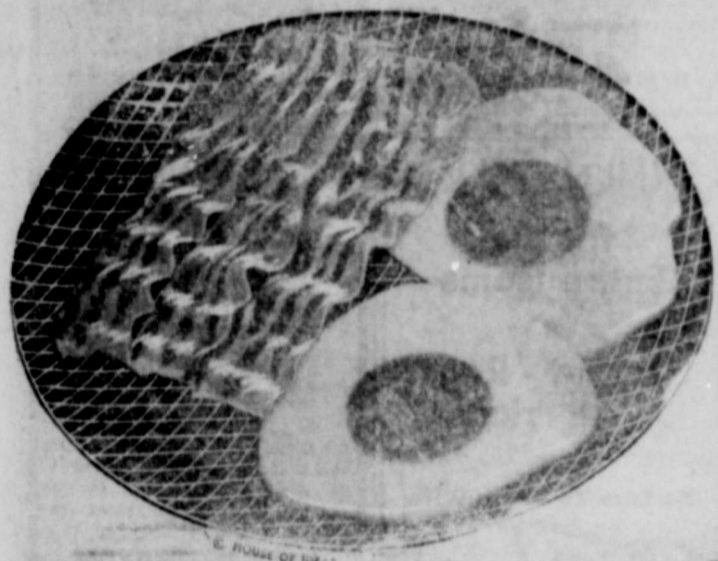

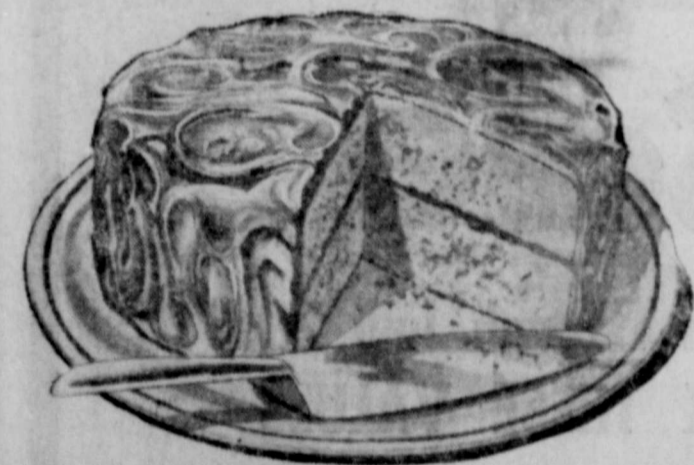

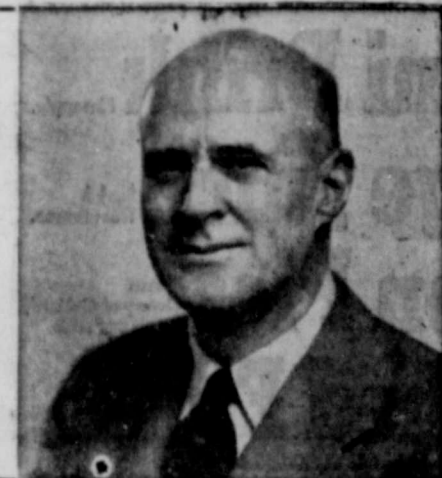

Murder Case Continues To Be State Wide News

The Cisco murder case is still grabbing off headlines around the state this week and both Eastland and Cisco have been swamped by reporters.

The case has developed into a three ring circus affair in Eastland, where photographers—both still and television—have staked out in front of the jail, the courthouse and the defense attorney's office. The pictures they've taken have not been unusual. They have been of County Attorney Earl Conner sitting behind his desk, of defense attorney Allen Dabney Sr. walking on the street and other similar shots. These may interest readers around the state, but to Eastland County people they are simply common day sights.
