Previous Charges Stopped

District Judge Turner M. Collie, this morning authorized an order to dismiss the case entered by attorneys for the contestants of the Ranger Municipal election contest scheduled for Friday morning.

Incumbent A. G. Koenig had filed for election contest May 2, against his opponent H. M. Bagwell, finance commissioner, who won the seat by a narrow five ballots.

Koenig had filed to get a recount on a number of absentee ballots that were called illegal by the method in which they were obtained.

Subpoenas that were being issued earlier this week were stopped unexpectedly, as first hint of the dismissal.

Bagwell had previously filed an answer to the notice of election contest, but he was unavailable for comment this morning.

School Aged Medical Exams To Be Completed

All examinations will be completed free of charge.

Ranger Guard To Test Arms Accuracy Sat.

Nearly 50 men of the Ranger National Guard will travel to View, Texas west of Abilene Saturday for two full days of small arms firing.

City Water Supply To Be Drawn From Lake Leon After June 1

Lake May Open For Fishing

Elaborate planning for a rousing formal-opening celebration of nearby Lake Leon will go forward, following the setting of Sept. 3 and 4 as the dates for the colorful occasion.

The schedule was set at a meeting of Ranger and Eastland Chamber of Commerce committees for the purpose, together with members of the Water Board, Tuesday night at the Eastland Chamber of Commerce office.

The first meeting on the project was exactly a year ago; the second, on Sept. 10, last year. Eastland Chamber of Commerce President Virgil T. Seaberry, who opened the meeting, stated that with the lake over half full of water, "it seems to be time that we planned for the big event."

Frank N. Sayre, chairman of the Eastland chamber committee, who presided over the Tuesday night meeting, was elected permanent chairman unanimously.

The gathering voted to continue the present standing committees on the project: Ranger, Dr. M. E. Jolly, Dr. W. P. Watkins, C. E. May, David D. Piekrell, C. B. Pruet and Rex Mitchell; Eastland: Frank N. Sayre, Grady Pipkin, Judge Milburn S. Long, Virgil T. Seaberry Sr., Willis Smith, and Jack Frost.

No Rate Increase Expected By Council

The Eastland County Water Board has announced by official letter that it will begin serving both the cities of Ranger and Eastland their supply of water from Lake Leon beginning June 1.

By agreement before the innovations of the water board and the construction of Lake Leon, the cities agreed to take their water supply from the new lake when the board deemed that the supply was adequate to serve the two cities.

Discussion of proposed rates at the regular weekly city council meeting Tuesday night indicated that standard rates would be altered very little. Largest change will possibly come on reductions for big users.

However, some change is anticipated on lines furnishing fire water and apartment house setups where a flat rate is set on unmetered dwelling units.

The council agreed that the changes would possibly have to be made to keep an overall rise in customer costs.

In other business, the council, in one of their longest sessions, appointed Lester Crossley, city manager, to request a referendum team to question city employees on their desires to enter social security contracts for retirement purposes.

If a majority of the employees desire to enter the setup and the commission authorizes the plan, each employee will divert two percent of each paycheck to the retirement fund. The city will likewise match the percentage payment. On the basis of \$1.70 a month payroll, the cost to the city for the 13 employees involved would be \$34 per month.

The plan does not make reservations for fire and police employees.

Mr. Houston is survived by his wife, Viola Shannon Houston; a daughter, Mrs. Clyde Atsforth of Conroe; two sons, F. A. Houston of Bay City, Michigan and K. C. Houston of Denver City. Seven grandchildren also survive.

30,000 Bass Added To Lake Leon Supply

The number of fish in Lake Leon was increased by 30,000 Black Bass Wednesday morning.

Harmon Henderson, who operates the State Game and Fish Commission fish hatchery at Possum Kingdom delivered the fish to the lake in special metal containers equipped with agitators.

Henderson said that three more loads of catfish, nearly 90,000 overall would be deposited in the lake by August.

The game official said that those Bass left in the lake this year would weigh at least 1 1/2 pounds by this time next year and that some would be as large as two pounds.

He plans to make a check on the fish that have been deposited there previously next week, by catching, weighing and measuring a few of the fish.

Burns is planning a program of events for the youngsters that will be colorful and entertaining not only for the Little Leaguers but for the adults who are in the stands. There will be three-legged races, speed races, pie-eating contests, blind fold races, watermelon-eating contests, distance throwing contests, wheelbarrow races and several other events capped off by a grandstand performance of all Little Leaguers in all parade formation.

In keeping with their policy of supporting and promoting Little League Baseball in this area, the Cats have sent invitations to all communities within 100 miles of Fort Worth for the night. More than 1,500 of the uniformed Little Leaguers are expected for the game.

Little League Roster Cuts Begin Tonight

Little League team playing rosters will be cut to 15 men after tonight, Joe Dackovich, Little League president said here today.

The cut is being made to conform with playing rules of the national headquarters which prescribe that no team shall consist of more than 15 players five days before the first game.

The Little League season officially begins here Monday night with a double header under the lights at Little League field.

Players who are trimmed from the rosters will be diverted to Minor League teams who will also have scheduled games and will be furnished some type of uniform for the individual contests.

Little League officers this week completed rewiring player dugouts and the back stop protecting the grand stands at the field.

Night workouts will probably be scheduled one night later this week in preparation for Monday's games.

Nearly 20 boys are expected to play on one of the four minor league teams.

The Little Leaguers will play twice each week, both night games on Monday and Friday while the Minor League will play at nights on dates to be determined later.

Roper Well Is Being Drilled Near Olden

Drilling of Roper No. 1 well, 4 miles northeast of Eastland, was begun Tuesday night by Irish Drilling Co. of Eastland for El Capitan Oil Company of Midland. It is just north of the J. L. Dick well.

respectively, also serve with the committee. The chamber executives are to contact numerous dignitaries, inviting them to the opening, those persons to include Gov. Allan Shivers and various leaders in water movements.

Attending the meeting were: Dr. M. E. Jolly, Dr. Watkins, Messrs. May, Pickrell, Milliken, Galloway, Mitchell and C. B. Pruet, all of Ranger. Those from Eastland were Judge Long, Messrs. Sayre, Pipkin, Tanner, McGraw, Parker, Seaberry Sr., Seaberry Jr. and Editor Floyd W. Casebolt.

Water sports and angling are expected to be among the entertainment features and Mr. Milliken suggested a fishing rodeo, which Water Board Chairman Parker said probably could be arranged "if the lake is thrown open to fishing by then." It was indicated that bands from around this section will be invited to play at the opening. That the Rangers from Ranger Junior College be invited to participate in the affair was also suggested.

Committeemen told of the importance of roads in the lake vicinity being in suitable condition by the time of the opening and on motion of Judge Long the chairman appointed the following committee to contact the commissioners court about this matter: Dr. Watkins, chairman; Messrs. Pickrell, Parker, Seaberry Jr., McGraw and Pruet.

Possibility of obtaining assistance from the state on a county park for the lake area was mentioned by Mr. Pruet who said that some encouragement had been given along this line, and the committee asked that he explore it further.

Mr. Pipkin told of the deep interest of the residents of the Stephenville area in the lake and said that they would like to see the Staff road pavement extended on to Deadmons, giving them a direct good-highway connection. Interest of Gorman, DeLeon and other towns was also mentioned.

Concerning the lake's steady stocking as a Mecca for fishermen, Mr. McGraw called attention to the "200,000 more bass being put in the lake this week, with 400,000 catfish to be added in July."

As plans go forward on arrangements for the opening, the presidents of the two chambers will soon appoint a finance committee for the affair.

To check progress on arrangements, the committees will convene again at an early date, to be set.

Leaders in the lake opening celebration project consider that Saturday afternoon and Sunday afternoon, immediately prior to Labor Day (which is Sept. 5) would be a favorable time for a great crowd.

BETTI'S BUDGET of HELPFUL HINTS

FANCY CHICKEN SOUP—Take a can of cream-of-chicken soup and the same amount of light cream. Cook in a double boiler on the top of your range. Mix a teaspoon of curry powder to a paste with a little milk and add to the soup. Add seasonings, stir well, and serve very hot. Garnish with minced parsley.

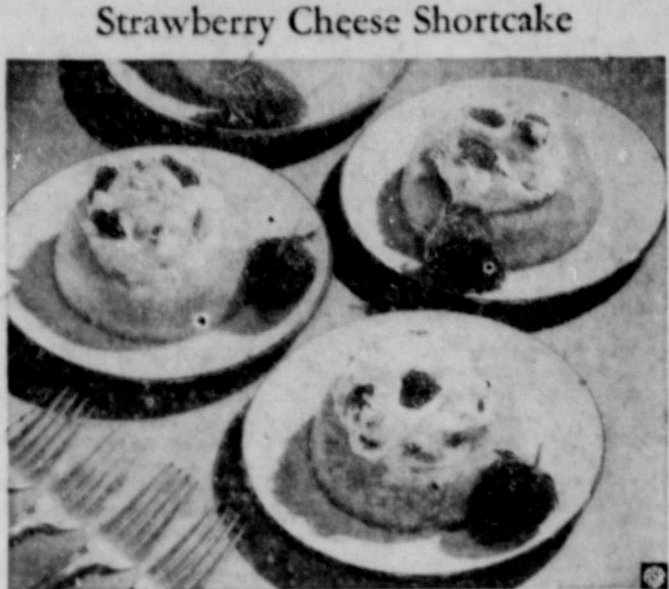

Lovely Summer Flowers Can Be Grown from Bulbs

Beginners in gardening find bulbs often easier to grow than seeds. A bulb is a "package deal" containing not only an embryo plant, as the seed also does, but food to nourish it until it flowers. There are many summer flowering bulbs which, like the gladiolus, are easy to grow and can be lifted before frost comes, and saved over winter to plant again next year. They are all attractive subjects to plant in groups near a patio or terrace, where they can be admired at leisure. They also contribute interesting flowers to the garden border, and cut flowers for home decoration.

Montbretias, cousins of the gladiolus and in a way resembling a miniature of that plant, have spikes of orange, yellow and scarlet flowers.

The newer named varieties are double the size of the old timers. They show rapid increase and a few bulbs will give a fine stock for another year.

The three-cornered blooms of the tigridia or tiger flower in brilliant red, yellow or white with striking spots in the center of the flower always attract attention with their dazzling display. They are an easily grown bulb that will provide much beauty during the summer.

The summer hyacinth with its huge spike or drooping white bells, catalogued as hyacinthus candicans, is another striking subject of very easy culture that will always attract attention and serve as a focal point.

Another is the Peruvian daffodil, ismene calathina. It really is not a daffodil at all but is a white lily-like bloom with a green trimmed cup in the center of the flower, the stalk bearing the cluster of big snowy blooms coming from an ornamental fountain of strap-shaped foliage that is attractive when the plant is not in bloom.

The little fairy lilies that send up 6 to 8-inch stems bearing rose and white blooms can be planted

in clumps and furnish a beautiful display all summer. These in the catalogue are zephyranthes, relatives of the amaryllis.

For the finest and most powerful fragrance a few bulbs of the old favorite tuberose should be planted for autumn bloom. This is an easily grown bulb that is always admired and loved for its odor.

The gorgeous tuberous begonias are fine subjects for a sheltered shady corner that you can keep well watered. They give an astonishing display. They are even finer for pots or boxes on a porch but they can't stand hot sun. They come in both double and single forms.

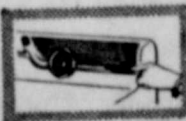

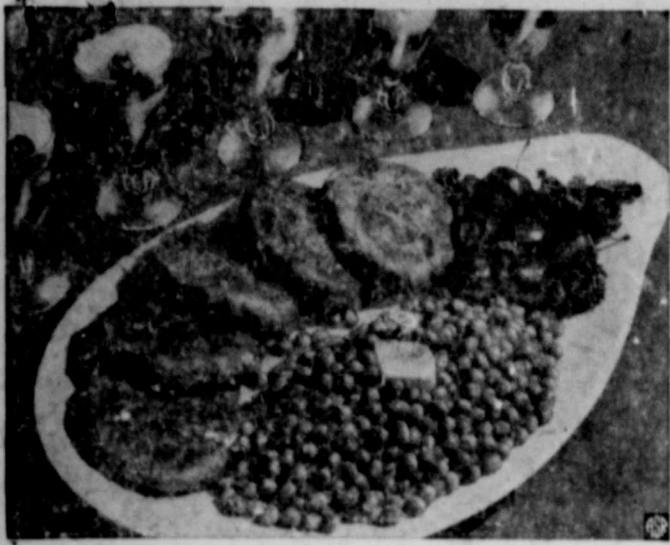
