## Crop Outlook Bright As Planting Nears End

### Shower Falls Here; Tornado Warnings Out

Turbulent clouds caused by cool air colliding with hot air laden with moisture caused a small shower here Friday night.

Other sections of the state particularly in North Central and deep West Texas were alerted for possible tornadoes. A funnel was spotted near Haskell, Vernon and Harold but none apparently touched ground.

Heaviest rain in the West Texas area was reported at Seymour with 1.39 inches.

A tornado warning was issued Friday evening that covered a large area of North Central and West Texas. The warning lasted for about four hours. Outmost point of the warning was 40 miles northwest of Fort Worth.

### Carl Springer, Ex-Eastlander, Buried On Sat.

Funeral for Carl P. Springer, 61, of Abilene, outstanding West Texas trial lawyer and civic leader, prominent former Eastland attorney, was to be held at 3 p.m. Saturday in St. Paul Methodist Church, Abilene.

The Rev. Phillip Walker, pastor of the Denton First Methodist Church and formerly Mr. Springer's pastor in Eastland was to officiate, assisted by Dr. Millard A. Jenkins, pastor emeritus of the First Baptist Church.

Special music was to be provided by a St. Paul quartet, with a solo by Dr. Euell Porter of Hardin-Simmons.

Mr. Springer, a native of Haskell, was a member of a prominent West Texas pioneer family. He was a member of the law firm of McMahon, Springer, Smart, and Walter.

He held ranching interests in Stanton County where he was reared. The veteran attorney was a director of two banks, the Farmers and Merchants National Bank of Abilene and the First National Bank of Rotan.

A civic leader of multiple interests, Mr. Springer was a trustee of two orphanages, the Methodist Home of Waco and Hendrick Home for Children in Abilene.

Mr. Springer, a veteran of World War I, went directly after the war to Eastland to begin law practice, arriving Jan. 1, 1919, while still in the uniform of a soldier.

### Peanut Seed Supply Temporarily Eased

"Prospective peanut crops for fall are better this year in Eastland County than they have been in the past three or four years," T. C. Wylie, manager of Ranger Peanut Company said today.

He said that nearly half of the entire crop had been planted since moisture from recent rains had dried enough to allow planting, and that the entire planting operation would probably be completed within ten days barring additional moisture.

Wylie said a number of the peanut growers are having to plant inferior seeds, however, as a result of nearly all-out sale of peanuts in favor of last year's high drought prices. Seeds this year are selling for around 30 cents per pound.

He indicated that most of the peanut growers will have some sort of seed available regardless of quality. The 7 1/2 per cent in acreage allotments also aided the situation in becoming more acute.

A part of the seeds now available were those that formerly went to the oil mill trade.

"If we can get by the extreme hot weather that we suffered last year and get a few showers along in July and August, then the entire Eastland County crop will be above that of the past few years," Wylie said.

The acreage allotment increase was affected in May of this year on the insistence of Rep. Omar Burleson, the Southwestern Peanut Shellers and the Southwest Peanut Growers Association and other governmental officials. The allotment brought the total in Eastland County to nearly 35,000 acres.

Other crops over the county now being put into the ground include sugarcane, sorghum and although the cotton acreage is relatively small.

Farm land is reported to be in good condition to work and, in much of the county, there's a "good season," with more than eight or nine inches of rain received lately.

The courtroom was crowded as the judge finished his lecture to the defendant in a divorce case.

"So, I've decided to give your wife \$50 per month," the judge concluded.

The defendant's face lit up. "That's swell, Judge," he smiled. "I'll try to slip her a couple of bucks now and then myself."

In only the first four Little League games this season, there has developed an unnecessary amount of heckling slanting toward individual ball players and the umpires.

There is no room for any such heckling or "riding," or "baiting," or any other adjective that you might apply. The Little League is devised to build sportsmanship and character above all else. A winning team is only secondary.

The players are at a tender age. They are subject to ever-lasting temperaments, emotions, and complexes.

If they are given to believe that an umpire has treated them unjustly or unfairly, or that the crowd, through their jeers, has discredited their efforts, a deep scar could easily be burned into their minds to torment them through the remainder of their life.

League officials have said that the identical problem was encountered last year, and that it was a problem more perplexing than any others encountered.

It's not that the favorites should be cheered on by their own supporters, but when an individual umpire or player is singled out for ridicule, then the entire purpose of Little League is defeated.

First we should possibly remember that during these Little League contests, we are not attending a game played by professionals. They are beginners, learners, of kindergarten classification. They do not yet have the power to think clearly and quickly for themselves. Yet, they are learning, and Little League only quickens their thoughts and actions.

They have not reached the peak of baseball where every maneuver is strictly a routine, practiced thousands of times over.

For the umpires, they spend nearly three hours each Monday and Tuesday, in tiring, thankless, volunteer and unpaid labor. They have no other personal interest in the game other than the advancement of Little League to call each individual play according to their own interpretation.

We cannot agree that an umpire's decision would be made only to benefit any single team or player.

We can only urge, as do League officials, that the heckling and ridicule be discontinued and that the energy be diverted to provide for a bigger and better Little League organization here.

Anyone who thinks he's indispensable should stick his finger in a bowl of water and notice the hole it makes when he pulls it out.

Two miles northwest of Eastland, Irish Drilling Co., Inc., of Eastland staked No. 2 Ben Mathews as an 1,800-foot rotary project. It spots 400 feet from the south and 603 feet from the west lines of a 40-acre lease in Section 24, Block 4, H&TC Survey.

Six miles south of Eastland, V. A. Cain of Midland spotted No. 3 C. E. Lafoon as a 1,999-foot rotary project, spotting 150 feet from the north and west lines of Section 25, Block 2, H&TC Survey.

W. H. (Bill) Hoffman of Eastland No. 2 McIntosh Heirs will be a 1,350-foot cable tool project seven miles south of Eastland, spotting 1,080 feet from the west and 2,250 feet from the south lines of Section 30, Block 2, H&TC Survey.

law firm in Eastland June 1, 1923, and until he moved to Abilene the firm was known as Turner-Seaberry-Springer. In Eastland he was a Rotarian and was a Mason. He was a graduate of the University of Texas.

Shortly after moving to Eastland, he married Mildred Foy of Baird, a member of another prominent West Texas family. They were married Aug. 25, 1919.

They moved to Abilene Feb. 1, 1941, when he became associated with Tom McMahon and Hudson Smart, then the only members of the law firm which is now one of the largest in this area.

Survivors include his wife; one daughter, Mrs. Robert J. Tiffany of Abilene; three grandchildren, Robert Jared Tiffany Jr., William Springer Tiffany, and Julie Foy Tiffany; one sister, Mrs. Ella Lanier of Aspermont; and five brothers, Raleigh L. Springer, president of the Rotan Bank; W. A. Springer, Aspermont rancher, E. F. Springer, Fort Worth businessman, N. E. Springer, Aspermont funeral director, and G. W. Springer, Aspermont rancher.

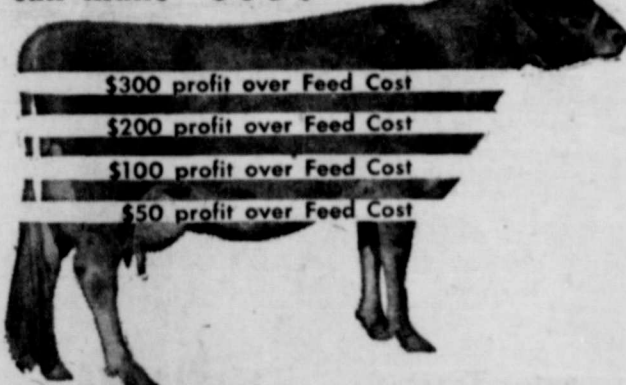

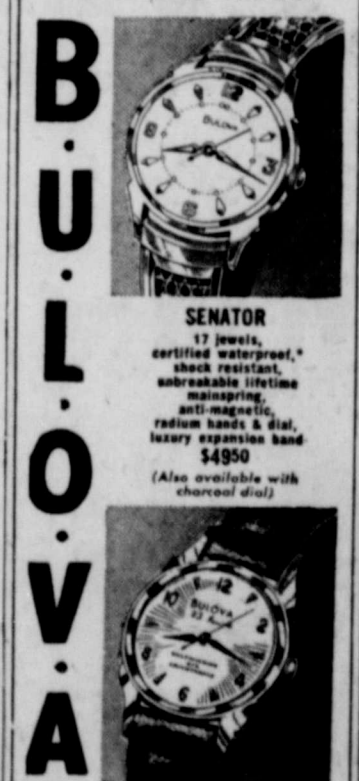

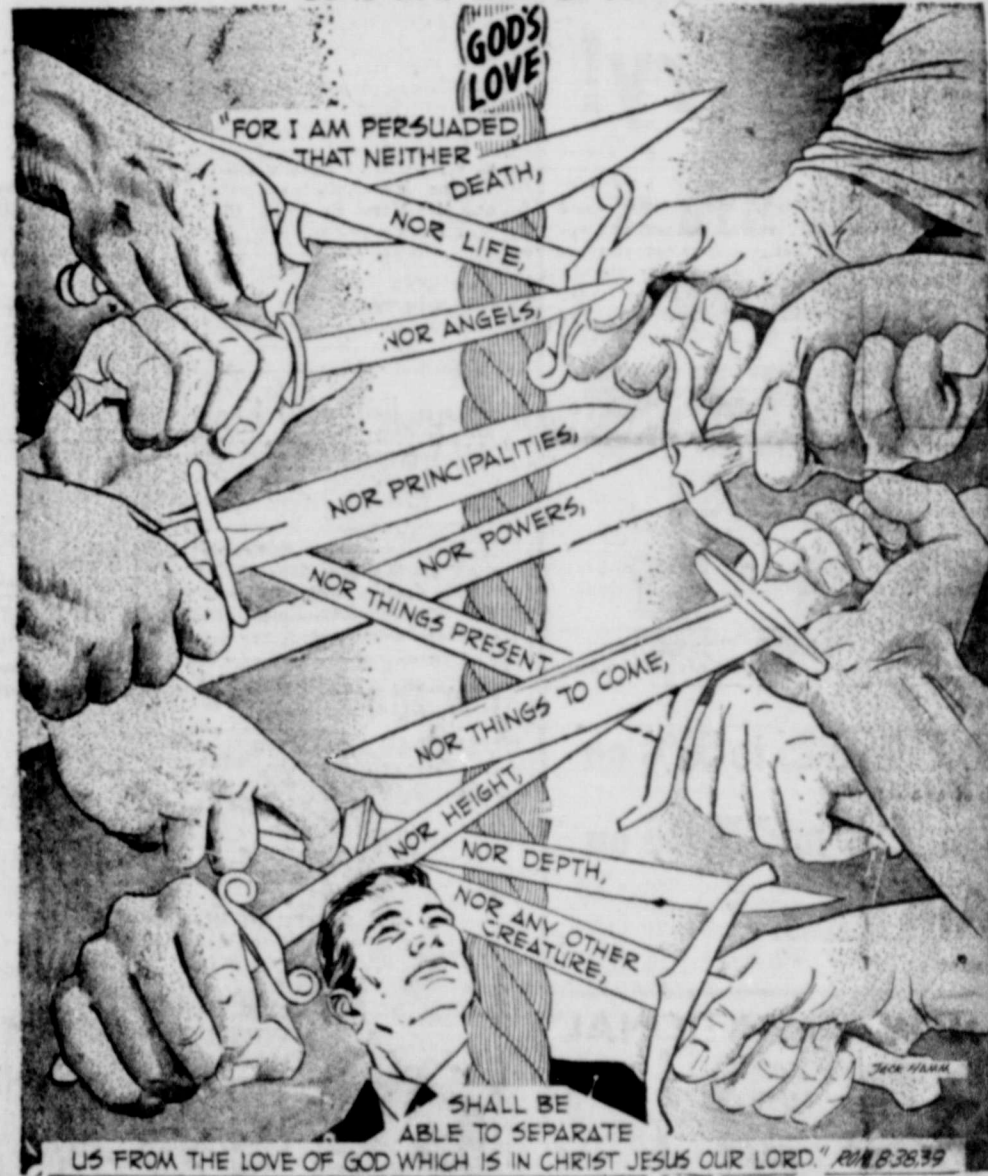
