NOTICE OF SPECIAL ELECTION TO BE HELD IN THE CITY OF RANGER, ON DECEMBER 4, 1954

Notice is hereby given to the qualified voters of the City of Ranger that a special election will be held in the City of Ranger at the City Hall on December 4, 1954, as provided for in the following ordinance passed by the City Commission on November 2, 1954.

An ordinance providing for the submission to the qualified voters of the City of Ranger, Texas, of a certain amendment to the Charter of said City to be voted on at a Special Election to be held in said City on December 4, 1954. Be it ordained by the City Commission of the City of Ranger:

That there shall be submitted to the qualified voters of the City of Ranger at a special election to be held in the City of Ranger on December 4, 1954, the following proposed amendment to the present charter of said City of Ranger:

PROPOSED AMENDMENT: 1. That Sections Two, Eight, and Nine, all of Article V of said Charter of the City of Ranger be so amended to hereafter read as follows:

"Section 2 — Term of Office: The Mayor and each Commissioner shall serve as follows:

Beginning in the year 1955 the Mayor and Commissioners of Places Two and four shall serve for a term of two (2) years and until his successor is elected and qualified, unless sooner removed from office as herein provided.

Beginning in the year 1955 the Commissioners of Places One and Three shall serve as follows:

For one year beginning with the 1955 term, and thereafter beginning with the 1956 term for two years; and until his successor is elected and qualified, unless sooner removed from office as herein provided."

"Section 8 — Election Day: The regular municipal elections of the City of Ranger shall be held on the first Tuesday in April in the year 1955, and on said first Tuesday in April every year thereafter."

"Section 9 — Election, Laws Controlling: All elections provided for in this Chapter, except the regular election held on the first Tuesday of April, 1955, and on said day every year thereafter shall be called special elections, and all elections shall be conducted and results canvassed and announced by the election authorities prescribed by the Election Code of the State of Texas, and said Election Code shall control in all municipal elections, except as otherwise herein provided."

2. That all parts of the existing city charter of the City of Ranger in conflict herewith, and especially Sections 2, 8, and 9, all of Article V, as the same now exist, are hereby repealed and said Sections 2, 8, and 9 of Article V, as the same herein read, be substituted therefor.

Management Big Role In Winter Grazing Results

COLLEGE STATION — Management plays a big role in the success of small grains and annual clovers for winter grazing.

Don't turn in the livestock until the new plants have at least six inches growth, says E. M. Trew, extension pasture specialist. This allows the development of a hardy root system and plants aren't easily pulled up by grazing animals.

Rotation grazing offers the most efficient use of forage produced by fast growing small grains and legumes. With a rotation system fields are divided into smaller blocks by portable fences. When the animals are turned in, the plants are grazed down rapidly and evenly, moved to another pasture, and the first plants make new growth, explains Trew. He recommends portable fencing because it is easy to move and is inexpensive.

If grazing gets too far ahead of livestock, mow the excess to prevent early booting. If allowed to make too much growth, the specialist says small grains are more susceptible to winter killing.

Remove livestock from grazing which later will be harvested before the plants start to "joint." Later grazing will reduce grain yields.

Winter grazing usually is very succulent and a little dry hay should be proved to help balance the diets of livestock.

Golden Topaz Is November Birthstone

November's birthstone, the golden topaz, is a clear, glowing emblem of fidelity and true friendship. Sharing this month's birthstone are distinguished persons from both past and present — poet Robert Louis Stevenson, explorer and colonizer Daniel Boone, and beloved New England author Louisa May Alcott. Also celebrating November birthdays are England's Prime Minister Sir Winston Churchill, pianist Jose Turbi, baseball champion Joe Di Maggio and Symphonic Conductor Eugene Ormandy.

The word "topaz" comes from the name of an island in the Red Sea called Topazos, meaning "to seek." The ancients found certain yellow-green stones on this island and later all yellow stones were known by the same name—topaz. Today most of the stones the jeweler knows as topaz actually are members of the quartz family, according to the Jewelry Council.

Chemically, this stone is a combination of oxygen and silicon and the cause of its color is unknown. It is found in six-sided crystals, most of which come from Brazil. Some call the stone "citrine," topaz quartz or quartz topaz. Rare "precious topaz" is different chemically from the quartz variety and has been found in several colors. There is blue and pink topaz, but the golden-brown variety is best known.

Quartz topaz ranges in color from the palest yellow to deep cherry brown. Adaptable to many types of jewelry designs for both men and women, the topaz is particularly effective when set in modern multi-colored gold mountings. A handsome ring stone, it can be carved into cameos and intaglios. Combinations of two shades are particularly effective.

Gas Poisoning Threat With Winter Coming

AUSTIN — The cold winds of winter will whip up a new threat to Texans' safety.

The threat comes from carbon monoxide, which, Dr. Henry A. Helle, State Health Officer, characterizes as being invisible, odorless, and tasteless — but deadly.

As cold weather draws near, the danger of carbon monoxide in the home or garage increases. Many people throughout the state are lighting poorly or faulty ventilated heaters and furnaces in their homes or running their cars in closed garages. Closed houses keep the cold out and the deadly fumes in. A few people live to tell about it because someone found them before it was too late.

The burning of any fuel that contains carbon may produce carbon monoxide. This is true of coal, coke, wood, oil, kerosene, gasoline and such gaseous fuels as natural or manufactured gas. Last year 7 Texans died of carbon monoxide poisoning, two of them in automobiles.

All heating equipment should be

vented to a flue. Keep all rooms ventilated. Do not turn the heater higher than it was intended to run. Never leave gas heating appliances burning while you and your family are asleep. Regulate adjustable air-mixing valves so that enough air is supplied to insure complete combustion of the gas. If a person is overcome by carbon monoxide they should first be removed to fresh air. In addition open windows and turn off the gas in the room. If the victim has stopped breathing, administer artificial respiration and if possible an inhalator should be used to administer oxygen. Keep the patient warm and lying down until a doctor comes.

List Prices On New Pontiacs Are Announced

List prices on the new 1955 Pontiacs were announced today by Jack Muirhead, owner of Muirhead Motors.

The list prices were lowered on two Catalina models and raised moderately on other models. On the two Catalina models, available in the Star Chief and 870 series, which are expected to represent 40 per cent of total production, list prices were reduced \$51. Prices on the completely redesigned station wagon were increased \$24. All other models which also feature the 180 horsepower Strato-Streak V-8 engine and panoramic styling were increased \$59.

In addition, Cozby announced that Pontiac's power steering, which was reduced in price by \$40 last year, will be cut an additional \$25 on 1955 models for a new low price of \$109. All other accessories remain approximately the same.

All prices announced today by Pontiac include the new General Motors freight and price adjustments which were announced Tuesday. For Pontiac the maximum charge for freight in areas 1200 miles or more from Pontiac will average \$162, a substantial reduction in some areas over previous freight charges. This, of course, will result in additional savings to many customers in those distant areas.

"The 109 new features built into the 1955 models represent Pontiac's long established policy of building greater dollar value into every new car while maintaining prices well within the reach of the American buying public," Cozby said.

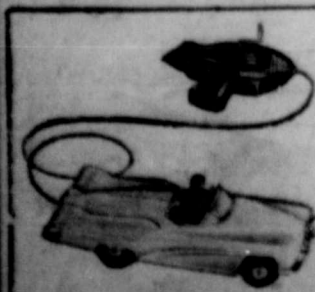

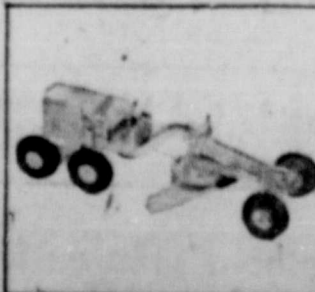
