mix one level teaspoon of sodium flouride with each pound of ground dry feed. A pig will eat about one pound of this mixture in one day. Repeat the treatment the next day for pigs weighing under 60 pounds. For heavier pigs, give each pig one pound of the above mixture per day for three consecutive days. The day before beginning the treatment feed only about a half ration so the pigs will be hungry the next day when the treatment starts.

The sodium flouride will not mix with whole grain so therefore it is necessary to grind the grain.

A precaution stressed is that sodium flouride is poisonous. Containers should be labeled and stored out of reach of children, household pets and individuals who might misuse it.

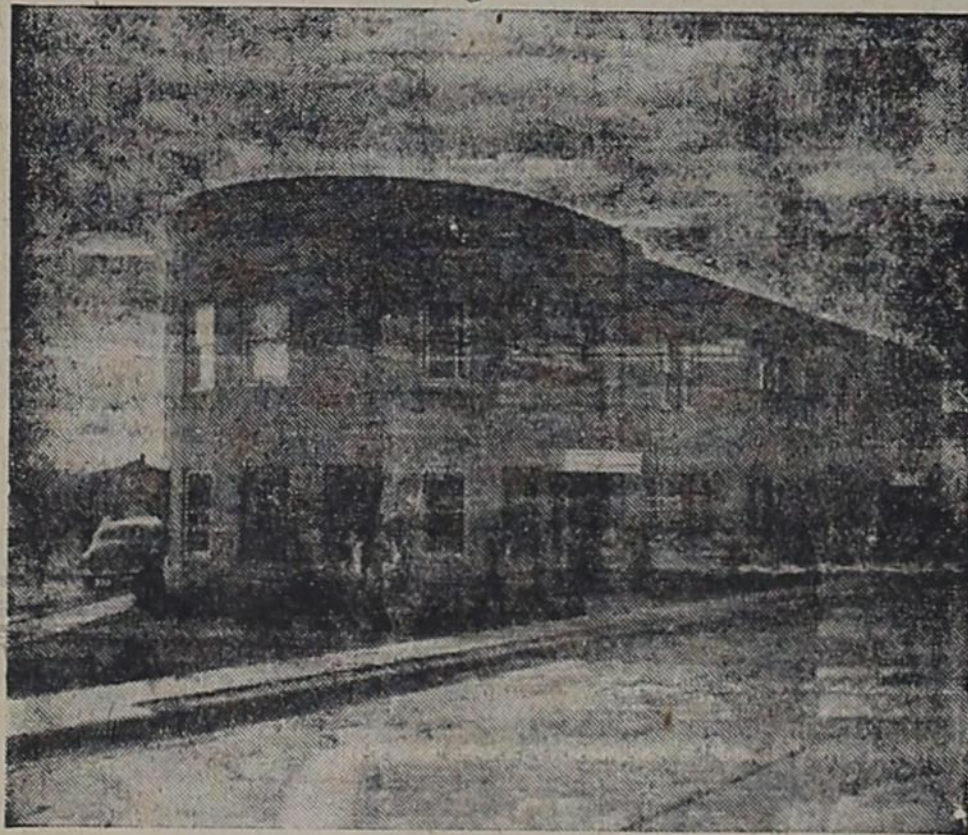

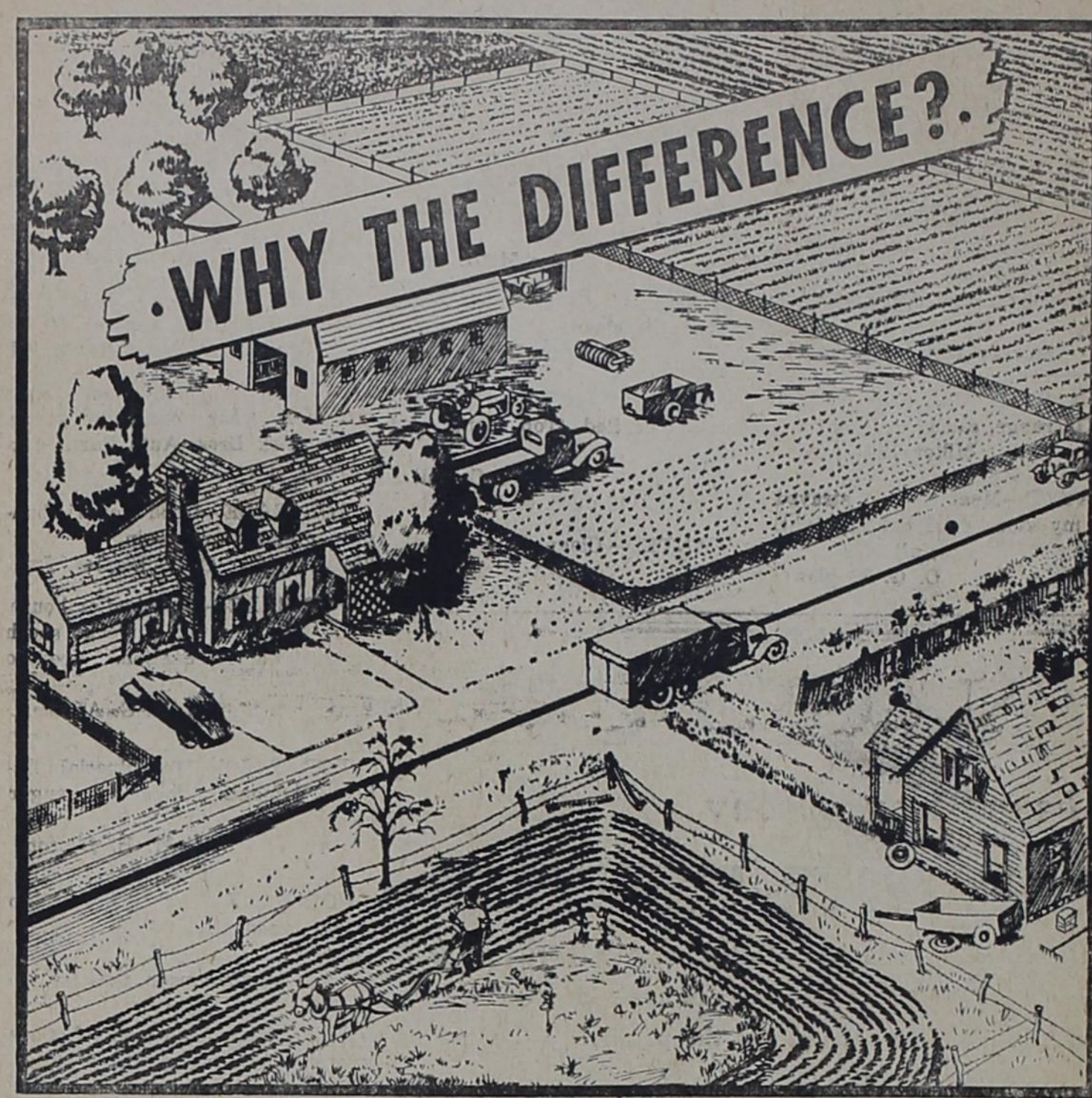
