Frankfurters, Potato Salad Hit The Spot At Party For Teen Ager

For one of the numerous end-of-school parties, have your teenagers invite the gang in for a buffet luncheon. Records, a rolled-up-rug and most important of all, food, are the entertainment requirements.
Teenagers are a casual lot and they appreciate the casual in food. Just so there's plenty of it. Your role in this party is chief chef. A menu easy on you and pleasing to the kids would be frankfurters with hot potato salad, pickles, catsup, mustard, strawberry-whipped cream-nut sundaes and hot chocolate or Cokes.
Frankfurters With Hot Potato Salad
1 pound frankfurters
6 medium-sized potatoes
1 onion, finely chopped
Hot dressing
Cook potatoes in skins and remove skins while hot. Cut potatoes in 1-2 inch cubes. Add onion to potatoes. Make hot dressing. Cover frankfurters with hot water and heat slowly but do not boil. Pour dressing over potatoes and onion. Heat salad until liquid is absorbed. Arrange on platter with heated frankfurters. 6 servings.

Hot Dressing
1 teaspoon salt
1-8 teaspoon pepper
1 teaspoon mustard
1-4 cup sugar
1-2 cup water
1-2 cup vinegar
1 egg, slightly beaten
4 slices bacon, diced
Combine salt, pepper, mustard and sugar. Add water, vinegar and beaten egg. Cook until lightly brown and combine bacon and drippings with other mixture. Cook slowly until thickened.

Tuna Roll-Up Is Tempting Taste Treat For Summertime Serving

For a new and tempting taste treat for your family, try this:
TUNA ROLL-UP
2 7-ounce cans tuna fish
1/2 teaspoon salt
1/4 teaspoon pepper
1 pimiento, chopped
2 tablespoons minced onion
3 tablespoons minced parsley
1 teaspoon grated lemon rind
1 tablespoon lemon juice
1/2 cup water
2 cups biscuit mix
1 egg yolk
2 tablespoons milk
Drain tuna; flake with fork. Add salt, pepper, pimiento, onion, parsley and lemon rind; mix well. Combine lemon juice and water. Add to biscuit mix and stir vigorously with fork to combine. Roll into 8 by 13 inch rectangle on lightly floured board. Spread with tuna mixture. Roll as for jelly roll. Dampen outside edge with egg yolk beaten with milk; press to seal. Lay seal-side down in floured shallow baking pan. Brush top and sides with remaining egg mixture. Bake at 400 degrees 35 to 40 minutes. Makes 6 servings.
For top-burner cooking, use pots that are the same size or slightly larger than the burner, and keep them tightly covered. Open pans waste heat and require more water in cooking vegetables — and often result in loss of flavor and food values. Too-small utensils allow heat to escape up the sides and out into the room.

Tuna Roll-Up Is Tempting Taste Treat For Summertime Serving

For a new and tempting taste treat for your family, try this:
TUNA ROLL-UP
2 7-ounce cans tuna fish
1/2 teaspoon salt
1/4 teaspoon pepper
1 pimiento, chopped
2 tablespoons minced onion
3 tablespoons minced parsley
1 teaspoon grated lemon rind
1 tablespoon lemon juice
1/2 cup water
2 cups biscuit mix
1 egg yolk
2 tablespoons milk
Drain tuna; flake with fork. Add salt, pepper, pimiento, onion, parsley and lemon rind; mix well. Combine lemon juice and water. Add to biscuit mix and stir vigorously with fork to combine. Roll

into 8 by 13 inch rectangle on lightly floured board. Spread with tuna mixture. Roll as for jelly roll. Dampen outside edge with egg yolk beaten with milk; press to seal. Lay seal side down in floured shallow baking pan. Brush top and sides with remaining egg mixture. Bake at 400 degrees 35 to 40 minutes. Makes 6 servings.
For top-burner cooking, use pots that are the same size or slightly larger than the burner, and keep them tightly covered. Open pans waste heat and require more water in cooking vegetables — and often result in loss of flavor and food values. Too-small utensils allow heat to escape up the sides and out into the room.

BETTI'S BUDGET of HELPFUL HINTS

When you clean closets, be sure to wash the shelves thoroughly with soap and hot water. Then line them with a plastic material which takes to soapuds, too, for easy clean-ups.

To make iced tea so that it comes out right every time, pre-measure 5 tablespoons loose tea or 15 tea bags. Bring 2 quarts of water to a full rolling boil. Remove from heat. Immediately add tea. Brew, uncovered, 5 minutes. Stir and strain into pitcher. Serve in ice-filled glasses with a wedge of lemon and sugar if desired. Remember to use 50 per cent more tea when you are making iced tea to allow for the ice dilution.

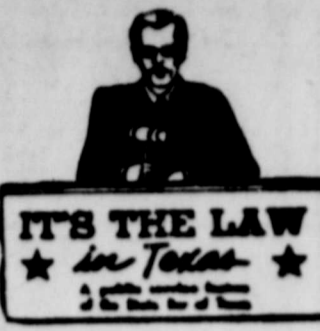

INSURANCE QUESTIONS ANSWERED

One of the most familiar types of contracts is the insurance policy, as nearly everyone carries some sort of insurance protection. Yet, few people take the trouble to read their policies and lawyers have to answer many questions regarding insurance generally.

Here is a problem presented: "I have a hospitalization insurance policy. Will the company pay all of my hospital bills if I become ill?"

It may or may not. Insurance is a contract between the insurance company and the policy holder. In the usual contract the policy holder agrees to pay a certain sum of money for the policy of insurance, and the insurance company agrees that should the policy holder incur hospital expenses that the insurance company will make payment to the policy holder of stated sums, as set out in the policy of insurance.

The insurance policy itself must state the complete contract between the parties. The oral statements of agents not in harmony with the policy are not binding on the company. The company is bound to pay such sums as are specifically set forth in the policy of insurance.

Practically all policies have a section called exceptions and exclusions. The policy holder should particularly read this section before purchasing a policy of any kind of insurance. It would be possible for a policy of insurance to have so many exceptions and exclusions as to practically nullify any benefits under the policy.

Another question often asked is: "Can I sue the insurance company which issued a liability policy covering the car of someone who runs into and damages my car?"

For all practical purposes you may not sue the insurance company which carries insurance on the other fellow's car to protect him from suits in case of his negligence. You must look to the owner or driver of the other vehicle for your damages. Upon his becoming liable to pay those damages to you, then he in turn looks to the insurance company to make the settlement for him, or to reimburse him for the settlement which he has made.

If the case goes to trial before the jury, even though you may know that the other party carries insurance, if there arises any discussion of the fact that insurance is carried by the other party, then the courts have held that it is the duty of the trial judge to declare a mistrial.

This means that you will have to start all over again and try your case from the beginning before the jury, at a later date.

Your case is not dismissed, and you do not lose your rights to be heard on your case because of the word "insurance" coming into the case, but it does mean that the trial then in progress must be dismissed and you must start all over again before a new and different jury.

The theory of the appellate courts is that the mere introduction of any evidence or any testimony to the effect that there is an insurance company involved in any way in the case, is highly prejudicial to the Defendant and his cause of action.

The appellate courts further say that it is reversible error, that is, such error as will set aside the findings of the jury, if the jury is retiring to consider their verdict discuss whether or not either or both of the parties might or might not have insurance to back them up or protect them.

Olden High School Commencement Week activities open today with the baccalaureate service at 11 a.m. Graduation exercises will be held at 8 p.m. May 26.

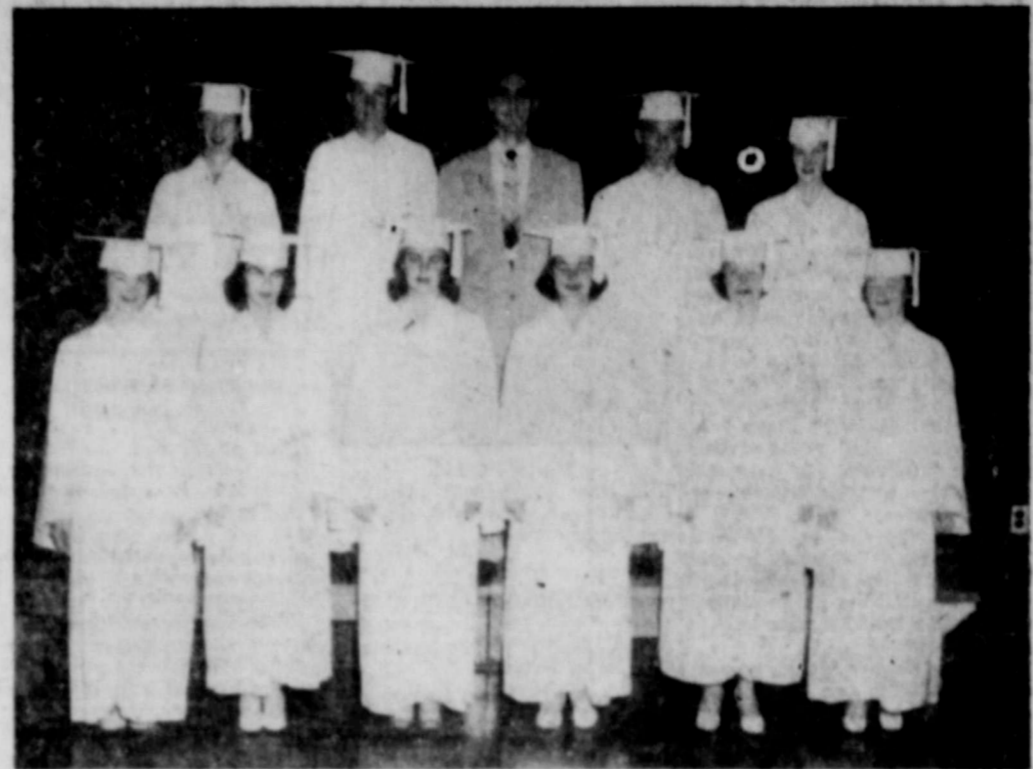

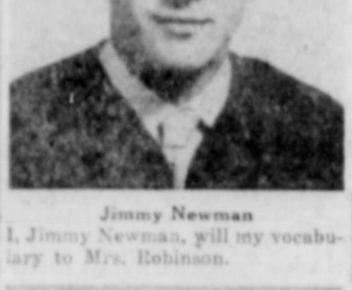
