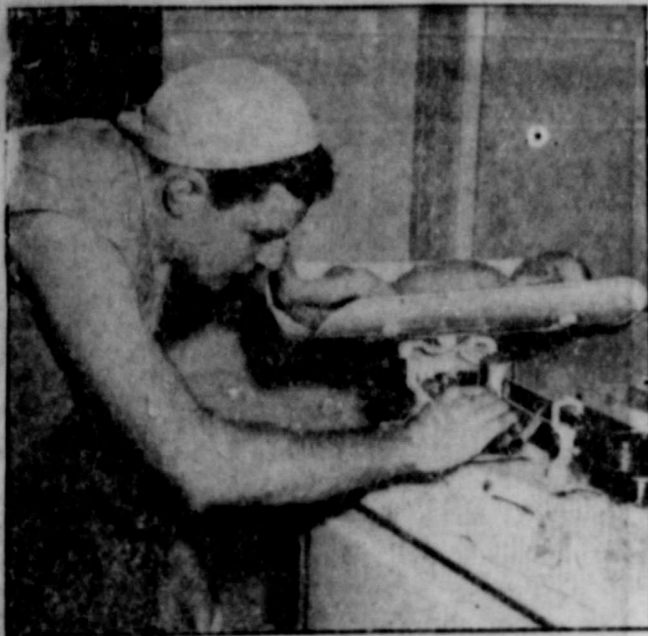

## Runoff Ballots Marked Today

For the second time within the month, citizens within this city are trekking to the polls today in attempt to choose a mayor and fire and police commissioner.

First round election Apr. 7 narrowed the field to two candidates in each of the races.

Lee Dockery and Twyman Hale were squared off for the mayoralty race and Willis Clark, Jr. and Jim Ingram are seeking the fire and police commissioners seats.

Voting at first counts this morning did not seem to be going as fast as the first election. However at 1:15 p.m. 526 votes had been cast.

Today's balloting will climax several months of active campaigning by city office seekers. At no time recently has the city offices been decided by such close margins as some in the first round vote.

Election officials do not expect as heavy a vote to fall in today's balloting as in the April 7 election day when 998 votes were cast.

However, to meet any emergency, two additional assistances were added to W. W. Paschall's staff and additional ballots were printed for this election April 7, only nine ballots were not used last time.

Final results of the last election were hardly announced when active campaigning for the runoff began anew by the candidates and their supporters.

Stocker calves were up slightly at the Monday auction at the Ranger Livestock Commission Exchange.

Some stocker calves sold for as high as \$20, slightly higher than in recent months.

More than 400 cattle and 70 hogs were sold during the day.

Other prices included: fat calves, \$17-\$22.50; common to medium calves, \$13-\$16.50; fat cows, \$11-\$13; canners and cutters, \$7-\$11; stocker calves, \$16-\$20; cows and calves, 100-\$145 a pair; bulls, \$11-\$14; hogs, \$17.50 tops and sows, \$14-\$14.50.

## 170 School Children To Get Shots Here

First shipment of the new polio vaccine in Eastland County was flown into Ranger near noon Sunday by an Air National Guard plane that had been alerted for the flight since the success of the vaccine was announced early last week.

On hand to greet the pilot and to receive his valuable cargo were Mayor Calvin W. Harris, M. D., Dr. W. P. Watkins, city health officer, G. B. Rush, superintendent of schools and Jess Cole, county March of Dimes chairman.

First shipment of the vaccine contained 681 cc's of the new drug, enough for first round shots of all first and second grade children in the county. Supply for the second round shots will be delivered later.

First of the two in a series of shots began this morning in the Recreation building. Rush said that 170 children from 187 first and second graders eligible would receive the inoculations free of charge. Only 17 questionnaires were returned specifying that parents did not wish for their children to receive the vaccine.

Other county cities are expected to operate on nearly the same schedule.

### Rules of Cisco Calf Show For May 21 Listed

With the affair set for the show grounds on the Albany Highway May 21, the Registered Beef Calf Show sponsored by the Cisco Livestock Association has announced its rules and regulations.

Officials also were announced: Sutton Crafts, Cisco, president; T. G. Caudle, Cisco, general show superintendent; Ed Huestis, Cisco, grounds superintendent; J. M. Cooper, Eastland, secretary.

"There are thirty-five breeders of registered Hereford and Angus cattle in the country, which is quite large for a diversified county," said Mr. Cooper, who is county agricultural agent.

Following are the rules and regulations:

1. The registered beef calf show is open to all breeders of Hereford and Angus cattle in Eastland and adjoining counties.
2. All calves in the show must be purebred and subject to registration.
3. Calves must have been dropped on or after Sept. 1, 1954, to be entered for competition.
4. Calves must be shown in pens of three and must be of the same sex to be judged for competition. (Example—3 bull calves in a pen or 3 heifer calves in a pen).
5. Each breeder may show two pens of calves. (Example: a pen of heifers and a pen of bulls or two pens of heifers or two pens of bulls). He may also exhibit individual animals of any age or sex, haltered and tied but not penned. Such individual animals will not be judged for competition.
6. A pen of calves of mixed sex may be exhibited but not shown for competition.
7. All animals must be in their places by 9 a.m. on the day of the show. They will be released to be taken home by 4 p.m. of the same day.
8. There will be no public sale or auction. Breeders may sell at private treaty if they wish.
9. Exhibitors will compete for ribbons only. The judges' decision is final.
10. Each exhibitor is to be responsible for panels for his pen or pens of calves. For each pen of calves exhibited two panels 8 feet long and 4 feet high is needed. Panels to be made out of six rough boards.
11. It is suggested that the panels be brought in the day before and set up.

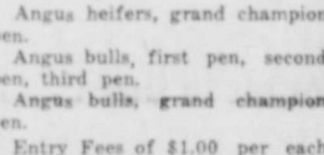

IT'S THE LAW in Texas... Changing and revoking wills has involved many an estate in litigation because the proper legal methods were not used and the statutes were not followed.

Take the case of Mr. S. Some time ago he went into his lawyer's office and laid in front of his attorney a will which had been prepared for him about a year previously. He said that he had made a few changes in it and wanted to know whether his attorney thought the changes were all right.

Mr. S. was attempting to change two items of his will by drawing lines through certain words in these items and interlining, in his own handwriting, the changes he wanted. He was not attempting to revoke his entire will but merely trying to change these two items.

Since a will does not take effect until the death of the person making it, the provisions of the will should be reviewed by the maker at least once a year to be sure that changing conditions and circumstances have not been such as to require a modification of the will.

There are many changing circumstances which would be brought to his attention if a person would review his will at least

once a year in the light of circumstances at the time.

Such things as death among the legatees or devisees named in his will, births, marriages or divorces in the family, accidents or sickness among the close relatives which make it desirable to increase or decrease the amount given certain ones, substantial increase or decrease in the value of the estate of the person making the will, death of all witnesses to the will and many other factors, may cause a person to want to execute a new will or add a codicil to his old one.

72 Is Important Number In Old-Age Insurance

Certain numbers bring immediate mental associations with them when heard or read.

"Number one" causes most persons to think of a leader, or top quality.

"Seven," to many, means a lucky number.

"Thirteen" brings thoughts of bad luck or at certain times of the year, reminds folks of our original 13 states.

"Twenty-one" may remind many of voting age. One could list other numbers with widespread, common associations, but R. K. Tukey, Jr., district manager of the Social Security Administration in Abilene, wants the rest of this space to talk about the number "seventy-two."

He reports that some residents of this area may have overlooked the importance of age 72 in the 1954 Amendments to the Social Security Act. At that age, there are no longer any sort of earnings restrictions placed on a person's eligibility to receive monthly Social Security Payments. In other words, the employee or self-employed person over that age can receive his old-age and survivors insurance payments regardless of the amount of his earnings.

Insured persons between 65 and 72 are eligible to receive all twelve months' checks for years their earnings are \$1200 or less, and from one to eleven months' checks if annual earnings are between \$1200.01 and \$2080. Regardless of earnings amounts, they can also be paid for any month they earn wages of \$50 or less and in which they do not render substantial services in any self-employment activity.

Persons 72 years of age or over, who have at least a year and a half of Social Security credit, should contact the Social Security office about their rights.
