

Tuna Is Fine Catch When Fishing for New Spaghetti Recipe,

THIS recipe for Tuna Pompons with Spaghetti is a two-way gift I from the sea for the homemaker who perennially faces the question, "What in the world can I serve that's different?" It's a nutrition-packed, tasty answer to the problem when a meat-less meal must be served, and it's a real treat for lovers of sea food You'll enjoy this party day-any day dish. Be sure and add the recipe to your menu file.

Tuna Pompons With Spaghetti (Makes 4 servings)

Two 61/2-cunce cans chunk-style tuna, 2 table poons chopped enion. 1 No. 2 can tomatoes, 1 6-ounce can tomato paste 1 teaspoon oregano, 1 teaspoon salt, freshly ground pepper, 2 eggs., 34 cup fine dry bread crumbs, 34 teaspoon marjoram, 2 tablespoons margarine or butter, 1 tablespoon salt, 3 quarts boiling water, 8

Drain tuna and reserve oil. In a saucepan combine 2 tablespoons tuna oil and onion; cook over low heat until onion is golden color. Add tomatoes, tomato paste, oregano, 1 teaspoon salt and pepper; mix thoroughly. Cover and cook over low heat 20 minutes, stirring In a bowl, combine tuna, unbeaten eggs, 1/2 cup crumbs and

marjoram; mix thoroughly. Shape tuna mixture into 8 pompons. Roll in remaining crumbs. Melt margarine in skillet and cook pompons over medium heat until lightly browned. If desired, add browned pompons to tomato sauce and cook 5 minutes. Meanwhile, add I tablespoon salt to rapidly boiling water. Grad-ually add spaghetti so that water continues to boil. Cook uncovered, stirring occasionally, until tender. Drain in colander. Serve tuna pompons with cooked spaghetti and sauce.




