Gann, chairman; and Boy Scouts, chairman to be appointed.

Bill Auvenshine, local United Fund publicity director, reports that only two asking agencies have turned in requests for funds to date. Other agencies are urged to make their requests at the earliest possible date so that goals can be set in making final plans for the campaign set for early in the fall.

Run-Away Negro Boy, 13 Years Old, Picked Up Here

A thirteen-year-old Negro boy posed a problem for local police for a few hours last Friday. The boy was picked up early Friday morning by police officers when they found him wandering aimlessly around the streets.

After much questioning, the boy said that he was from Hobbs, New Mexico, but a check with Hobbs authorities failed to reveal any relatives there.

About 10:30 a.m. the youth darted from the police station and disappeared down the street. Police spent until 2:30 that afternoon looking for him and finally found him walking along Highway 80.

He was taken back to the police station, where after friendly treatment plus new blue jeans and a shirt bought by local officers, he finally admitted that he was from Fort Worth and gave the names of his parents.

Officers notified the parents, who said that the boy had run away from home. The parents picked him up about 11 a.m. Saturday and returned him to Fort Worth.

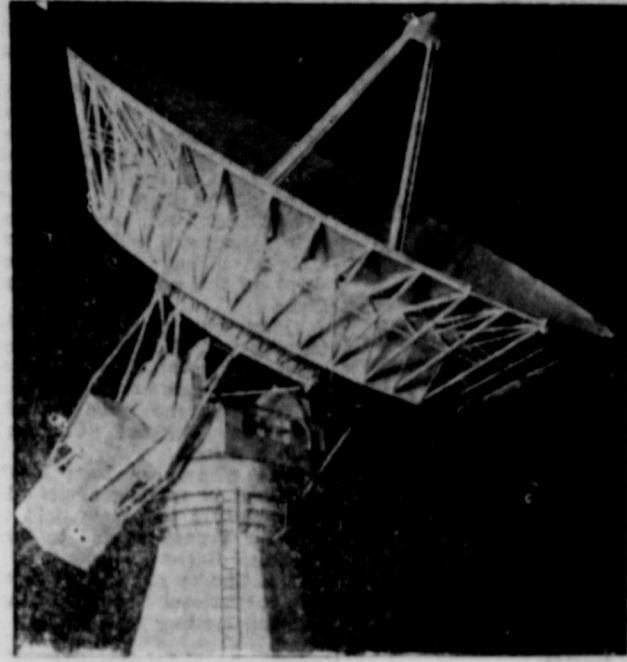

Renewed Oil Activity Is Noted In County

Five new drilling locations staked in Eastland County point to renewed oil activity in this area.

One, a Desdemona (Marble Falls) Field project, is Standard Oil Co., of Texas No. 1 Mrs. Annie Thompson, et al, one-half mile south of Desdemona. It is a 3,500-foot rotary venture on a 49.62-acre lease with drillsite 91 feet from the north and 600 feet from the east lines of W. F. Stockton Survey, A-649.

The other four locations were staked by Nueva Operating Co. of Abilene in Courtney (Strawn) Field 3 1/2 miles northwest of Eastland. All are on the C. G. injection wells.

County Cancer Patients Receive Free Dressings

Twenty-one Eastland County patients are receiving dressings from the American Cancer Association. Seven clubs in the county are making the dressings, according to Mrs. Earnest Shafer, county service chairman, of Cisco.

The dressings made by the clubs are used within the county. If there is a surplus of dressings they are sent to the state headquarters to be distributed.

These dressings are issued to patients free of charge. They are distributed individually, not to nursing homes and hospitals. If the patient is in the hospital or nursing home, he still may receive free cancer dressings.

Dressings, bed jackets and bed pads are specially made by the following county clubs: Word Home Demonstration Club, Lake Cisco Home Demonstration Club, Ladies of the Cisco Lutheran Church, and ladies of the First Christian Church, all of Cisco; Nimrod Neighborhood Club, Flatwood Home Demonstration Club and North Star Club in Rising Star.

Granville Jones Retires July 31 From Lone Star

Granville W. Jones, one of Lone Star's oldest employees in terms of service, retired July 31. According to the "Blue Blaze", published for employees of Lone Star Gas System, Jones' record on retirement showed a working career of 40 years and 10 months.

Born on a farm near Troy, Jones moved with his parents to Callahan County in 1911, where he farmed until he was 26 years old. At 26 he began working for Lone Star Oct. 1, 1939, as a laborer. He became an operator at the Pueblo Plant on July 1, 1929, and transferred on Oct. 15, 1933, as a relief operator. After working in and around Ranger as a relief operator for many years, he was assigned to the RCF plant near Ranger in 1943.

The Joneses plan to move into Ranger to live until they decide where to locate permanently. Jones says that hunting and fishing will be his new career.

He has been active in community affairs in Ranger for many years. He served three terms as commander of the American Legion, is past commander of the World War I organization, and served two years as commander of a government housing project in Ranger.

Nathan Curry Is Declared Delinquent Child by Court

Nathan Curry, 16, has been declared by the court to be a delinquent child by reason of having committed an act of burglary on or about June 28, 1961 at the private residence of Mrs. Florence Hussey in Cisco, Judge John Hart stated Wednesday morning.

All attorneys and witnesses in the case have been instructed by the court to make no comment regarding this hearing other than indicated in the above statement, Hart added. Judge Hart said that an order of commitment had been issued and that members of the Eastland County Sheriff's Department left Eastland at 11:30 a.m. Wednesday with young Curry, to place him in the Gateville State School for Boys.

The hearing, which lasted two and one-half hours was held in the Eastland County Court.

Curry has been under arrest in connection with the stabbing murder of Mrs. Hussey, secretary of the First Baptist Church in Cisco.

It was understood before the hearing that if Curry was declared a juvenile delinquent he would be held in the state reformatory at Gatesville until he is 17, when he could face trial as an adult on a murder charge.

District Attorney Earl Conner Jr. dismissed an early charge of murder and substituted the burglary charge.

Curry was represented by Allen D. Dabney Sr., who was assisted by George Leonard and Temple Dixon, both of Sweetwater.

Organization Of United Fund Completed Mon.

The directors of the United Fund of Ranger held a business meeting at the Chamber of Commerce Monday night for the purpose of completing the organization of the United Fund. Herman Cupp, vice president, presided in the absence of the president, Dr. Charles E. Gann.

Each director was told the number of years he is to serve on the Board of Directors, the length of term of each being determined by lot. Seven directors will have a one-year term; seven, a two-year term; and seven, a three-year term. Under this plan there will be 14 old board members serving each year to assist in the United Fund campaign.

Those to serve two years are the following: Mmes. H. C. Croom, James P. Morris, E. L. McMillan, Charles E. Gann, and J. T. Robertson, a director from the New Era Club (to be appointed), and Dr. Charles E. Gann.

Directors drawing three year terms include the following: Herman Cupp, W. F. Crouser, David D. Pickrell, Ronald Carroll, Claude Sooter, the Boy Scout director (to be appointed), and the Chamber of Commerce director (to be named later).

Bill Auvenshine, publicity chairman, gave a report on coming activities planned. Arthur Deffebach, chairman of the budget committee, reported that requests for funds had been received from three organizations outside Ranger but that the budget committee recommended that these requests be turned down and that money collected in Ranger be allocated to these local asking agencies: Boy Scouts, Salvation Army, Child Welfare, Teen Town, Ranger Community Library, Red Cross, and Campfire Girls. Deffebach also stated that of these agencies, only two, the Salvation Army and Boy Scouts, had turned in their requests for money to date. The directors voted that these two requests be accepted.

AUSTIN—"You can't take it with you," and they often break when thrown from a car window and can cause slashed automobile tires or injuries to people who step on them; third, they can be the origin of grass fires caused by the summer sun's rays.

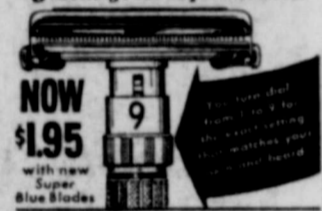
He said the litter problem is "especially acute in Texas' 1,000 Roadside Parks during the summer months when they are heavily used. "We provide disposal units at these parks and ask that they be used."

"Summer is the time of year when Texans and their families enjoy the outdoors to the fullest," Greer noted. "We encourage motorists to enjoy using our highways and Roadside Parks—but please leave them clean for the enjoyment of others."

Greer urged motorists to follow these simple rules to stamp out litter:

- (1) Set a good example for your children and neighbors by always disposing of trash in a proper receptacle and carrying a litterbag in your car.
  - (2) Aid your local civic organizations in making people aware of the need to keep Texas highways beautiful by "stowing" trash, not throwing it.
  - (3) Enjoy the picnicking facilities of Roadside Parks but leave them clean for the next visitor.
- Greer commented that a large percentage of the litterbugs are not out-of-state tourists but are Texas residents. "I am afraid that many of our litterbugs are local citizens," he said. "They simply do not think of the consequences of throwing out an empty pack of cigarettes, a napkin, or a bottle and how these items, multiplied by the thousands of motorists who use our highways each day, can destroy the scenic qualities of our highway network."
- He pinpointed bottles as the "triple threat" of highway litter. "First, they are the hardest items to pick up among the litter; second,

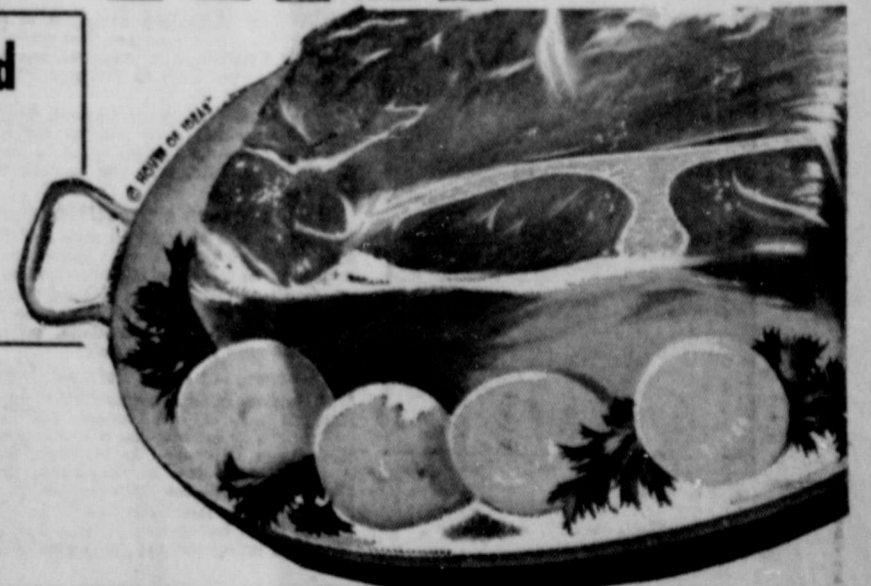

### Good Dove Season Will Depend Upon Weather, Weeds

With fewer than 30 days until the opening of the mourning dove season in the North Zone, Sept. 1, there is still a great deal of speculation as to how plentiful this year's crop will be. According to Howard Dodgen, executive secretary of the Game and Fish Commission, some hot, dry weather is needed to ripen feed seed, and darken considerably the green effect of the present abundance of foliage.

In parts of West Texas where there has not been too much rain, weed seeds are now ripening, according to information received in Austin. In these cases, the doves seem to be plentiful at the present time. However, the abundance of rain in Central Texas has vegetation very lush, and weed seeds are not yet ripening. Since water holes have been filled completely, this will tend to scatter late evening dove shooting around the water holes.

So, according to the executive secretary, it is anybody's guess as to how good the dove season will be. On the other hand, the quail crop right now looks to be in top condition. There are still a few nesting birds, but for the most part there have been heavy hatches in practically every part of the state. As a result, a big crop of birds is reported in areas where there were practically no birds last year.

Under the general laws, the quail season will open Dec. 1. The Game Commission will set the quail season in regulatory counties at its quarterly meeting early in October.

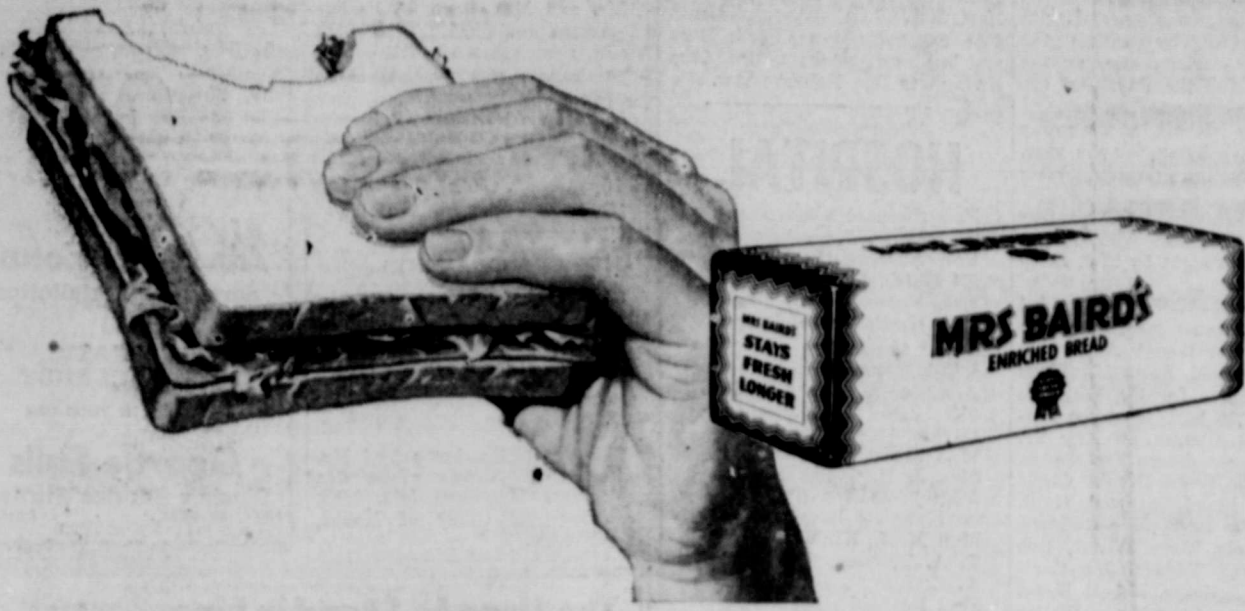
