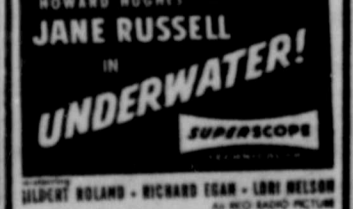

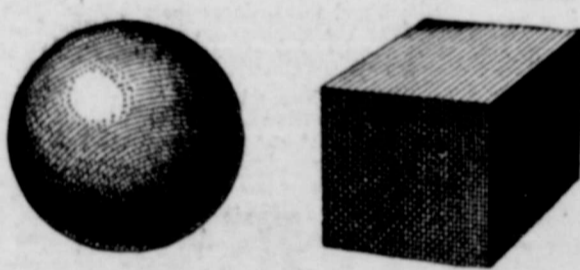

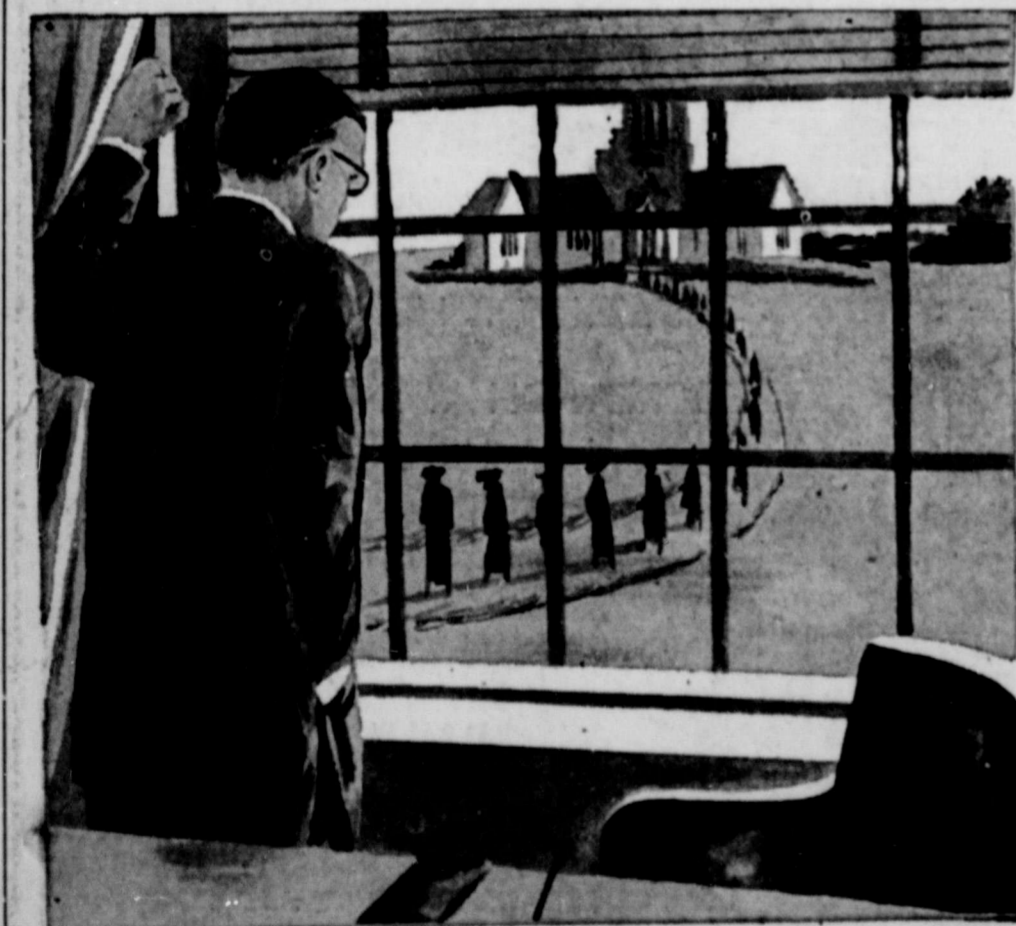

vehicle miles traveled in Texas. Economic loss of \$141,788,750 due to traffic accidents.

162,726 persons injured. A total of 208,552 fatal, injury and non-injury accidents. Speed too fast for conditions—leading causative factor in rural fatal accidents.

These statistics in some part are a frightful indication as to the danger that we encounter each time we enter into an automobile however, short the ride may be.

We know something is wrong when the economic loss from accidents is more than \$141 million over a year's time and when nearly 2,500 persons lose their lives in fatal mishaps.

It is time that we take notice of these statistics and attempt in our own ways, no matter how simple, to make the roadways as safe as possible.
