keeping her family's salt supply in balance during the summer times from industries which dispense salt tablets to workers engaged in heavy exertion in high temperatures. Cases of heat prostration and even heat fatalities were a serious problem to many industries until it was discovered that salt depletion from excessive perspiration was the cause For the average person slightly

more salt in the preparation of food and at the table is sufficient to compensate for losses throug perspiration. Others engaged vigorous work or play in high temperatures may need to bolster their reserve with extra salt be tween meals. As a general summer rule, the more profuse the perspiration, the greater the need for more salt.






