Ranger High School Joins Search For The All-American Homemaker

The All-American Homemaker of Tomorrow may be a student of Ranger High School. The girl among the seniors scheduled to graduate in the spring who receives the highest score in a written examination based on homemaking knowledge and aptitude will be Ranger High School's Homemaker of Tomorrow. She will represent them in the state contest where she will compete for a college scholarship of at least \$1,500 and possibly \$5,000, a trip to historical American shrines and the biggest award of all, the opportunity to become the Betty Crocker All-American Homemaker of Tomorrow.

There will be fun and prizes right from the beginning of this project which General Mills has sponsored to focus public attention on what the school is doing to prepare our young women for the future and to demonstrate how homemaking can be as rewarding and glamorous as any other career.

Participants will take a 50-minute examination which will be given simultaneously in all schools Jan. 12. This examination will be graded by Science Research Associates of Chicago.

The state winner will receive a \$1,500 scholarship, a golden jeweled pin, a complete set of the Encyclopedia Britannica for her

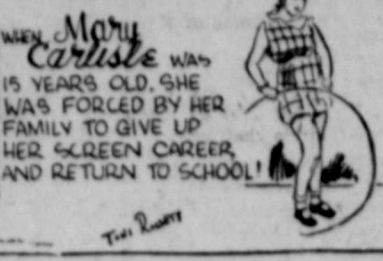

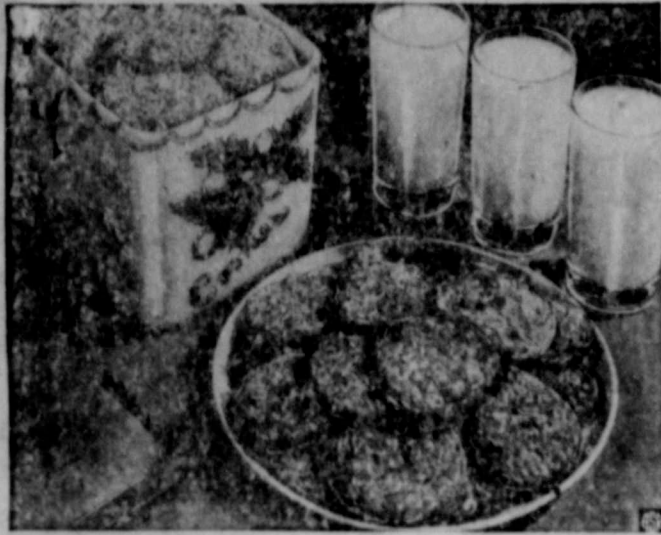

- 1 tablespoon grated lemon rind
- 3 tablespoons lemon juice

Waterfowl Talks Being Readied In Washington

AUSTIN — As the smoke begins clearing away from the 1954 waterfowl season, talks are being readied in Washington looking ahead to future harvests.

And the Executive Secretary of the Texas Game and Fish Commission will take part in Capitol discussions Jan. 13 and 14 which will be conducted by the United States Fish and Wildlife Service.

The Executive Secretary will represent, among other agencies, the International Association of Game, Fish and Conservation Commissioners, of which he is president.

The Washington session will be presided over by John Farley, chief of the Fish and Wildlife Service.

The Executive Secretary said a prominent part in the two-day program will be taken by the representatives of the different flyways. The flyway contributions to the affair will be funneled through the National Flyway Council, of which the Executive Secretary is a former chairman.

"The Washington conference is another one in the series to coordinate the efforts of the State, National and International agencies toward refining waterfowl management procedures," said the Executive Secretary.

"Plans already laid at previous sessions, since the flyway council program was inaugurated, are expected to be broadened. And we will go ahead in the effort to put the states' effort behind the Federal program. Thus manpower and know-how all along the line will be harnessed up to get the job done."

The Executive Secretary said the comparatively new joint program between the Federal agency and the state groups, as combined in the Flyway Councils, already has shown progress through standardized procedures and, in some cases, improved regulations.

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Prices Expected To Remain About Same For Feeds

Livestock feeds and hays in 1955 are expected to cost Texas farmers about the same as 1954.

Prices of high protein feeds will probably hold steady and the cost of cottonseed meal probably will rise this winter and continue high into 1955, predicts John G. McHoney, extension agricultural economist of College Station. A rather marked difference in prices of individual feeds is on the '55 horizon.

By individual feeds the economist sees it this way: Shipments of hay to Texas will continue for the duration of the drought. Hay

supplies for the nation as a whole are above last year. But supplies in the Southwest are very short.

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Flood, Epidemics Plague Texas Health Picture

AUSTIN — A flood, two epidemics, and a bad polio season marred the public health picture in Texas during 1954, a review of health department activity shows.

In late June the Rio Grande, maddened by 1 to 20 inch rains, ran wild through five border counties. The highest flood crests in the river's history inundated vulnerable water treatment plants, increasing the danger of water-borne disease outbreaks. Public health engineers put plants back into operation within nine days. This, and emergency vaccination programs, forestalled a crisis.

In August an epidemic of mosquito-borne encephalitis struck hundreds of victims in Hidalgo County. State Health Department laboratory experts identified the cause as Saint Louis virus, which had never before occurred in epidemic form in this area.

Psittacosis in isolated flocks of turkeys plagued health officials all spring and summer. The first outbreak 48 employees of a Corsicana packing plant in May. Other cases cropped up in scattered areas, but the disease was finally smothered by a tight program of flock sanitation.

The year just past was both disheartening and encouraging concerning polio. It was disheartening because 3107 cases made 1954 the second worst polio year in state history; encouraging because of the high hopes held for the success of the Salk vaccine field trials of last spring.

Some 35,000 Texas second-graders took part in the field trials, and state and county health officials since then have been quietly collecting blood samples and recording data which must be analyzed before the true significance of the vaccine will be known. Results will be announced next spring.

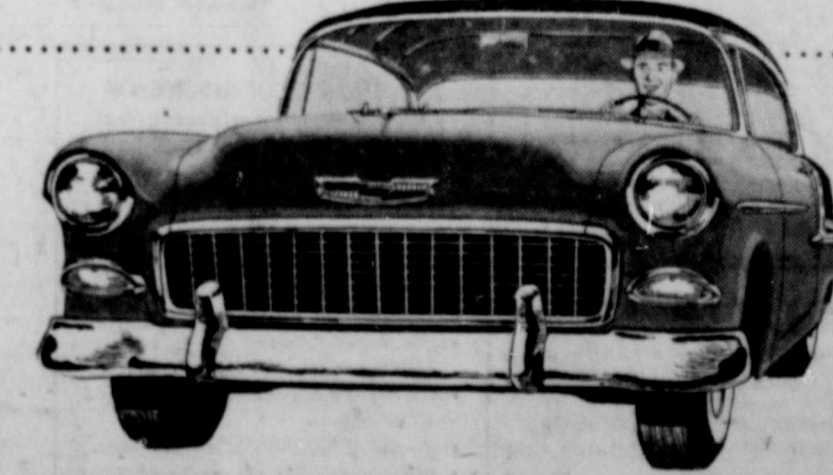
