## Farm Bureau To Air Surplus And Acreage Plan At Conference

A national farm program designed to eliminate surpluses and discriminatory acreage controls will be recommended to the American Farm Bureau Federation, according to A. Z. Myrick, of Ciesco, president of the Eastland County Farm Bureau.

Under the Texas plan, acreage control would be set up on the basis of a farm's total tillable acreage. The present law places controls on the individual commodities.

### Farm Magazine Tells How To Get Better Eggs

People at breakfast are pernickety about the eggs they eat. If one spreads out in the skillet or is a little off-flavor, they mutter about "rotten eggs."

In its October issue, Capper's Farmers said egg producers "can take advantage of this fussiness" to build a more profitable market. Nearly every community in the Midwest is short of high-quality eggs the greater part of the year.

The farm magazine cited J. T. Mozier, Lincoln county, Missouri, who sells half the eggs from 1,100 hens to "particular people" who are willing to drive to his farm to get them.

Another Mozier outlet is a retail route on which he sells both milk and eggs. At times his customers pay twice the price of nest-run eggs. They want quality and he gives it to them.

If you don't care to operate a retail route, or sell at your door, said the farm magazine, it isn't to find larger users who will take all your eggs.

Mrs. Rudolph Krasny, Shawnee county, Kansas sells eggs from 5,600 hens to restaurants, hospitals, schools, and elite grocery stores. Her market pays \$13,000 to \$14,000 more a year than if she sold through regular market channels.

The customers like the eggs she produces, and there are good reasons. She follows all the rules for keeping eggs fresh, from the time they're laid till they reach the customer's storage.

Her system includes: (1) gathering eggs often, (2) cooling them promptly, (3) cleaning the dirty ones, (4) grading them and (5) storing in a cool-damp place.

These precautions enabled Mrs. Krasny to get 44 to 50 cents for her grade-A large eggs last summer when nest-run, farm-handled eggs were selling throughout the middle west at 15 to 23 cents.

BETTI'S BUDGET of HELPFUL HINTS

In the preparation of leafy vegetables, to make certain they are clean and free of insects, use salt water to draw out dirt, and any insects which may be lurking deep among the leaves.

Another salt hint for the busy housewife speeds double boiler cooking. Add salt to the water in the outside container. The water heats quicker, and the foods in the inner pan cook faster with this method.

If you're having roast duck instead of turkey for your Thanksgiving dinner this year, add a festive touch by arranging canned whole crabapples around the serving dish when you bring the duck to the table. The syrup from the crabapples can be used for basting the duck while it's in the oven.

Knit dresses are high style again this year, with elaborate accessories for "dress-up" occasions. Read the manufacturer's label carefully before laundering these garments. It's safe to wash in lukewarm mild soapsuds if it's wool, and hotter suds if it's cotton or nylon. Some even can go into the washing machine, provided you put the dress into a mesh bag first.

Sour cream, whether you bought it or let it get that way, is not to be used just over raw vegetables. Fold a little ino salad dressings. Float a little ino top of soups. Mix a lot into gravy. Pour gobs of it over this egg panakes filled with applesauce.

For something a little different try using a cup of rice, which has been first toasted and then boiled, in your turkey dressing instead of the cornbread. The

grains of rice have a delicious nutty flavor that's just right with turkey.

Handy travel companion is a new drying rack that folds up like an umbrella and slips right into your suitcase. Made of metal, it weighs only thirty ounces, and has six drying arms when opened. A whole suitcase full of lingerie can be sused and dried conveniently wherever you happen to stop off.

Just 'cause we can get a turkey today without the trials of being shot at — is no reason for us to ever forget the true purpose of Thanksgiving Day. Let's remember to take time out from our fancy fixin's that day to give special thanks for all our blessings.

**Raisin-Pecan Timbales With Hot Lemon Sauce**

You'll want to show off these dessert timbales because they look so clever with the bits of toasted pecans and plump raisins in beautiful color contrast to the snowy white timbales. The lemon sauce is easy to make and oh, so pretty, served hot over the Raisin-Pecan Timbales.

- Ingredients for Lemon Sauce:**  
 1 cup beet or cane sugar  
 2 tablespoons cornstarch  
 1/4 teaspoon salt  
 1 1/2 cups boiling water  
 3 tablespoons lemon juice  
 2 teaspoons grated lemon rind
- Ingredients for Timbales:**  
 2 cups water  
 1 teaspoon salt  
 1 cup uncooked white rice  
 1/2 cup beet or cane sugar  
 1/2 cup cooked raisins  
 1/2 cup coarsely chopped toasted pecans  
 1/2 pt. (1 cup) chilled whipping cream  
 1/4 teaspoon vanilla

**Method for Making Timbales:** Put the water, salt and rice into a 2-quart saucepan and bring to a vigorous boil. Turn the heat as low as possible. Cover and leave over this low heat for 14 minutes. Turn the heat off. Leave lid on for 19 minutes. Stir the sugar into the hot rice. Chill the rice. Fold in the raisins and the pecans. It is important that the pecans are toasted. Do this by placing the pecans on a greased shallow pan in a 350° oven for 19 minutes, or until browned. Whip the cream and stir in the vanilla. Fold the whipped cream into the chilled rice mixture.

Use a wet custard cup for molding the timbales. Press the rice into the custard cup and then unmold by running a knife around the edge of the custard cup and shaking out the timbales. Cover and store in the refrigerator until time to serve. To serve, garnish the top of each timbale with a toasted pecan and serve with the hot lemon sauce.

This recipe makes 6 timbales if a custard cup holding 2-3 of a cup is used for molding.

**Method for Making the Lemon Sauce:** Mix together the sugar, cornstarch and salt in a saucepan. Slowly stir in the boiling water. Cook over a medium heat stirring constantly, until clear and thick. Stir in the lemon juice and lemon rind. If desired, color with yellow food coloring. Serve hot over the Raisin-Pecan Timbales.

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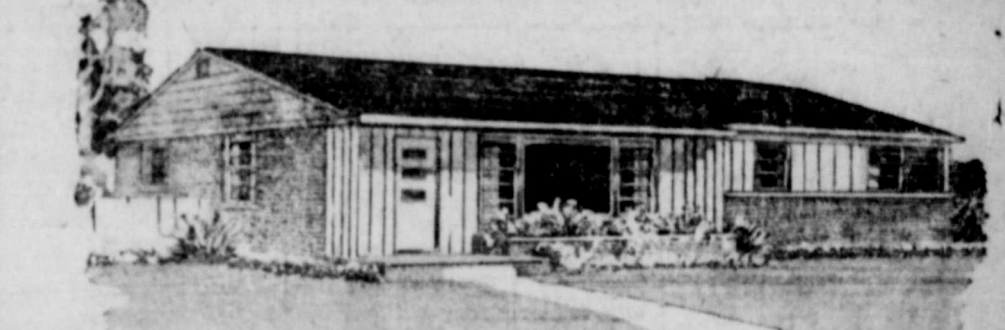
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
