## Ranger School Enrollment To Date Approximately Same As Last Year's

Total enrollment in the Ranger Public Schools, as of Aug. 30, is 702 students, approximately the same as last year's figure.

The enrollment in grades 1-3 in Hodges Oak Park School is 185; in grades 4-6 in Young School, 182; in grades 7-8 in Ranger Junior High School, 130; and in Ranger High School, 192. Thirteen students have registered in the Slaughter School. More students are expected to be registered on Tuesday when school starts and throughout the remainder of the week.

Students all over the Ranger Public School system will be greeted with improvements in the school plants, both inside and outside, when they report for classes Sept. 5. Workmen have been at work all summer redecorating and making building improvements. Work was concentrated this year on major improvements at Young School, with similar improvements in other buildings of the system planned for the future.

At Young School all old desks were removed, and 216 new desk-chair units were installed. Floors were redone with a seal-coat and was finished. Also added in each room were lockers for storage of students' books and supplies and new fluorescent lighting fixtures with new wiring were installed. On the playground a new backstop was erected on the Pershing Street approach to the building.

A large group of children, mothers, and other guests attended the open house and inspected the classroom and equipment.

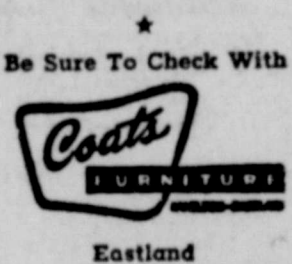
The kindergarten will be open from 8:30-11:30 a.m. Monday through Friday.

### San Antonio Firm Contracts Road

A contract for 7.8 miles of construction on F. M. Road 2689 in Eastland County has been awarded to a San Antonio firm, it was announced in Austin this week by the State Highway Commission.

Maupin Construction Company submitted the low bid of \$191,533 on the project. Grading, structures, base and surfacing from FM 81 in Gorman north to mile-closure of FM 2563 is expected to take 150 working days, according to E. M. Pritchard District Highway Engineer at Brownwood.

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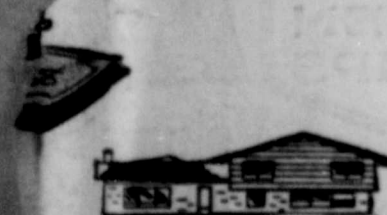

### TOP YEAST BAKER AT FAIR WINS SPECIAL AWARD

1 1/2 cup warm (not hot) water  
1/2 cup milk  
1/4 cup sugar  
1 teaspoon salt  
2 tablespoons melted shortening  
2 3/4 to 3 cups sifted flour  
1 egg  
2 tablespoons melted butter (sweetened to taste)  
1 cup cooked dried apricots

Sprinkle or crumble Fleischmann's Yeast into warm (not hot) water. Stir until dissolved. Scald milk. Pour into large mixing bowl or into large bowl of electric mixer. Add sugar, salt, and shortening. Cool until just lukewarm. Stir in one cup flour. Mix in dissolved yeast. Add egg and beat hard. Stir in 1 1/2 cups flour. Sprinkle 2 tablespoons of the remaining 1/4 cup flour on bread board or pastry cloth. Turn dough out on flour and knead, adding more flour as needed to make a soft dough. Brush with melted butter. With spatula spread apricots on dough. Beginning with long side roll up like jelly roll. Seal edges together with fingers. Place on greased cookie sheet, making a circle with dough. With scissors, clip ring almost to cookie sheet leaving about 1 1/2 inches apart. Brush with remaining butter. Cover with damp cloth and let rise until doubled (about 1 hour). Bake in moderate oven (350° F.) for 30 minutes. While still warm, glaze with Apricot Glaze and sprinkle with coconut.

#### APRICOT GLAZE

1 cup powdered sugar  
4 tablespoons heavy cream  
2 tablespoons cooked dried apricots

Combine ingredients; mix well.

NO HUNTING permitted in game refuges and game reserves.

SPECIAL NOTE: Unlawful to take white-winged doves or chachalacas South of U.S. Highway 83, formerly State Highway 4, in southern tip of Texas, marked on map as "Game Sanctuary," and the Big Bend National Park in Brewster County.

SHOOTING: Must be played permissibly to three-shell capacity, may not be larger than 10 gauge. Hunting doves with rifles prohibited.

SHOOTING HOURS: Mooring doves, 12 noon to sunset—except in areas having white-wing season, where the shooting hours will be from 2 p.m. to sunset on September 8, 9 and 10 (consecutive days) only. White-winged doves, in season, 2 p.m. to sunset.

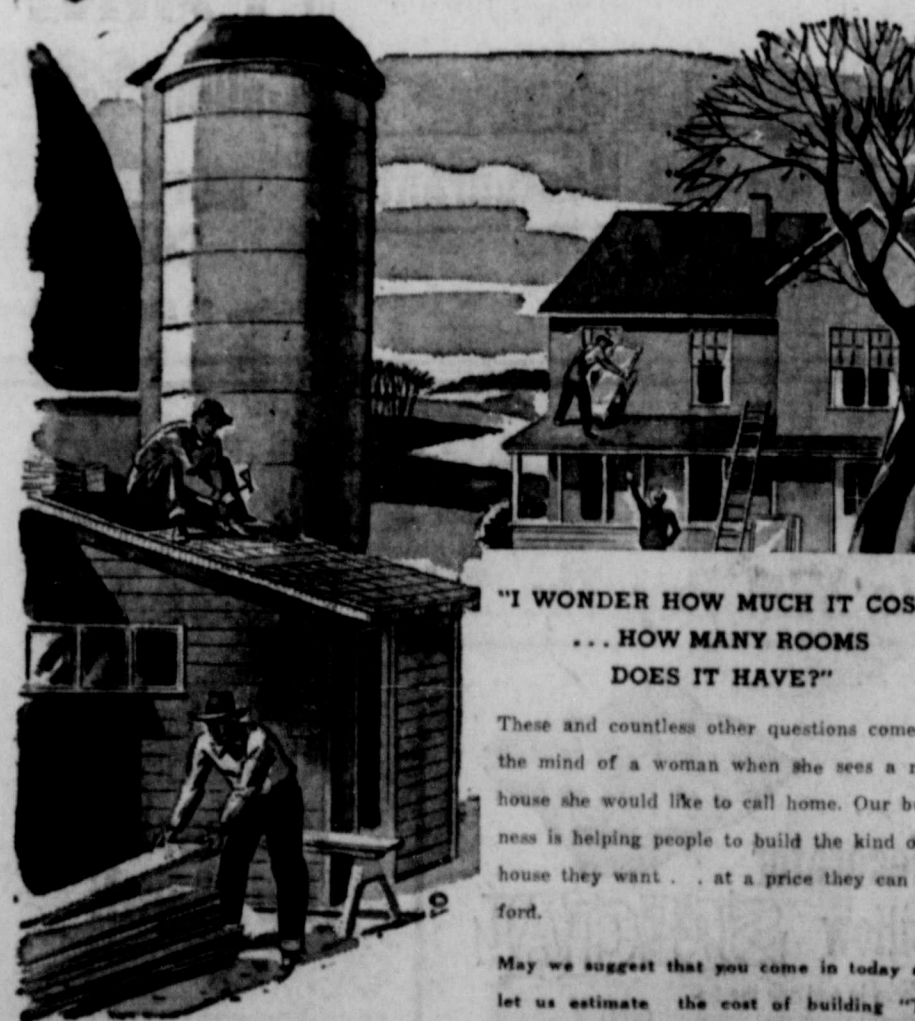
