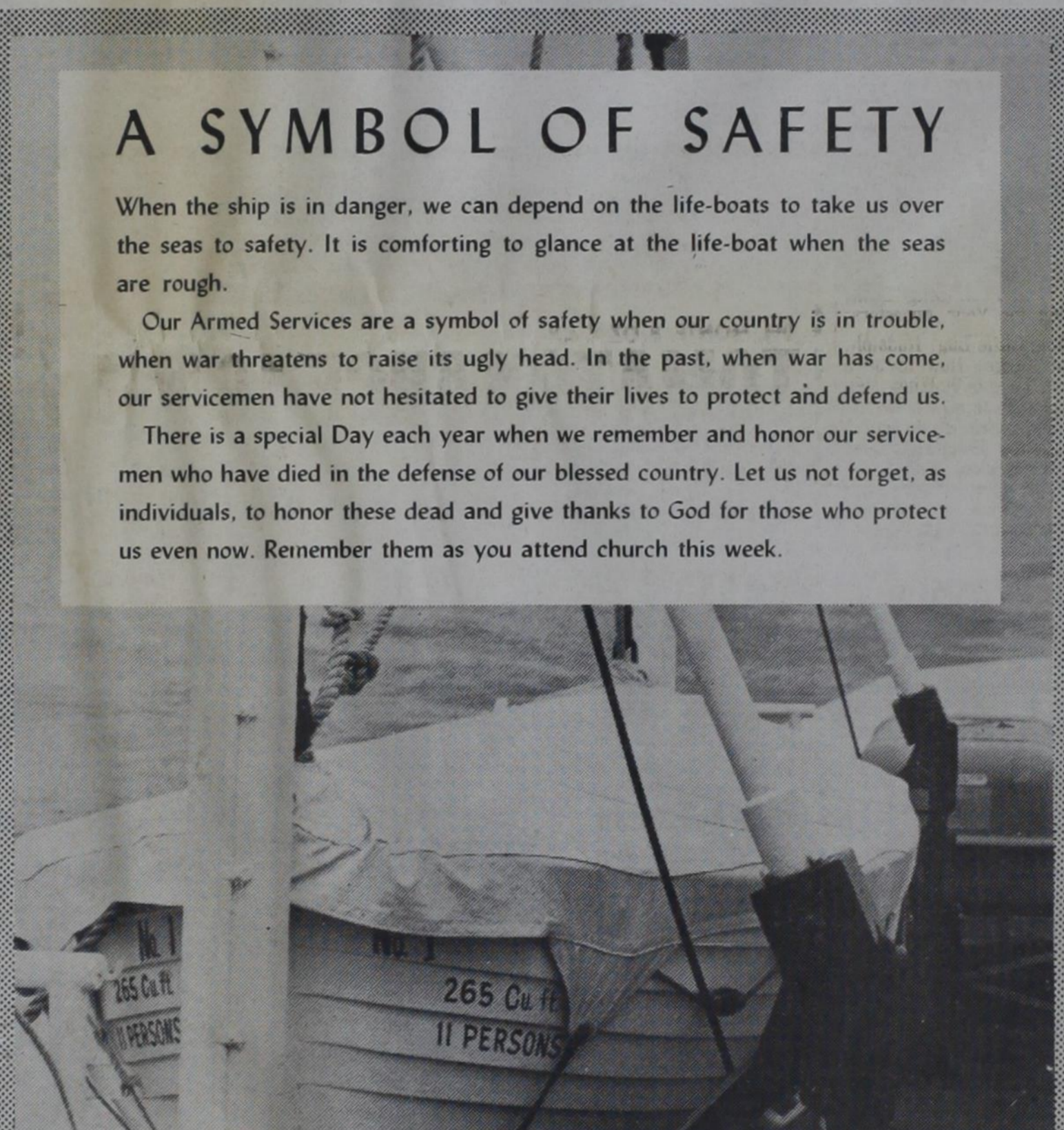



A Sense of Proportion

It is probably no new idea to observe that Americans are at times most paradoxical.

In far off Southeastern Asia, in an attempt to halt communist aggression, a bomb falls that destroys a levee which in turn destroys some rice paddies upon which 50 or 60 families depend for a livelihood.

This is enough to cause demonstrations and parades.

Yet, some 15,000 longshoremen recently destroyed the jobs of an unknown number of people in a dispute which was largely created by friction between two unions.

A case in point in the files of the National Federation of Independent Business comes from the state of Minnesota.

Paradoxically, political leaders in this state usually stand in the front ranks of those that decry any attempt to prevent destruction of American business and jobs by curbing the power of organized labor to disrupt the economy.

In this particular case, there was a manufacturer of costume jewelry, gifts and kindred items which had been established for many years. Unfortunately, it had to depend on imports for raw materials.

When the Pacific Coast longshore strike tied up all shipping for close to four months, the raw materials could not be obtained. And because the goods could not be manufactured, sales could not be made, and
