## Crossley Resigns As City Manager Parking Fines To Be Increased

### Leon Water Delivery To Be Delayed Here

Lester Crossley, city manager, submitted a letter of resignation to the city council Tuesday night, during the commissioner's regular weekly meeting.

City manager for the past nine years, Crossley asked to be released by July 1, but agreed to remain long enough to adequately train his successor.

His letter of resignation stated that he had been offered employment, that offered unlimited advancement and that he felt he could not refuse.

In other business, the commissioners raised overtime parking fines to 25 cents to replace the present five-cent charge.

The councilmen agreed that those parking in metered spaces were tempted to disregard an expired meter as the charge was no more if a ticket was issued.

Crossley pointed out that meter revenue has decreased sharply in the past few years, partly because of less business activity and also that the fines when the meters were first installed were \$1.

Also, commission members again did not agree on an attendant for the swimming pool. Four applications had been previously submitted. Mayor Lee Dockery instructed A. H. Williams, water commissioner, and Crossley to decide on the issue in the "next day or two."

Further study was to be made on existing water rates and necessary methods of maintaining the same rates once city water is taken from Lake Leon.

No change is expected on residential customer rates, however, a sharp increase is expected in apartment buildings. Also, some free users of water may be eliminated to keep the cost down to regular customers.

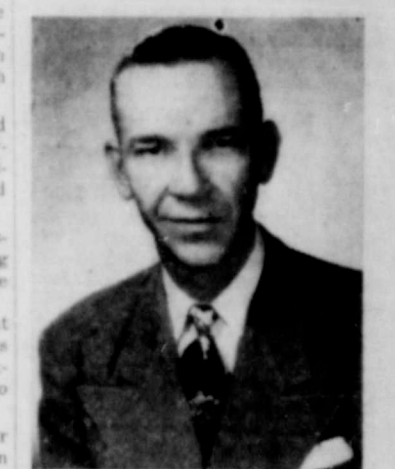
A table of the rates will probably be set at the next commissioners meeting, next Tuesday night.

The Eastland County Water Supply District also informed the commission that water could not be furnished the city by the June 1 date, as a leak in the suction lines had developed which did not allow sufficient pressure to force the water into the city lines.

Officials said that evidently the leak had been discovered in the base of Leon Dam. A dredge was to be brought here Wednesday morning for the necessary repair on the lines. The operation was expected to take two to three days. It was not mandatory that the commission decide on a standard rate before the release of water.

### Crossley To End Eight Service Years With City

Lester Crossley, July 1, will end eight years of service to Ranger in the capacity of city secretary and city manager, because "I have been offered and accepted a proposition that I feel will be advantageous to me," as he outlined in his letter of resignation to Mayor Lee Dockery Tuesday night.

Crossley's resignation sounds a note of coincidence. He was appointed city secretary June 2, 1947 when the city commission was under the mayorship of Dockery. His resignation also, falls with Dockery on office as mayor.

The city manager said that he would be associated with a brother-in-law, Tom Lasselle in Midland after his resignation is effected here. Lasselle is a building materials broker.

Crossley said however, that his family would not be moved there for another two or three months.

In his letter of resignation to the mayor Crossley said, "I shall be glad to assist the person you name as my successor in every way possible, and I want to assure you that between this date and the date of my leaving I shall conscientiously devote my time and efforts to the discharge of my duties and to the advantage of the City of Ranger."

The annual city audit is to be completed here July 1 and the books for May and June will be audited following the annual affair.

### Summer School Begins At Ranger Junior College

Registration began Tuesday for summer school at Ranger Junior College and first classes were held Wednesday night.

Total number of registrations so far for the semester were unavailable today.

However, one of the school's largest summer registrations, which will continue into next week, is expected this year.

Courses being offered are psychology, poultry husbandry, algebra, government, English literature, chemistry, analytical geometry and European history.

### City Employee Of Eastland Dies Thursday

R. C. Hudson, Eastland city employee, died Thursday morning at his home.

Particulars were not available by press time. However, it was known that Mr. Hudson had been ill only a short time.

The family resides on Virginia street, just off Commerce. Hamner Funeral Home will be in charge of arrangements for the services.

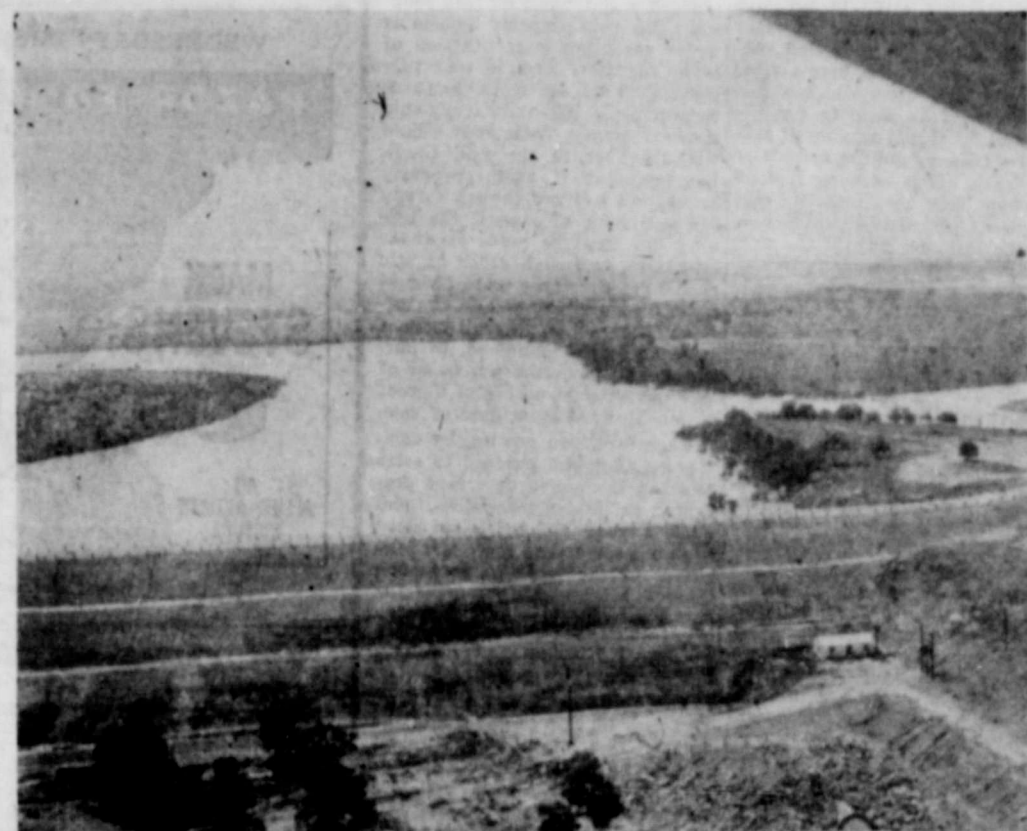
### Rains Fail To Develop In Eastland County

Thundershowers failed to develop in Eastland county this week as other areas in the state felt the punishment of freak winds and tornadoes which brought the death of at least one person.

Two men were swept from the back of a moving flatbed truck in Fort Worth, Wednesday. Killed was LeRoy McGill, 44, in the fall. Willie Moses, 44, was seriously injured.

Churning, violent air marked the path of tornado warnings in the panhandle. Two funnels were reported near Childress, but neither was reported to have touched the ground.

Childress and Amarillo reported heavy thunderstorm activity while most of the state had warm and mostly clear weather Wednesday.

### Market Reports Added To Times Coverage

By special arrangement, the previous day's quotations will be brought from two of the nation's largest livestock markets along with the poultry averages throughout Texas and the nation.

Wednesday's livestock reports in Fort Worth were:

Good and choice steers and yearlings \$19 - \$22; good and choice slaughter calves, \$6-\$20; bulls, \$10-14; canned and cutters, \$7-\$11; and stockers steady to weak.

Butcher hogs steady to strong, sows steady; butchers, \$18.50-\$18.75.

Sheep: Fairly active. Good and choice slaughter lambs \$21-\$22.50; cull and utility, \$10-14.

In Chicago: good to prime steers, \$21-\$25; good to high choice heifers, \$18.50 - \$22.75; canners and cutters, \$9-\$12.50; other slaughter cattle steady to strong.

Butcher hogs \$18.50-\$18.75; sows \$15.50-\$15.50.

Sheep: Moderately active, choice shorn lambs, \$17.50-\$19.

Total poultry sales in Texas averaged steady to weak at 29-30.

When this terminal is placed in operation the mailing address will be Eastland and the Eastland telephone exchange will service the terminal, it was learned.

### As It Looks From Here Two Millions Workers In Military Production Without Security Checks

WASHINGTON, D.C. — Automation is suddenly in everyone's vocabulary. Translated in terms of a man's work, it means being replaced by a machine.

Many people have thought in the past that their jobs would be taken over by a machine, and in fact, many have been. On the other hand, it seems when a machine takes over a job, it has a tendency to create work for not only the person displaced, but for others also.

I suppose what most of us are looking for is a machine which will do all of our work and leave us idle entirely. Of course, we will want to be paid while we are idle. In fact, that seems to be the attitude of a great many people — past, present, and doubtless it will be in the future.

While most everyone has been looking the other way, three South American nations have welded themselves together in economic unity. Chile, Bolivia, and Argentina are now linked by agreements pledging economic integration. Argentina has grain, meat, lumber, and small industry. Chile and Bolivia have coal, oil, copper, tin,

nitrate, and hydroelectric potentialities.

The pact calls for sharing of capital for investments, and mutually building highways and pipelines. If it works out, dependence on Europe and the United States for markets for raw materials will diminish.

There is nothing wrong with economic integration in Latin America, but if we properly develop our foreign trade, we will be furnishing these countries the things they need and securing from them certain raw materials essential to maintain our standard of living. Certainly we cannot afford to lose any more foreign markets.

With the resignation of Lester Crossley from the city manager's position, and his subsequent move to a West Texas city, Ranger is losing one of its outstanding citizens.

A conscientious employee of the city, the efficiency of city hall proclaims his accomplishments. His loss will no doubt be felt in the months to come.

Two of our city's projected projects were delayed temporarily this week. First of all the swimming pool was not opened Wednesday as planned and seems that it will be Friday before it is opened for use by local swimmers.

City workmen said that never have they seen the pool in such shape. Of course, it collects much sand and trash between seasons and likely, heavy dust storms in early Spring did nothing but worsen the situation.

Employees of the city have been working long hours, even up into the night, dredging the silt and leaves from the pool in an attempt to have it ready on the tentative opening date. Water began pouring into the clean pool Tuesday. However, approximately 48 hours is required to fill the cement container.

Another project postponed temporarily, was the use of water from Lake Leon for the city supply. A air leak in the suction lines caused the temporary delay. We're not an expert on much of anything, and certainly not on problems concerning water, and methods of transportation of the liquid.

Those that are experts though tell us, that any perforation, even one no larger than a pin head, will hamper all suction operations. The leak has been located now in the base of Leon Dam. A dredge was brought in for use Wednesday morning and the leak is expected to be plugged within the next two or three days.

After viewing certain aerial photos of the lake, that have been supplied by Delbert Capps, local photographer, one can easily see that some of the additional water will be required to completely fill the container.

The water height has just now reached a point where it begins to spread over nearby ground. The acreage that the lake covers will evidently be nearly double the space that it now covers.

When the lake fills completely, we think that local persons will be as surprised at the tremendous size of the project as they were after viewing the site following recent downpours.

Some say that it will require rains as large as those recently to bring the water gauge up to the 80' mark. We say, however, give us five inches of fast rain and you'll have a full lake.

Guam, Midway and the Philippines during World War II—and those in the military held prisoner of war by the enemy—must be filed by August 31, 1955.

The Defense Department is worried. More than two million workers are engaged in the manufacture of military supplies, but have not received security clearance. Those who handle "secret" and "top secret" work get a careful check. Below this they get a "confidential" clearance, sometimes in a matter of minutes. The military points out that some contractors give "confidential" clearance as soon as a worker is hired. Frankly, the Defense officials do not know what to do about it. They are unable to spare the personnel necessary to check all these workers. The FBI needs more money and men to do the job. The problem has been dumped into President Eisenhower's lap.

Most of the labor unions are seemingly against these security checks being made. They contend, as do some others, that it would create a sort of Gestapo. People in sensitive positions were checked for security during the war, and I can see no reason why it could not be done even better at the present time.

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Tuna Is Fine Catch When Fishing for New Spaghetti Recipe

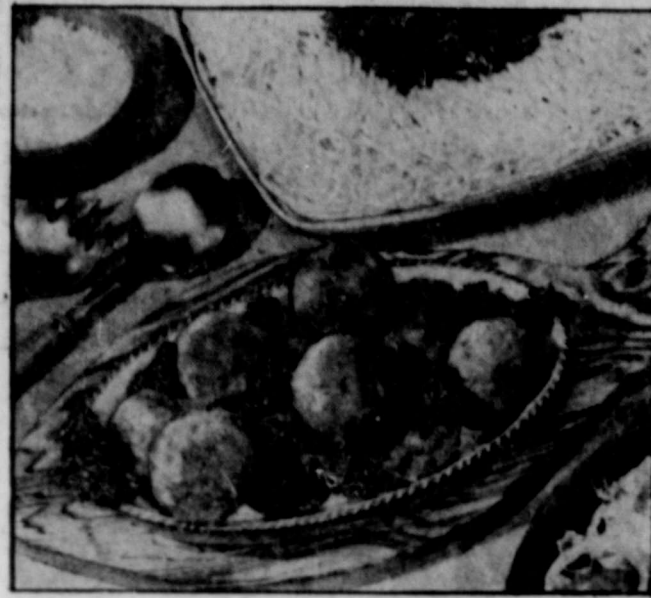
THIS recipe for Tuna Pompons with Spaghetti is a two-way gift from the sea for the homemaker who perennially faces the question, "What in the world can I serve that's different?" It's a nutrition-packed, tasty answer to the problem when a meatless meal must be served, and it's a real treat for lovers of sea food. You'll enjoy this party day-any day dish. Be sure and add the recipe to your menu file.

Tuna Pompons With Spaghetti (Makes 4 servings) Two 6 1/2-ounce cans chunk-style tuna, 2 tablespoons chopped onion, 1 No. 2 can tomatoes, 1 6-ounce can tomato paste, 1 teaspoon oregano, 1 teaspoon salt, freshly ground pepper, 2 eggs, 3/4 cup fine dry bread crumbs, 1/4 teaspoon marjoram, 2 tablespoons margarine or butter, 1 tablespoon salt, 3 quarts boiling water, 8 ounces spaghetti.

Drain tuna and reserve oil. In a saucepan combine 2 tablespoons tuna oil and onion; cook over low heat until onion is golden color. Add tomatoes, tomato paste, oregano, 1 teaspoon salt and pepper; mix thoroughly. Cover and cook over low heat 20 minutes, stirring occasionally.

In a bowl, combine tuna, unseasoned eggs, 1/2 cup crumbs and marjoram; mix thoroughly. Shape tuna mixture into 8 pompons. Roll in remaining crumbs. Melt margarine in skillet and cook pompons over medium heat until lightly browned. If desired, add browned pompons to tomato sauce and cook 5 minutes.

Meanwhile, add 1 tablespoon salt to rapidly boiling water. Gradually add spaghetti so that water continues to boil. Cook uncovered, stirring occasionally, until tender. Drain in colander. Serve tuna pompons with cooked spaghetti and sauce.

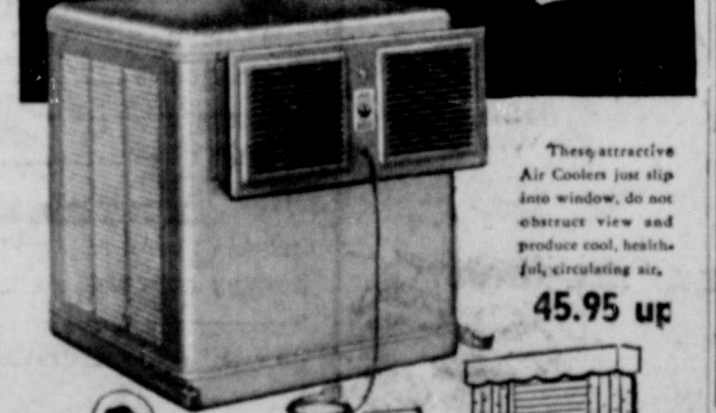
