

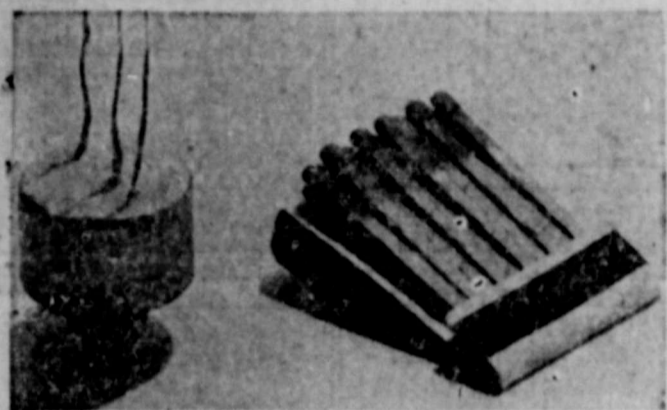

Easter showers looked promising here as heavy clouds poured 29 of an inch on this drought-stricken area Friday.

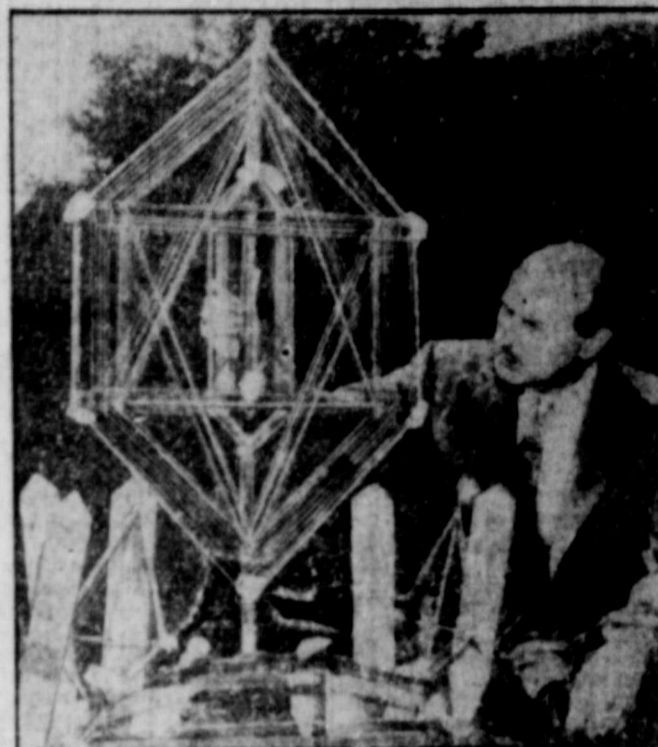
Moist rains in the state were reported from West- and Central Texas points.

Neighboring Breckenridge reported .16, Baird got .45, Ovalo .60 and Abilene got as high as .40 in some sections of the city.

Weather forecasters called for remaining cloudiness over the weekend with scattered showers over most of the state. The showers however, were not expected to be heavy enough to bring a great quantity of moisture to the area.

Merkel received enough hail to cover the ground with their .50 inches, but no damage was reported.

Some damaging lightning was reported deeper in the West Texas area, knocking down some power lines. In the lower reaches of the state only small traces of rain in several cities was announced.

Fashioned of sticks and colored thread, it is mounted in mud mixed with human sibilis. Tibetans believe that drawings of people and animals on sticks lure ghosts into circle of small traps. Ghosts then become entangled in TV antenna-like device. When wool tufts at points of antenna become damp, it's a sign ghost is trapped. Antennae come in 14 different designs, one for each major type of spirit Tibetans hope to ensnare.

Guard Prepares For Summer Training

Ranger's National Guard will leave here June 19 for North Fort Hood and two weeks of summer training, it was announced today.

The two weeks summer camp is scheduled to begin in the grandstand as a portion of the annual training which also includes drill once each week and six day drills.

To some of the first year guardsmen, the two week camp will represent the climax of what they have studied during weekly drill nights. For these, training aids will become a reality as a hardened, technically trained aggressor forces will make field training an similar to war as possible.

While in the field during the last week of training, the unit will attempt to harass an "enemy" with their large artillery weapons. The "enemy" will counterpunch in force or with small patrols to test the prowess of each soldier on the battlefield.

Most of the aggressor attacks will come at night in an attempt to knock out the artillery. Inspectors of the 4th Army will be on hand to judge the efficiency of the group as it is exposed to conditions that exist only in warfare. To fail is embarrassment as well as low marks on an endless string of military records, that stand and stare at those who have failed.

First week of the training is spent in preparing for this final test and the climax to a year's work. Those who have not qualified with small arms will again be oriented and given another chance, to prove their marksmanship with their weapons.

Those who have qualified previously will advance into preliminary problems of the artillery pieces, unit supply will be set up to issue appropriate clothing, bedding and necessary supplies for the impending test. Lectures will be the order of the day as each soldier is again oriented in his particular phase of operation.

For the first week the pattern will be nearly identical from day to day, with the flavor of Army inspection, guard duty and KP thrown in for measure.

The Ranger Guard will leave here in their own vehicles, join the Cisco and Breckenridge guards in this vicinity and proceed to meet the San Angelo and Colorado City outfits somewhere south at a pre-determined rendezvous.

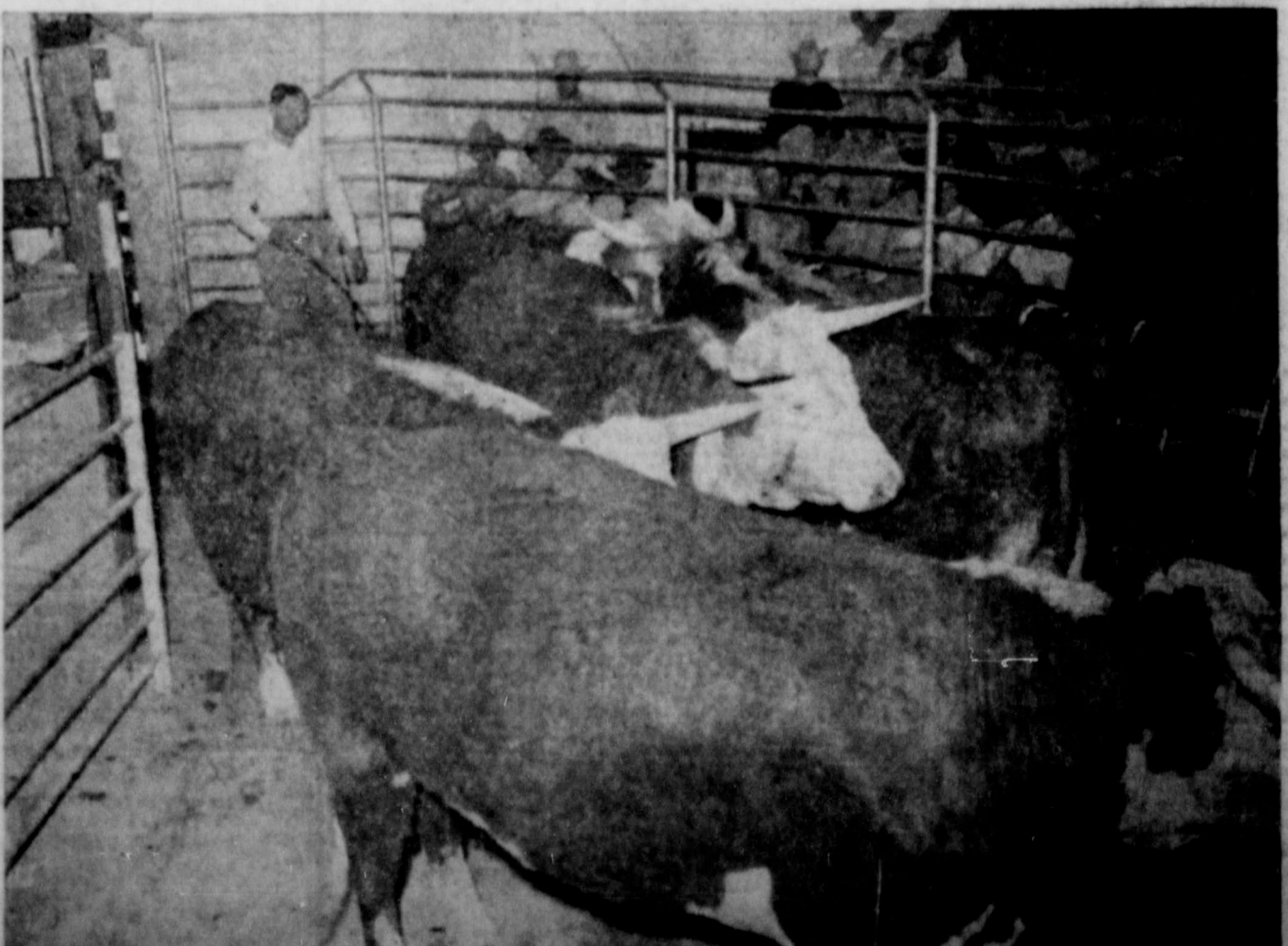

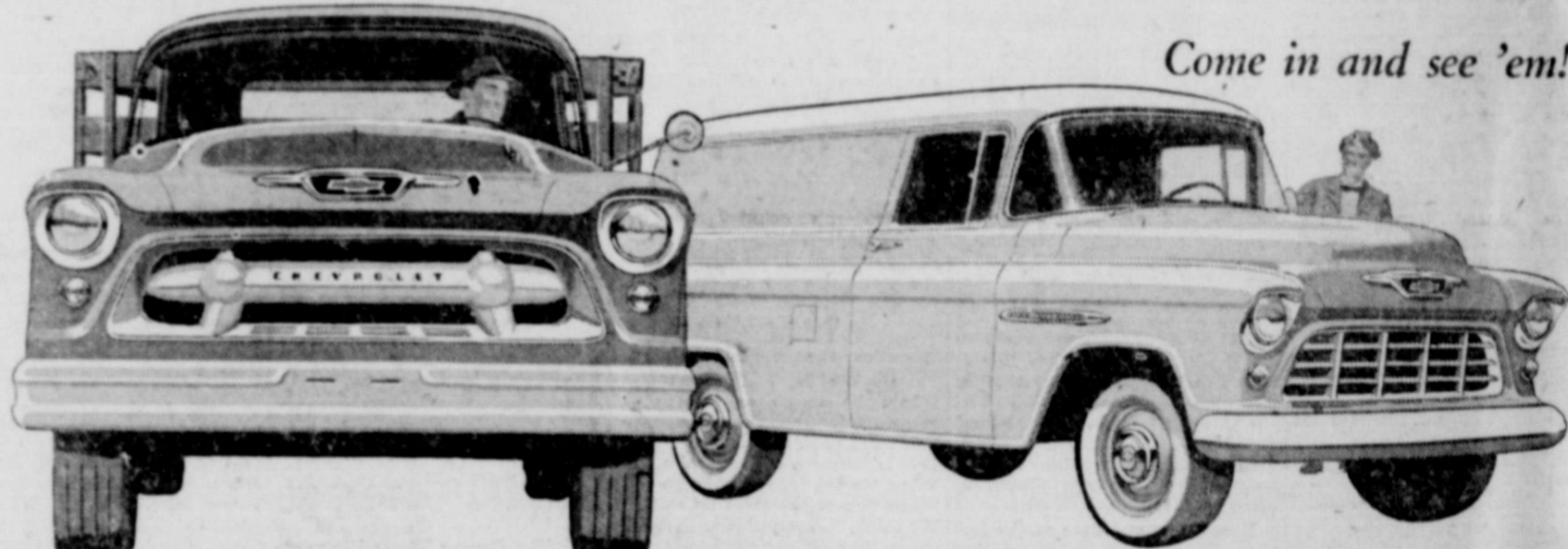

New Orleans Pensioner Proves The Old Can Feel Young At Heart

GLASGOW, Scotland — Old people can feel young in heart again through the inspiring story of Adrian Alexander McCaskill, 79-year-old pensioner from New Orleans who provided a dramatic moment in the All-Scotland Crusade of Evangelist Billy Graham.

The moment came during the middle of a meeting at beautiful Kelvin Hall, scene of the crusade now under way.

A tall figure, gnarled and somewhat bent with age, Mr. McCaskill had arrived late for the meeting and was looking for a seat. Failing to find one in the overflow crowd of 16,000, he went out and found a chair. He placed it near the platform, but an usher whispered he would have to move and was leading him down an aisle when Billy jumped from his seat and cried in a voice which rang through the hall.

"That man — hold that man. Let him turn and face us."

An electric shock spread through the packed throng. The first thought was that someone was making trouble.

Mr. McCaskill, wearing an American Army greatcoat, stood with downcast eyes as Billy continued.

"This man comes from New Orleans, La. He is nearly 80 years of age and has followed us all over the United States. He lives on a small pension — there are very few of you here who could live on it. He saves his pennies and ministers in New Orleans gave him a few dollars to help out.

"I didn't even know he was here. But he is here — and he has a right to a seat anywhere in this auditorium as far as I am concerned."

The old man stood straight and tall and his eyes clouded as he looked at the young preacher, who had interrupted his thoughts on a message to express appreciation for a long journey.

An usher allowed him to place the seat near the front.

After the service he was mobbed by the press and well wishers from both sides of the Atlantic.

"God bless you, sir," said some of the people as they pressed shillings and dollars into his hand. Soon his little snap pocketbook was overflowing.

"My, I have never been so famous in all my life," he beamed.

Next day, as the luncheon great

of the writer and George Beverly Shea, soloist for the Graham team, Mr. McCaskill told about his experiences.

He first heard Billy Graham speak about three years ago in San Francisco. Since that time, he has visited every American campaign conducted by the evangelist, managing it all on a 65-dollar-a-month pension and the little he makes selling religious songs he has written. Some of the meetings he attended were held at Houston, Chattanooga, St. Louis, Portland, Detroit, Syracuse and Dallas.

Last year he dreamed of attending the meeting in London, but this was just a little beyond his means and dreams. He continued to save the pennies, nickels and dollars in hopes that he might come to Scotland.

The came one of the big decisions of his life. The goal was in sight and it looked as if he could make the trip.

"But I felt very deeply that the Lord wanted me to give \$100 to a foreign mission project," he said. "The old devil started talking to me and said 'don't be a fool; you will never get to Scotland if you give \$100 of your savings away.'"

"I trusted the Lord and gave it anyway. It wasn't a month before I had the \$100 back, and more besides."

The old man cried softly as he recalled the statement of the man who sold him his ticket for the journey: "This trip will be the fitting climax for a well spent life."

Added Mr. McCaskill:

"Before I left New Orleans I prayed and asked God to help me witness along the way and win people to Christ. I won a man in North Carolina."

In New York City he boarded the Italia and on the following Sunday aboard ship he preached at the regular morning service. There were some Germans on board and whenever he had the opportunity he recited John 3:16 to them in German. He has learned the Bible's most famous verse in several languages.

After he had disembarked at Plymouth a little girl stuck her head out a porthole and said:

"Mister, you did a wonderful job of telling us about Jesus at the service."

Again his eyes misted as he said:

"It was worth going all the way around the world to hear a little girl say that."

You need no longer tolerate faded plastic shower curtains. The same all-fabric dyes used for clothing will freshen the color of plastic curtains, including those that have printed designs. The Tintex Home Economics Bureau reports.

Many articles made of plastic — slipcovers, drapes, raincoats, eyeglass frames, synthetic pearls — can be given new color with all-fabric dyes. These require no boiling.

Dyeing will restore the basic color of printed plastic curtains, at the same time retaining much of the original print colors.

The washing machine is recommended for dyeing plastic curtains and other bulky articles. Use the hottest water available in the washer. Pour the dye, after dissolving it in a quart of very hot water, into the machine as soon as it is filled with water.

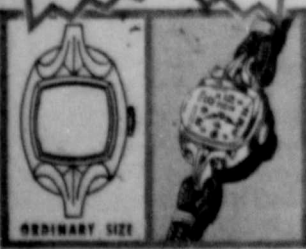

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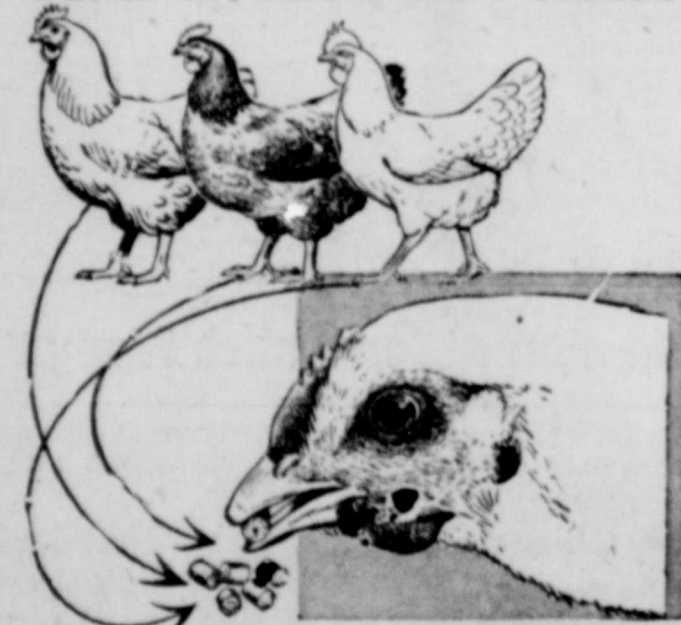

Gyroscope Plan Is Explained By Dep't. of Army

Trainees undergoing training in units of the U.S. Army designated for "Operation Gyroscope" — rotation with stability — will be granted at least one two-week leave prior to overseas shipment, according to a circular issued by the Department of the Army.

"Operation Gyroscope" provides for the planned rotation of Army units up to division level in phases that will enable the unit to serve 33 months in an overseas command and then return to the United States. At present, the 10th Infantry Division, presently located at Fort Riley, Kansas, is the only unit designated for "Operation Gyroscope" type rotation available to this area, but more are to be named very shortly. The 10th Infantry Division will replace the 1st Infantry Division in Würzburg, Germany, in a three-phase operation scheduled to get underway this summer.

With a quota of 70 men per week throughout May 6th set within the five state Fourth Army area for the European bound 10th Infantry Division, local U. S. Army recruiter, Sgt. Edward Lowe is expecting plenty of business each Tuesday at the draft board. Men enlisting from the Eastland and

Ranger area will be sent directly to Fort Riley to take preembarkation training before departing for Europe. The recent Department of the Army circular guarantees trainees enlisting under the program a two-week leave before overseas departure. Sgt. Enlistment In Overseas Bound Unit Possible

"The U.S. Army will accept 70 young men each week through May 5 from the Fourth Army area for direct assignment to the 10th Infantry Division under the Army's new and revolutionary Operation Gyroscope, which allows direct enlistments into Army units bound for overseas commands," Sgt. Edward G. Lowe, Army recruiter, said in a visit here this week.

The 10th Infantry Division, now stationed at Fort Riley, Kansas, is scheduled to replace the 1st Infantry Division in Würzburg, Germany, this summer.

Technically known as the Unit Rotation Plan, the term "Gyroscope" has been applied to punctuate the "rotation with stability" of the plan. The plan calls for rotation of units up to division level to replace similar sized units currently stationed in overseas commands. The 10th Infantry Division is the first unit selected for "Gyro-

scope" type rotation with more units scheduled to follow in the near future.

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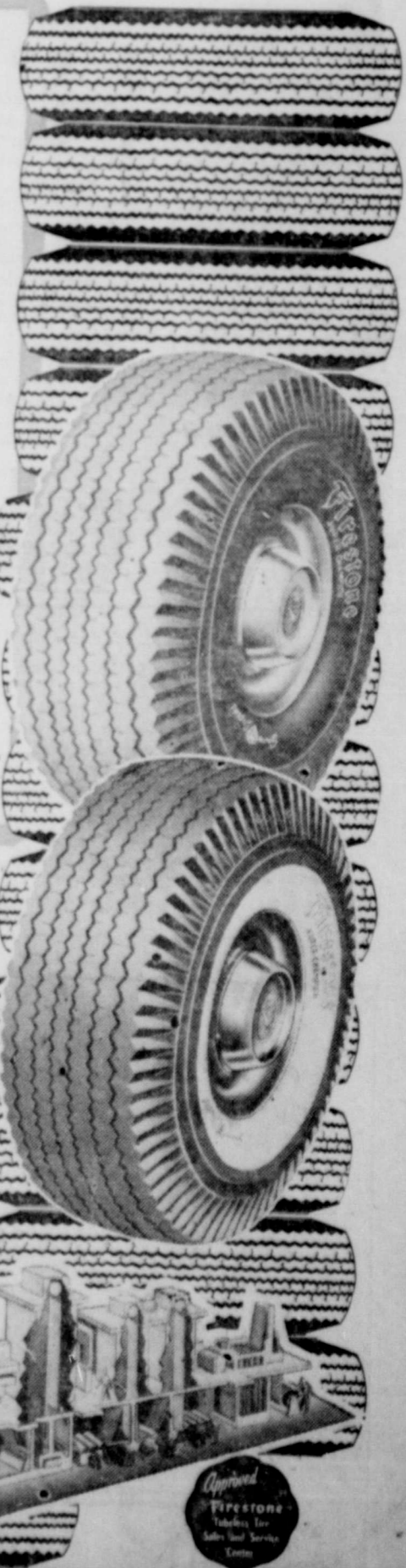
