"I don't know either, dad, but it's crawling down your neck."

It was quite clear at Tuesday night's commissioners meeting that some of the members would respect nothing except power. While the mayor advocates that he opposes the city manager form of government, and yet only last week supported an application from Graham for the identical position, has only led some to believe that his only intention is to relieve Lester Crossley of the position.

Quite an undertaking for a man who several years ago put Crossley in his present position and now wants to rub him out like putting a blotter into a puddle of spilled ink.

Surely, Mr. Mayor, you don't believe that eight years of experience has reduced his qualifications for the position.

Mr. Ingram, you have asserted continuously Tuesday night most recently, that you were elected to run your department and have so far been denied the privilege.

Take a look at the minutes of city council minutes in the past, and never has there been one recommendation concerning your department proposed before the remaining councilmen that you have made.

This might indicate that you are entirely satisfied in the manner that "someone else" is running your department.

To refresh your memory, three weeks ago Street Commissioner Owen Bray proposed that parking meter fines be increased. The commissioners each and all asked for your recommendations as fire and police commissioner. You had none.

Again Tuesday night, Finance Commissioner H. M. Bagwell asked for your recommendations on the transfer of city firemen to the fire station, again you had none.

So, Mr. Commissioner, you say that you aren't given a chance to run your department, and yet when three sincere men ask for your recommendations — you have none.

What room is left for complaint that you can't run your department?

Surely, you do not want to take such measures where no one else knows of your plans, what you are doing and how you have accomplished it.

Oh, but for the fulfillment of campaign promises. Some of us have boasted of the numerous changes to be made, the heads to fall and the innovations of a complete form of government, only to be bottled up in crucial moments because we didn't stop to consider someone else's feelings, and because the boasts were designed to roll roughshod over any who consider standardization.

Mr. Mayor and Mr. Police Commissioner, 475 persons made it rather plain and blunt through their signatures on the petition presented to the city commission Tuesday night, that they would like to see Lester Crossley hang his hat around here for some time yet.

When that many people react that strongly, we believe that it might be a good idea to adopt a hands off policy.

It would be quite a shame for a petition bearing that many names to be presented before the commission requesting the mayor's RESIGNATION.

Ned Leabris, Carbon was elected president of the newly formed Sabana Valley Game Preserve Association at a recent meeting of the farmers and ranchers at the Center Point School in south central Eastland County, according to an announcement today.

Other officers named include: Henry Lovell, vice-president, and Berry Greenwood, secretary-treasurer. Both Lovell and Greenwood get their mail out of Carbon.

Four directors will be elected in the near future who will, with the officers, act as the governing body of the organization. Special emphasis in the newly formed game preserve will be on deer and quail, according to Eastland County Agent J. M. Cooper, who has been helping the group set up the organization.

There are a few deer in the thinly settled area at the present time. Deer hunting is to be closed in the area for the next five years, it was said.

The group plans to meet on the second Tuesday night in each month at Center Point School. Blocking up of land acreages by signing the applications and agreements is already underway by the secretary. From 20,000 to 35,000 acres are in the proposed area.

It is reported likely that farmers and ranchers in the north end of Comanche County will be invited to participate in the organization.

Tempers Flare Anew In City Council Meeting Tuesday

City Manager's Job Ignites Lengthy Fued

Mayor Lee Dockery, who apparently was more interested in the names on a petition urging Lester Crossley to remain as city manager, than business before the council, in closing remarks furnished the fireworks for a stormy ending of the city commissioners meeting Tuesday night.

After three commissioners, Owen Bray, H. M. Bagwell, and Addie Williams, had voted to reject Crossley's resignation and asked his reconsideration, Dockery standing from the floor before a sizeable crowd, said, "You gentlemen have made your decision, but I always have been and still am opposed to the city manager form of government."

The three opposing commissioners asked Dockery for his reasons. He would give none except that it was more economical. Williams and Bagwell asked the mayor to submit his recommendations before the council for due consideration.

Dockery's answer to most of the questioning was simply, "the majority rules."

Bray said, "Mayor, if we revert to the city secretary form of government then you would have all of the power."

Dockery replied, "I don't want the power."

Bray counterpunched, "Then we won't give it to you."

Crossley challenged the mayor to comply with the petition in the closing minutes of the argument. He asked, "Mayor, in view of this development what do you propose to do?"

Only To Preside
Dockery replied, "Nothing, I will just come down and preside."

"But do you think anything can be accomplished with a definite three-two split on the commission, and with the mayor taking a passive part in the conduct of city affairs," Crossley asked.

Dockery answered, "I won't interfere, I didn't get out of line tonight, did I?"

Meeting with controlled emotions previously, the commissioners had not shown any outburst of tempers before last night since the meeting April 30, when Dockery refused to hear council business that resulted in the election of Williams as mayor pro-tem who signed each of the police commissions and with the vote of Bray and Bagwell reappointed each of the city employees.

The split of the council has been noticeable since.

Basis For Argument
Basis for the argument was the petition bearing 475 signatures urging Crossley to withdraw his resignation, presented by Wilson Guest, who acted as spokesman, J. F. Killingsworth, James Hatfield, T. J. Anderson and Calvin Lipkin.

Referring to the mayor's proposed city secretary form of government, Williams reminded Dockery that he (Dockery) had said that he would run the city after midnight of that night.

Bagwell said, "If I couldn't go along with this petition, I'd be ashamed to walk down Main Street in the morning." Only a few business men in the city had not signed the petition urging Crossley to remain.

As Mean As Any
Bray said, "I will go all the way for harmony here and will deeply consider any legitimate recommendations, but if we can't get it — then I can be as mean as any of you."

The street commissioner also asked Dockery to leave the petition on file in city hall, that he may want a photostatic copy of the instrument.

Bray's request had reference to Crossley's letter of resignation which Dockery "just forgot and stuck it in my pocket," before he returned it more than a week later.

Dockery agreed that was the place for it and that he would leave it there.

Even though Dockery stated that he was opposed to the city manager form of government, Commissioner Williams, Bray and Bagwell said that the mayor had supported P. W. Jackson's application for the position. Jackson was the applicant from Graham.

The council deferred action on a request by Constable Ralph Veal to install a police-type radio in his car. Under Veal's plan, the city would underwrite the cost of the unit and would in turn look for 50 percent of the payment from Veal and another half from the Civil Defense Administration.

An election board of three persons, Mrs. Reba Rawls, chairman, A. F. Stevens and J. D. Barker were appointed to canvass city employees on the question of social security and to submit their recommendations to a referendum man representing the government.

Squall Line Brings More Rain To Area

Two separate, east moving squall lines dumped .80 inches of rain on Ranger Wednesday afternoon after storms Tuesday.

The hard blowing rain which was gauged in varying measurements Tuesday, fell for the most part in less than an hour.

The storm line brought extensive damage to nearby communities Wednesday.

After the storm here Wednesday, 42 dead sparrows were found under a large tree in the J. T. Robinson yard. They were evidently killed by lightning.

A thunderstorm, "with hailstones as big as baseballs," were reported to have stripped trees and broken windows in Eastland.

In DeLeon, the storm unroofed houses, uprooted trees and left the city without electricity.

While further in West Texas, Rotan counted \$250,000 in property damage. Damages there were caused both by high winds and hail.

There were no tornadoes reported in this area however, and none were forecast by the weather bureau.

A tornado did strike at Follett in the Panhandle, however, blowing down a grain elevator before skipping into Oklahoma.

Though damages were relatively light here Tuesday, several other localities reported heavy storm damage.

Four members of a family living east of Abilene escaped injury when their home was smashed by wind.

Crops were destroyed in an area between Sylvester and Roby by severe hail and wind.

Other cities reporting rain were Breckenridge, 1.5; Buffalo Gap, 4.25; Clyde, 1.40; Merkel, .50 and Tye, 2.10.

Ranger Woman Struck By Lightning Wed.

Mrs. Izetta Smith, 214 S. Marston, was stricken lightly by lightning while in bed early Wednesday morning.

Mrs. Smith said that she had gotten up near midnight to observe the clouds and had gone back to sleep with two pillows over her face.

She said when the lightning struck, it felt as though someone was pouring hot water over her neck, arms and legs and that probably the pillows saved her hair from being burned.

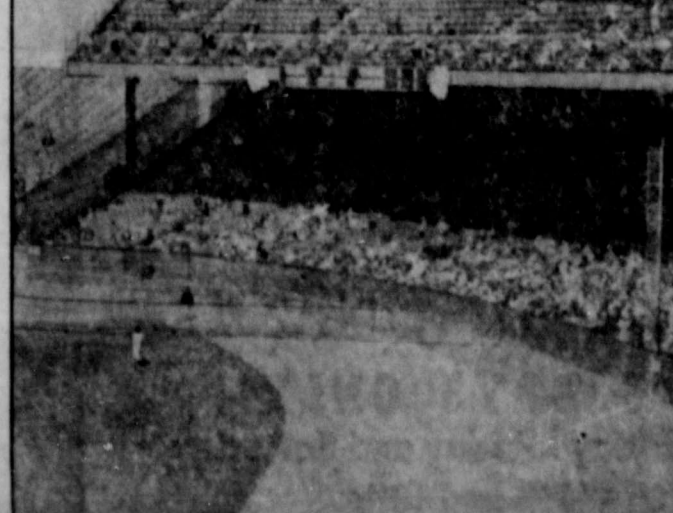
Eastland County Gains Regular Oil Producer

El Capitan Oil Co. of Midland No. 1 Roper, BRB&C Survey, A-43, was completed three miles northeast of Eastland. It has been placed in the Eastland County Regular Field.

Daily potential was 32 barrels of 42 gravity oil and 66 per cent water. It is pumping from four perforations per foot at 1,512-27 feet where the formation was ruptured. Casing is set at 1,585 feet and the hole bottomed at 1,620 feet.

A regular field location was staked two miles south of Olden and slated for 1,850 feet with rotary. It is Norris & DeLaitte, operating from Eastland, No. 1-A George Fox.

Drillite is 750 feet from the south and 600 feet from the west lines of Lot 67, McLennon CSI Survey.

Six-County Four-H Camp Is Scheduled

The camp is recreational in nature with swimming one of the main attractions. Lake Cisco pool has ideal facilities for this event Cooper said. Besides swimming other games are track, horseshoes, baseball, washers and this year two new events are to be added, the three legged race and tug-of-war. The pillow fighting will be eliminated due to its hazards it was said. All events are on a competitive basis and ribbons are awarded the winners.

Postmaster A. E. Crawley today outlined changes in postal fees which were effected here June 7. They are as follows:

"Effective June 7, 1955, the minimum registration fee of 39c on mail articles having no value was discontinued. The minimum fee now is 40c. To take the place of the 30c fee the Post Office Department initiated a new service—"Certified Mail." This service is for the use of patrons on mail having no value but for which they want evidence of delivery.

"The fee for this service is 15c in addition to the regular postage. A return receipt may be obtained by paying an additional fee of 7c. On this service the patron is given a gummed slip of paper containing a number. The patron attaches this number to his letter, affixes the necessary postage, and drops it in as ordinary mail. This mail is handled as ordinary mail except a receipt is obtained when delivered to the addressee.

Crawley said also, that after June 20, box rents could be paid for quarter, semi-annual or annual terms.

Cisco Woman's Father Drowns While Fishing

While fishing below Marble Falls dam, near Austin, recently the father of a Cisco woman drowned.

Dead was the Rev. Joseph F. Karling, 61, pastor of Decker Methodist Church and father of Mrs. C. E. Hooker of Cisco.

BETTI'S BUDGET of HELPFUL HINTS

Here's a lunch menu which will tempt your children's appetites as well as your own: "Funny-Face" Meat Muffins, molded berry salad, green, bread, butter, sugar cookies and milk. Your children will be delighted with the meat muffins. They are made with ground beef, prepared the way you usually do for meat loaf. The ground beef mixture is packed in the muffin tins so that each is 2-3 full. They are baked in a slow oven (300 degrees F.) for 30 minutes. When the meat muffins are served, slices of stuffed olives are arranged on each to form "funny faces."

Assorted sponge mops are a "must" in every cleaning supply closet. One useful type is a double-thick sponge angled on a long wood stick to save you from bending into a pretzel while chasing dirt. With it, you can easily reach hard-to-get-at corners. Since all sponges have a way of "hoarding" soapuds, they help you to spread lots of lather wherever needed.

A salad becomes a meal in itself when you make it hearty with meat. A pleasing combination is cubed cooked meat or julienne strips of ready-to-serve meat with fresh spinach, chopped celery, pitted black olives, and tomato wedges. A bleu cheese dressing adds flavor interest.

Flexible plastic pails that are noiseless and won't corrode, rust, or peel, are the best accompaniment to soap-and-water cleaning you can think of. They scarcely weigh anything at all so you can carry them easily, won't chip the paint if they happen to bump the wall, form their own pour spouts when you discard soiled soapuds, and come in a refreshing range of colors. These plastic pails—some with covers—also make wonderful picnic equipment to carry bottled or canned soft drinks packed in ice.

Frozen meat should be used immediately after it is defrosted. Defrosted meat should not be refrozen.

Salt To Beat Summer Heat

The homemaker's salt cellar plays an important part in good summer nutrition for members of her family.

By more liberal salting of foods, she fortifies them against the ill effects of salt depletion resulting from excessive perspiration. Weariness and loss of effort are the first symptoms of a below-normal salt reserve. As the reserve drops still further, dizziness, heat cramps and heat prostration result.

The homemaker's lesson for

keeping her family's salt supply in balance during the summer times from industries which disperse salt tablets to workers engaged in heavy exertion in high temperatures. Cases of heat prostration and even heat fatalities were a serious problem to many industries until it was discovered that salt depletion from excessive perspiration was the cause.

For the average person slightly more salt in the preparation of food and at the table is sufficient to compensate for losses through perspiration. Others engaged in vigorous work or play in high temperatures may need to bolster their reserve with extra salt between meals. As a general summer rule, the more profuse the perspiration, the greater the need for more salt.

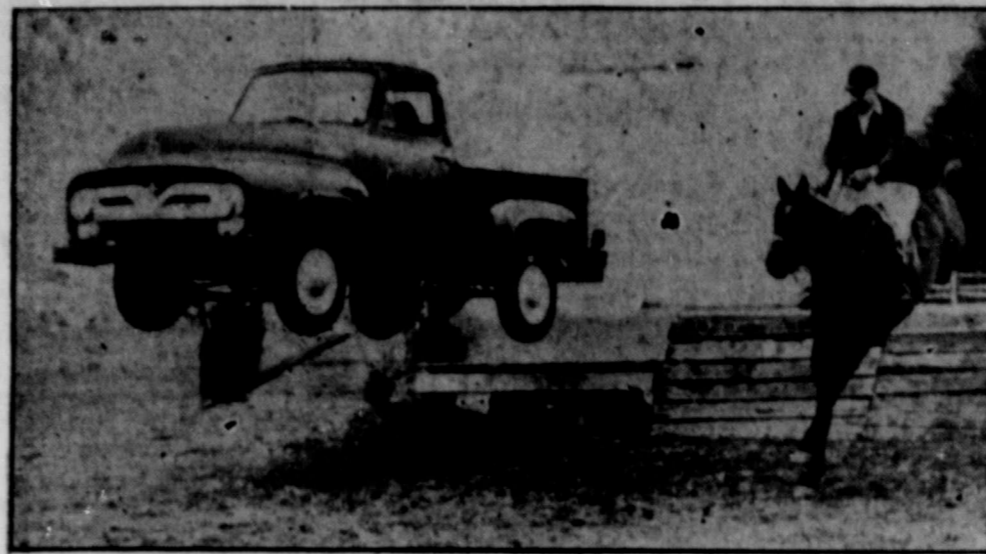

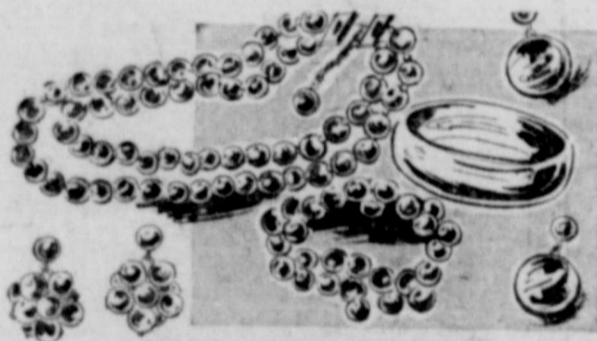

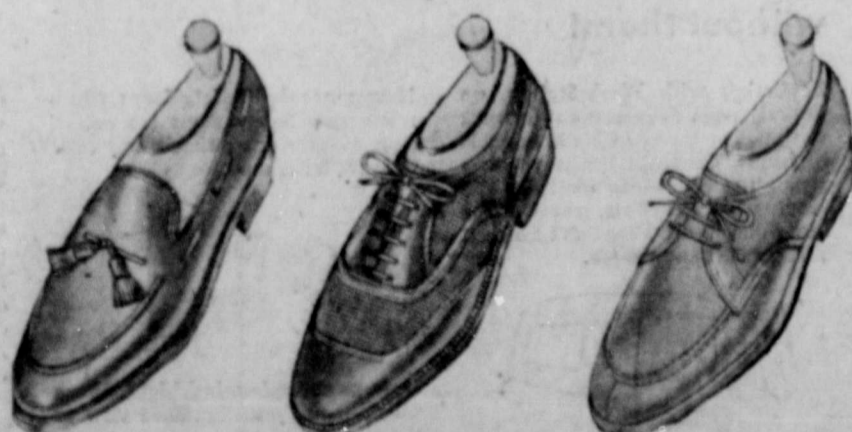
